MEXICAN BANDITS THREATEN

CRIPPLED BY BIG STRIKE ON SUBWAY AND ELEVATED LINES

New York, Aug. 18.—More than two million persons, who ordinarily travel daily over the Interborough Rapid Transit Company's subway and elevated lines in Manhattan, the Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens today either took slow-moving surface cars and improvised conveyances or walked to their work as a result of the strike of the company's 14,000 employees for a 50 per cent increase in wages. As yesterday, when the strike became effective, not a wheel turned on the company's 250 miles of trackage. daily over the Interborough Rapid Transit Company's subway and elevated lines in Manhattan, the Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens today either took slow-moving surface cars and improvised conveyances or walked to their work as a result of the strike of the company's 14,000 employees for a 50 per cent increase in wages. The stoppage of the main arteries of travel caused the worst traffic snarl in the history of the city.

Heir To British Throne Visits Capital of Nova Scotia.

His Royal Highness Makes Inspection of Troops After Formal Reception.

Halifax, Aug. 1 .- His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales stepped ashore at the dockyards from H. M. S. Renown at 10 o'clock this morning to the booming of a royal salute from the citadel. After the formal reception and inspection of the guard of honor supplied by the Royal Canadian Garrison Artil-

The Prince of Wales reached the provincial buildings at 10:20 a.m. Addresses of loyalty and congratulation were there read to his royal highness on behalf of the Province of Nova Scotia and the city of Halifax. Mayor John S. Parker and City Clerk L. F. Monaghan represented the city, and the provincial address was signed by Hon. McCallum Grant, lieutenant-governor, and G. H. Murray, provincial secretary. In reply the prince congratulated the province and the city on their part in the historic struggles which determined the future of the North American continent many generations ago. New York, Aug. 18.-Radical changes n the sanctioned practices of the Episcopal Church are provided for in a report made public here today of the church's commission on the revision and enrichment of the book of common prayer, to be submitted to the general convention of the church in October.

The report makes provision for faith healing, anointing with holy oils, requiem communions and prayers for the dead, reservation of the sacrament and intinction—the use of a dipped wafer instead of the communion cup. British Premier Outlines Financial and Industrial Situation in the Mother Country-Britain Has To Pay Back Adverse Trade of Two Billi ons-3,100,000 Demobilized Men Absorbed in Industrie s.

London, Aug. 18.—The war cost £40,000,000,000, Premier Lloyd George declared in his speech in the House of Commons today on the financial and industrial situation. Most of this sum was spent for purposes of destruction. The premier asserted that the changing from war to peace conditions would take just as long as the change from peace to war. The first outstanding Capital Is Prepared To Extend fact of the present situation was the alarming adverse trade balance. The import restrictions, which will terminate September 1, the premier continued, had given British manufacturers an opportunity of making and dealing in goods which otherwise would have been hurried here from foreign countries.

The premier said that before the war imports had exceeded exports from the United Kingdom by £150,000,000. Receipts from foreign investments at present were down to £100,000,000, while Great Britain has to pay back an adverse trade balance of £800,-

Labor conditions in the United Kingdom, Mr. Lloyd George added, have improved. Of the 3,600,000 men demobilized, only 350,-000 have not been absorbed in industries.

The national debt, the premier declared has grown from £641,000,000 to £7,800,600,000.

Pensions cost the Government £100,000,000 yearly. Private expenditure in the aggregate, the premier said, was more formidable than public expenditure. One way of meeting the increase in expenditure was to increase production, but the output is less in everything except agriculture.

. The premier declared that if the country continues in the way it is going, the adverse trade balance would reach £1,000,000,-000, compared to £150,000,000 before the war.

The question of uniform rates for electrical power was brought before the convention of the Western Ontario Associated Boards of Trade held in London last fall, when the cause was eloquently championed by Mr. Hume and Mr. Bowden on the ground that if hydro power is genuinely a "public utility," all municipalities should benefit equally and have the same opportunities for development through the service of such power, whatever their location. One of their arguments for equalization of rates is the postal system, whereby a letter is carried a few miles or to any part of Canada for the same rate.





EMBARGO AGAINST U. S. GOODS NOT CURE FOR EXCHANGE PLAGUE

Many For Benefit of the Few.

A citizen of London, anticipating short holiday trip to the United States, went into a local bank yesterday to draw a check on himself for \$100, making a request for "American money."

No Relief For Present.

He told his experience to the newspaper, declaring himself a convert to the idea mooted locally some days ago, namely, that the Government be urged to place an embargo on goods imported to Canada from the United States until the "balance of trade" is restored.

No Relief For Present.

"The rate of exchange on American money has steadily increased during the period of the war until the present, and there won't be much change in the situation until England is again able to supply us with goods formerly received from there, but now hought in the No Relief For Present. United States."

An assistant bank manager, in the absence of his chief, ventures the opinion that the exchange business is "all a gamble," and that it isn't possible to predict improvement or otherwise in the present conditions.

In other words, when it comes to doing business with the United States, a Canadian dollar just now is only worth about 95½ or 95½ cents."
