

# Says Women Confessors Would Never Do, Couldn't Keep Secret

London, April 22 .- Whether the church should provide women conssors is a question with which the Lambeth conference of the clergy of Great Britain, to be held in July, may have to decide. The Rev. Henry Ross, vicar of St. Albans, a large parish in Holborn London, does not hold out much hope for the suggestion, for in a recent interview he said women would not confess to women, who are pitiless to their own sex.

'I have had considerable experience of public life outside church," he said, "and while we welcome women's help, I have had evidence of this trait in their character. "The church is quite clear on this subject." he added. "for we come at once up against the question of the priesthood. No woman can be admitted to the priesthood. Therefore, we can have neither women preachers nor women confessors. If there were no other, there is the psychological objection that one woman would not trust another woman

Berne. April 22.-The Czecho-Slovak authorities stand ready to deliver to Germany, possession of Max Hoelz, the Saxon communist bandit, terrorizer of the Plauen district, who was arrested in Czecho-Slovakia last week, according to dispatches from Prague.
In addition to the 130,000 marks in bank notes found upon Hoelz at the time of his arrest, it was discovered that

### BIRD NOTES

(Contributed by McIlwraith Or. nithological Club.)

April is the month when most of the wild ducks pass through Southern Ontario from their winter homes in the South to their breeding grounds on the northern lakes. On their way they often stop for rest and food on the river or small ponds about London. This spring we have had a very good list. nine species being found by club mem-bers—the American and Hooded Mer-gansers, the Bufflehead, Bluebill, Old-Squaw, Ring-Necked, Golden-Eye, Ruddy and Black ducks. The rarest of the list is the Ring-Neck, a duck with black head and back, white sides and a black head and back, white sides and a bluish bill with a couple of white bands. In fact, "ring-billed duck" would be a better name than "ring-neck."

London Housewives Can Now Use Electric Stoves.

# **WANTS HOUSING**

City Clerk Baker, was unanimously referred for consideration to the executive of the Chamber of Commerce.

Following the address by Mr. Dennis, Major T. J. Murphy drew attention to the fact that the man who most needs assistance is the man who cannot be helped by housing schemes, providing houses worth from \$3.500 upwards.

Mr. Dennis declared that frankly speaking, the housing commission could do nothing under the present housing act to help the man who can only afford to pay \$18 or \$20 a month rent. He suggested a housing company, organized under the old act, under which it could borrow \$5 per cent of the money required. Or the manufacturers and the chamber of commerce could get together Today's Total Reaches Sum of chamber of commerce could get together and guarantee the payments of return-ed soldiers, who could not afford to ad-vance one-tenth of the cost of construc-

Building figures for the month reached a total of \$133,180 today, and passed the total of \$137,000 attained during the whole month of April last year. The total is likely to be increased considerably before the end of the month. Building Inspector A. M. Piper said. The total reached so far this year is now more than \$50,000 ahead of that reached by the end of April last year. There are 6,500 vacant lots in London. ## INSPECTOR YOUNG SENDS OUT PLUMBING RULES

Regulations to govern the installa-ion of plumbing until the amended bylaw has been approved by the board of health and the council were issued by Plumbing Inspector James C. Young oday on the instructions of Ald. O. I. Cunningham, chairman of No. 1 com-nitree. mittee.

The city council Monday night ruled that all plumbing work should be subject to the provisions of the old plumbing bylaw, until the new one became operative. There are only a few copies of this old bylaw available. To get around this difficulty the inspector has condensed the regulations and sent them out in letter form to every plumber in the city, as follows:

"A permit shall be taken out for all work except necessary minor repairs, and a plan of same filed in this office.

"A water test shall be required on all roughing in, but the smoke test on the finished work may be dispensed with.


# **VARNISHED BOARD IS**

LONDON, April 21.—A varnished board as an effective rat trap is a board as an ellective rat trap is a method recommended recently by Dr. Howarth, medical officer of London. # Excise Tax on Luxuries?

(Special To The Advertiser).

OTTAWA, April 21.—The imposition of an excise tax on luxury lines, by which individuals purchasing goods or articles in excess of a certain price shall be compelled to pay a percentage over and above toward the treasury, is said to be in contemplation by the minister of finance.

Such a tax is in force in the United States at the present time and is intended to act not only as a revenue-producer, but as a sumptuary restriction upon extravagent tastes. Under the measure, if it is introduced, a certain line of articles would be stipulated, including apparel, boots and shoes, etc., and it would be provided that a percentage be added to each individual article costing above a certain amount. A record of transactions would be kept by the dealer and the proceeds from the tax on sales turned in to the receiver-general.


