RUDELY RATTLED.

Extensive Shaking-Up in Uncle Sam's Domain.

Earthquake Shocks Extend Throughout Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, Tennessee and Missouri.

CHICAGO, Sept. 28.—The earthquake shock Saturday night was felt in Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, Ohio, Tennessee, Missouri and Kentucky. The general direction seems to have been from the northwest to the southeast, Galena, Ill., being the extreme northern point. In some cities three shocks were felt. The duration of the disturbance was from three seconds to one minute, al-

were felt. The duration of the disturbance was from three seconds to one minute, although at St. Louis the shock lasted fully two minutes. The damage was comparatively small in all the places affected.

The shock was felt all through lowa. Keokuk suffered the most of any place in the west. Nearly every town in Illinois was affected, except those in the northwestern section. At Vincennes the Vincennes, Chicago and Mississippi freight depot rocked to and fro so that the yardmen were appalled and rushed from the building. Many chimneys were topled over in Indiana towns.

This sum is payable six months hence and is secured by first charge or lien upon the whole of the company's property and lands, which the judgment directs shall be sold next March in case the company makes default in payment then. The company cannot meanwhile deal with its lands or bonds except to pay Charlebois and other lienholders. The original motion, which was made on behalf of Charlebois to continue the chanceller's injunction of the 12th inst., was turned into a motion of final judgment, and was ratified by Mr. Justice Ferguson y exterday morning. 

It is not expected of the younger representatives in the House that they should take a very active part in the debates until they have been in Parliament for some years, and Mr. Hyman has not been heard from on public questions as frequently as have some less able members. He has, however, spoken at some length on trade and other questions vitally affecting the people, and has shown by his votes, as well as by his speeches, that he will always be found on the side of the masses. It has been made evident to him, as well as to us all, that the classes can look after themselves. As a member of the Public Accounts Committee, where so much of the rascality that has permeated the departments at Ottawa has been laid bare, Mr. Hyman has given loyal support to Messrs.
