President Chipman explained that Mr. W. C. Pearce, whose name was on the programme to speak on "Modern Sunday School Methods," had been delayed in reaching Chatham by a change in the time of the train he was to take leaving Boston, but he would be here tomorrow, meantime, the programme of the evening would, necessarily, be departed from to some extent on account of Mr. Pearce's regretted absence.
