Mussulman and Christian in a Fierce Fight.

Christians Accused of Starting the Riots.

Paris, Sept. 8.-Official advices received by the foreign office here give brief details of the outbreak at Beirut. The killed number five or six, and many persons were wounded. The city is in an intense state of agitation.

The outbreak occurred during the night of Sept. 6 between Christians and Mussulmans. The fighting was furious, firearms and knives being used. The Italian: consul rescued one Christian, who had been stabbed and who had fallen in front of the door of the consulate.

This was the first information received here showing the really serious condition prevailing at Beirut. It caused much apprehension in official quarters, as being an indication of the spread of the disorder in the Turkish Empire. The presence of the United States cruisers Brooklyn and San Francisco at Beirut is regarded as a fortunate circumstance. It is expected that a number of other foreign war-

ships will gather there. The official reports further show that Beirut is one of the three places which are now centers of great animation.
