THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
TO THE
DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY
OF THE
CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN CANADA
CONSTITUTION

(As amended September 16th 1892.)

1. This Association shall be called "The Woman's Auxiliary to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada."
2. The objects of this Association shall be : By means of united intercessory prayer and systematic efforts, to diffuse missionary intelligence and increase missionary activity among women of the Church ; to unite previously existing societies in one interest, and to endeavor to organize Diocesan and Parochial branches of the Auxiliary throughout Canada.
3. All women of the Church who shall contribute to the funds of the Auxiliary annually, either through a Diocesan or Parochial branch, or as individual Church women, shall be considered members of this Association.
4. The Board of Management shall consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, (Presidents of Diocesan Branches), Recording, Corresponding and Dorcas Secretaries, Treasurer and three Diocesan Officers elected from each Diocese.
5. All Officers except the Vice-Presidents, shall be elected by ballot at the Triennial meeting and no officer hold more than one office at one time on the Board of Management.
6. A General Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be held once in three years, at the time of the Provincial Synod.
7. A special meeting of the Provincial Board of Management may be called by the President at her discretion, seven to form a quorum.

BY-LAWS

1. The wife of the Metropolitan shall be Honorary President of the Auxiliary.
2. Missionary Diocesan Auxiliaries shall have the privilege of representation by substitute at the Triennial meeting.
3. The Recording Secretary shall give notice of all meetings of the Association, and propose and submit to the general meeting a triennial report.
4. The Corresponding Secretary shall attend to the correspondence with the branches of the Society; and to her application may be made for information connected with the work of the Auxiliary.
5. The Treasurer shall receive and keep account of all money collected at the General Meeting, shall receive and transmit any contributions sent through her to the Board of Missions, shall receive annual statements from the Diocesan Treasurers, and shall submit a statement of the whole to the general meeting.
6. All Diocesan and Parochial Associations shall have the privilege of designating the fields of work to which they wish their contributions applied.
7. Diocesan branches shall be required to make annual reports to the Woman's Auxiliary and send two delegates to the general meeting.

2. The objects of this Association shall be : To pray for missions ; to awaken missionary zeal among the church women in the Diocese ; to diffuse missionary intelligence ; to raise money for missionary objects ; and to encourage the formation of Parochial Branches throughout the Diocese.

3. A Board of Management of the Diocesan Branch shall consist of a President (who shall be the wife of the Bishop of the Diocese), Vice-Presidents (who shall be the Presidents of the various Parochial Branches), a Treasurer, a Recording and Corresponding Secretary, together with members, to be nominated by the Bishop of the Diocese.

4. The Diocesan Branch shall have charge of all Parochial Branches, and shall be the medium between the Parochial Branches and the Woman's Auxiliary to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society.

5. Parochial Branches shall be required to report annually to the Diocesan Branch, and shall be represented by delegates at the Annual Meeting.

6. The Board of Management shall hold quarterly meetings for arranging plans of work, and for the transaction of such general business as may come before the Board.

7. The Annual Meeting shall be held _____, at which meeting all reports shall be presented, and officers elected for the ensuing year.

8. A special meeting of the Diocesan Board may be called at any time by the President, upon the request of any three members of the Board.

9. This Constitution may be changed at any regular meeting of the Board by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, notice in writing having been given at a previous meeting.

BY-LAWS

1. The President, or one of the Vice-Presidents, shall preside at all meetings. She shall take the general supervision of the Parochial branches, and urge the formation of such branches in all parishes of the Diocese.

2. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct all the correspondence of the Diocesan Branch, and furnish the Parochial Branches with all possible intelligence concerning the work of Domestic and Foreign Missions.

PAROCHIAL CONSTITUTION

1. This Association shall be called "The _____ Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada."

2. The objects of this Branch shall be : To pray for missions ; to aid the Woman's Auxiliary in its work of interesting church women in missionary work by one common bond of harmonized effort ; to diffuse missionary intelligence and to infuse missionary zeal amongst the children of the Church ; to receive contributions towards the funds of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society.

3. All women of the church who desire to be members of this Association may become such by the payment of an annual subscription (from 10 cents to \$1.00).

4. The Board of Management shall consist of a President, Vice-President, a Recording and Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer, together with two women nominated by the Rector of the Parish.

5. By a two-thirds vote at any General Meeting, this Branch shall be qualified to receive contributions for Diocesan Missions.

BY-LAWS

1. The President, or, in her absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall preside at all meetings.

2. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to give notice of all meetings, and to keep a record of such meetings. She shall prepare the Annual Report, and send an annual statement of the work of the Branch to the Secretary of the Diocesan Auxiliary.

3. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct all the correspondence of the Society, and shall prepare an Annual Report of such correspondence.

4. The Treasurer shall receive and forward to the Diocesan Treasurer all money offerings, and keep an account of all money and articles contributed for Missionary purposes. She shall present a monthly statement, and prepare an Annual Report to be presented at the Annual Meeting, and shall also send to the Diocesan Treasurer a yearly financial Report.

5. The Board shall endeavor to increase in the church a Missionary spirit; shall decide on the best methods of augmenting the funds; endeavor to promote in every way the efficiency of the Branch in its labor of love and mercy, by visiting the several congregations, explaining the objects of the Society, enrolling new members, and soliciting regular subscriptions.

OF THE SECOND TRIENNIAL MEETING
OF THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

1892

The second Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada took place in Montreal in September 1892 at the same time as the Provincial Synod. A special service with Holy Communion was held for the W. A. in Christ Church Cathedral on the morning of the 15th Sept. The business meetings were held in the Synod Hall beginning on the afternoon of the 14th. A meeting of the Board of Management was held on the evening of Tuesday the 13th and a closing meeting of the Board as newly constituted on the morning of the 19th. The minutes of the business meetings follow.

It was proposed by Mrs Tilton, Ontario, seconded by Mrs Thorneloe, Quebec, that the minutes of last Triennial meeting having been printed and circulated be considered read and laid upon the table.—*Carried.*

Mrs Tilton, Corresponding Secretary, read a letter from Mrs Cumming, Toronto, regretting her unavoidable absence through the serious illness of her husband. Mrs Hoskins now take her place as representative for Calgary diocese.

A letter from Mrs Sullivan asking that Mrs Boomer be permitted to represent Algoma for her was read.

The having been mentioned that the wife of the Bishop of Ohio was present, the President invited that lady to take a seat with the officers.

Mrs Holden, Montreal, read an address of welcome to the visiting delegates.

The Recording Secretary read her report.

It was moved by Mrs Leach, Montreal, seconded by Mrs R. V. Rogers, Ontario, that the report be adopted.

The Corresponding Secretary read her report, at the close of which Mrs Tilton wished to thank the Diocesan Officers, through the President, for their gift of a life membership to her during the year 1891.

The President called upon Mrs Irvine, Quebec, to read the Treasurer report, which that lady did, and in some explanatory remarks added to her report said that the sum of \$1,000 per year for current expenses, seemed a large one for the purpose.

Mrs Rogers, Ontario, asked the Treasurer whether diocesan expenses were not in each case covered by the assessment for the purpose.

Mrs Williamson, Toronto, said that all working expenses in Toronto, printing, postage, etc., were provided for out of a separate fund formed by a ten cent fee from each member.

Mrs Finkle, Huron, said that the same method, in effect, was adopted in that diocese.

Mrs Rogers said it was the same in Ontario.

Mrs Holden, Montreal, said that the member's fees were used for the working expenses in Montreal.

The President called for the Dorcas Secretary report. Mrs Tilton read it, after which Miss Patterson rose to remark that Toronto had not valued boxes during the past year.

Mrs Sutherland, Niagara, wished that special printed forms could be sent by the Dorcas Secretary to the Diocesan Secretaries.

Mrs Tilton said that such were about to be prepared.

Mrs Renaud said that ladies had formerly put a money value upon their work as well as upon the material, but now the feeling was that it was much better to give the work freely unvalued.

Mrs Rogers asked the Treasurer if the assessment for Diocesan expenses was counted separately.

The Treasurer replied that all the Diocesan expenses were counted together.

It was moved by Mrs Finkle, Huron, seconded by Miss McCord, Montreal, that the report be adopted.—*Carried.*

Mrs Tilton moved that a committee be appointed of the Vice-President to confer with the Domestic and Foreign mission Board as to the work of the Lady missionaries and other work connected with the auxiliary.

Mrs Williamson, Toronto, proposed a meeting of the vice-Presidents to elect one or more of their member and the delegates, to confer with the Board. Mrs Tilton consented that her resolution should take that form which was then seconded by Mrs Williamson and *Carried.*

Mrs Sutherland, Niagara, rose to say that Diocese would not be willing to give up the disposition of their funds. They would prefer to choose the objects for whom these shall be employed.

Mrs Boomer said she was quite sure the feeling would be the same in Huron.

Mrs Williamson, Toronto, moved, seconded by Mrs Rogers, Ontario, that the vice-Presidents be appointed a nominating committee to nominate the various committee for the business meetings of the following days.

A hymn was sung while the collection was being taken up, after which the President pronounced the benediction and the meeting adjourned.

Mrs. Tilton in the Chair.

A Hymn was sung. The President led in prayer.

The Roll was called by Mrs Leach, Recording Secretary.

Mrs Tilton called upon Mrs Williamson to read committee list which were as follows, moved by Mrs Williamson, Toronto, seconded par Mrs Rogers, Ontario, that the vice-President of this Provincial Auxiliary act as a nominating committee to choose form among the delegates present to arrange the various subjects for discussion. Brief accounts were next given the work done in the various Diocesan Branches, by members of the Auxiliary called upon by the President.

Mrs Muckleston, spoke for Ontario.

Miss McCord for Montreal.

Miss Montizambert for Quebec very briefly as she said the information had all been touched upon in the reports of the previous day.

It was moved by Mrs Fessenden, Niagara, seconded by Mrs Ker, Niagara that the meeting adjourne to attend the Provincial Synod.—*Carried.*

The meeting then adjourned.

SYNOD HALL, 2.30 P. M.

Mrs. Lewis in the Chair.

After devotional exercises, the roll was called and the minutes of last meeting read.

The President called for the report from Toronto, which was read by Mrs Dumoulin.

The next called for was the Dorcas report, Toronto, which was read by Miss Paterson in the course of which she said that the offer to convey bales from the auxiliary free of freight charges, which at first been received with so much pleasure was afterwards found to be transferred with so many restrictions that it was practically useless, and the speaker would be glad to see said offer refused by the auxiliary in future.

Mrs Ker, Niagara, read report for that diocese.

Miss Montizambert said that Miss Mellish, Lady Missionary to the Indians in Mrs Burman's R. L. school had not been mentioned.

Mrs Boomer read the report for Huron.

Dr Mockridge was then introduced by Mrs Houghton.

Rev. Dr Mockridge addressing the meeting referred to the first beginning of the Auxiliary seven years ago, and then said that his message from the Board was concerning the Canadian Missionary Magazine. The Board hoped that the Auxiliary might be induced to undertake it systematically in such a way as to make it a success. He deprecated any rivalry with the "Leaflet" on the part of the magazine and said there was room for both. He mentioned that a juvenile paper was about to be started in connection with the Missionary Magazine.

Mrs Lewis made some remarks on the benefits of a child's mission paper.

Mrs Tilton spoke of the way in which their local church magazine in Ontario was managed and asked Dr Mockridge if the Board Magazine could be supplied at similar, reduced rates.

Dr Mockridge replied that if 50 copies were taken in a parish, each subscriber could get it for 35 cents a year, that is without covers.

Mrs Tilton asked Dr Mockridge if he would represent the ladies at the Missionary Meeting in the evening and give a summary of Auxiliary work.

Mrs Hoskins asked question about Child's Magazine.

Mrs Tilton asked how many pages the Auxiliary could have in the Magazine.

The President asked Mrs Irvine to finish her report, which she did.

Mrs Paterson, representing N. W. spoke on behalf of work in that diocese.

Mrs Boomer, as representative for Algoma made a report for that diocese, reading first a letter from Mrs Sullivan, referring in sadly touching words to the illness of the Bishop, who sent a special message of gratitude and regard from his sick bed to the Auxiliary. In conclusion Mrs Boomer made an earnest appeal to the meeting for help for the superannuation fund of Algoma.

Mrs Lewis handed a donation for this fund to Mrs. Boomer.

Mrs Rogers suggested that a box be placed on the table to receive thank offerings for that or other purposes.

Mrs Tilton now read the report on Foreign Missions, and handed round to the delegates a photo of Miss Lings and her mission class children. Also read the appeal for the Chinese in British Columbia, and exhibited banners sent by teachers of Chinese mission school giving an account of school.

Mrs Williamson, Toronto, was called upon to give some report of the conference of the Auxiliary Committee with the Board of missions. Matters were still under consideration so report would not be given till following day. Mrs Williamson mentioned that Miss Sherlock the lady missionary in Japan, was shortly to be married; but would remain at her post till Easter until another lady could be sent to fill her place. It was suggested that she should refund her passage money to be used for the next lady going out.

Mrs Tilton said that the Auxiliary having merely acceded to the request of the Domestic and Foreign Board in the matter of Miss Sherlock in providing the funds, could not make conditions.

Mrs Boomer thought that in future all lady missionaries sent out by the Auxiliary should be under a promise to fulfil their engagement with the Society for a term of years.

The resolutions on amendments to Constitution were called for.

Mrs Finkle, Huron, asked that this portion of the session's business be deferred till the following day when it was hoped that Mrs Baldwin would be able to be present, therefore.

Mrs Tilton moved that the meeting proceed to discuss the next item upon the programme "The use and benefit of a Uniform badge."

Mrs Lewis asked for remarks and Mrs Williamson, Toronto, opened the discussion, spoke of the beginning of the idea, the difficulty of recognition between members of the Auxiliary and passed round examples of four different designs, to make choice

from. The speaker said one of them the Winchester cross was the oldest in mission work except St. Andrews'. Each diocese could return its colour to fasten the badge on, and wearing it would be entirely optional with every member.

Mrs Boomer said that Huron was indifferent about the use of the badge, but would be willing to accede to the wishes of the other dioceses.

Mrs Finkle, Huron, said when the matter had been placed before their meeting, several speakers had spoken against it, and no one, had spoken in favor of its use.

Mrs Fessenden, Niagara, spoke in favor of the badge.

Mrs Muckleston said Ontario thought it unnecessary.

Mrs Holden said Montreal was in favor of the use of the badge and preferred the one, chosen by Toronto but would fall in with the wishes of the other dioceses.

Mrs Von Iffland, Quebec, in favor of badge. Mrs Tilton said she had first been attracted by it from seeing it worn by Mrs Twing N. S. Auxiliary.

Mrs Williamson said it should be a badge of Union of the whole Auxiliary.

Mrs Rogers, Ontario, thought it should be unanimous, and would only be in favor of it if all the dioceses adopted it.

Mrs Finkle, said Huron would agree to that.

Mrs Williamson mentioned the matter of the Leaflet, and its very largely increased circulation since last meeting, after its adoption by the various dioceses, to show that union is strength and that a common badge would help towards that end. The badges could be obtained, if made in large quantities, of silver for about 35 cents each.

Mrs Muckleston, Ontario, said one disadvantage of a badge worn by all was that there were many who were not working member, but thought their responsibility ended when they had paid their ten cent fee.

Miss Montizambert, Quebec, said badge should be as plain and inexpensive as possible. In her branch the cost of 25 cents would put it quite out of the reach of many of the members.

Mrs Rogers, Ontario, thought if they had a badge at all it should be good of its kind but inexpensive.

Mrs Tilton read the resolutions to be discussed the following day from Niagara, Toronto, Quebec and Huron.

Moved by Mrs Dumoulin, Toronto, seconded by Mrs Holden, Montreal, that plain silver, Winchester Cross be adopted, wearing to be optional by members.—*Carried.*

After devotional exercises and Roll call the minutes of Thursday afternoon session were read and some corrections made when.

It was moved by Mrs Williamson, Toronto, seconded by Mrs Ker, Niagara, that the minutes of previous meeting be adopted.—
Carried.

Mrs Holden asked if notices of the meetings had been sent the Montreal papers, each day.

A notice had been given by the Recording Secretary, to reporter but had not appeared in evening papers.

Mrs Tilton now called for resolutions on amendment of clauses 4 to 8 of the Constitution.

Mrs Williamson, Toronto, read her resolutions as follows:

That clauses 4 and 5 of the Provincial Constitution be amended to read. The Board of Management shall consist of a President, Vice Presidents (Presidents of Diocesan Branches), General Secretary, General Recording Secretary, General Dorcas Secretary, General Treasurer, and three Diocesan officers.

Also that clauses 5 and 6 be amended to read.

All officers of the Central Board (except the Vice Presidents) shall be elected at each Triennial meeting by ballot and no officer shall hold more than one office at a time on the Central Board.

Also that clause 8 shall be amended to read.

The Central Board shall meet annually in September in the several dioceses by rotation and a general meeting of the whole Auxiliary shall be held once in three years.

The resolution was then discussed.

Mrs Rogers, Ontario, asked question as to words "Central Board", Mrs Williamson and Mrs Tilton explained further. Mrs Rogers thought the words "Central Board" confusing.

Mrs Von Iffland asked question as to members of Provincial Board.

The insertion of the words Board of Management instead of association was suggested.

Mrs Finkle regretted Mrs Baldwin's absence through illness and asked if she might speak for her. Answer in the affirmative.

Mrs Finkle said that in Huron it was thought that great caution should be exercised in making changes in the constitution.

Mrs Rogers read clause 9 in constitution giving power to make changes from time to time.

Mrs Tilton thought changes were necessary as an association grows.

Mrs Von Iffland moved in amendment that a fixed number of diocesan officers be named.

Mrs Boomer wished the words "three diocesan officers" be inserted.

The amendment was that carried and read as follow.

Moved by Mrs Finkle, Huron, seconded by Mrs Von Iffland, Quebec, that clauses 4 et 5 of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

That the Board of Management consist of a President, Vice Presidents (Presidents of the Diocesan Branches), a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Dorcas Secretary, a Treasurer, and three Officers from each diocese.—*Carried.*

Mrs Von Iffland, Quebec, proposed, seconded by Mrs Muckleston, Ontario, that the President be elected at each Triennial meeting.—*Carried.*

Mrs Williamson spoke to her motion of amendment of further clauses.

Mrs Fessenden spoke on subject of Board of Management meeting annually.

Miss Montizambert, Quebec, moved, seconded by Mrs Thorneloe, Quebec, that the words Triennial meeting be inserted instead of annual.

Mrs Williamson thought some provision should be made to represent the children's work in the shape of a Secretary for juvenile work, also that duties of delegates should be defined.

Mrs Tilton thought Board of Management should meet oftener that once in three years.

The amendment to Mrs Williamson's motion having been carried, Mrs Williamson withdrew her resolution. She would like to have time of annual meeting for Board of Management stated. It would be a good time when the Board of D. and F. hold their meeting.

Mrs Tilton having said that the election of Officers would take place at the beginning of afternoon session, and explained the difference between an open nomination and one by ballot, it was,

Moved by Mrs Muckleston, Ontario, seconded by Miss Paterson, that the mode of nomination by ballot be followed for election of Officers.

Mrs Lindsay and Mrs Everett were appointed scrutineers and the meeting adjourned after singing the doxology.

Mrs Tilton explained now the voting was done for the benefit of those not present in the morning.

Voting papers were then given out nineteen votes for Mrs Tilton, nomination as President were given in. She was elected by acclamation, votes were given for Mrs Pollard, Ontario, for Miss Montizambert, Quebec, for Mrs Cumming, Toronto, for Mrs Boomer, Huron.

Miss Montizambert wished to decline in favour of Mrs Pollard ; it was decided Mrs Pollard, must be asked if she would accept, nomination for Recording Secretary was proceeded with, for which 13 votes were given for Miss McCord, 4 for Miss Montizambert, 2 irregular papers.

Miss McCord refused the honor. The nomination for Treasurer, Mrs Irvine received twelve votes, Mrs Rogers Ontario, 3 Mrs Boomer, Huron, 2, Miss Shortiss 1, Miss Halson 1.

Mrs Tilton in a few kind words asked the members to give a standing vote of thanks to the retiring, Recording Secretary, Mrs Leach, Montreal, which was done.

In the nomination for Dorcas Secretary, Miss Paterson, Toronto, received the largest number of votes, Miss Shortiss less, Miss Paterson there fore was elected unanimously.

Mrs Holden, Montreal, then proposed, seconded by Mrs Williamson, that Mrs Denne, Montreal, be nominated as Recording Secretary.

The election of officers was now declared and resulted as follows, Mrs Tilton, President, Miss Montizambert, Corresponding, Miss Paterson, Dorcas Secretary, Mrs Irvine, Treasurer.

Mrs Tildon introduced the subject of a uniform prayer.

Mrs Von Iffland, Quebec, thought we should have one common prayer, uniting the whole Auxiliary.

Mrs Holden, Montreal, is of the same opinion.

Mrs Rogers, Ontario, spoke on the subject of reading and prayer in the branches.

Mrs Williamson, Toronto, thought that the subject for reading and prayer should be taken away with us for the summer. Might be of use to people living in the country, a dearth of information about missions being often the state of things in farm houses. We need in the Auxiliary to stir up concentrated effort. Missions information in an attractive form might be recommended to all our Branches and to use the prayer for Missions at the hour of noon.

Mrs Boomer said in Huron the country branches write for any book they require for Missionary information to the lending library of the Diocesan Branch.

Miss Montizambert, spoke of the plan followed in Quebec.

Mrs Renaud, spoke on the same subject.

Mrs Lewis, said having now heard several speakers, would any lady make a resolution on the matter.

Mrs Tilton asked if the committee on the Leaflet were ready with their report.

Mrs Williamson replied that they were.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY REPORT

Sept. 1892.

The Report of a Secretary embracing three years correspondence, could be made most extensive, and consequently take up much time of this meeting; it is not proposed however, to occupy, one moment more than necessary to give the important items of interest.

Your Secretary would first acknowledge the goodness of the Lord in prospering this part of the Auxiliary's work. During the three years, there has been no correspondence that has not been blessed to the work, and with the Secretaries of the different Dioceses, there has been maintained most uninterrupted sympathy and unity which is to day acknowledged with deep gratitude to Him—who can "make all of one mind in a house."—

DELEGATE TO TRIENNIAL OF U. S.

After the Triennial meeting of 1889, your Secretary went to New-York, as a delegate from the "Woman's Auxiliary of Canada," to the Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the United States. A letter in the "Church Missionary Magazine," in January 1890, gave you a report of that grand meeting, and the warm greetings extended to your representative. It may be many years before so large a body of Church workers, can be gathered together in Canada; but, it really was not the numbers present, that impressed one so deeply, as the spirit of love and enthusiasm manifested for the work of Christ and His Church; it prevailed over every thing else at both sessions, and that spirit, is within our reach. "Keeping the unity of the spirit, in the bond of peace."

MISS EMERY

The influence and power of Miss Emery was most marked. In the chair, at the Diocesan Officers meeting, or acting as Secretary, at the Triennial one could see, whilst ministering to her own, she had been appointed, for more extended work.

BOARD OF D. & F. MISSIONS

Resolutions passed by the Board of D. and F. Missions, at its meeting in October 1890, were received and may, with others be

(19) That the Board acknowledge with pleasure the receipt of the statement of the Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary for the year, 1890, and congratulate them on their success, and that the Board would ask that in future the money actually received and paid out for Domestic and Foreign Missions should be embodied in a separate statement which will greatly facilitate their work in comparing the different accounts placed before them, and that statements of moneys collected for Home or Diocesan Missions and other purposes not within the scope of the Board's duties and statements of clothing might be embodied in a separate account.

"That the Board would respectfully represent to their most valuable Auxiliary of Churchwomen, which has done and is doing so much towards promoting the important objects of our great Society the necessity as well as the duty as far as practicable of leaving the appropriation of all funds collection in the various dioceses or parishes, to the discretion of the Board of Management. The Board feels that the Bishops of the Missionary Dioceses, are the proper authorities to make the appointments, and to adjudicate all moneys contributed by the Church for their respective dioceses, and the Board would ask their estimable Auxiliary, to sustain the Board's hands in the administration of its funds through the legitimate channels."

NOVA SCOTIA

It was a matter of regret, to learn from the Secretary of the Branch of the Auxiliary in Truro, Nova Scotia in June 1890. that it was obliged to withdraw from The Woman's Auxiliary, as the Bishop of the Diocese felt its efforts for the present, should be directed towards the work of their own Diocese.

ALGOMA

Letters and resolutions have been received from the Diocese of Algoma expressing a warm appreciation of all that the Auxiliary has done for missions in that Diocese: these were published in the magazine, and Leaflet when received, and copies sent to the Secretary of each Diocese: The representative of Algoma, Mrs Boomer, in the absence of delegates from the Auxiliaries of this Diocese, will be able to tell you of its present needs.

RUPERT'S LAND AND THE NORTH WEST

Appeals for clothing and Church Linen have been received from Ruperts Land and the North West these were responded to, by the Dorcas workers of the different Dioceses: Appeals for money

aid, were sent to the Board of Domestic and Foreign missions or applicant recommended, to apply to Board through his own Bishop, which seemed to be the course, most in accordance with the wish of the Board. Letters have been received, saying that Mrs Cumming of Toronto diocese, had been asked to represent Calgary—Miss Paterson, of Toronto diocese, New Westminister—and Miss Halson of Niagara, Ruperts Land at this meeting.

CALEDONIA

From Caledonia, most interesting letters have been received from Mrs Ridley upon the extension of the work in that Diocese and adds. "Could we be included in the area, assisted by your Auxiliary." Tidings of the formation of an Auxiliary for Chinese Missions in the Diocese of Columbia, have been received, and this is an evidence, that our Churchwomen are engaged in a work, that has appealed to many Christian women on the Pacific Coast. The appeal, which was sent out by the Women's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, to aid in the suppression of a great evil, has come up, before the different Diocesan Annual meetings and action taken ; At the last Meeting of The Board of Missions, the following resolution was passed.

11. "That the Secretary do transmit to the Bishops of Columbia, New Westminster, and Caledonia, a copy of the memorial from Miss S. Gooderham, president of the Women's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, and authorize them to use the name of this Board in any representations, which they may, after due enquiry of the facts of both cases, see fit, either in conjunction with other Christian bodies, or simply on behalf of the Church of England to make to the Hon. Minister of Customs at Ottawa, and the Governor of the Province of British Columbia."

FOREIGN WORK—MISS SHERLOCK, Japan

In April 1891, Miss Sherlock of Southampton, Ontario, applied to the Board, to be sent to Japan, as a Medical Missionary and was accepted, her support, with fit out and expenses to Japan was entrusted, to the Auxiliary, this, the Diocesan Branches readily consented to do, and contributed at the rate of \$150 each, the first year, as well as continuing the same proportion when it was found, that the expenses were greater than was first contemplated.—The Diocese of Toronto exceeded the required sum.—Miss Sherlock left Toronto, October 8th 1891 and arrived in Japan November 8th. MISS LING, INDIA

Many of the delegates present will remember at the last Triennial Meeting, that an address was given by Miss Ling, a lady missionary from Oatacamund, South India. Her letters since her return, to her field of labour have been most interesting, she has the happiest recollections of her reception in Canada, and evidently is watching missionary life here. She writes. "I have a Canadian Church paper, sent me by a friend in Toronto in which I note with interest the progress of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Dominion, and was glad to see that the Canadian Church is about to send out its first lady Missionary. May she be the first of many. You will perhaps be interested to hear, what is being done in my station with Canadian money. A Bible woman is supported in Wellington, a heathen town, entirely unevangelized heretofore, it is about 10 miles from here. (Oatacamund) Another Bible woman has been taken on, in Coonoor to help the one already working there, whose work had grown beyond the capacities of one: Three children come out from heathenism (one boy and two girls), are being supported in Christian Schools. Help has been sent for the Mahometan work, and a donation towards a debt in one of our school buildings: One of our great interests, since my return to India, has been an opening for mission work amongst the Todas, one of the hill tribes peculiar to the Nilgiris." The accompanying photograph will give a very good idea of these people, this was sent out by Miss Wallinger, that Miss Ling's Canadian friends might see her present surroundings.

Another deputation will be sent out to Canada next month. The Hon. Winnifried Sugden, the Diocesan Secretaries have been acquainted of her tour, and are already arranging for it. Let us see, that the same gracious welcome be accorded to Miss Sugden as was extended to Mrs Greaves in 1886, and Miss Ling in 1889.

MISSIONARY SOCIETIES

Invitations have been received from the Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist Missionary Societies, to send delegates to their annual meetings, but, as the Woman's Auxiliary has only a Triennial meeting, there was no authority, by which delegates could be appointed, and the courteous invitations, were not accepted.

The following letter from Mrs Child upon the subject of a special hour for prayer for Missions, was followed by a reply from Miss Emery, both of which will interest you.

Dear Friend,

It has been suggested that all the Woman's Missionary Societies should so far as practicable observe the same hour of prayer for the progress of the kingdom of our Lord in the earth. As the hour from five to six on Sabbath afternoon has been adopted by the members of the Presbyterian and Congregational Foreign Missionary Societies, it might be pleasant for all to unite in this hour. Will you kindly take what action is necessary on the matter in your society, and let me know your decision. It is the intention of some of the societies to ask their missionaries to unite on the same hour so that it may be observed around the world.

REPORT OF THE PROVINCIAL SECRETARY OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

September 1892.

The Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of the Domestic and Foreign Missions of the Church of England in Canada beg leave to report as follows :—

Bell Irvine, 555 St. John Street, Quebec.

To bring before you in anything like detail, the progress made by so large an organization as the Woman's Auxiliary of the Dominion for the term of one year, in the space afforded, would be impossible, much more when three years are to be reviewed. It will be necessary therefore to confine the account to some brief statements of the increase in numbers since our last meeting in 1889, and also, (for this contains our annual report as well as the Triennial) to some comparison of the differences in our various diocesan Branches between this year and last.

The number of Branches reported at the last Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was 194. This time we report 361, an increase of 160 so that the association has nearly doubled its Branches in three years. The number of members reported for this year is 9,129, but this does not by any means represent our actual numbers, for it is much to be regretted that there are still so many Parochial Branches who do not report the number of members. Three years ago only 2,927 were reported, but the increase is not so great as it appears, since 1889 there were many more branches than at present where the number of members was not reported. There has been some improvement in this particular.

The total number of Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary given last year was 295, including the Juniors, so that 59 new have been

formed in the 12 months, and adding 7 from Algoma we have 66. The total membership reported was 8,268, which gives an increase of nearly a thousand but as before mentioned these figures are quite inadequate.

One or two points must be briefly noted in the history of the Woman's Auxiliary since the last Triennial meeting. First the Lady Missionaries. One, Miss Sherlock has been sent to Japan within the last year, and is wholly supported by the Auxiliary. Four other ladies are at different points in the North-West, as missionaries to the Indians. These are supported by various Diocesan Branches,—Miss Busby, by Huron, to the Blood Indians, Miss Brown, by Ontario, to the Piegans, Miss Perkis, by Toronto to the Blackfeet and a lady teacher in the Washakada Home by Montreal. It may be proper to mention here that since the last Triennial meeting the lady teachers and missionaries employed by the Auxiliary have been recognised by the Domestic and Foreign Mission Board as their own.

The Quebec Diocesan Branch held its sixth annual meeting on 12th May, 1892. We learn from the Secretary's report that this Diocesan Branch now consists of 22 Senior Branches, 2 subdivisions of Branches, and 4 Junior Branches, being and increase of 3 new Branches, 2 Senior and 1 Junior, over last year, and of 12 since the last Triennial report. There 1133 members, an increase 1173 over last year. From information received it is expected that several new branches will be formed in the near future. The number of barrels, bales, etc, sent out was not quite so large this year as last, on account of infectious disease in some of the branches, but many of the parcels were so much larger that there was not a corresponding falling off in quantity. Quebec is educating a missionary's daughter, Ethel Allman, from whom good accounts are received. Other good works aided were the Zenana Mission, Mrs Wilson's Indian Homes, a number of missions in the North West, \$100 for a lady teacher in Mr Burman's Mission, and the \$159 promised by the Diocesan Boards towards Miss Sherlock's expenses. In addition to these a set of solid silver vessels for the Holy Communion was presented to Bishop Reeves of McKenzie River in memory of the late lamented Bishop Williams of Quebec whose death was a heavy blow to the Quebec Board. The whole amount of money raised by the W. A. in Quebec diocese this year was \$1687.71, not far from being double what the total was two years ago. The officers of the Quebec Branch are:—

The number of members so far as reported is 550, against 391 reported at the last Triennial meeting. This is much under the actual number however. Some of the changes to be noted in the last three years, are the establishment of Life memberships in this Branch; the non valuation of bales in many of the Parochial Branches, and the adoption of the Leaflet. Bales of gifts have been sent to many missions in the Nort West, and to outlying mission stations in the diocese. The grant of \$200 to Miss Vidal, lady teacher at the Washakada Home, is continued, and the \$6.50 towards Miss Sherlock's expenses also given. The Treasurer's report shows a marked improvement financially, the receipts being \$1042.76. In 1889 the receipts amounted \$682.04. The Officers are:—

There are now 28 branches, but as many of these include several parishes the total number of parishes connected with the Woman's Auxiliary is 58, against 48 at the last Triennial. Four new branches have been formed since last year. Twenty-nine are Senior Branches with a membership of 1580, and twenty-three are Junior, membership 375. THE SECOND TRIENNIAL REPORT
OF THE
PROVINCIAL TREASURER
OF
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

It will not be amiss to say a few words of explanation to those who may not have followed closely the various changes made in the working of the Woman's Auxiliary since the last Triennial Meeting, otherwise the Treasurer's Report this year may prove a disappointment to them.

At the last Triennial Meeting a general Dorcas Secretary was appointed and to *her* all reports of boxes and bales of clothing, books and other articles have been sent : thus the Treasurer's accounts will show money and money only.

This change very materially diminishes the sum *total* as compared with the Report of 1889 ; but, if you will look back, you will see that at that meeting but \$27,812.77 was shown in *money* the balance \$24,389.64 being made up of the approximate values of boxes and bales ; while *this* year, with feelings of deepest gratitude and thankfulness to Him who has so abundantly blessed our feeble efforts to serve Him, we record \$44,481.02, an increase of \$16,668.25. And this is no mushroom growth, nor advance in one or two directions only, but a steady, vigorous and healthy development in all ; the large branches in wealthy communities have given more liberally, the smaller branches in, it may be less favoured localities, have gladly given more and more as God has prospered them.

At the last Triennial the subject of the education of missionaries children was fully discussed, with the result that most of the Diocesan branches in this ecclesiastical Province undertook to forward the work, some by adopting and taking entire charge of a child and others by helping the parents in various ways for the same object. In the past three years \$978, has been spent on this work a lone.

A little more than a year ago the Board of management of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society requested the Woman's Auxiliary to provide Miss Sherlock's salary and defray the expenses of her journey to Japan, where she is to work as a medical missionary. The appeal was not made in vain: nearly the *whole* amount required, \$900, for the year, had been sent in when the different Diocesan Reports were printed and I have no-doubt all has been paid ere this.

The Board of management at their last meeting urge Woman's Auxiliary to place more money "unappropriated" at their disposal. As an Auxiliary we are forced to the conclusion that we are bound to *follow* as they lead and to help them, not take the work out of their hands. Of the \$44,481, raised within the last three years but \$145, was left entirely to the Board to dispose of as they saw fit; \$1,378, was given undesignated to Domestic Missions, and \$437 undesignated to Foreign Missions, a total of only \$1,960, over which the Board had any control.

It is but natural that we should like *ourselves* to give the money we have had the trouble and labour of collecting and, without doubt, the personal interest awakened in the missionaries with whom we correspond, stimulates the zeal and enthusiasm of the workers. But may not this degenerate into the mere personal feeling for the hardships endured by individual missionaries in whom we are interested or for certain schools or missions which we have pledged ourselves to support, which will *lower* our ideal and narrow our usefulness.

We might perhaps confer with the Board of management in order to see whether it would be possible to arrange some plan of action whereby we might work more *with* them and less independently than we do at present, when they take the initiative, as in the case of Miss Sherlock, we should *follow* and complete the work laid out for us.

We are *now* too much at the mercy of our *feelings*, and he who pleads the most eloquently enlists all our sympathies, and all our money, or very nearly all, is given without any reference to the Board who have every means of knowing, and who *must* know far better than *we* can, where money is most required. I know that I am taking the unpopular side of the question, indeed I acknowledge that I have been myself convinced against my own inclinations, but in a subject so important involving issues so momentous, should we not endeavour to banish so far as possible, the rather childish desire to do as we please with our money, and willingly and gladly give in whatever way is thought to be the best by those who, from their position on the Board, are most

competent to judge that we are but

competent to judge : We need constantly to remind ourselves, that we are but an Auxiliary and *not* an independent society.

There is one more subject to bring to your attention and serious consideration. Here I am afraid, I may be treading on dangerous ground ; but, in my capacity as Treasurer, I feel I cannot pass it over without notice. I refer to the question of Diocesan expenses. For the last three years the Diocesan expenses have averaged over a thousand dollars each year.

Now I know that expenses must increase as the work grows ; but this seems an enormous amount to take each year for expenses only. Should we not weigh it well, whether such an outlay is absolutely necessary to advance the cause we all have so much at heart, before we incur it ? If it is *not* necessary cannot we resist the temptation to make it ?
