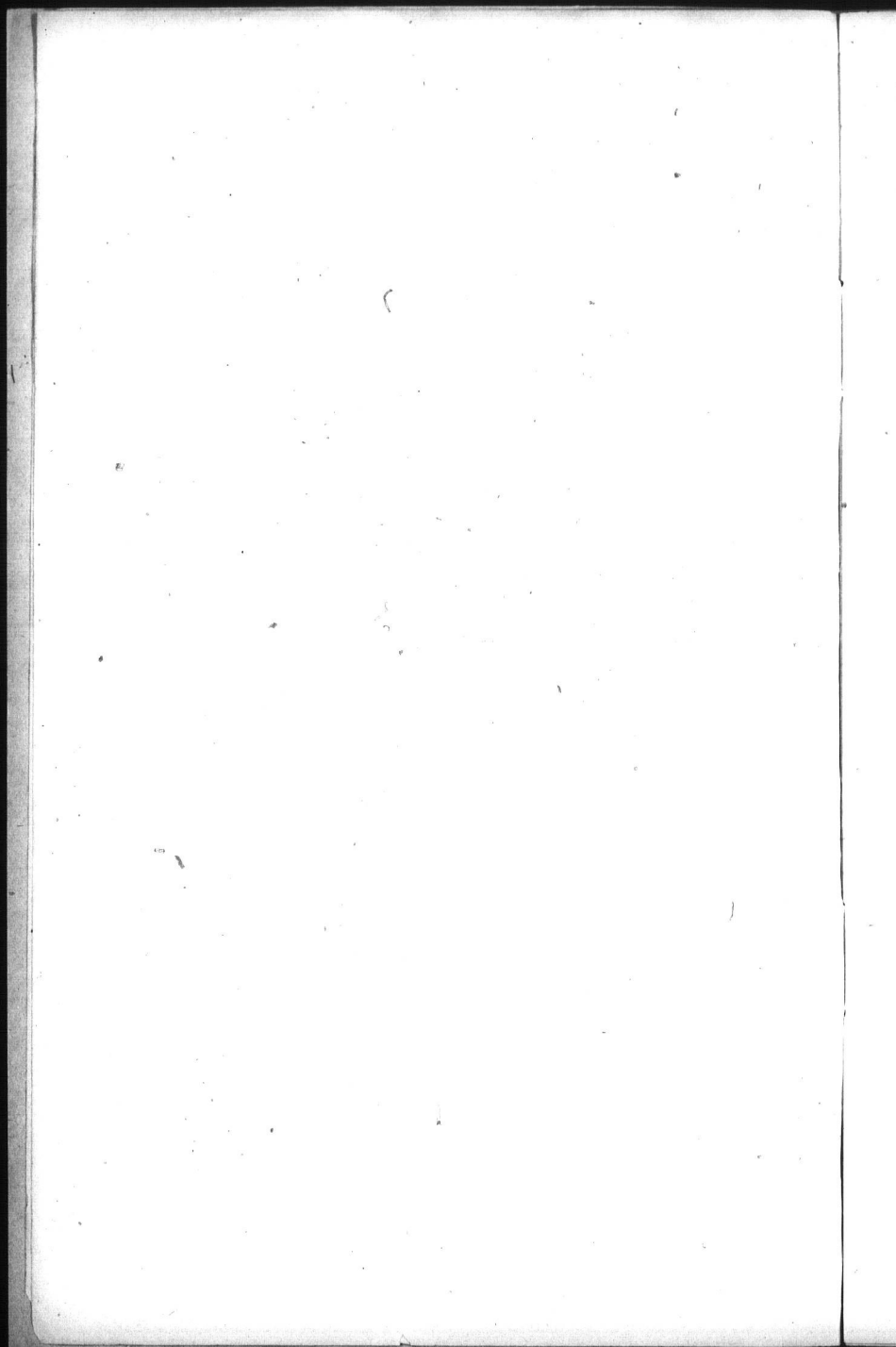

HOUSE OF INDUSTRY.

SIXTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT,

1898-99.

1. The Board of Management of the House of Industry respectfully submit their Sixty-second Annual Report of the affairs of the Institution to its friends and subscribers.

THREE NEW WINGS ERECTED.

2. At the last Annual Report mention was made of an important addition to the accommodation for inmates by the erection of an East wing to the building, since then a West wing has also been added more than doubling the former accommodation.

3. In addition to thus supplying a long felt want your Board resolved to add a South wing to afford accommodation for

AGED COUPLES,

a pressing necessity long felt by the management. Hitherto, many aged couples left without means in the evening of life, were obliged to separate in order to find a home. A commencement is made by the erection of this new South wing to provide against this added misfortune and should it be found that larger accommodation is necessary the means will doubtless be forthcoming to add to this new department.

The new East wing is already occupied and in a few weeks the other two wings will be ready for occupation and a formal opening will then be announced, when it is hoped that all our charitable citizens will avail themselves of the opportunity of inspecting the whole institution and its work.

4. In venturing upon this

EXTENSIVE ENLARGEMENT,

the Management decided that if the invested funds of the Trust were expended in providing ample modern accommodation for the aged poor that the cost of maintenance would willingly be provided by the city through the council and the charitable public.

The cost of these new wings, with the necessary furniture, will fall little short of the sum of

TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS,

all taken out of the invested funds of the Charity, the income from which has hitherto been reserved for the maintenance of the inmates.

INMATES.

5. The number of permanent inmates at present in the House is 133, including 3 blind, 2 dumb, and 13 cripples. The number reported in the House at the same period last year was 103, showing an addition of 30 permanent inmates.

COST OF PERMANENT INMATES.

6. The total number of days' stay of inmates in the House during the year was 38,413 days, the total maintenance cost was \$7,269.35 or 18 $\frac{9}{10}$ cts. per day per capita.

OUTDOOR POOR.

7. The number of families relieved at their homes during the year is 1,817, showing a decline of 180 from the number relieved the previous year. The number of individuals is 7,691, including 1,170 men, 1,716 women, 3,505 children. The relief granted was coal 936 tons, wood 183 cords, oatmeal 6,266 lbs., rice 4,886 lbs., sugar 3,204 lbs., tea 718 lbs., 85 gals. soup daily, 22,337 meals to casuals, and 46,531 4 lb. loaves of bread, at a cost of \$12,270.62.

The grant from the city corporation has hitherto been exclusively appropriated to this outdoor and casual work, the support of the inmates being provided wholly out of income from investments, Government grant, and public subscriptions.

CASUALS.

8. The number sheltered in the Warfarers' Lodge during the winter ranged from 20 to 70 each night, the average being 44, a slight increase over last year, the average then being 40, but still a heavy decline from the year previous, the average then being 100.

The stone-breaking test is still rigorously applied, which accounts in a great measure for the permanent decline in the number of this class receiving aid from the Institution.

9. The separate reports of the various Standing Committees of the House, furnish further and interesting details for the information of the friends and subscribers of the Charity.

10. The regular religious services for the inmates are carried on by the various denominations interested and the large hall recently erected in the South wing very much increases the interest and effectiveness of these gatherings.

11. The Superintendent and Mrs. Laughlen have had additional responsibilities and duties imposed upon them during the year owing to the extensive alterations and additions in progress during the whole year, but all the details of the work were well attended to notwithstanding these drawbacks.

12. The Matron and her daughter discharged the duties of that department efficiently although sharing in the exceptional trials of the year caused by the building operations, and in addition had thirty per cent. increase in the number of inmates to look after.

13. The Treasurer's Statement furnishes full details not only of the cost of maintenance of the inmates and of distributing the City funds for the relief of the out-door poor, but also the actual cost of the extensive additions made to the building.

REPORT OF CASUAL POOR COMMITTEE.

To the Board of the House of Industry :

HOMELESS POOR OF TORONTO.

The number who found shelter at the Wayfarers' Lodge for the year April, 1898, to April, 1899, was 335; the numbers for three consecutive years being 441, 377, and 335. There were 28 whose age was less than 20, and 288 whose age was between 20 and 30. The total number of nights these were in the rooms of the House was 5,716 and cost of maintenance was \$914.63. Average number of nights to each person, 17.

The number of men who came from outside the city and found shelter in the Lodge last year was 934 as against 1,015 the year before. The numbers for the three consecutive years being 1,094, 1,015, and 934. The total number of nights granted to this class was 3,707. The cost of maintenance was \$609.74. Therefore, the total number of men in the Wayfarers' Lodge for the past year was 1,269, the year before it was 1,392, the three consecutive years being 1,535, 1,392 and 1,269. During the year 31 women found shelter in the House, therefore, the total number of persons was 1,300. Average number, 4 nights.

The average number in the Lodge each night during the past season was 44.

The total cost of the Lodge for the year was \$1,524.37, as against \$1,780.25 the year before. The three consecutive years being \$1,954.64, \$1,780.25, and \$1,524.37.

It is gratifying to know that during the year a number of comfortable and well equipped county homes have been erected for the care of the poor, and that other counties are now moving along the same line.

Quite a decline in the number of prisoners committed to jail during the past year—628 less.

The thanks of the House are due to the City corporation for supplying an ample quantity of stone for the application of the labor test which was rigidly enforced on the casuals during the past winter months. The quantity broken was $71\frac{1}{2}$ toise, value \$429, which is now being carted out of the yard and put upon the streets of the city.

All those who have the management of the Lodge did the work required of them faithfully and satisfactorily.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OUTDOOR RELIEF.

To the Board of the House of Industry :

GENTLEMEN,—Your Committee have pleasure in stating that the work of visitation has been carried on with much devotion to the needy families of the various portions of the city. It is a matter for sincere satisfaction that whilst we have passed through one of the severest winters experienced for many years, the expenditure has been a good deal less than on the previous year. The cause of this saving is no doubt due in a large measure to the manifest improvement in many business centres in our city and country. For this return of better days and brighter prospects we are truly grateful. Another cause of this lessening of expenses in this department of the Board's work is doubtless due to the increasing efficiency of our faithful and self-denying visitors. So long as the present staff is maintained and men are willing to give their time and best judgment to this benevolent work there need not be any well founded fears that the poor of our city will suffer. To have such men as compose the visiting staff of this House of Industry, who are ready at every call of need to make personal and patient investigation into each case before commending it to the Board for aid, is the best guarantee that the money devoted by the city council or donated by the friends of the Institution, shall be wisely administered. Your Committee feel that these visitors deserve the best thanks of the citizens of Toronto and of your Board for the services they have rendered to many homes of want during the past severe winter. It is an honor to our city that so many men are found within its gates who are willing to bestow so much attention on a truly important and benevolent work.

Owing to the disturbance of building we have had more sickness than usual during the past winter, but none of the cases from that cause proved fatal, and since the admission of the new applicants my work continues to show an increased average, for "one touch of nature makes all men kin," and hope, the most lasting of all the emotions, prompts our poor old incurables, when brought in sight of free medicine, to try again for relief, just as the well-to-do under like circumstances so often try every worthless nostrum of the advertising charlatan.

During the year nine men and two women have died of the respective ages of 72, 73, 74, two of 75, two of 77, and one each at 79, 83, 84, and 88 years.
