Camp Sussex, N. B., Sept. 24.—The past few days saw a large number of recruits enrolled on the strength of the 64th Overseas Battalion, there be-

There are about two companies of the men A and B, that have been in-oculated for the first, and today the regimental M. O., Capt. J. S. Carruth-

ers, is inoculating C and D, and he will finish them in the evening.

All men, after they have been inoculated are allowed forty-eight hours off duty to roam around the grounds at will. Thursday a fatigue squad of about twenty men erected two marquees to be used by the men as mess tents in inclement weather, and they also erected a new post office on the grounds where the men can register quarters to be removed to and receive registered mail without having to go to the post office in the town for such purposes.

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




