Says Prohibition Is the Only Efficient Remedy.

DEPUTATION TO MEET AGAIN

The Duty of the Government to Consider What Other Means Are

Toronto, April 6. — Premier Ross de-livered his answer to the temperance deputation this afternoon, as promised. Following is the text of the reply: "My Dear Sir,-In reply to the deputation which I had the honor of receiving yesterday, I desire to exsented by the different speakers that nothing short of the prohibition of the sale of liquors in hotels and the strict control over sales for purposes generally recognized as proper and legitimate, would fully protect society from the evil effects of excessive drinking, so far as legislation can be invoked,

for that purpose.
"Your decided preference for such a neasure as against amendments of the license laws I understand to mean that you do not favor at present any other form of temperance legislation.
"If the Government is unable to give the measure desired this session, will be our duty to consider what means are available for further action. Yours truly, G. W. ROSS."

The officers of the law who were en aged in the pursuit of "Texas" are not inclined to believe that the des perado was seen near Nilestown yesterday. They still cling to the belief that the last authentic report of the crook's whereabouts came from Engineer Simmie at Springbank, and that possibly he was seen on Brick street later on. The police do not believe that "Texas" was seen hatless and coatless near Nilestown, because in the first place they think that he would have been fully clothed before reaching that place. Further, they state, it is a very unlikely thing that "Texas" would make his way through at least ten miles of muddy roads. If he com-menced to double his tracks when he reached Springbank he would have to go fully that distance before he reached Nilestown. Besides, it would necessary for him to make a considerable detour to avoid the city. It is improbable that he would attempt

to make his way "cross country" through the fields. One officer says he does not believe 'Texas" was at Nilestown, nor does ne think he was any great distance from the city. 




Ottawa, April 6. — At the opening of the House, Hon. Clifford Sifton took up the Grand Trunk Pacific debate. He proved the Government's position in regard to the financing of the road to be a safe and correct one, and General to grant dissolution upon a false platform. The Government had nothing to take back in regard to its statements to take back in regard to its statements of last year, that the railway was going to be a paying enterprise. The trouble was that the shareholders of the Grand Trunk did not have the same faith in the country as the Government had, and the concessions made and pro-visions inserted to reassure those shareholders were an earnest of the Govern-ment's continued faith in the paying pospects of the Grand Trunk Pacific. Government control of rails, he maintained, was secured by the clause in the contract which declared that the Gover-nor-in-Council or railway commission shall have control of rails, and Parliament would pass an act compelling the commissioners to exercise that control. The Grand Trunk Pacific can never raise the question of vested rights. That was owing to the contracts. He admitted that the capitalization of a railway, in the matter of issue of bonds, affected the power of the Government to control rates. But, in regard to stock, it was different. Every man who bought stock did so in the face of the express provision of the contract that there is to control of rates.

Continuing, the Minister of the Interior declared that the company must not only build the western section, lease

the eastern and equip the entire road, but must bear the responsibilities of furnishing the money to run the road. Of the \$45,000,000 of stock, preferred and common, the Grand Trunk would have about \$32,000,000 to put on the market. Considering that therefore dividends could be paid on this stock, the Grand Trunk would have to pay interest on the bonds. rent of the eastern division and operating expenses, the company would do very well to get 60 cents on the dollar for this \$22,000,000, or \$20,000,000 in cash, which was only just enough to buy the rolling stock. That would leave the company with \$13,-000,000 of treasury stock on which to raise money for betterments, and it was ob-surd to say that this stock would be

given away practically for nothing. He added that the first dollar the Grand Trunk raised on this \$13,000,000 of common obligation to the Government; so that Mr. Fielding's estimate that the Government would not be called on to pay more than \$13,000,000 or \$15,000,000 as its share was completely vindicated. Mr. Sifton denied the statement that the Grand Trunk Pacific could get out of its obligation to spend \$20,000,000 on rolling stock by having it supplied by a rolling stock mpany. He treated this suggestion as utter nonsense, arguing that no company would advance rolling stock upon it under the present contract. The Government would have a first and second mortgage. Mr. Sifton also dismissed as absurd the suggestion that the second mortgage bonds of the Grand Trunk Pacific would be put upon the market at a sacrifice. As the Grand Trunk would have to guarantee interest on such bonds, he thought it pretty safe to assume that the com

pany would see no more were issued than were absolutely necessary. 
