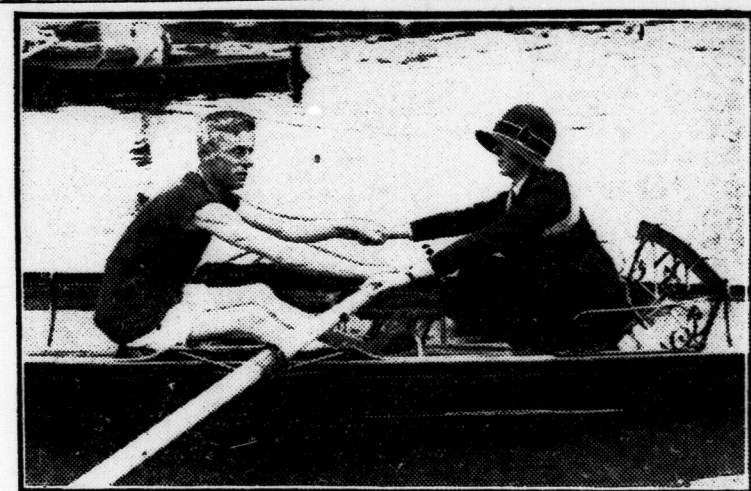




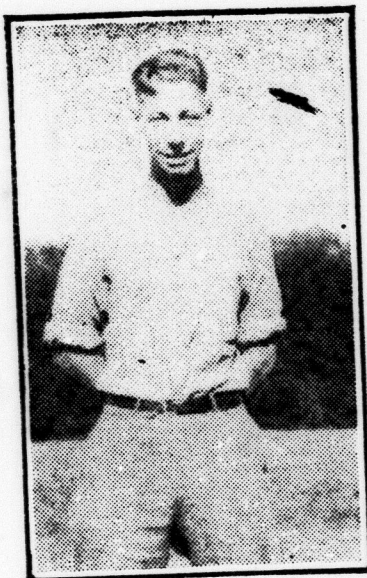
This interesting photograph shows how the natives of Sarajevo, Jugo-Slavia, carry their live stock to market.

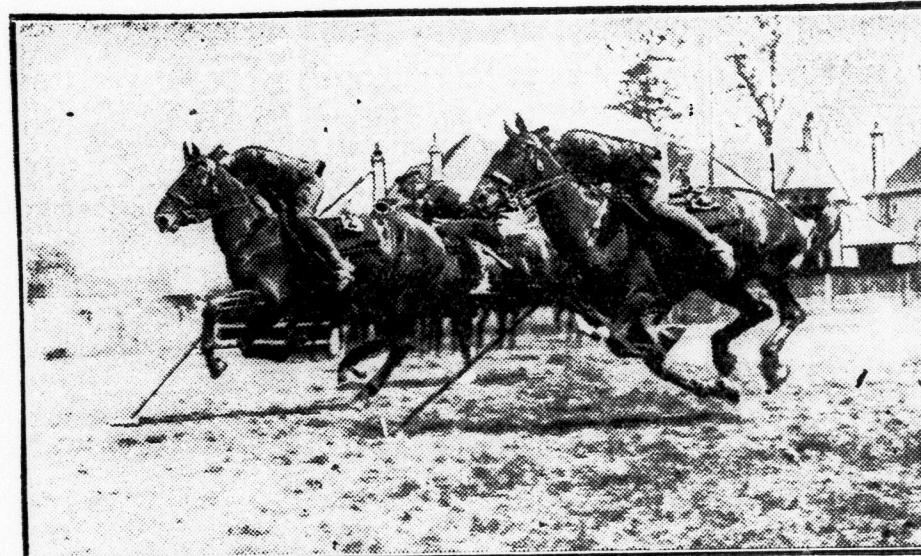

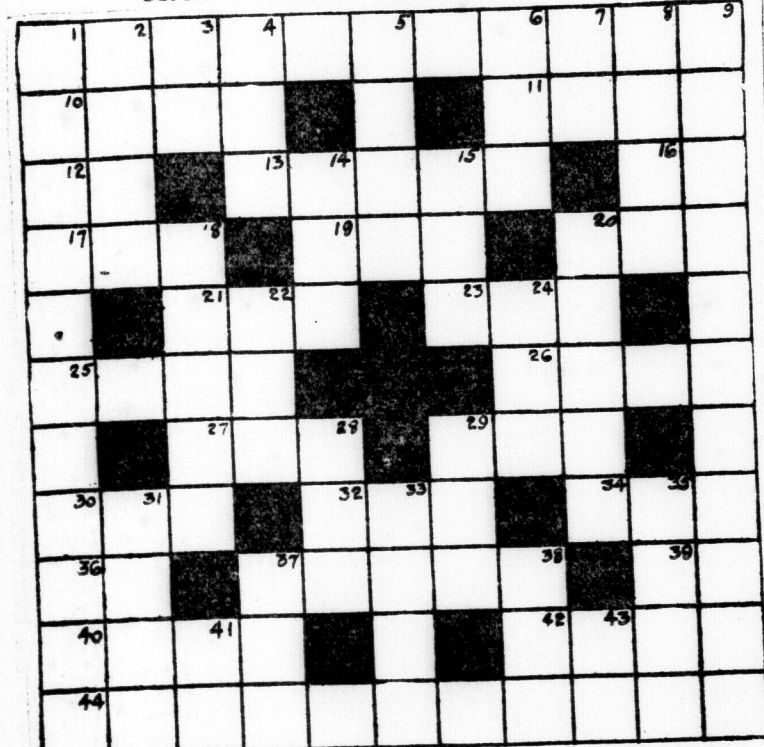

MANY WOUNDED IN RIOT AT WELSH COAL MINE. Strikers Attack Safety Workmen Manning Pumps—Fight 3 Hours. Associated Press Despatch. Ammanford, Wales, Aug. 5.—There was another severe riot tonight in the anthracite region where the miners are on strike.
