England's Eastern Policy Attacked.

On Monday Mr. Gladstone moved one of his resolutions in the British House of Commons condemning the policy of the Government in not taking a more active part in endorsing the policy of Russia towards Turkey. The Rt. Hon. gentleman had prepared five resolutions, but as they threatened to completely demoralize the Liberal party, if moved, he abandoned two of them. A press telegram summarizes the resolutions as declaring in effect that England had just cause of complaint on account of the conduct of the Porte. They refer to Lord Derby's despatch of last September relating to the Bulgarian massacres, and proceed to declare that until there is a change of conduct and guarantees are given for better Government the Porte has no moral or material claim to the support of the British Crown; that, in the midst of complications and with war actually begun, the House earnestly desires that the influence of England in the Councils of Europe be employed for the effectual development of liberty and self-government in the disturbed provinces; that the House further desires that the influence of England be addressed to the promotion of harmonious action among the European Powers, with the view of exacting such means of government from Turkey as are necessary for the purposes of humanity and justice, for effectual defence against intrigue, and for the security of the peace of the world.

Three Mails a Week on the Valley Road.

We are glad to be informed that the Postmaster General has been induced to comply with the prayer of the petitioners who asked for the restoration of the tri-weekly mail on the road between Chatham and Newcastle and Fredericton. It was at first thought that no additional cost would be entailed by giving the increased accommodation if the route were divided, but that was found to be a fallacy and the Department deserves thanks for restoring the old arrangement in the face of the extra expense, which, we believe, is about \$400.

Official Information.

What do the Miramichi gaspansax fishermen think of the fact that the Department of Marine and Fisheries is officially informed that there are only five gaspansax seines on the river. We know the names of owners of fifteen such seines, and we presume many of our local readers can count more than that number. We ask, in all seriousness, whether high officials who act on such false information are fit to deal with important matters under the control of the Department at Ottawa. We thought that after our exposure of the Miramichi Hatching House frauds the Minister would not allow himself to be hoodwinked any longer, but we have to regret that they were apparently mistaken as to his disposition to protect the public against the impostors they are now forced to put up with under the baneful rule which is fast rendering fishery administration in Northumberland worse than a farce. There is no excuse whatever for the ignorance or malice which has led to the gross misrepresentations concerning the number of gaspansax seines on the Miramichi.

They did not consider it necessary to erect mounds behind the targets as the bullets penetrate a forest. Lumber can be procured within a quarter of a mile. Accompanying the Report was a plan of the Range, showing the roads leading to it and the position of the targets which had been prepared by Ensign Loggie.

The New Post Office.

We hope the Government will lose no time in fitting up the portion of the Dominion Building at Chatham which is intended to be used as a Post Office. We took occasion, several months ago, to give expression to the public's disapproval of the Government's tardiness in the matter and are glad to know that the building is, at last, to be used.

The Price of Bass.

We observe that a statement of the Inspector of Fisheries to the effect that the bass caught in Napan and Black Rivers are no worthless that "they bring only 2 cts. per lb., while fish in good condition in winter readily bring on the ice 10 and 12 cts." is published in the News. Our contentions may learn, by making proper enquiry, that Bass bring no more than from seven to eight cents per lb. in the winter. In the Spring they are not sold by the pound, but the price in Chatham is 25 cts., per fish, the average weight being about four and a half pounds. This would make the price per pound more than five cents. Bass can be shipped abroad in winter in a naturally frozen state, and the expense of putting them into the markets of the cities of the United States is therefore small, compared with what it would be were the fish to be iced and sent away. Bass bring no more in Boston or New York city markets in April or early in May, than they do in January, February and March, and any of our readers will readily understand that while it might pay very well to ship the fish without being during the frosty months it would be quite another matter when to expense of icing is to be added the increased cost of freight in proportion to the weight of the ice and the heavier package necessary to hold it.

Archbishop of Quebec.

The Archbishop of Quebec was poisoned on Friday while celebrating mass by means of strychnine introduced into the sacramental wine. There is intense excitement and indignation over the crime, and the perpetrators have not yet been discovered.

Canada's Soldier.

OTTAWA, May 2.—The nomination for the vacancy in the Commons, for this city, took place at noon to-day when Mr. John P. Featherstone and Mr. J. M. Currier were the only two nominated. There was a meeting of the party on Monday, and no speeches were made. A mass meeting was held to-night at Featherstone's. The Minister of Customs leaves for St. John about the middle of the present month.

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OTTAWA, May 2.—A cable telegram from the Globe announces that the Daily Telegraph has a fascinating report of the efforts of military aid from Canada to Great Britain in case it should be wanted. 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OTTAWA, May 4.—Information has been received here that three British iron-clads and the 42nd regiment, Colonel Cameron's, will shortly proceed to Halifax.

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OTTAWA, May 5.—In the Chamber of Deputies, at Versailles, on Thursday, Minister Simon, replying to Lehoucq's interpellation relative to Ultramarine intrigues, said neither the Government nor any political party could be held answerable for the attacks on foreign governments in the newspapers. The petitions for the re-establishment of temporal power were the work of a feeble minority. The Government had not a step to these petitions and would not tolerate any attack on Catholicism, which it sincerely respected, and which now enjoyed unprecedented liberty. All parties must respect the law, and the Government must protect the clergy while they confined themselves to their spiritual duties, but would deal firmly with them if they encroached on the civil power. The Government has distinguished a conciliatory policy, but neither in France and Europe, and would henceforth act with resolution.
