### USING MILKING DEVICES

When It is Adv sable to Invest in Milking Machines.

The Cause and Cure of Diarrhoea In Calves - Simple and Common-Methods of Treatment May Save Valuable Young Animals.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

T is clear that if dairying is to develop as it ought to do in the Province of Ontario, more labor needed on dairy farms. As the supply of labor is limited, cow-farmers are turning their attention to the mechanical milker as an aid in the cows are kept, namely, that of Past the Experimental Stage.

While it is true that mechanical milkers are not yet perfected, and possibly will never be absolutely 'fool-proof," they have reached a stage of perfection where they can be recommended to the man who is in need of help at milking-time. There are several machines now on the market which have proven to be more or less successful in tests made at Experimental Stations, but what ven more important, have stood test of actual farm conditions.
