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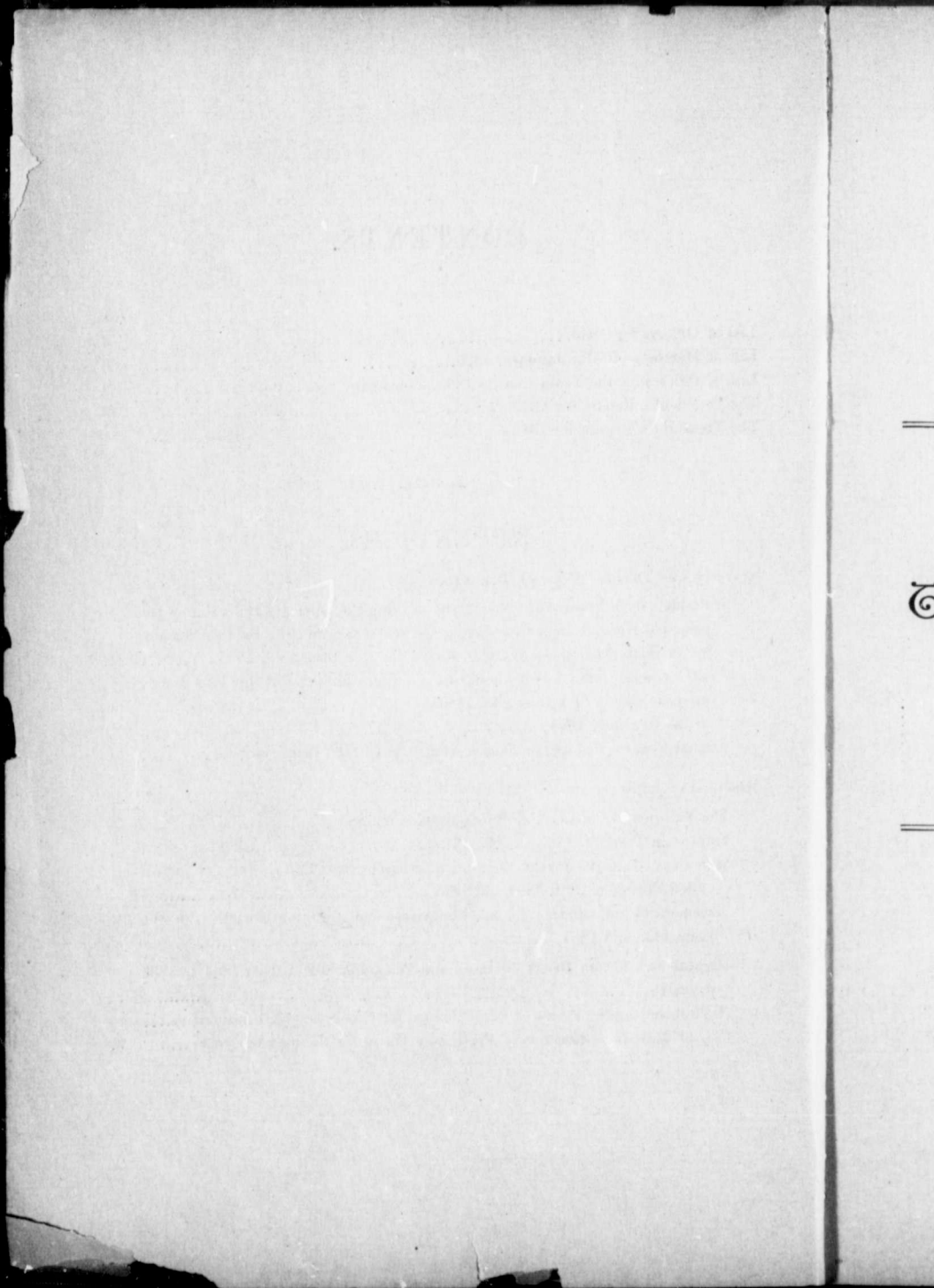

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—*TORONTO BOARD OF TRADE.*—

PRESIDENT'S REPORT, 1885.

A review of the condition of trade and commerce, prospective and retrospective, must take cognizance at the outset of the event which overshadows every other event that has occurred during the year, even commercially in the completion and opening for traffic of the Canadian Pacific Railway from ocean to ocean. Of the magnitude of this enterprise, 3,327 miles of constructed railway (not including 600 miles of leased lines) representing an expenditure somewhere in the neighbourhood of \$140,000, 000, it is impossible to speak in adequate terms.

Of this expenditure, and the labour and enterprise that have entered into the settlement and development, and the lives that have been lost in the defence of the new country opened up by the construction of this great trans-continental line, the people of Ontario have borne and must still for many years continue to bear a most important share. It is incumbent upon us, therefore, to see that the commercial enterprise of this city and Province is shaped to the requirements of the new and extensive fields thus opened to us, that the internal resources and possibilities of the Western Provinces may be fully explored and diligently cultivated, and all obstacles, such as discriminating rates of freight,, vigilantly watched and removed, so that an immediate and increasing return for that expenditure may be secured to us, and the fullest scope given to inter-provincial trade, in the absence of which our national life and commercial development will be dwarfed or strangled.

The completion of our connection with the C. P. R. at Callender by means of the Northern and Pacific Junction Railway, and the prospect of it being open for traffic within a month or two, puts us in a most favourable position in regard to distance from Northern Ontario and the North-West, to compete for the trade of these portions of the Dominion with that fairness of action in matters of freight and passengers on the part of the C. P. R., which this Board doubts not will characterize the proceedings of that Company, and our merchants may be expected to take the fullest advantage of this new avenue for the extension of our commerce.

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NATIONAL FINANCES.

The condition of the national finances is of importance to us, inasmuch as the revenue is still insufficient to meet the current expenditure, and there is a large deficit in the exchequer. The revenue producing point has already been reached in many items of our imports, and the probability of an increase of duty in some quarters, is producing speculation in merchandise on which an increase of duty is anticipated.

RECIPROCITY.

We seem to be face to face with an opportunity for securing a treaty of reciprocal trade relations with the United States, desirable in the interests of both countries. Taking up the statistics where they were left off by the late Hon. George Brown, when acting as High Commissioner, an expert should be immediately employed to compile the figures showing the current of trade between the two countries since then, to which the fullest publicity should be given; and when a draft treaty is happily agreed upon, every opportunity should be given the commercial organizations of discussing its provisions, and their probable practical effect. The ignorance of many of the U. S. citizens, of our country, its climate and institutions is dense, and every opportunity of removing this should be taken advantage of.

Of the trade of 1885 generally, it may be said, the close of the year found it in a sounder condition than at the beginning. The volume of trade was probably less in the aggregate, the competition greater, and the profits smaller. The terms "unremunerative" or "unprofitable" rather than "depression" would more accurately express the tendency of trade and its present condition. The extent to which home manufactures have displaced what in former years was imported, and the continued reduction in the value of commodities generally, will account in part for the reduction in imports. The statistics in regard to failures show a considerable reduction in the estimated amount of liabilities, comparing 1885 with 1884, but the reduction in the actual number of failures is not so marked.

The deduction seems to be, that the year has been disastrous to those chiefly in a smaller way of business, and every year it is certainly becoming more apparent that the chances of success are all against those who attempt to carry on business without adequate capital. Character, training and favourable surroundings form important factors in establishing a

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basis for credit, but are insufficient to enable one to cope with present competition, unless accompanied with adequate capital; and almost certain loss awaits those who credit largely on the strength of the one, without the other.

There are not wanting indications that a healthier and tolerably active business will be done in 1886, the cash returns from which are likely to be more promptly made than heretofore. There is general agreement that payments latterly have materially improved, purchases have been made with exceptional caution, and stocks and liabilities have been well kept in hand. There is, however, nothing in the prospects to warrant any license with these two important aids to stability and success.

LUMBER TRADE.

Those engaged in the lumber trade, in Ontario at least, have had a favourable year. There has been a large production, which has been almost wholly absorbed at remunerative prices, with every immediate prospect of a continuance of prosperity in this industry, upon which so many classes of our people are dependent.

PRODUCE TRADE.

The harvest of 1885, although not so large as in 1884, was yet more than an average one. Only a fraction of the wheat crop has yet been marketed, no doubt on account of the price in the British market which was lower in 1885 (32s. 10d. per quarter being the average) than has yet been known. The highest on record was in 1801, when 119s. 6d. was the average figure.

The export trade for wheat, peas, rye and oats, has been of the dullest, and most discouraging, with no immediate prospect of improvement. The redeeming feature in the handling of cereals, has centered in barley, which was a good crop, in active demand from both Eastern and Western States, and it was quickly turned over at fairly remunerative prices to dealers.

MILLING INTEREST.

Of the flour and milling interests little can be said that is pleasing or hopeful. To a state of the keenest competition among themselves consequent upon its being so largely engaged in, there has been added, the

competition of millers in Manitoba and the Western States, intensified by a tariff highly favorable to the latter and discriminating rates of freight hostile to the millers in Ontario and the East, while in Britain the adoption latterly to some extent of American machinery and modern processes of manufacture has made the millers there more formidable competitors than formerly. Could the tariff, which in relation to this industry has been described as being "as uneven as a shrew's temper, and on the whole as hard upon its victims, and as unaccountable in all its whims and changes," be so amended as to restore a measure of prosperity to this, the largest manufacturing industry in our midst, there would be cause for much rejoicing.

TEXTILE MANUFACTURES.

A decided improvement has taken place in the condition of the cotton manufactures during 1885. More working capital has been supplied, surplus stocks have been absorbed, the diversity of production has been enlarged by the introduction of new fabrics, there is a fair demand for what can be made, and if the margin of profit is still small, there has been removed for the present any immediate danger of serious disaster. In woollens any change has been in the direction of improvement, so far as the demand is concerned. In knitted goods the difficulties of over-production have not yet been entirely overcome.

TORONTO.

Of the trade of this city, in which we are more immediately interested, nothing has occurred during the year to interrupt the steady development and substantial progress which has characterized its industries generally for many years. The Custom House returns of imports show an increase over 1884 of nearly \$1,000,000, all the more remarkable in view of the decrease in value of commodities mentioned above, and the extent to which home manufactures are distributed by our merchants. About \$500,000 of this is in free goods, but the returns are not yet available to show the items constituting this increase. The receipts in the Inland Revenue department are the largest ever recorded at this point. This is accounted for, however, partly by the removal out of bond in May last of an enormous quantity of spirits, in anticipation of an increase in duty.

The failures in 1885 (84) in this city were nearly the same in 1883

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(89), and 12 less than in 1884 (72), the dry goods, and millinery, and liquor-dealing houses being the chief sufferers, but the total liabilities estimated, are only about one-half of those of the previous year (deducting the liabilities, \$2,500,000, of the lumber concerns which failed in 1884, for the purposes of comparison), so that the remarks made with reference to the Dominion as a whole apply with equal force to this city.

Speaking generally, our enterprises of all kinds are in a fairly healthy state, and ready to profit by any circumstances favourable to their expansion.

As a knowledge of defect is the first step towards a successful remedy, we find in the decline of the tobacco manufacturing industry a rather singular state of affairs. At one time, and especially during the American Rebellion, it was a large and important industry here, but latterly it has almost disappeared from our midst, and other centres are appropriating it. I am informed that something in the neighbourhood of one and a half million pounds of manufactured tobacco are annually distributed by our Toronto merchants, who are dependent on outside sources for their supplies, and while we can scarcely hope to be the centre of every manufacturing industry, it is in striking contrast to our other enterprises that this industry has been to a great extent lost to us, and so continues.

The rapidity with which houses are being erected and occupied in Toronto is not unattended with danger. That a sewer connection should be completed by a labourer with a broken flower-pot or a piece of rolled zinc, from which the sewer gas was allowed to percolate through the houses, resulting in loss of health and possibly loss of life to the inmates, and no responsibility rest upon the contractors and architects, is so repulsive to one's sense of what is right, and is suggestive of what should be crime, and what the law should provide, that I feel it incumbent upon me to refer to it, with all the importance which an utterance from this chair can bear.

THE WORK OF THE BOARD.

Turning now to the work of the Board, we find ourselves to-day in a commanding position, so far as the number of our members is concerned, the increase during the year having been from 260 to 822; a considerable number of these being representative gentlemen resident in various parts of the Province, which has given the Board much more than a local, it may

almost be said a provincial constituency and influence. You are witnesses of the improvement in our place of meeting, the cheerful and inviting aspect and the convenience of our surroundings, which have been secured at a comparatively trifling expenditure. The meetings have been numerous and largely attended. The subjects discussed and the work engaged in extend over a tolerably wide field, and it may truthfully be said, that the functions of the Board, if not for the first time, at least in a much larger degree than heretofore, have been appreciated, and put into exercise, to the manifest advantage of the members and the important interests which they represent.

INSOLVENCY LEGISLATION.

Although there are still serious obstacles in the way, some advance has been made in securing insolvency legislation. The Bill reported last session by the special committee of the House of Commons presided over by the Hon. J. J. C. Abbott, embodies so much that was recommended by the joint committees of the Boards of Trade, and gives promise of being a satisfactory measure in so many important respects, renewed efforts should be made by all the commercial organizations to urge the passing of the measure at the ensuing session of the House, so that for the preservation of our good name abroad, and the encouragement of inter-provincial trade, there may be a uniform measure governing the collection of debts, and controlling insolvent debtors and their estates, throughout the various Provinces of the Dominion.

ACT RESPECTING ASSIGNMENTS FOR THE BENEFIT OF CREDITORS.

The difficulty of securing needed commercial legislation, seems to have been more easily overcome in the Provincial Legislatures, than in the Federal Parliament, for in both the Provinces of Quebec and Ontario, successful efforts were made in their last sessions, to enact measures that would to some extent cure the evils consequent upon the then state of the law. In Ontario, the Hon. Attorney-General Mowat most cheerfully gave effect to the suggestions made on your behalf, and we have to credit his Act respecting assignments for the benefit of creditors of last session, for the almost total abolition of undue preferences through chattel mortgages, and otherwise, which induced so many frauds and created exasperation, and ill-feeling between creditors, without in the long run any commensurate advantage.

This is now acknowledged by all a step decidedly in the right direction, and it, as well as the legislation in Quebec, may be pointed to in proof of the accuracy of the contention of this Board, that a measure dealing simply with the equitable distribution of an Insolvent Debtors estate, even without provisions for discharge, is better than none, and is not the unjust or harsh measure represented.

The limited scope of the Local Legislatures to deal with the subject renders it exceedingly difficult to enact a comprehensive measure, and, it is therefore, the more incumbent upon the Federal parliament to exercise its functions to this end. An early opportunity should be taken by your Insolvency committee, to solicit from the Attorney-General, some needed amendments to the local Act, tending to give creditors greater latitude in the selection, and more complete control of their assignees, power to examine the debtor, and others in regard to his affairs, the proving and contestation of claims, etc., and I would say on behalf of the committee that suggestions from any quarter on this subject, addressed to the Secretary, will be carefully considered by them.

ARBITRATION.

It is gratifying to notice an increasing disposition to refer to arbitration, disputes and differences between members which are thus promptly, inexpensively, and generally satisfactorily adjusted. The creditable part taken by two prominent members of the Council, Wm. Ince, Esq., and R. W. Elliot, Esq., last summer, in adjusting the dispute between the labourers and their employers, should be an encouragement to similar organizations, to strive after a friendly reference of any disputes to such a tribunal, before resorting to violent measures, which entail such serious loss on all concerned.

POST OFFICE.

The Postmaster of the City is to be congratulated on the successful and satisfactory establishment of the delivery, by carriers of Postal matter in the city. A months trial of it by any business man, wedded to the effete box system, will effectually convince him of the superiority of the official delivery. A city ordinance or other law should now be passed, requiring every householder to provide a sufficient letter-box on the outer door or gate of his house, most easily accessible from the street, so as to avoid

detention of the carriers at the citizens doors. There is room for improvement in the clumsy manner in which collections are made from the street pillars and letter-boxes.

CUSTOM HOUSE.

The recent addition of a new wing to the Custom House, forming a warehouse for storage, of spacious dimensions, fire-proof and comparatively isolated, will meet a want much felt by merchants. Increased facilities for landing goods also are in progress, in the shape of a new engine and hoist; the contract for the new engine-house having been awarded by the Dominion Government during the past week.

The Tabulated Schedule of duties on Imports, similar to that in use in the United States for the use of Importers, so long promised by the Dominion appraiser, is still in a state of incubation in the Custom Department at Ottawa.

RATE OF INTEREST.

It is only re-echoing a remark formerly made from this chair, and also the opinion of all the authorities entitled to be heard on the subject, that the borrowers of money in Canada, and in these are included almost every class of citizens, corporations and municipalities are prevented from reaping the full benefit of the reduced value of money, by the abnormally high rate of interest paid by the Government on the deposits in the P.O. and Savings Banks; and this, apart from the question whether the use of this money by the Government, or by other deposit receiving institutions, would be most beneficial to the country generally. In a former address, I pointed out the gradual withdrawal of these deposits taking place from the Chartered Banks to the Government P.O. & Savings Banks, and from the latest published Government returns, it appears a drain is now in progress from the coffers of the Loan Companies. The deposits in the Toronto Companies in 1883 were \$5,062,348.78; in 1884, \$4,708,285.28. The cause of this is worthy of enquiry.

THE COURT-HOUSE.

The importance of this subject to the citizens warrants a repetition of the pronounced opinion of the Board, viz.—that antecedent to engaging

in its erection, there should be submitted for the endorsement of the citizens, carefully considered estimates, and, if possible, actual *bona fide* tenders, so that as nearly as may be, the final cost may be ascertained. This position so taken by the Board a year ago, was not without effect. Our prediction as to the probable cost of the site acquired by the city has been fulfilled, something like \$205,000 having been invested in it, out of the proceeds of the \$300,000 of debentures which were authorised, and have been issued by the Act 47 vict., chap. 59. It is fortunate perhaps this is about all that so far has been done.

A Court-House and City Hall will require to be built, and that soon. It is expedient provision should be made for both at the same time. A building in keeping with the other public buildings of the city, creditable to the present generation, and likely to be adequate to the wants of the city 50 years hence, assuming that full value is obtained for all the money spent, should not cost less than \$600,000 to \$750,000, and until the citizens feel such an expenditure would be warranted, operations should be deferred. Above all things the citizens should not be committed to an indefinite expenditure on an ill-considered project. Such an erection as is shown in the plan displayed in one of our shop windows, the dimensions of which are now, it appears, to be cut down, would scarcely do credit to one of the least progressive of our country towns.

THE IMPROVIDENT CLASSES.

As the population of our city becomes more dense there is an increase in the idle, the vicious, the depraved, and the improvident classes, who can scarcely be prevented from flocking from all quarters to our midst. To deal with them in an enlightened, Christian spirit is a duty prompted by considerations alike of humanity and self-preservation. The many noble charities in active exercise in the city are highly creditable to us, but there is still need of effort in this direction, in which our men of business might very properly take a distinctive part. Who among our 800 members, having a heart for this work, will form themselves into a committee, and recommend a scheme, if possible, in connection with some established institution, with which we may be closely identified, for the consideration and support of the Board ?

GRATUITY SCHEME.

Notice has been given of application to Parliament for the necessary authority to give effect to the gratuity scheme adopted during the year. As a measure designed to render valuable our mutual association, it is a most hopeful and interesting project.

EXPRESS MATTER.

There is pressing necessity for improvement in our transport of merchandise by express companies, in the direction of cheaper rates, and more frequent deliveries, There should be provision for sending parcels by every passenger train reaching and leaving the city, so that greater despatch may be secured.

It is only just to add that what work is now performed by the express companies, is done with safety and despatch highly creditable to them.

COLONIAL EXHIBITION.

There is every prospect of Ontario, and Toronto especially, being creditably represented in London at the Colonial Exhibition. This Board has assumed at the instance of the Dominion and Provincial Governments, the preparation and classification of the Ontario exhibit of cereals and the constitution of the Committee engaged in the work, is sufficient guarantee that the exhibit will be representative of the fertility of our soil, and its successful cultivation, and do this Board no discredit.

THE PRESS.

The full and generally accurate reports of our proceedings that have found publicity in the city papers throughout the year, deserve recognition at our hands, in fact the important part that the press of the city is performing in the advancement of all our interests, commercial and otherwise, and the enterprise displayed in their own peculiar sphere, is quite in keeping with, if not in advance of, any of the multifarious forces at work, in the upbuilding of this great commercial centre.

Our death roll for the year includes the names of F. A. Howland, of Lambton, and P. D. Conger, of this city, both prominent and esteemed members; and although not a member with us at the time of his death, it is due to his position and character as a Toronto merchant, and the

large part he took during a long life time in the upbuilding of the city, that the name of the late Robert Walker should be mentioned here, with every respect and esteem.

In conclusion, I feel confident I express the hope of every thoughtful member of this Board that our association together may be more than ever promotive of mutual acquaintance and good fellowship, an incentive to every laudable effort to improve the material well-being of each, and the proper performance of the duties attendant upon our common citizenship; that it may issue in making tributary to our united efforts, the fullest possible benefits that can be derived from these great railway and other corporations, the attendants and ministers of our commerce, to the construction of which we have contributed, and that it may be helpful to that scrupulously honourable conduct of our individual affairs, without which no success can be creditable or permanent.

In submitting the Annual Statement of the financial affairs of the Board, your Treasurer would, first, congratulate the members on its increased prosperity; and, secondly, thank them for so heartily acting on the suggestion he made in the report he presented twelve months ago, as to doubling the membership during the year just closed.

On the 31st of December, 1884, our membership stood at 260; on the 31st December, 1885, it had reached 669, an increase of 409 within the period named. Since then it has been further increased by 157, making the total membership at the present, 822. This is a gratifying state of things, and I trust the influence that such a body of intelligent men is capable of exerting will greatly tell on the commercial prosperity of the City of Toronto and the Province of Ontario generally.

Our finances have shown a considerable improvement. We began the year in debt; but I am pleased to say we have closed it without owing a single dollar, and more, have a considerable balance in hand.
