





London, Nov. 12.—Emperor Charles of Austria has abdicated, according to a Copenhagen dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company, quoting private ad-Telegraph Company, quoting private advices from Vienna.

> The abdication of Emperor Charles has been rumored several times in the past two weeks, but none of these reports have been confirmed. On October 23 it was reported that he had fled from 29 it was reported that he had fled from Vienna, but this report was denied by a Berlin newspaper, which said he was at the Austrian capital on October 30, and that he had been cordially received by the people, while going about the city. The most recent report in connection with Emperor Charles was received on November 2, when it was said that he had announced his intention to abdicate.



UNPRECEDENTED PROSPERITY TO FOLLOW WAR, DECLARE THE LEADERS OF FINANCE

Credit May Have To Be Exten ded in Time to a Democratic

| Continuous Continu Germany in Order That Indemnities Levied by the Allies May Be Collected.

[Special to The Advertiser.] New York, Nov. 12.-Representative bankers and industrial leaders are confident that unprecedented prosperity can be attained in the coming years, but warn that the days of readjust-ment to a pleace basis are fraught with grave pitfalls and dangers. Their atti-tude on the economic aspects of the new world situation created by the signing of the armistice and the politi-cal debacle in Germany was reflected in statements made today. Far-reaching changes in the inter-national relations were foreshadowed. In certain influential banking quarters

In certain influential banking quarters the view was expressed that eyentually the United States will be called upon to extend credit to the nations that made up the disintegrated alliance of what was the central powers. George E. Roberts, assistant to the president of the National City Bank, crystalized this sentiment by saying: "The peace settlement should be a just one, and should provide for complete reparation. But after that I think the war in all its phases should end. The German people must have a chance and a hope for development and prosperity in the future. Unless we help them with raw materials and credit facilities they will be unable to pay the required indemnity to France and Belgium."

Bankers who hold this view emphasized the repugnance that would be feit in extending a helping hand to our former enemies, but pointed out that it would be unwise and inhuman to build a wall around Germany and starve her people by witholding food and raw materials.

Some months will probably elapse before the actual cost of the war to the dominion will be known, after the actual declaration of peace. Estimates now given are merely conjectural. Considerable expenditure arising from the war will continue after the conclusion of peace. William Howard Taft Warns People of U. S. What To Expect.

Chicago, Nov. 12.-William Howard Taft, former president, warned the people in a speech not to expect the soldiers back from France within two years, because of the policing which will fall on the shoulders of the United States.

"The men in France will not return soon," he said. "They will be kept there for some time to do police work, both in the country of our enemies and in Russia. All boats in which the men were sent across will be needed to carry food and supplies to both our allies and our foes."

Peace, Like a Mantle, Spread Over **Battlefields**

With the British Army in Belgium, Monday, Nov. 11 .- (By the Assoclated Press) .- Peace descended like a mantel over the battlefield at 11 a.m. today. The last big gun crashed its challenge and 3 great, overpowering quiet replaced turmoil, death and destruction.

Almost coincident with signing of the armistice by the desperate enemy, the city of Mons capitulated before relentless British pressure, Canadian troops under Gen. Horne having captured the place. On this hallowed ground the troops are now resting on their arms, happy in the thought of the achievement of their final triumphs. They had driven the enemy out by the same gateway through which Field Marshal von Buelow and Field Marshal von Kluck hurled their great armies against the valiant little force of "contemptibles" in 1914.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11 .- Terms of the armistice which ends the world-war, because they strip Germany of the power to renew it, were announced by President Wilson today in an address to Congress, assembled in joint session.

All other submarines to be paid off and completely disarmed and placed under the supervision of the Allied powers and the United States of America.

26.—The existing blockade conditions set up by the Aliled and associated powers are to remain unchanged and all German merchant ships found at sea are to remain liable to capture.

27.—All naval alrcraft are to be concentrated and immobilized in German bases to be specified by the Allies and the United States of America.

28.—In evacuating the Belgian coasts and ports Germany shall abandon all merchant ships, tugs, lighters, cranes and all other harbor materials, all materials for inland navigation, all aircraft and all materials and stores, all arms and armamenta and all stores and apparatus of all kinds.

33.—No transfer of German merchant shipping of any description to any neutral flag are to take place after signature of the armistice.

34.—The duration of the armistice is to be thirty days—with option to extend. During this period, if failure of execution of any of the abovo clauses the armistice may be denounced by one of the contracting parties on 48 hours' previous notice.

VII.—TIME LIMIT FOR REPLIES.



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

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
