Former Premier of Canada Has Eye On Position.

Sir Louis Davies Would Be Willing to Retire, Is Belief.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Nov. 25 .- Speculation regarding the future of Sir Robert Borden is still rife here. He has been enjoying his retirement here recently in a quiet way, devoting the greater part of nis time to reading, and appears to flave tompletely regained his health. It is well known that it was long the ambition of Sir Robert to cap his distinguished career as a lawyer by achieving the position of chief justice of the supreme court of Canada, and it is generally believed that he will succeed to that position before long. The present incumbent, Sir Louis Davies, was appointed to the supreme court in September. Under the statute retirement on full pension is permissible if the intumbent has been on the bench for 20 rembent has been of the bench for 20 years and is over 75 years of age, or has served 25 years and is over 70. Sir Louis was 75 last May, and will have served 20 years next September. Consequently, his retirement then is very probable, and it is known that his indinations run that way. The general expectation is that Sir Robert will succeed him next September, by which time he will be fully able and desirous of resuming work.

Ottawa, Nov. 25 .- An amalgamatio as been effected between the Posta Clerks' Association and the Federated Association of Letter Carriers, according to the secretary-treasurer of the new body, E. W. Mann. As each of these bodies numbers about 2,000 members, and have branches between the Great Lakes and the Atlantic seaboard, the federation of these bodies is probably one of the largest amalgamations in labor circles in Canada for the last few years.

The new organization will be called the Canadian Federation of Postal Emplovees. Membership shall be com posed of all existing recognized Do minion-wide postal employees' organizations, and such other organizations of postal employees which shall in future be organized and recognized by this federation as Dominion-wide or-ganizations. W. J. Cantwell is president of the new organization.

ARGENTINA LEADING

Sweden, Norway and Denmark Will Demand Amendments.

Geneva, Nov. 25.—No meeting of the assembly of the League of Nations was held today in order to give the members full time for committee work, and it is possible there will be no session tomorrow. While some of the committees are reported to be progressing with unexpected speed their prompt decisions are thus far mostly for sure and slow solutions.

After the membership committee had decided to make all the new Russian states wait for admission, and the amendment and disarmament committees had expressed themselves in favor of delay, the committee on finances and economics decided yesterday it would not act at present on the suggestion of the Brussels financial conference that a committee of financiers be chosen to lay plans for an international credit institution. The committee appears to be of the same opinion as the council of the league that this also is a question in which precipitate action would be unwise. If the assembly approves the committee's decision, another international financial conference will be held next year before anything is done on the suggestions made at the Brussels conference. This is understood to be the plan advocated by the British.





PARIS, Nov. 24.-Every house with its own electric generating installation. is the dream which M. E. Colardeau French scientist expounded before the French Academy of sciences recently. "We waste too much energy," was hi text, and he proceeded to show how scandalous was the waste.

Wind power was wasted wholesale but even more culpable was the waste of waterpower within one's own house. "The force of every kitchen and bathroom tap is wasted," he declared, and he put forward a scheme which he be-

room tap is wasted," he declared, and he put forward a scheme which he believes can be made practicable to utilize the force from the water that runs from every kitchen tap. Paris desires its water from a reservoir 200 feet above the city.

This is where M. Colardeau's invention comes in. In his own house he has fitted on his supply pipe a high-speed water turbine, giving direct energy to a dynamo, with a little battery of accumulators. Every time that the taps are turned on the little generating station works and the batteries accumlate the energy from the water, with his own installation the scientist claims he can light one 500-candle-power lamp, or 20 lamps of from 15 to 20 candlepower.

In his house he uses no other installation, and it never gives out and never costs him anything. In the country places M. Colardeau would use the wind to pump water up to the required heights, and so transfer the wind energy into water energy, which in turn would be transferred into electric energy with an apparatus similar to that described above.

"When we've done that," he concluded, "we needn't any longer worry about the exhaustion of the coal stocks of the world."



The Tariff Question.

Owing to the fact that the draft will go to the clubs for consideration, there was not much discussion of it. But, one delegate declared that unless the Canadian tariff wall was kept as high as the American, the country would be swamped with American and other countries' manufactured products.

Answering a question about the income tax, Mr. Currie said that as he understood it, a man having an income of \$1,000, whether it was in the way of wages or otherwise, would be required to pay a tax of \$20 annually on that amount, and a married man would be required if his income was \$2,000, to pay \$40. A delegate took exception to this, claiming that in the case of a married man with a family, \$40 tax on \$2,000 would be an impossible proposition, and a serious hardship.

It became evident that some kind of organizaion was required to work specially in furtherance of the movement, and in the city of London a few earnest-minded sons of the church organized "The Canadian Church Union." Special societies to achieve special ends within the church have been called into existence from time immemorial as circumstances required, and as there are special temperance, purity, mission and other societies or guilds, in full working order-today, under the authority of the church's spiritual ruler, so a society for church union in Canada was exactly in the path of church custom. The moral authority for organization was derived from Provincial Synod action, and it would not have existed without that action. Voluntary service for the cause of the church is one necessity of its earthly position, and the call to this work was none the less legitimate, that it proceeded from internal consciousness of church necessity, instead of external official appointment.

The Canadian Church Union has no connection with any other society. Its qualification for membership is being in full communion with the church, and its aims and objects are as

stated in its constitution. The better union of the Canadian Church called it into existence, but in considering the declaration of its aims and objects, it was felt that some other necessities of church life might be profitably dealt with, if the union grew into sufficient strength and influence to enable this to be done. Its aims and chiects then are:

1. To unite the various dioceses of the Church of England in Canada, so as to form a purely Canadian branch of the one Catholic and Apostolic Church, owing allegiance to a metropolitan and a provincial synod, as the true head and

Reports from Vancouver, Toronto, Montreal and Quebec state that large numbers of men are out of imployment, and that the prospects for the winter are far from promising. 



By squinting the lids, so that some of the marginal rays of light are excluded, the near-sighted may make vision slightly clearer, but only slightly. Near-sightedness tends to progress from bad to worse from year to year, up to the age of 20 to 25 years, when it generally does not show further in-

rease.

D. Rockefeller has given away nearly half a billion dollars, his son, John D. Rockefeller, declared here tonight in what is believed to be the first authentic detailed statement that has ever been made concerning his father's philanthropic gifts. The approximate total of the gifts is \$475,000,000, nearly half of which has been distributed in the last

five years. The statement refers to testimony given by the younger Mr. Rockefeller before the industrial relations committee here January 25, 1915, At that time, he said, he believed his father's gifts would total a quarter of a billion dollars, although so far as he knew, there was no accurate record of the oil king's philanthropy up to that time.

Whether reductions are possible.
