~ CLEMENTS' GOOD MOVE.

Mr. Clements, the earnest young nember of Parliament for West Kent, drew the attention of the House to a very important matter when he advocated that the M. C. R. be forced to re-open their station at Charing Cross to accommodate the farmers of that district in matters of transportation, as reported in The Postmaster General to oppose such a

Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Minister of Railways and Canals, in reply to Mr. Clements, said: "I am not at all familiar with the circumstances to which my hon, friend, Mr. Clements has referred; in fact, I hear of the matter for the first time. I received note from him a few minutes ago saying that he would make reference to the Michigan Central Railway in ome remarks that he proposed to address to the House, but he did not indicate in what direction, I do not remember just exactly the provision of section 24, but it is the section which I had in my mind that where any grievance was brought to the notice of the Minister of Railways or the Railway Department the Min ister had the power to request the Board of Railway Commissioners to take action in the matter."

Mr. R. L. Borden pointed out that he Act says that the Board may of its own motion and shall upon re quest of the Minister deal with any Continuing, Mr. Emmerson said:

"My hon, friend having called at tention to the matter. I shall certainly request the commissioners to nquire into it and see wherein the difficulty lies. I quite appreciate the inconvenience which arises to the people of that locality-I am some-what familiar with it-by the cloing of this station. There must be some good and sufficient reason for this action by the railroad company, because, as a rule, railway companies do not arbitrarily close railway stations especially where there is any business to be done. I, perhaps, might very well understand why they might close a station as an operating office, but they would not close it as a railway station for passengers to get on and off and for the receipt, transport tion and send-ing out of freight. Whatever the facts are I shall endeavor to have them disclosed, and if the railway company is at fault it shall be called to an account to the extent that the Railway Commi sion has ju i dic-

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, Postmaster-General, in answering the portion of Mr. Clements' speech which eferred to his department, said:

"When the Hon, gentleman (Mr Clement ) called at my office this morning f was in attendance at a special Committee of the House, or else I would have been pleased to be there to listen to his request. 1 may tell my hon. friend that as usual I will try to meet his wishes in the matter."

From the replies received from the heads of the departments under whose jurisdiction the matter comes, it is seen that the question was seriously considered, and Mr. Clements was fully justified in making this appeal on behalf of the farmers affected as a result of the Railway's recent action. # **EDUCATION** BILL KILLED

The House Of Lords Refuse The Proffered Olive Branch

CARRIED AMENDMENTS

London, Dec. 20.—The education bill received its death blow in the House of Lords yesterday.

Both sides spent the last three days in practically incessant conferences, with the object of discovering an acceptable compromise, but the Opposition found themselves unable to accept the concessions offered by the Government.

These were formally presented by Lord President of the Council, the Earl of Crewe, when the House of Lords met yesterday afternoon, but Lord Lansdowne, on behalf, of the Opposition, refused the proffered olive branch, and moved that the Lords insist on their amendments to the bill. This was adopted by 132 to 52 votes, and the education bill was thus killed.





#### OIL COMPANY WOUND UP

Detroit, Dec. 20 .- The Hickey Oil Company, of Drivoit, which in its day was the wonder of the Leamington-Comber oil field in Essex County, Ont. has wound up its affairs and passed out of existence.

It struck two or three gushers in the latter part of 1904, but they proved to be only "pockets" and did not last long. It sold about \$15,000 worth of oil to the Imperial Oil Company, of Sarnia, and received about \$7,000 in bounties from the Canadian Government, but machinery and well construction were costly. One didvend of about one-half per cent. was paid.

The total loss to stockholders will be over \$14,000.
