A Train Piched Over a Fifty-Foot Em-

Colorado Springs, Col., Dec. 25.—Santa Fepasseager train No. 8, which left Denver at 11:05 has night, was wrecked two miles east of Husted. Several cars left the track and plunged down on embankmont 50 teet high. Fire broke cat almost immediately. The train was running 40 miles an hour. Two boys, names unknown, are dying at the hospital here. They are believed to be the only ones fatally injured, although almost everybody on the train was hurt. Lima, O., Dec. 23.—A bad freight wreck occurred on the C. H. and D. R., near here to-day. Thirty cars were demolished and Robert Demning was killed.

Every member of the City Council was in also place at last night's special meeting, called to consider the street railway question, of which it may be said that councils may come and councils may go, but it goes on—not quite forever perhaps, but into another year probably. The aldermen waded through 21 and a fraction of the 37 clauses in the agreement and then stuck. They were temporarily extricated at midnight by an adjournment until Tuesday. After a silence of some weeks the new company bobbed upscrenely again, and went the old company a little better by offering ten tickets for a guarter. Naturally this complicated the consideration of that part of the old company's proposition relating to cheap fares, and under these circumstances, combined with the late hour at which it was reached, the only thing the council could do was adjourn and think it over in the meantime. Mr. Ivey was present in the interest of his colleagues, and Messre. V. Cronyn, H. Cronyn, Flock and Smallman, of the London Street Railway Company. Representatives of the Trades and Labor Council were there patiently waiting for the clause which deals with the working hours of the employes, but it had not been arrived at when the meeting broke up.

THE NEW COMPANY HEARD FROM.
The following communication addressed to the city clerk was read.
"At the council meeting held on the 18th.



Booth went directly to Surrattsville, and then down the river to Leonardtown, where he crossed the Potenac to the Virginia side. Booth was traced through Surrattsville, and, knowing that he stopped at the old tayers. A grand of saddiers was old tayern, a guard of soldiers was placed about the house, and Lloyd was practically kept a prisoner of war for some days. HOW CIVIC CONTROL OF ELEC-

No one has attempted to controvert the deductions made by Ald. Parnell's committee from the extensive inquiries made by it in regard to public lighting by electricity. Yet that committee, afterfully investigating the whole question and ascertaining the experience of cities that own and operate electric lighting plants, made the important declaration that, under civic management, the taxpayers would save \$10,000 a year in their street lighting bill. Instead of paying \$94 a year per light, the committee maintain, the expense under municipal management would be about \$59.

The vote in favor of the principle should be decidedly in the affirmative.

KINDERGARTEN NURSERIES.

We understand that in some of the city sindergartens children under five years of age have been admitted during the session just closed while children over that age have been debarred from attendance. This is a matter which should engage the attention of the trustees at the earliest possible moment. It is of infinitely greater importance that a child, say of 6 years, should be at school than that the kindergarten should be turned into a nursery for 4 year olds. In any case, so long as the schools are crowded, the age for admission to the kindergartens should not be below 5.

THE OUTLOCK FOR CATTLE. Canadian shippers of live cattle to Great Britain, despite the rosy promises from Ottawa, may well be alarmed at the formidable movement against their interests ed by the London Times. That influential English journal has taken the ground that the time has arrived when all foreign cattle should be slaughtered at the port of debarcation in order to prevent the introduction of disease among British flocks and herds. Of course, Canadian cattle are included in the term "foreign," for in dealing with heir material interests old world authoritheir material interests out what the ties regard all countries removed from the two islands as "foreign." This stand seems to have wide indorsation, despite the protests of Canada. Indeed, it seems to be but a sequel to the action of the British Board of Agriculture excluding Canadian "stockers." Addi-tional evidence of the strength of the movement was supplied at the recent meet-ing of the Scottish breeders, under the presidency of the Marquis of Huntly, where the following resolution was unani-

mously passed:

"The members of the Aberdeen Angus Dinner Club beg to congratulate the Board of Agriculture upon the admirable work they have done this year, more particularly in prohibiting the landing of cattle, sheep, and swine from foreign countries in which loot-and-mouth disease was known to exist, and also for their firm and consistent action in scheduling Canadian cattle when it was found that they were affected with pleuro-pneumonia. They also desire to recognize the valuable services rendered by their veterinary staff in having not only reduced pleuro-pneumonia to a minimum, but in checking what at one time threatened to be a serious outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease in a manner which has not yet been done in any other country in Europe."

The London Times, commenting on this declaration, says its great importance lies in "the fact that it was passed without a mously passed:

deciaration, says its great importance lies in "the fact that it was passed without a dissenting voice at one of the most repre-sentative gatherings of «Scotch breeders ever gathered together in London, and may therefore be considered as a most unanswerable argument to the ungenerous attacks on the Board of Agriculture which have been made by a very small section of cattledealers in Scotland." Another resolution

passed was:

"It is the opinion of this club, in view of the fact that pieuro-pneumonia is now practically extinguished in this country, that an act should be passed requiring all foreign cattle, sheep and swine to be slaughtered at the port of landing, special powers being reserved by the Board of Agriculture to admit animals only under such conditions as the board may from time to time deem expedient to impose."



During the Christmas season, in the mind of the child, nuts, candies and pretty things are in the ascerdancy. This particular time of the year brings to the infant many little fairy thoughts and a distended stomach. Parental kindness permits a period of gormandizing which would not be tolerated at other times, and the nuts and cadies which are ordinarily distributed in a healthful way are swallowed in a terrible manner, and doctors and mustard plasters mark a scason which should not go outside the bounds of merry celebration.

The nuts to children, when permitted to be seaten at random, are poison. The child of today is not the monkey who exists on the finites of trees indigenous to his elime. Greay substances, when put into a little stomach with sugars and ices, turkeys and meats of every description, are not destined to bring about a state of health. Bad dreams, distended stomachs and embryodyspeptics can come from a single Christmas celebration. As the oil of the nut comes in contact with the digestive fluids, it is not turned into the channels which put the animal oils or vegetable oils (such as the olive) to the parts of the body that need their warmth. The nut oils are too fortified in character to be digested when taken in quantity, singly, they are not harmful.

There was an old New England tradition that one should never eat nuts without apples as a condiment. It was a sensible legacy which the generations of ancestors left. The mild acid in the apple so cut the oil of the nut that it was prepared for reception by the stomach and not left in a state to cause a disturbance. In this there was a lesson; think it out.

Parents, do not let your children mix nuts and sweets. You temper the sugar you take when you have a salad at dinner. Peel a Brazil nut and you can burn it in the flame of the candle, but so far as digestion is concerned there is little to recommend it. Let your children have a few nuts, but only a few, and do not let these combine wi



The dweller in the town commiserates the country resident in winter. If there has just been a light snow the secrets of the forest are printed as on an unsullied page—here are a few tiny characters which tell the number and street of the mouse's residence, and bold, pronounced ones which even the crafty fox cannot conceal; while here are the footprints of the rabbit he was pursuing. A pile of feathers and a few tracks in the snow proclaim the tradegy of the partinge and the owl's share in it, and an interincing of star-like tracery is significant of the fact that a great many dear little feather balls of snow birds have been breakfasting off the seed vessels of a patch of weeds.


