HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

remier Roblin Gives Interview on Probable Result of Tomorrow's Vote.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 18.—When Premier Roblin was asked as to the telephone question coming up for vote by the municipalities on the 18th, he said:—"The people are almost unanimously in favor of municipal ownership of local exchanges, with long distance lines owned by the government. They have been confused by the articles appearing in newspapers controlled by the Bell people and by cunning agents employed by that company, pretending to be the farmers' friends. If every elector votes 'yes' on the 18th, it does not mean that they will necessarily have a municipal 'phone; it simply means that they endorse the principle and may have the advantages if they wish them.

"After it carries and before an ex "After it carries and before an exchange can be established, a sufficient number of subscribers must sign a contract to take the 'phone, to guarantee the interests on cost of construction, etc., just the same as the Bell system, only that we give a better system for half or less. The collection of the charge will be made distinct from ordinary rates; in a word, the taxpayer charge will be made distinct from or-dinary rates; in a word, the taxpayer will not know from his rate bill that there is such a thing as a municipal 'phone. Only those who use a 'phone will have anything to pay, exactly as under the Bell'"





Various Notes of the Latest and Prettiest the Fashions Offer

MANY TOWNS FAGE A FUEL FAMINE

inent in Western State, While in North West It Exists.

In Many Places Not Even a Pound Can be Bought-Fuel Trains to be Given Preference.

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 18—With coal selling in Tonopah at sixty dollars a ton, and the Northwest unable to get fuel at any price, because railroads say there is a shortage of cars, there are more than four thousand empty cars standing on side tracks in Kansas City alons. Reports from various railroad division points in Missouri and Kansas indicate that cars are plentiful in both states, The heaviest snowstorm of the winter is general over Southwestern Missouri, Southeastern Kansas, and parts of Oklahama and the Indian Territory. Much suffering will result and the snow is from two to six feet deep. The Northwest no longer faces a fuel famine, it experiences one. Careful inquiry in the northern half of North Dakota shows there is not a town in which coal can be had except in small quantities and to supply immediate needs and in some places there is not a pound to be bought, dealers having been out of fuel for days and in some cases for a week or more.

In the face of the serious conditions the people are giving no attention to the lack of cars for wheat shipments, and great piles of wheat that lie loose on the ground are buried under the snow. Individuals, commercial and civic bodies and newspapers demand that fuel have right of way over that fuel have right of way over

everything.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 18—Sentor Hansborough, of North Dakota, consulted the members of the Interstate Commerce Commission in reference to the coal famine. He declared the attention resulting from the shortstate Commerce Commission in reference to the coal famine. He declared the situation resulting from the shortage of coal in his state was most deplorable, and that the public schools in some localities were closing on account of lack of fuel to keep the children warm. It is said that for a number of years past at this season, and earlier in the year, there have been complaints of lack of equipment to properly transport coal, but the situation in this respect was never so acute as now.

The commission will begin investigating the situation next week at Minneapolis and Chicago.

MANGUM, Okla., Dec. 18—A coal famina is now prevailing in this part of Oklahoma. There is no timber for fuel, and many farmers are burning fences and outbuildings. The weather is cold. Coal in transit is confiscated by the railroads, and apparently there is no relief in sight. Fifty farmers went to the Rock Island station today, and took charge of the only car of coal. Unless relief comes shortly, all public works will be closed and many families will suffer.

THE HINDU AS A

RAILROAD LABORER

Contractors Think He Will Turn Out Good Work on the Contract

VANCOUVER, Dec. 18.—Piece work is to test the possibities of the Hindu as a railroad laborer. About seventy-five of the race are now employed on that basis by Ironsides, Rannie & Campbell, contractors for the construction of the Great Northern cutoff between New Westminster and Blaine. By this contract system, the Hindus will have to work to make money, though with a fair amount of effort they can make a fair day's wage.

"We tried some of the Hindus some time ago on the construction of about two miles of railway between the Brunette and Fraser River mills," said Mr. D. K. Campbell, "but they only stayed long enough to draw down one pay. The work was in swampy ground, and there they did not show to advantage, because they were poorly clad, and in no condition to work in water over their boot-tops. When they water over their boot-tops. When they got paid they never came back. Had they taken some of their money and bought gum boots for themselves, they might have continued the work with-

"On the Great Northern cutoff, we are trying them on the contract system, and to make anything they will have to work. It is possible that when they become used to hard work in this country they may make good laborers. I find that many farmers are employing them with good results."



DRAMATIC CRISES

Kaiser's Subjects on Point of Revolt Against Taxation.

Situation in France Rivals That in Germany -Britain's Controversy Over Education Question.

LONDON, Dec. 18.—Rarely have European affairs presented pictures of such intense dramatic interest as at the present moment. An Emperor is fighting his people upon a grave issue of policy, a religious war has begun between a republic and the greatest Christian church, and Great Britain is at a deadlock in the first stages of another religious controversy, its present real issue being the question of the separation of Church and State.

An outside observer who studies impartially great popular movements is able usually to see situations in a truer perspective than those in the thick of the fray. It is in this spirit that the following brief observations upon the German, French and English crises now pending are offered.

STRUGGLE IN GERMANY. The struggle in Germany is not based The struggle in Germany is not based on a mere question of colonial policy. It is the culminating protest of the German people against the terrible financial burdens which the Emperor's vast ambitions in world politics have imposed upon the ration. Added to that is the almost rebellious oposition of the generous populace to the heavy increase in the cost of food, brought about by the prohibition of imports for the benefit of the agrarian class. Germany is now the most taxridden of

Germany is now the most taxridden of progressive nations, and the patience of the people is well nigh exhausted.

PACE TOO RAPID.

The Germans fully sympathize with the Kaiser's ambitions for national greatness, but they protest that his pace is so rapid it is exhausting the vitality of the Empire. They are shocked and appalled by the revelation of scandal and cruel atrocities in connection with colonial administration and especially in South-West Africa. The military spirit has gone mad in certain directions and the Germans resent it, as the world at large resents the horrors of the Congo. The average patriotic German argues: "If all my sacrifices for the greatness of the Fatherland bring disgrace in the eyes of Christendom as the consequences then then the

It is impossible to make the core of the world of the sake of providing further the correctly volced German opinion, but the Reichstag will follow the Government's colonial budget, as the dissolved one did. It is impossible yet to forecast the result of the impending campaign. There will be much beating of drums and appeals for support of the Kaiser in creating a world empire, and it is not at all impossible that the Emperor will carry his point once more.

This is certain, however: The imperial programme will have to be moderated. The burden is greater than the people are willing to bear, and they will find means, one or another, to lighten it.

No outsider is called upon to express an opinion upon the merits of the French religious controversy. One may, perhaps, be permitted to say that, looking at the situation from alternate points of view, each side has made the best possible move under the present

circumstances.

The Pope certainly has consulted the best interests of the church in forcing the struggle. The reason may be found for his action in the fact that for 15 years, during which the writer has been a close student of French public sentiment, a great and significant change has been the steady drifting away of the populace from religious convictions. This, of course, has been most marked in the urban populations.

CHANGE IN FRENCH PEOPLE. It is not that the French people are developing antagonism to religion. The have acted accordingly. The Governthat. France is becoming not irreligious, but unreligious. The church's only hope in combatting this tendency to disintegration is to make its cause

to disintegration is to make its cause a fighting cause.

The people clearly realize this and has acted accordingly. The Government, on the other hand, had no option but to meet the challenge with unyielding insistence that the law of the land must be obeyed.

It is true that the law of 1981, requiring notification of all public meetings had not in contemplation religious services in its application. It is equally true that the Government would not dream of passing such a law as a new piece of legislation. It cannot, however, repeal it under the foreign threat which this week came from Rome. Sir,—I thoroughly agree with the statements of "Beatrice Walker," and have had almost the same experience, that in the welfare of their pupils, but the health of a pupil is not benefitted by being kept in a close room until dark to get up lessons, which had be left unlearned if they cannot be done in school hours. If you complain you will be told, in polite terms, of course, that it is none of your business, and that if the pupil is not kept in, he or she will not grade.

The system, not the teacher, is to blame for the latter condition, as the teacher is expected to cram a certain amount of knowledge in a pupil in a given time, regardless of the pupils physical or mental fitness.
