O'LEARY LETTER WAS PRODUCED

Offering Parts of Richibucto Wharf at High Figures.

GOT GOOD VALUE

OTTAWA, Jan. 19.—The production of two letters from Richard O'Leary and A. R. Leary, of Richibucto, in the public accounts committee this morning placed an altogether different face upon the purchase of the wharf and adjacent property from T. O. Murray by the public works department.

O'Leary's letter was nearly six years old, being dated April 22, 1904, and was addressed to D. H. Waterbury, who is Inspector of Dominion buildings in New Brunswick. Waterbury was in Richibucto in connection with the improvement of public buildings there, and in conversation O'Leary suggested that the Dominion government improve their property by purchasing his wharfage.

Dr. Pugsley's production of O'Leary's letter to Waterbury caused the Tories great discomfort. O'Leary had sworn that a few years ago he had offered the whole wharf property to the government through Mr. Waterbury for \$1,000. He also swore that it was a verbal offer, not a written offer.

Dr. Pugsley produced his written offer, dated in April 1904, in which he made three propositions one to sell a strip 227 feet wide for \$1,000, the other two propositions being to sell the property and reserving a strip 150 feet frontage between the wharf and the railway, and the third proposition being to sell only a frontage of 227 feet at the \$1,000. In the same letter he offered a smaller piece of land which at the same proposition would make \$19,999 for the whole, and also a third alternative offer of a smaller piece at a proportionate price of up to \$25,000 for the whole.

Waterbury asked him to put his offer in writing and O'Leary did so. But he made no offer of the 227 feet frontage, the right or ten acres of land which he sold to Murray later for \$700 and which the government purchased afterwards. His offer to sell a small portion for \$1,000 or still smaller lots for \$500 and \$250 would have made a valuation of the property which the government purchased of more than twice \$5,000.

O'Leary's Letter

The production of this letter was a surprise to O'Leary's friends, and it looked as if he had forgotten the terms of it. The letter was as follows:

From Richibucto, April 22, 1904
To D. H. Waterbury Esq. Richibucto, N. B.

Dear Sir,—With further reference to our conversation today re. land opposite the public building in Richibucto, I will sell the whole lot on the eastern side of Water street, the full width of the present lot owned by the government, i. e. 227 feet in width and running back to the channel 625 feet for \$1000 or I will sell the 227 feet on the street running back to a depth of 100 feet for \$500.

P. S.—Or I will sell a piece 50x100 feet opposite the public building where the sewer now is, for \$250.

G. T. P. STEAMERS

News of the ceremony of launching the new ship Prince Rupert, of the Trunk Pacific fleet, and description of that splendid ship Prince Rupert, has just reached Canada.

According to British publications: The naming ceremony was performed by Mrs. Richard L. Newman of Victoria, B. C. Many distinguished persons were present including Sir Chas. Rivers Wilson, G. C. M. G., C. B. The Lord Mayor of Newcastle, and his lady, the Sheriff of Newcastle, also the Mayors of Wallsend and Jarrow.

The published account says: The steamship Prince Rupert has been most carefully designed by Messrs. Swan, Hunter and Wigham, Richardsons, Ltd. The steamer will have a smart appearance with its straight stem and cruiser stern. There will be two pole masts and three funnels, the centre funnel bearing the flag device of the company. The rounded cruiser stern has been adopted in order to obtain the best lines to give a high speed. The ship is being built to the highest class under the

British Corporation survey and will also comply with the Board of Trade regulations for passenger steamers. The "Prince Rupert" is 320 feet long, 42 feet 3 inches wide with a depth of 15 feet to the main deck. The gross tonnage of the vessel is 2,850 tons. The engines and boilers with Howden's forced draught are being constructed by the Wallsend Shipway and Engineering Co., Ltd. There are two sets of triple expansion engines balanced on the Yarrow, Schlick and Tweedy system. This system is used not only on modern passenger ships but for war vessels of all classes as it ensures smooth and steady running with vibration reduced to a negligible quantity.

On the shelter and shade decks of the "Prince Rupert" there will be accommodation in state rooms of two berths each for 220 first class passengers. There will also be a few sets of staterooms on suite placed on the shelter deck amidships. There is provision on the main deck forward for second class passengers. When occasion arises 1,500 excursionists can be taken on board.

—Alderman Hunter of Newcastle in providing the health of the lady who christened the "Prince Rupert" and the success of the ship said: "The steamer they had seen launched was one of great interest and one which they were very proud to have been commissioned to build. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway was of his importance. It was a great undertaking and when it was finally completed it would open up a new and very rich part of the Dominion and would have very easy gradients. The railway would open up a very vast area rich in all kinds of timber, hemp, iron, coal, copper and mica, and before many years were over, through the means of the railway, the immense territory would begin to be thickly populated and the city of Prince Rupert would become a splendid town."

—Mr. R. L. Newman, following Alderman Hunter said: "The name 'Prince Rupert' was taken from the City of Prince Rupert, the Western gateway of the British Empire through which would ultimately flow the manufactured and agricultural products of that great section of the Empire, also the manufactured products of the New England states, and last but not least, let them hope, it would be the means of dragging closer to that little island of which they were all so proud, the markets of the Orient. He wished that he might tell them of the beauties and possibilities of that vast continent, its unbounded agricultural possibilities, its great mineral wealth, its enormous wealth in timber, and also of its fisheries. Englishmen did not appreciate the possibilities of that continent, but their neighbours, the citizens of the United States were rapidly awakening to the great opportunities of Canada. In the great Northwest there were vast tracts of land, and taking up large sections of land and there raising stock and immense crops of wheat. Why were our young Englishmen not taking advantage of these opportunities? He had heard of excess in population in this country, was it then that Canada was seeking elsewhere for settlers?"

The chairman gave the toast of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company and said when the railway was completed it would be possible to go on a tour of the world in 24-48 days. Mr. E. C. Salter, European traffic manager, pointed out the great possibilities of the new railway and said that it would open out on the Pacific coast a most important port in commercial and strategic history.

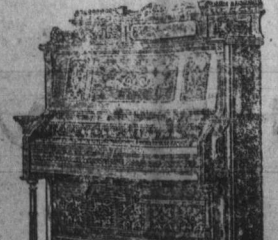
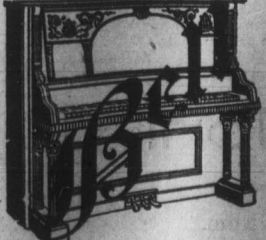

Council At Meeting Tuesday Night Give Him Another Trial.

A meeting of the Town Council was held on Tuesday evening. Those present were Deputy Mayor McLean and Councillors: Miller, Andrew, Moore and McLennan. Deputy Mayor McLean presided.

M. A. Kelly made application for a license to sell liquor which was granted.

Accounts of the Chief Clerk, Mr. W. J. MacLean, from the Police and License Commission, were reported recommending that Chief of Police Crawford be reinstated. After some discussion the report was adopted unanimously.

The memorial submitted by the Town Solicitor in regard to the S. S. Seniac was approved, after some slight changes and ordered to be forwarded to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and Jas. Reid, M. P.

Council adjourned.

OUR OTTAWA LETTER

The important legislation of Naval Defence introduced at the opening of Parliament last week by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, marks a new era in Canadian history. The people have been before them a serious problem for consideration and one of vast importance, relative to the future security of this nation. There will be no allowance for false judgment and petty mistakes will not be tolerated. Unity and harmony must be reached between both parties before this national question receives its final disposition.

In all probability some weeks will elapse before any further controversy will be raised over naval matters in the House of Commons. However it is understood that in the event of Mr. Brodeur not recovering and able to proceed within a reasonable time the Premier himself will guide the bill through its different stages.

Budget Debate Resumed.

Dr. Clark, M. P. for Red Deer, Alberta, in speaking on the budget expressed himself as an ardent believer in free trade. His advocacy of this principle brought him into disagreement with the Minister of Finance in respect to the question of bounties. Dr. Clark repudiated the analogy, as drawn by the Minister of Finance, in his budget speech in respect to the iron and steel bounties and subsidies to railways being of a similar nature.

The doctor maintained that the subsidizing of railroads might be all right as the whole of the people were to receive benefit from railroads, but it could not be so from the bounties paid out to the iron and steel industries.

Dr. Clark also took a fling at the German tariff, saying that it was an unjust policy of retaliation, and that it would not tend to improve trade relations between Germany and Canada.

The doctor while only a settler in the West for the past nine years, has been thoroughly acquainted with the needs of that country, and marshals his facts as but few can.

He picked up at the Hon. Geo. E. Foster over the Saskatchewan Valley land transactions, saying that results of the outside civil service would be a great increase of salary, and that their positions should be made independent of government action. He was surprised he said, when he visited the public accounts committee, to hear such statements as he did there, and he believed that in one instance an outside civil servant had juggled with the truth as his head and butter was at stake, and the Minister of the Department was gazing into his face.

He concluded with a tribute of praise to Mr. Butler, Deputy Minister of Railways, who had been lately appointed general manager of the Dominion Railway.

Mr. Piquet (Liberal) said that a French Canadian would get Mr. Butler's job on the I. C. R. Board of Directors.

T. W. Crothers, M. P. for West York, expressed his opinion that if Canada had followed the principles of the Liberal party we would have seen this annexed to the United States.

Every great work he said, had been originated by the Conservative party for the development of Canada, and that the foundations of Canada's great development had been laid by such men as Cortier, McDonald, Tilly, Tupper and others.

Mr. F. T. Condon M. P. for the Yukon, delivered a ringing speech in defence of the Liberal policy, and he came out strongly in favor of free trade, especially with the United States, saying that it would be the best guarantee of amity between Canada and her neighbors to the south.

Abolishing Senate.
The House of Commons voted on the proposal of Mr. Lancaster (Cons.) Niagara, to abolish the Senate. The motion was defeated by 111 to 22 on a vote of 133.
