



Siam Attaches Enemy Firms.

The Siamese government has issued a notification ordering all German and Austrian business firms to be attached and wound up. Among the business houses to be liquidated are three of the leading drug stores in Bangkok, two hotels, two dental offices, one phetographic studio, one printing office, one rice milling firm, three general import houses, one rice mill engineering office and one undertaker's establishment.

The importance of Germany's trade interest in Siam, notes a correspondent, may be judged from the fact that the imports from that country integrated in the fiscal year ended March 31, 1913, and to 32, 436,889 in 1914, while exports of nattive products from Siam to Germany were valued at \$2,110,085 and \$2,747, 286 during the respective periods.

A large share of the shipping was also under German control, so that out of the total number of 914 ships of all nationalities that entered the port of Bhngkok during 1914 those of German registery numbered 261 vessels. At the time of Siam's declaration of war on July 22, 1917, the German vessels in the Bangkok harbor consisted of nine steamships, of 11,766 tons; five steam lighters, of 1,317 tons; twe tags, of 55 tons; seven barges and twe large cod bulks.

R. C. H. FIRTH, Regius Professor of Modern History at the University of Oxford, recently spoke on "England During the Napoleonic War—an RESTIGOUCHE PRESBY-Historical Parallel."

Frofessor Firth said that the events, incidents, and speeches of the last three years had recalled to his mind repeatedly the resemblances and the differences between the present. Then we concluded a precarious peace. In 1803 we were in a better position, both for attack and defence, than we were in 1793, but in 1803 we no longer had any allies. Our former allies were then neutral. The French navy had been destroyed, and in 1803 and 1804, owing to the miscalculations of Napoleon, the danger of invasien was not serious. It became a real danger in 1805, when Napoleon aimed at becoming master of the channel, but that danger also passed. On the other hand, the war on land went steadily against a The years 1807 to 1812 were the critical period of the struggle, but it was noticeable that contemporary utterances indicated rather doubt concerning the capacity of our rulers than the fear of the enemy.
