BRITAIN'S INDUSTRIAL AND FINANCIAL SITUATION OUTLINED BY LLOYD GEORGE

INDUSTRIAL NEW YORK BADLY CRIPPLED BY BIG STRIKE ON SUBWAY AND ELEVATED LINES

Metropolis Experiencing Worst Traffic Mix-Up in Years—14,000 Employees Demand an Advance of Fifty Per Cent in Wages—Prospects of Settlement Not Bright.

New York, Aug. 18.—More than two million persons, who ordinarily travel daily over the interborough Rapid Transit Company's subway and elevated lines in Manhattan, the Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens today either took slow-moving surface cars and improvised conveyances or walked to their work as a result of the strike of the 14,000 employees for a 50 per cent increase in wages. As yesterday, when the strike became effective, not a wheel turned on the company's 250 miles of tracks.

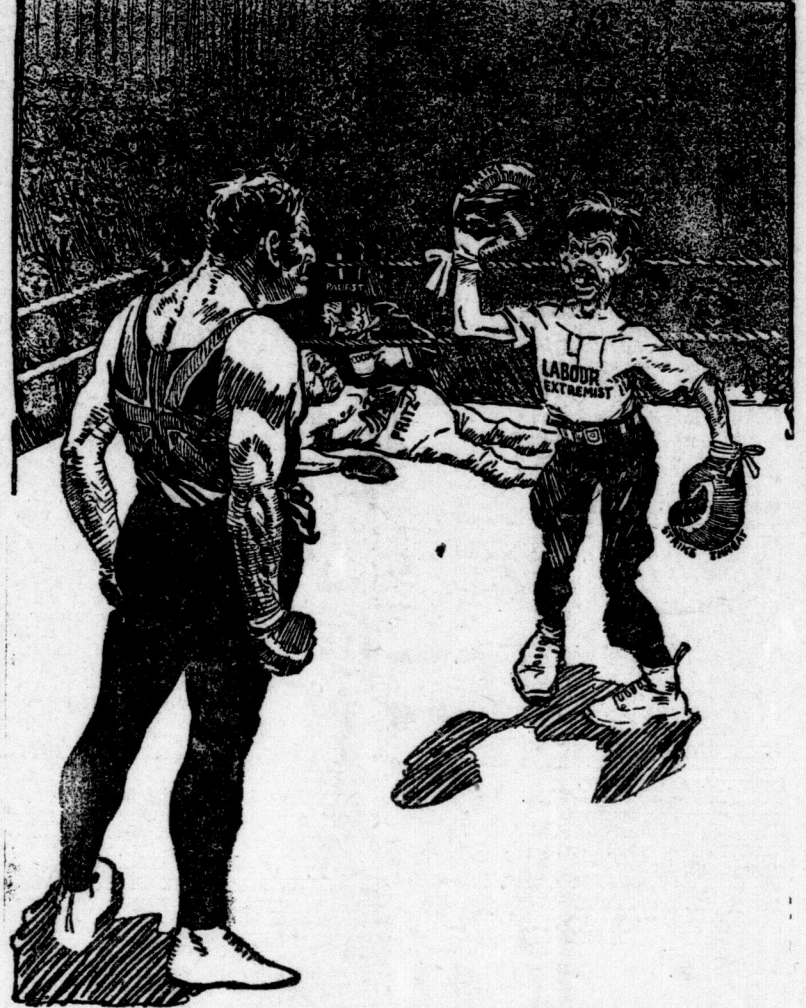
Heir to British Throne Visits Capital of Nova Scotia.

Lloyd George Tells Commons That War Cost Great Britain Two Hundred Billion Dollars

OTTAWA WILL WELCOME SIR ARTHUR CURRIE THIS AFTERNOON

Capital Is Prepared To Extend an Enthusiastic Reception.

VETERANS AS GUARD

Canadian Commander Will Be Guest of Honor At Official Dinner on Tuesday.

Ottawa, Aug. 18.—Ottawa will officially welcome Lieut.-Gen. Sir Arthur W. Currie, G.C.M.G., K.C.B., commander of the Canadian Corps, on his return to the capital today. In the absence of the prime minister, Gen. Currie will be met at his train at 4 o'clock in the afternoon by Sir George Foster, secretary of the Canadian Corps, and other members of the staff.

British Premier Outlines Financial and Industrial Situation in the Mother Country—Britain Has To Pay Back Adverse Trade of Two Billions—3,100,000 Demobilized Men Absorbed in Industries.

London, Aug. 18.—The war cost £40,000,000,000, Premier Lloyd George declared in his speech in the House of Commons today on the financial and industrial situation. Most of this sum was spent for purposes of destruction. The premier asserted that the changing from war to peace conditions would take just as long as the change from peace to war. The first outstanding fact of the present situation was the alarming adverse trade balance. The import restrictions, which will terminate September 1, the premier continued, had given British manufacturers an opportunity of making and dealing in goods which otherwise would have been hurried here from foreign countries.

BOLSHEVIKI ARE DRIVEN FROM ODESSA, SOVIET ARMIES ARE EVACUATING ENTIRE UKRAINE

London, Aug. 18.—The Bolsheviki have been driven from Odessa, the most important part in the Black Sea, by the populace of the city, according to reports received by the British war office. It is reported also that the Soviet forces are evacuating Kiev and the entire Ukraine.

Odessa was the last important city along the Black Sea held by the Bolsheviki. The reports of the city and the evacuation of Kiev and the Ukraine, if correct, takes from Bolsheviki control the most important agricultural territory of European Russia. Since its occupation by the Allies, Odessa has been held by the soviet, except for a brief period when rebels gained control.

MEXICAN BANDITS THREATEN TO KILL AMERICAN AIRMEN UNLESS RANSOM IS PAID

U. S. Government Realizes Crisis Has Been Reached and That Drastic Action Must Be Taken At Once—Avisors Are Held For Sum of \$15,000.

Washington, Aug. 18.—Vigorous representations were made to the Mexican Government today by the state department concerning the capture and detention of two American army aviators by bandits, who demand \$15,000 ransom.

Washington, Aug. 18.—Coming close on the heels of the state department's virtual ultimatum to the Carranza Government, that unless steps were taken to stop the murder of American citizens, and for protection of their rights, a radical change in the attitude of the United States Government toward Mexico would be adopted, news that two American aviators were being held by Mexican bandits for \$15,000 ransom, with death as the alternative, caused the already strained relations between the two countries to be regarded here today as having reached a stage bordering on the acute.

There was no statement early today of what steps had been taken, or were to be taken, either by the state or war department. However, it was regarded as imperative that some action be taken at once, as the demands of the bandits required that the ransom be paid today.

GERMANY'S POLICE FORCE IS ORGANIZED ON MILITARY BASIS

Officials Are Being Equipped With Steel Helmets and Rifles.

Coblenz, Aug. 18.—The militarization of the police force in Germany, which has been in progress since the beginning of the war, is now being completed, according to reports from the German government. The police force is being organized on a military basis, and the officials are being equipped with steel helmets and rifles.

BRITISH FORCES OF OCCUPATION BEING RAPIDLY REDUCED

Whole Divisions Are Leaving German Territory At a Time.

London, Aug. 18.—The reduction of the British army of occupation at Cologne is being rapidly accomplished, a whole division at a time returning to the United Kingdom. The military authorities are permitting soldiers to volunteer for harvesting in some localities at full rates of pay.

DRASTIC CHANGES PROVIDED FOR IN EPISCOPAL CHURCH

American Commission Makes Recommendations On Revision of Prayer Book in U. S.

New York, Aug. 18.—Radical changes in the sanctioned practices of the Episcopal Church are provided for in a report made public here today of the church's commission on the revision and enrichment of the book of common prayer, to be submitted to the general convention of the church in October.

IGNITION OF WHEAT DUST WAS CAUSE OF PT. COLBORNE WRECK

Commission of Engineers Submits Report After Investigation.

Ottawa, Aug. 18.—An explosion, caused through the ignition of wheat dust, was the cause of the wreck and destruction of the Government elevator at Port Colborne, according to the tentative report of the commission of engineers which has been investigated to the matter. It appears that the "leg" used for loading the boats jammed, causing friction between the pulley and belt, the "leg" hereupon fell down, raising a cloud of dust, which became ignited through the explosion followed, which wrecked the elevator.

PARIS ANXIOUSLY AWAITING NEWS OF GOLIATH'S ARRIVAL

Paris, Aug. 18.—Anxiety is felt here over the lack of news of the arrival of the giant alpine Goliath at Dakar. The airplane was last reported Saturday morning at 3:30 o'clock passing over Port Etienne, 500 miles from Dakar. At that time the machine had accomplished the worst part of the journey from Madagascar to Dakar, having crossed the Sahara.

CZECHO-SLOVAKS WHO WERE WITH ITALIANS LEAVING FOR BOHEMIA

Rome, Aug. 18.—A contingent of the Czecho-Slovak forces that fought with the Italian army during the war began leaving Italy today for Bohemia.

LOUVE WILL SOON BE REOPENED AND THOROUGHLY CLEANED

Paris, Aug. 18.—The Louvre, the National Museum, which has been closed to the public since the beginning of hostilities, will be reopened shortly. It is being completely cleaned and overhauled and is being repaired for the first time in fifty years.

NEW FINNISH CABINET

Helsinki, Aug. 18.—The new cabinet of the Finnish republic has been definitely formed. It was announced today, with Prof. Kaarlo Juho Stenroos, president of the republic, holding the war portfolio.

Paris, Aug. 18.—The Hungarian situation will be discussed by the supreme council of the peace conference at its first meeting. Balfour, the British foreign minister, who visited the battlefields of France over Saturday and Sunday with Simon Tittoni, the Italian foreign minister, and Frank Polk, the head of the American delegation, returned to Paris this morning.

MOROCCAN BRIGANDS UNDER RAISULI KILL SPANISH SOLDIERS

Paris, Aug. 18.—Moroccan brigands under command of their leader, Raisuli, are reported to have ambushed a Spanish force accompanying a food convoy between the towns of Sagrada and Reala, killing twelve soldiers and wounding a number, four officers being among the casualties. The column, however, succeeded in escaping. Raisuli is said to be organizing a vast entrenched camp between Taniers and Telenan, near Fondack. Natives report that an elaborate system of trenches and blockhouses has been constructed, all the works being modern in character.

GOVERNMENT LIKELY TO SET WHEAT PRICE AT \$2.25 A BUSHEL

Figure Decided Upon To Be Much Higher Than That First Forecasted.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Winnipeg, Aug. 18.—The initial price of wheat to be paid by the Canadian Government to the farmer at the time of sale is expected to be announced from Ottawa some time today. This was learned from members of the Canadian wheat board, who arrived at what they believe will be a satisfactory price, both to the producer and the Government at a session Saturday morning, and their recommendation was forwarded at once to the Government.

AGED FOREST MAN DIES SUDDENLY. FOREST, Aug. 17.—Andrew S. Anderson, one of the oldest residents of Forest, died suddenly this morning following a stroke. About a year ago he suffered a slight stroke, but had recovered. Mr. Anderson was well known to traveling men throughout the province, having been in the ivory business here for about 50 years. He retired about ten years ago. He was born in Russell county in 1837, and was several times town councillor here. Surviving are his wife, two sons, Charles A. and Clarence, and one daughter, Mrs. Howard Fraleigh, all of Forest. The funeral will take place Tuesday. John McPherson, while drawing logs for the Forest Basket Factory here Saturday, fell from the load and fractured his collarbone and three ribs. A PERTINENT QUESTION. Where Did Males Get Their Idea of Superiority, Says Precher. The manner in which Rev. Charles Evans, B.A., of St. Marys, Ont., referred to the question of superiority for men on Sunday morning, in the course of his eloquent and impressive sermon on "Unity," preached to the united congregations of St. Andrew's and the First Presbyterian Churches, evoked many smiles and subsequent comments. QUICK ACTION BY PORT LIFE-SAVER SAVES TWO LIVES

Harry Stevens Makes Clever Rescue of St. Thomas Boys.

Port Stanley, Aug. 17.—Quick action on the part of Harry Stevens, lifeguard at the Port Stanley bath house, undoubtedly saved the lives of Eddie Page and Leroy Scott, two St. Thomas youths. Sunday, shortly after 5 p.m. Most of the bathers had left the beach, when the two boys were tipped from a canoe and were seen struggling in the heavy surf. The lifeguard was in the dressing room, preparing to leave when he was told of the boys' danger by a Chinese laundryman. Without waiting for his clothes he plunged into the water, and, diving himself in his heavier garments as he swam, reached the boys before they sank the second time. He righted the canoe and towed it to the beach with the boys clinging to it.

WEST. ONTARIO TO START DRIVE FOR EQUAL HYDRO RATES

Convention Will Be Held in This City August 22.

A convention of those interested in all parts of Western Ontario, in the question of uniform rates for hydroelectric power, is to be held in the Tecumseh house on August 22 and 23, called by representatives of the Goderich Board of Trade, J. 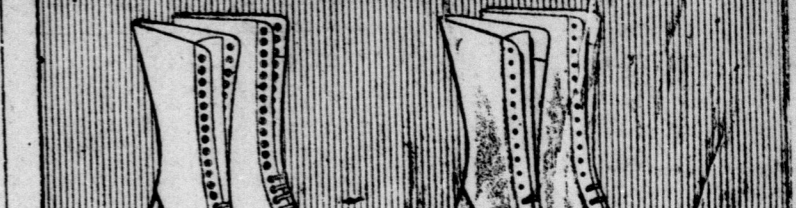

The Hearst administration has failed to do this. In Toronto five companies control and sell all the cattle which are brought there. The butchers do not receive anything but the carcasses of the animals. The controlling companies get the hides and the hides are such that if the attorney-general were to take the trouble to investigate he would find that there is a fine of \$500 for selling these with the carcasses of the animals. These were among the charges against the party in a stirring speech to liberalists that was given by Dewar in the Griffin Theatre at Chatham, Saturday.

Indorse Nominations.
The meeting was called to indorse the nomination of R. L. Brackin in the coming provincial election. Mr. Brackin contested the riding against the present Conservative member, G. W. Sulman in 1914, reducing a Conservative majority of 1,100 to 32. Two years ago he was re-nominated by the Liberals. At his own suggestion the meeting Saturday was called to discuss his nomination in the light of the conditions of the last two years.

4 1/2 PER CENT EXCHANGE ON CANADIAN MONEY

Dominion Funds Exhausted in Detroit, Declares Bank Official.

DETROIT.—The rate on Canadian exchange, quoted at Detroit banks today, reached the unusual figure of 4 1/2 per cent. James A. Wilson, assistant cashier

of the First and Old Detroit National Bank, said a request made to Canadian banks for a market on exchange brought the reply that there was none to be had. "Canada's funds here are exhausted," Mr. Wilson explained. "The balance of trade has been so much against her that she has been unable to maintain sufficient money in this country to keep exchange rates anywhere near normal. The moving of the Canadian wheat crop in the fall may be expected to relieve the situation to some extent."

WAKE UP OR DOLLAR WILL BE 90 CENTS

Mayor Somerville Tells of Canada's Needs.

ENCOURAGE INDUSTRY

Refrain From Purchasing From the United States.

That Canadians should stop purchasing foreign-made goods and that London particularly should encourage home industries to expand, rather than assist foreign manufacturers to establish factories in this city is the opinion of Mayor Somerville, which he expressed yesterday in reference to the rate of exchange between Canada and the United States. If Canada were to refrain from purchasing anything from the States with the exception of certain raw materials which cannot be secured at home, the value of the Canadian dollar would be increased to its normal rate in American markets, says his worship.

Patronize Home Concerns. Mayor Somerville has many times expressed the opinion that home industries should be patronized and he thinks that this policy is absolutely necessary now if Canada is to reach her proper place in the industrial world. One of the methods which his worship would adopt to secure this is the

maintenance of a high tariff wall. This is an absolute economic necessity for Canada at this time, he asserts. This, in connection with a large educational campaign which he says should be started, will result in bringing the Canadian trade to a proper balance. **Industrial Expansion.** Touching on the industrial expansion which is coming to Canada, he pointed out that there are many small but worthy industries that would expand if they were given a chance. The mayor would facilitate this by making arrangements for the banks to loan the necessary money. This would be much preferable to bringing in new industries, generally from the United States, where the profits are returned, and building up large American firms on Canadian soil with Canadian capital which is controlled by American interests.

"Unless we Canadians wake up and buy at home, our money soon will be worth more than 90 cents on the dollar in the American markets," said the mayor. "On the other hand, we have taken all the American silver dollar which was lost to circulation here here, and for very silver American we paid 100 cents when it was only worth half that as far as silver value is concerned." The mayor would advocate a campaign to educate the Canadian citizens to the "danger" of continuing this policy of buying foreign goods to the exclusion of home trade and to the injury of Canadian money values in foreign markets.

CANADIAN SILVER IS AT DISCOUNT IN BUFFALO NOW

Silver Dollar Has Value of Only 92 Cents in Border City.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 4.—Canadian silver coins were worth eight cents on the dollar less than their face values

as a circulating medium in Buffalo today. Notices were posted in banks and business houses fixing a discount of one cent on a dime, two cents on a quarter and four cents on a half dollar. Canadian coins have passed at par there for years, but bankers explained that, because of the widening discount due to post-war conditions, other borrowing cities were making Buffalo a dumping ground for Canadian money of all denominations.

EMBARGO AGAINST U. S. GOODS NOT CURE FOR EXCHANGE PLAGUE

Would Work Hardship to Many For Benefit of the Few.

A citizen of London, anticipating a short holiday trip to the United States, went into a local bank yesterday to draw a check on himself for \$100, making a request for "American money." What he actually received through the wicket was \$85 in bills of various denominations, and some odd pieces of silver.

He told his experience to the newspaper, declaring himself a convert to the idea mooted locally some days ago, namely, that the Government had urged to place an embargo on goods imported to Canada from the United States until the "balance of trade" is restored.

The Balance of Trade. "What's the balance of trade," the young woman wanted to know who had a few hours before paid something money out of the bank in American money. "You see," she was told, "we have been buying so many more things from the United States than the United States has been buying from Canada, that it is necessary to even things up by charging just so much more for American money. In other words, when it comes to doing business with the United States, a Canadian dollar just now is only worth about 92 1/2 or 93 1/2 cents." "And we earn our money just as hard, if not harder, than they do over there," said the young woman indignantly. The embargo can't come too soon for her.

two victims of a balance of trade on the wrong side of the line for Canada. "The cure would be worse than the disease," he says. "It simply can't be done without causing great hardship to the many who would be deprived of goods for the benefit of the comparatively few who travel and visit in the United States! We are obliged at the present time, and will be for some time to come, to get many things from the United States which we formerly bought from England. This is the reason for the growth of the balance of trade against us in the United States. It is also responsible for the fact that the sterling rate has gone down."

No Relief For Present. "The rate of exchange on American money has steadily increased during the period of the war until the present, and there won't be much change in the situation until England is again able to supply us with goods formerly received from there, but now bought in the United States."

An assistant bank manager, in the absence of his chief, ventures the opinion that the exchange business is "all a gamble," and that it isn't possible to predict improvement or otherwise in the present conditions. A third financial institution representative, calling attention to the fact that the balance of trade has been piling up rapidly on the side of the United States in the past six weeks, with consequent large increase in exchange rates, adds: "It is to be expected that there will not be any substantial decrease until after the wheat crop is sold. The wheat crop is a large factor in restoring the balance of trade. This expert numbers contribute largely to the building up of a balance of trade on the wrong side for Canada."

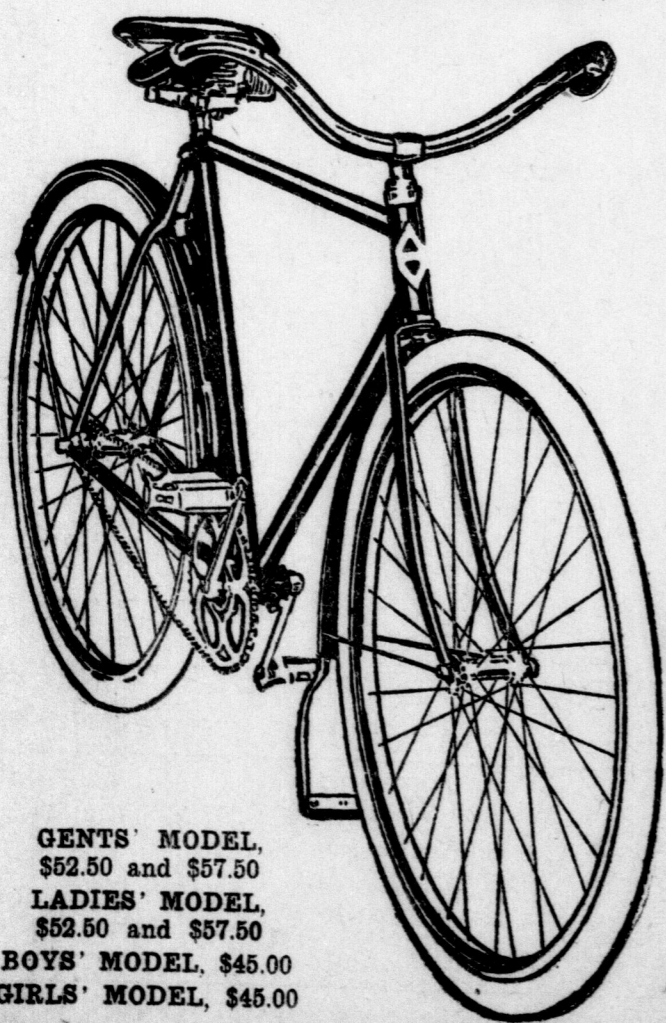
