**GOVERNMENT LOST
ON A DIVISION**

THIRTY ANIMALS
BURNED IN 'ZOO'

LONDON, Tuesday.—By a fire which
occurred in the Zoological Park, South
port, about thirty animals, including
two elephants, were asphyxiated or
burned to death. Nothing remains on
the site of the building in which the
animals were confined but a number
of charred upright poles and a smol-
dering mass of cinders.

The gardens are visited by a quar-
ter of a million people each season,
and the Zoo was one of the principle
attractions.

The flames were first observed by
a policeman at a little after one o'-
clock in the morning, and within half
an hour, and before the arrival of the
firemen the entire wooden structure
which was covered with felting and
had recently been tarred, was de-
stroyed. The flames, fanned by the
brisk north-west wind, spread very rap-
idly and when policemen and keepers
arrived it was found impossible to re-
scue the animals.

The valuable collection destroyed
comprised: Two elephants, bison, se-
bra, dromedary, camel, llama, tapir,
nylghamantelope, two Shetland ponies,
two Nubian goats, two emus, two rheas
cassowary, three rufous deer, fa-tailed
sheep, black-headed sheep, axis
deer, two black bucks, number of
birds.

The female elephant was a splendid
Indian specimen, standing 8 feet 6
inches high, and the male elephant,
2 feet smaller, was a trained animal.
Apparently the latter had broken
loose from its tether at the commence-
ment of the fire, for its partly burned
carcase was found lying several feet
away from its stall. In their charred
condition, their tusks fell away to
dust on being touched. The bison was
stated to be the only perfect specimen
in England. A crane and two eagles
were the only creatures to escape, and
these were subsequently recaptured.

Though a policeman was the first
to observe the fire, the first intimation
of the outbreak was given by a little
terrier belonging to Mr. Clifton Rid-
ing, manager of the Richmond Hotel
situated within the grounds. He was
awakened about one o'clock by his dog
snapping up and down the stairs
barking, as if he was alarmed, but he
paid no attention to it or the loud
trumpeting of the imprisoned ele-
phants in their terror until he was
called up by the policeman.

Mr. Nathan Yates, the proprietor of
the gardens, estimates the total dam-
age at 2,500 pounds, which is partly
covered by insurance.

Happy, the other portion of the
Zoo, which contained the lions and
tigers, was a quarter of a mile dis-
tant from the scene of the fire, and
quite escaped.
