Co. council opened here on Tues-
day at 11 a.m., the councillors are:

Minutes of July meeting confirmed.
The statement submitted by the
Secretary Treasurer at Tuesday's
session shows that on Dec. 31st
there was to the credit of the munici-
pality in the Royal Bank on con-
tingent account a balance of \$6486-
88. And school fund account a
balance of \$1759.13 and on sinking
fund debenture account a balance of
\$2698.35.

The council is occupied with
routine work and passing accounts.
A resolution was moved and car-
ried at Wednesday's session
authorizing the public lands and
building committee to erect a suit-
able wire fence around the coun-
cil house square and to have the coun-
cil room painted.

Mr. A. G. Adams, veteran coun-
cillor for Addington and warden of
the county was appointed at Wed-
nesday's session to represent Resti-
gouche at the Union of Municipalities.

Councillors Arseneault, Bernard
and Levesque were granted leave of
absence for Thursday forenoon to
attend the funeral of the late John
Spude who was killed in the lumber
woods on Monday.

At Wednesday's session the
parish lists of officers were passed
and will be published in the usual
way.

DEATH OF MRS. WILLIAM NOBLE

Mary E. Noble, wife of William
Noble of Glen Levit, passed to her
eternal reward on Jan. 18th at the
early age of forty years.

She was the mother of a large
family, the youngest about three
years old. She contracted measles
along with the seven children and
this was followed by double pneumo-

tem only too readily succumbed.
The baby is not expected to recover,
so the home is a sad one.

Hugh Craig of Glen Levit and is sur-
vived by two brothers, James in the
States and George at Tide Head,
also two sisters, Mrs. Gallie of Glen-
coe and Mrs. Arthur Thompson of
Dawsonville.

Mrs. Noble will be much missed

was kind and affable and a helper
in the church to which she belong-
ed and for every good cause she had

at Flat Lands and was very largely

Head, Glencoe, Flatlands, Sellerville
and Campbellton.

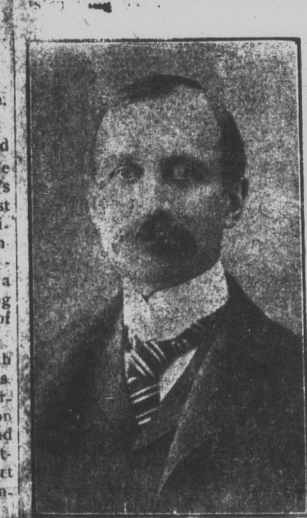

PRESENTATION IS MADE TO HON. CHARLES H. LABILLOIS AT DALHOUSIE

An Address and Purse Given by the Friends of the Late
Member For Restigouche as a Reminder of
Their Appreciation

On Tuesday evening a committee
consisting of Mr. A. E. G. McKen-
zie, W. A. R. Cragg, manager of the
Royal Bank, Dalhousie, Councillors,
Alex. Levesque, Harvey C. Gillis
and Ed. Bernard waited on Hon. C.
H. LaBillois, at his residence and in
the name of his friends in the
county and province, presented him
with an address accompanied by a
purse, as a testimonial to show their
great appreciation of the good work
that had been done by him during
his thirty years of public life. The
presentation was made by Mr. Mc-
Kenzie who contested the county on

Mr. LaBillois in reply said that
in accepting the address and
testimonial from the committee
which represented his friends every-
where, he desired to thank them for
their very kind expressions towards
him for what efforts he has made for

the best interests of the people.
He was grateful to those who had
contributed so generously to the
testimonial. He saw there the
names of former colleagues who sat
with him in the legislature. Some
of them adorned the bench, others
did credit to the province in the
Senate and House of Commons of
Canada, others had retired from
public life. To them and to other
in the province and country he
would be for ever grateful.

He said that it would be fitting
on an occasion like this to say a
word about the future. Since his
defeat in June, one of the members
for Madawaska Co., without any
solicitation whatever, had offered to
resign the seat in his favor. It was
also well known that Premier Flem-
ming would not be averse to Mr.
LaBillois occupying a seat opposite
him in the Assembly, as their rela-
tion in parliament were always of
a most friendly character. He
felt, however, that after thirty long
years of service, it was only fair to
himself and just to his family that
he would devote some time, at least,
to business and social affairs and
that he had made up his mind that
he would not make any great effort
to return to Fredericton. However,
he said that his long experience in
dealing with public affairs would
not be lost as he intended devoting
some little time to the study of
problems for the benefit of the people
of his native town in which he lived,
for the advancement of the county
which had for so long a time hono-
red him with its confidence, and he
could not forget the county of
Bonaventure, where he had so many
friends and where he had learnt to
speak the French language after he
had left Dalhousie at the age of nine
on account of the illness and death
of his parents.

After the speeches, refreshments
were served and a most enjoyable
time spent.

CRAZY MAN JUMPS FROM MOVING TRAIN

Fred Reid on Way to St. John
Jumps Over Bridge at Mill-
stream—Now at Hospital

On the arrival of the Ocean Limited
on Monday morning some stir was
caused here when it became known
that a man had jumped from the train
at Millstream.

It appears that the passenger, Fred
Reid, aged about 30, an Englishman,
who was travelling to St. John en
route for England, suddenly took a
crazy streak when the train was at
Millstream and jumping from the train
leaped over the railway bridge and
made off over the ice.

The train was immediately pulled
up and the crew assisted by others
captured the man half way over the
river. He was brought back to the
train and Railway Detective Culligan
at Campbellton was notified to meet
the arrival of the Ocean Limited.
When the train pulled in to Camp-
bellton officer Culligan procured
blankets from the sleeping car and
had the man removed to the Hotel
Dieu, where he now lies.

It seems that Reid has been subject
to fits of mental aberration, and on
being asked why he jumped over the
bridge said, "The people were bother-
ing him." "What people?" asked the
questioner. "The people of Mont-
real" he replied.

Reid seems to be in comfortable
circumstances having a goodly sum of
money with him, and an Oddfellows
card showing he was in good standing.

TO ADVANCE CIVILIZATION

"Rockefeller Foundation" of \$100,000 Has Been Incorporated

Washington, Jan. 23.—Articles of incorporation for the so-called "Rockefeller Foundation" to administer a philanthropic fund of \$100,000,000 to be donated by John D. Rockefeller were passed by the House today 152 to 65, after desultory opposition. The measure now goes to the Senate.

The mill, introduced by Representative Peters of Massachusetts, names as the incorporators to administer the fund, John D. Rockefeller, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., Frederick T. Gates, Starr J. Murphy, Harry Pratt Judson, Simon Flexner, Edwin A. Alderman, Wickliffe Rose and Charles O. Heydt; and such persons "as they may associate with themselves."

The object of the Foundation is "to promote the well-being and to advance the civilization of the peoples of the United States and its territories and of foreign lands; the dissemination of knowledge in the prevention and relief of suffering; and in the promotion by eleemosynary and philanthropic means of any and all the elements of human progress."

THE LUMBER OUTLOOK

The St. John correspondent of the Canada Lumberman says of the lumber outlook in New Brunswick:

"The outlook for the sale of deals to the English market seems good, the rates of freight are not high, in fact, it is said that vessels can be chartered to-day for 50 to 55 shillings for Bay of Fundy ports, that in itself being quite a drop. Stocks both on the north shore and at the St. John are only about one-half of what they were last year. The unfavorable weather and also the stocks in all the English ports are lower than they have been for many years, and what parcels are going forward by liners are being taken from quay about as fast as they are landed. Prices are sustained, consumption is good and business in England is extra good. Also, as we look to the United States we find the stocks on yards are very light. Transportation conditions during the seasons, both by vessels and cars, prohibited any surplus being shipped. In fact, many orders are yet unfilled because of lack of cars and vessels, and buyers are flooding the country and financial matters should keep pace, and they are doing so. If nothing radical should occur to mar the general outlook for good trade the world over, no reasons can be given except those already stated which will not help to make 1913 a good year for the lumber trade.

"Some sales of deals for 1913 delivery have taken place in this section during the week. The price is said to be \$16 for a specification of fifty per cent. 7 x 8 x 3, balance 9 in and up, with 3 x 4-6 ends and fourths at usual reductions, but it is felt that very few will sell even at that price under present conditions. There is practically no old stock of any kind left unsold, it being all in the hands of a few buyers here. Spruce boards cannot be had at all for less than \$14 at mills, and there are very few for sale.

"Hemlock—No stocks on hand except small quantities in retail yards, and they asking \$15 per M.

"Low grade stocks of 1, 2 and 3 inch, have all been disposed of at about \$9.00 to \$9.50 per M. in yards.

"Laths have all been sold.

"Freights coastwise remain at a standstill as very little shipping is being done because it is felt to be more or less hazardous at this time of year. Vessels for New York are getting \$4, which is about 50c per M. less than heretofore. Ocean freights—the liners are taking small parcels at about 45 shillings, but space is very limited, general freight taking the place of lumber. The deal shipments from St. John to England showed a marked falling off in 1912, being only 79,000,000 against 129,000,000 in 1911—due to the mills not manufacturing as much for the English market and also the high rates of freight. The stocks on the Miramichi are also low, only about 29,000,000 against 59,000,000 in 1911."

IS THE PREMIER TO GIVE UP POLITICS

A Rumor to That Effect is Now Current.

Is Hon. J. K. Flemming, the provincial premier, going to retire from local politics? Rumors along that line are current and have been for some days. Hon. Mr. Flemming, the report goes, finds the duties of his office so exacting that he is able to give little or no time to private business. While the salary of a New Brunswick cabinet minister is so small that it does not afford a reasonable living. Hon. Mr. Flemming has not as yet made any public statement of his intentions, but that he has talked the situation over with personal friends and has intimated his intention to retire seems to be certain. The people of New Brunswick of all shades of political opinion will regret if Hon. Mr. Flemming feels compelled to withdraw from public life. He has shown both in the opposition and in office evidences of a desire to do the right thing for all parts of the province and his removal from the arena of provincial affairs would be a distinct loss. Some of those active in public affairs are of the opinion that he knows nothing definite and hoped that the rumors would turn out to be unfounded.

I. C. R. TO REMAIN A GOV'T RAILWAY

An I. C. R. Day in the House. Assurance by Hon. Mr. Cochrane.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—That the Intercolonial Railway will not be disposed of by the Government was the assurance given by the Minister of Railways, Hon. Mr. Cochrane, to his predecessor in office in the House of Commons, tonight. Throughout the afternoon and evening discussion ranged over the people's railway, being raised upon a resolution, moved by Mr. Emmerson, in which the member for Westmorland, advocated extension of the I. C. R. by taking over branch lines. The general tenor of a long list of speeches delivered by members from countries concerned, was that the Maritime Provinces had suffered retarded development because of lack of communication with the trunk railway. Most of the speakers admitted that all Governments had been equally negligent in the matter. The adjournment of the debate was moved at 12.15 by Mr. Rhodes (Cumberland), Mr. Emmerson rose and said that would mean consigning the resolution to the grave, and he pressed Hon. Mr. Rogers, who moved the adjournment of the House, to say that it would be taken up again. The Minister of Public Works would not say more than that the Premier would do his utmost for the resolution.

ASTOUNDING CASE OF BESTIALITY

Despicable Outrage Perpetrated on a Riviere du Loup Woman who is Now Dead

An unconfirmed report has been received here of a most despicable outrage perpetrated on a young married woman at Riviere du Loup six men being implicated in conduct unknown out of savage countries.

The details, the nature of which are unprintable are of such a devilish character that one is at first inclined to think the story in its entirety a mere fabrication of a diseased mind, no one ever dreaming that such fiends could walk unmolested this fair green earth of ours, or be known outside of a madman's cell.

From an authoritative source we have gleaned the following information.

Over a week ago six Frenchmen four married and two single men called on Mrs. Desjardins the wife of an I. C. R. employee, during the absence of her husband, taking with them six bottles of liquor.

What can have happened after this liquor was consumed cannot be imagined by anyone. No conception can be had of the base indignities practiced on that unhappy woman by those fiends in human form, the mere impression of a thought sending a blush of shame to any right minded man. Suffice it to say that when the husband returned to his home he found the place wide open and the body of his wife stark naked lying in an empty apple barrel, bearing on her person the marks of the greatest abuses and outrages.

The body was marked all over with burns from cigar stubs, she had been beaten, kicked, bitten and mortally abused and was in a dying condition when found. She was bruised and disfigured almost beyond recognition. In fact it is said that the priest who was summoned failed to recognize her.

The woman who is now dead lived long enough to give the names of her six assailants and we are informed that four of them have been arrested and are in custody at Riviere du Loup.

The coroner held an inquest on the body, but it was understood that the husband wished the matter hushed up and did not wish to press the charges, but now it is said the Crown authorities will take up the matter and probe it to the bottom.

Up to the time of going to press we have not received confirmation of the occurrence as related above which we have given as it came to us.

CIVIC GRAFTERS ARE ARRESTED

79 Indictments Are Found

Nashua, N. H., Jan. 23.—The most wholesale graft exposures in the history of the city came to light Saturday with the indictment by the Hillsborough county grand jury, at Manchester, of 79 citizens, many of them prominent in Nashua and Manchester.

Police Commissioner Frank A. Wingate of Nashua heads the list of indictments on charges of liquor selling and bribery, but it is understood that the proceedings mark only the beginning of an investigation which is expected to implicate "men higher up," who hold positions of trust and prominence in city and state government.

The charges named in the indictment include bribery, gambling, illegal liquor selling, keeping disorderly houses pandering and illegal voting.

The news burst upon this city like a bombshell, although rumors have been current several days that indictments against some of the leading people in the city were to be brought.

The indictments follow a thorough municipal house-cleaning campaign instigated by Police Commissioner Harry A. Gregg, who was appointed several months ago by Gov. Ross. When he took office it is understood that he found conditions in the police department such that he was unable to secure the cooperation to the extent which he desired, and that he thereupon enlisted the services of a private detective agency. Shortly after Gregg's activities began City Mar-

shal W. W. Wheeler resigned from office, at the instance, it is reported, of the newly appointed commissioner.

The police commission in Nashua consists of three members: The third member besides Gregg and Wingate is George E. Anderson. Wingate's indictment occasioned the greatest sensation of all. In addition to his position in the police force he is a member of the Legislature.

Only those lower down in the official scale have been presented to the grand jury," said Commissioner Gregg. "A number of other citizens have been guilty of violations of the law whose cases will be brought before the Legislature.

EASTER WILL BE EARLY THIS YEAR

Will not Come Again so Early Till the Year 2000

Easter will be "unusually early this year. Ash Wednesday comes on February 5, Good Friday on March 21, and Easter Sunday on March 23. Not since 1818 did it come sooner in the year. On that year it fell on March 22, its earliest possible date following the full moon on March 21, the next day being Sunday. Not again until the year 2900 will it come so early again.

Sixty-seven years ago and 50 years ago, respectively, Easter occurred on the same date as it does this year. It fell on March 23 in 1846 and 1896, when it still arrived on March 24 in 1901 and 1951. It will come again on March 26 in 1967.

The latest Easter of the 19th and 20th centuries was in 1899, when it occurred on April 23. Last Easter was on April 7.

PHOTO USED AS AD., SUES FOR \$35,000

Sent Everywhere, Girl Says and Shown with Pictures of Prizes Fights and Races.

St. Louis, Jan. 14.—Miss Violet Evans's face will be her fortune if she wins the \$35,000 damage suit which she filed against the Hammer Dry Plate Company.
Her suit is based on the action of the defendant in using her portrait for advertising purposes without her consent, according to the allegations in her petition.

She alleges that four years ago, while visiting her married sister in St. Louis, she had her picture taken by Victor C. Dry, a professional photographer. When she posed for the picture she says, she was modestly dressed in garments such as she would wear at home, but her hair was falling over her shoulders.
In such a pose, she says, she would be willing to be seen by members of her family and a few intimate friends, but not by the general public.

Miss Evans, her petitions alleges, had only two copies of the picture made by the photographer and he kept the negative in trust for her and subject to her order. She considered that this negative was her property and that she alone had a right to order copies made from it.

The Hammer Dry Plate Company, she avers, induced the photographer to put the negative at its disposal and made thousands of copies of the picture for advertising purposes.

The copies, she said, was sent to all parts of the world and displayed in shop and show windows, sometimes side by side with prize fight and horse race pictures. She herself says, saw copies in Seattle and Houston.

Recently she has heard that the dry plate company has ordered 1,000 frames in which to exhibit additional copies of the portrait.

The company, she says, has made no provision for the final suppression of the pictures and when they are replaced by other advertising matter they may find their way into objectionable places.

The petition, filed by Attorney Albert Chandler, alleges that the company has wrongfully trafficked in Miss Evans' beauty and that when she finds persons staring at her on the street she wonders whether it is because they have seen her picture in public places.

Chandler says Miss Evans does not live in St. Louis and does not desire that her present whereabouts be made known.

In addition to demanding \$10,000 actual and \$25,000 punitive damages, Miss Evans begs the court to enjoin the defendants from further circulating the picture and to order them to withdraw and destroy those now on exhibition.

WILL THE WOMEN GET THE FRANCHISE?

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—A cable to the Tribune from London says: This week the House of Commons will consider whether several million men and women shall be added to the number of Parliamentary electors. This is the momentous issue raised by the franchise bill, the issue affecting the whole of the United Kingdom. The long awaited fight on the woman suffrage question is at hand, the really decisive battle, compared with which all previous debates on the subject in the House, have been but skirmishes. The issue of the battle will be in Parliament on Friday. The crucial debate will arise on the clause extending the franchise to every "male" person. Sir Edward Grey will move as an amendment the elimination of the word "male," and the pignancy of the position will be realized when it is stated that Mr. Asquith is an uncompromising opponent of woman suffrage, that Herbert L. Samuel, C. E. Hobhouse, Winston Churchill, Louis Harcourt, Sidney Buxton, Reginald McKenna, J. A. Pense, and Col. Seely, all cabinet ministers, support the premier, and that David Lloyd George, Augustine Birrell, John Burns, Sir Rufus Isaacs, Walter Runciman, and T. McKinnon Wood also members of the cabinet, back up Sir Edward Grey.

AMERICAN LUMBERMEN'S GRIEF

Doleful Prophecy as to The Conditions Attending Tariff Reduction

The American lumberman has taken his last stand. At Monday's hearing he stated his fears of a Canadian invasion of his markets. He spoke loudly of his need of protection from oriental labor in the Canadian northwest in justification of his position, he has now filed his brief before the committee.

With plaintive eloquence he asks that the Canadian be kept out by retaining the present duty of \$1.50 a thousand feet on rough lumber.

This is the American lumberman's last stand, declares Z. W. Whitehead, of Willington, in his brief. And of what will happen if the duty is removed and the Canadian enters more freely, Mr. Whitehead can only speak in tones of despondent awe. Here is his prophecy, taken verbatim from his brief:—

"Around the hearth stone and fire sides of the hundred and one humble cottage homes and hovels surrounding the innumerable saw and planing mills from one end of this country to the other are hundreds and thousands of honest yeomanry earning their livelihood by the sweat of their brow with five times as many helpless women and little children dependent upon them, in blissful ignorance of the far-reaching and disastrous results of the impending danger now hovering about their heads.

"To take advantage of them in their innocence and solitude, denied, as many of them are, of the blessings of society, and other advantages so common to most of us, and directly or indirectly rob them of the food with which their mouths are fed and the raiment with which their bodies are being clothed, while in the discharge of their duties, would be a crime against humanity, a sin in the sight of God, and constitute an act of bad faith that would bring down upon their heads of those responsible for all such the curse of not only the present but generations yet unborn.

"Indeed, if it developed a school of anarchists and socialists such as began the great crusades of the past which finally resulted in the overthrow of whole empires and kingdoms, no one should be surprised if it would only be a case of history repeating itself, sowing the winds and reaping the whirlwind.

"What has the reduction of the duty accomplished? The brief queries further and itself supplies the answer. "I will tell you. It has enabled the Canadian manufacturers to supply American markets in part, substituting oriental labor, foreign capital for American capital, and in various and sundry ways fattened and prospered upon American industries to the detriment and loss of American interests. This is what it has accomplished and this much will be multiplied in behalf of Canadian interests if you repeal the present duty."

Other briefs have also been filed by the American lumbermen and in the main while lacking its grandiloquence they followed along the lines of that of Mr. Whitehead. One filed by the Goodyear Lumber Company of Buffalo, N. Y., sums up the situation in the curt and rather unkindly phrase. "Talk of possible reduction in prices by reason of any possible change in the tariff reducing or removing entirely the duty on lumber from Canada is bunkum.

The first crossing on the ice here was under taken on Monday by four men from Fleurant's point and Upper Maguasha. No teams have crossed yet. This is about the latest crossing on record. The delay in ice making this year has dealt a severe blow to over a hundred families in this vicinity who depend on the smelt fishing. It has also been a hindrance to trade. However, the prospects are brighter since Sunday, and active preparations are going on here now in the shape of hauling shanties on the ice, etc.

New Glasgow, Jan. 22.—The most disastrous fire that has visited New Glasgow in recent years occurred this morning, and wiped out the large wooden block on the corner of Provost and Forbes streets, owned by Norton Lodge, I. O. O. F., and occupied on the ground floor by Bent & Coohens hardware merchants, and L. Higgins & Co., boots and shoes. The upper story was used as a lodge room. The building directly north of the burned block, owned and occupied by Wm. McIntosh & Co., was badly damaged. The plate glass windows in the north of Chamber's block and in the front of Mason's candy store were completely burned, and the large panes in the Two Barkers' store were badly damaged by the heat. Several windows were broken in the Evening News building.

Tons of water were poured into the building through every window and hole.

In a brief period the interior was a seething mass of flames. During the progress of the fire there was a constant pouring of water.

Masses of flaming wood were carried skyward by the current of heated air, and fell on the roofs of the surrounding buildings.

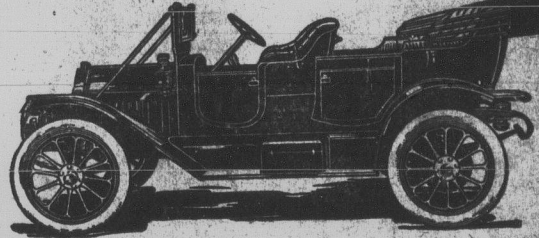
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
