

Thrilling Story of a French Victory At Notre Dame de Lorette.

Trenches Lost By Allies Are Regained In Magnificent Counter-Attacks.

Paris, March 8.—The manner which a furious German attack at Notre Dame de Lorette was transformed inte a defeat in which 3,000 Germans fell, is described in the Petit Parisien by one f the combatants.

"The Germans blew in by mines our first line of trenches." says the story. Before the echoes of the explosion had dled away an avalanche of Germans poured down and forced the French into the second line of trenches, after a flerce hand-to-hand struggle. The Germans suddenly raked the trenches with two machine-guns, forcing the defenders into the third line, from which they were forced to retire on an easily-de-fensible position in the rear, after another bayonet battle with superior num. bers.

Preparations Made. "In no way demoralized, our me spent the night preparing to win back he lost position which the Germans strengthened with sand bags. artillery was placed in position ready to fire. As soon as dawn broke '3-inchers' opened with salvos. The shells burst in our old trenches, peppering the Germans methodically. Then the heavy artillery joined in the demoralizing. 





LONDON, March 7 .- The Petrograd correspondent of the Star forwards the following:

Archduke Joseph's army now is in full flight through the woody country between the Dniester and Pruth Rivers (Eastern Galicia), pursued by the Russian army which occupied Stanislau on Thursday.

"The Austrians have been forced to discard a number of guns and baggage trains, leaving them stuck in the heavy roads. On the other extremity the Austrian army has been driven from Nadworna (67 miles northeast of Czernowitz) and is partly broken and dispersed.

"The Austrian effort from the mid-Carpathian passes to clear the first part of the road to Przemysl has now been abandoned in despair."
