**AN ACT,**  
TO INCORPORATE  
**The Alumni of King's College,**  
WINDSOR.

*Passed the 30th day of March, 1847.*

WHEREAS, a number of persons have associated themselves under the name of The Alumni of King's College, Windsor, for the promotion of Education, and have raised by private contribution, sums of money which they are desirous to expend in aid of the Funds of the said College, and the Collegiate School at Windsor, connected therewith, in or towards the maintenance and support of the Teachers therein, or in such other way as may best conduce to the end which they have in view, and they are desirous of obtaining assistance from the Legislature, by the passing of an Act of Incorporation for enabling them to hold property, and manage their affairs with greater ease and convenience. Preamble.

I. Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Assembly, That John T. Twining, James B. Uniacke, Henry Pryor, Hugh Hartshorne, and all and every such other person and persons as now are members of, or in the said Society, and their successors, shall be, and are hereby appointed a Body, Politic and Corporate, in deed and in name, by the name of "The Alumni of King's College, Windsor," and by that name have succession and a common Seal, and by that name shall sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded at law and in equity, and in all Courts and places, and be able, and capable in Law to have, hold, purchase, get, receive, take, possess, and enjoy, Lands, Tenements, Hereditaments, and Rents, in fee simple or otherwise, and also Goods and Chattels, and all other things real, personal, and mixed, and also to give, grant, sell, let, assign, or The Alumni of King's College Windsor, incorporated,

convey the same or any part thereof, and to do and execute all other things in and about the same as shall or may be thought necessary or proper ; and also shall have, from time to time and at all time full power, authority, and license to constitute, make and establish such Bye-Laws, Rules, and Ordinances, as may be thought necessary for the rule and good management of said Society, the establishing of the Officers proper for the management of its affairs, and declaring the extent, duration, and authority of the Offices and Officers of the Society, and their mode of appointment, and generally for promoting the objects of the Society: Provided such Bye-Laws, Rules and Ordinances, be not contrary or repugnant to the Laws and Statutes of this Province, or those in force within the same, or to the Laws and Statutes of King's College, Windsor, respectively, at the time such Bye-Laws, Rules, and Ordinances, may be constituted and established, or to the provisions of this Act: And provided also that the said Society shall not hold at any time, Lands, Tenements, Hereditaments, Goods, Chattels, Property, or Effects, of greater value than Ten Thousand Pounds.

Proviso.

Annual Subscription to be paid by Members.

II. And be it enacted, That all persons paying an Annual Subscription of Twenty Shillings or upwards, or making at one time a Donation of Twenty Pounds or upwards, shall be entitled to be members of the said Society, having been duly admitted pursuant to the Bye-Laws thereof: Provided that such Annual Subscription or Donation be actually paid into the Funds of the Society, and provided that no person now a member of the said Society, or who hereafter may become a member of the same, shall at any time hereafter continue a member of the same, unless he shall have heretofore paid, or shall hereafter pay at one time into the Funds of the said Society, a Donation of at least Twenty Pounds, or shall hereafter annually, and from year to year, pay into the said Funds the sum of Twenty Shillings or upwards, and if such Annual Subscription, or payment of any such Annual Member, shall not be paid on the first day of May in each year, such Member shall there-

III. And be it enacted, That the said Society shall be governed, and its affairs managed by a Committee of Nine, comprising a President, Vice President, and seven other Members, a Secretary and Treasurer; the said Committee to be henceforth called the Executive Committee, and such other Officers as the said Society from time to time may think proper.

IV. And provided, and be it enacted, That John T. Twining, D. D. now the President of the said Society, shall after the passing of this Act, be the President of the said Society; that the Honorable Henry Hezekiah Cogswell, now the Vice President of the said Society, be the Vice President of the said Society after the passing of this Act; that Samuel L. Shannon, Esquire, now the Secretary and Treasurer of the said Society, be the Secretary and Treasurer thereof after the passing of this Act; and Samuel P. Fairbanks, Henry Pryor, James B. Uniacke, William J. Almon, Robert Fitzgerald Uniacke, Mather B. Almon, and Charles Twining, now the managing Committee of the said Society, shall after the passing of this Act, be the Executive Committee of the said Incorporated Society, until an Executive Committee be elected under this Act.

V. And be it enacted, That all persons without regard to religious denomination or difference of religious sentiments, may be, and at any time hereafter become members of the said Incorporated Society, being in all other respects entitled to be and become members of the said Society, and now and at any time hereafter may hold any of the said appointments, or any other offices and appointments in the said Incorporated Society, being duly elected and appointed thereto, pursuant to the Bye-Laws thereof, anything contained herein, or in any Rules, Regulations, or Bye-Laws of the said Society, to the contrary notwithstanding.

VI. And be it enacted, That the said Society Incorporated as aforesaid, shall have power from time to time hereafter, to appoint the President, Vice President, and Executive Committee at some General Meeting of the said Society, by a majority of the members of the Society present, the whole number present being not less than Twenty Members; according to such regulations concerning such appointments as may hereafter be made by any Bye-Laws of the said Society to be made by virtue hereof.

VII. And be it enacted, That the Secretary and Treasurer of the said Society, and such other Officers as may hereafter be required for the management of its affairs, shall be appointed in such manner as shall be declared by the Bye-Laws and Rules of the said Society, to be passed by virtue hereof.

VIII. And be it enacted, That all Donations to the said Incorporated Society, to constitute Life Members or otherwise, of not less than Twenty Pounds, shall be invested under the direction of the Executive Committee, as a permanent Fund for the benefit of the said Society, and that the Funds of the said Incorporated Society shall from time to time be laid out and applied by the Executive Committee, in such way and for such purpose only as any General Meeting of the said Society may direct or appoint, and that the Executive Committee shall be bound, and are hereby required annually to account to the Society for all their acts, receipts, expenditures, and doings whatsoever in the said office, and to make a report annually to the said Society at its General Meeting, of the progress and state of the said Society, and of its affairs generally.

IX. And be it enacted, That a General Meeting of the said Society shall be held once, that is to say, sometime within the last ten days of the month of June in each year, and as much oftener as may be directed by any Rule or Bye-Law of said Society.

X. And be it enacted, That the Executive Committee of the said Society shall meet and assemble as often as there may be occasion, and any three members shall form a quorum.

## B Y E - L A W S

OF THE

**Alumni of King's College,**  
WINDSOR.

*Passed at a General Meeting held at the Halifax Hotel,  
27th June, 1848.*

I.—Besides the Annual General Meeting of the Incorporated Society, it shall be competent for the Committee at any time, either of their own accord, or upon a requisition signed by at least ten of the members of the Association, upon giving seven days notice in the public papers, to call a Special General Meeting of the Association, specifying the purposes for which it is called, and in which Meeting it shall be competent for the Association to transact any such business as may be required. Ten members shall be deemed a quorum for the transaction of business.

II.—That the Books, Accounts, and Papers of the Association, shall be open at all times to the inspection of all the Members, and the Secretary shall furnish an account of the affairs of the Association, whenever required by the Committee.

III.—That the Treasurer and Secretary, and such Officers as shall be requisite for the incorporated Society, shall be annually appointed by the Executive Committee.

IV.—That at the Annual Meeting of the Association, the President and Vice President shall alternately go out of office, accompanied by the first three of the Committee, and that all or any of them on having a majority of votes, shall be eligible to be re-elected.

V.—That at any meeting, members not present may vote by proxy in writing to be held by any other member; provided that no member shall be entitled to vote either personally or by proxy, whose dues are not all paid up for the preceding year.

VI.—That the Funds of the Association will be appropriated for the payment of one or more Professors or Lecturers, and one



or more Scholarships at the University of King's College, or one or more Teachers or Exhibitions in the Collegiate School at Windsor, to be denominated the Alumni Professorships and Scholarships respectively.

VII.—That the Association will scrupulously apply such Donations as may be made to them, to such specific objects in aid of King's College, as may be directed by the Donors respectively.

VIII.—That all Meetings of the Incorporated Society shall be opened with prayer.

IX.—(*Passed at General Meeting of June 21st, 1849.*) That the elections for members of the Incorporation shall be by ballot.

AT the General Meeting of the Society held at Windsor, in June, 1852, the usual Grant of £50 stg. towards the salary of Professor of Modern Languages was passed.

As the Foundation Scholarships have been discontinued, owing to a want of funds, the Alumni granted a sum of £20, for prizes, which has been distributed in the following manner, viz :

At the request of the Alumni the Governors have abolished all the oaths heretofore taken by undergraduates on matriculation, except the oath of Allegiance ;—a promise of obedience to the Statutes being required in lieu of them.

The income of the Society from interest on investments (exclusive of the Wm. Cogswell Scholarship fund and the Academy Prize endowment), and from annual subscriptions, is about £200 per annum.

The Committee meet at the Secretary's office on the first Wednesday of every month, at 3 o'clock, P. M., and all members of the Society who may visit Halifax at any of those periods are invited to attend.

Donations, either of land or money, will be thankfully received by the Committee. In order to facilitate the benevolent intentions of any parties, who may feel disposed to assist the Society in their efforts to sustain the College, a form of bequest is given below : " I give, devise, and bequeath to the Incorporated Society called and known as 'The Alumni of King's College, Windsor,' and to their successors and assigns, the sum of — (or my lot of land containing — acres at A. with the appurtenances) for the uses and objects of the said Society ; the receipt of the Treasurer for the time being of such Society, to be a sufficient discharge to my executors."

As many persons are not aware of the moderate amount of the necessary expenses of an Undergraduate at King's College, a table of fees is subjoined.

The Terms appointed for Matriculation are the last week in June and the first week in September. There should be a full three years attendance at Lectures. These are designed to embrace the successive study of the most approved Classics, the several branches of Mathematics and Natural Philosophy and Logic, the Evidences of Religion, Divinity and Hebrew. For such Students as reside after passing the examination for degree, separate classes are formed in the subjects required of candidates for Ordination, and proficiency is tested by an examination similar to the "Voluntary," at the English Universities.

☞ It is perhaps not generally known, that a Subscriber of £100 has the privilege of nominating a Student, who shall pass through College without payment of fees.

☞ The money collected for the Jubilee fund in Nova Scotia, (about £130,) has been set apart as the commencement of a fund for endowing a Professorship of Pastoral Theology, at Windsor.

## REPORT.

THE Executive Committee have again the pleasure of meeting the Alumni of King's College on the recurrence of the Annual General Meeting.

The year that has passed has been an important era to the College. After several years unsuccessful efforts by the Provincial Legislature to deprive the College of its present Grant, frustrated in part by the efforts of your Committee, the Colonial Secretary had at length been induced to signify, that Her Majesty's assent would be given to an Act for repealing it, coupled with certain conditions. Such an Act was again introduced into the House of Assembly: in this emergency, your Committee received an intimation that if opposition to the Bill was not offered by the friends of the College, no objections would be raised by any party in the Legislature to such alterations in the Government of the College as its friends should propose. A conference on the subject between the Governors of the College and your Committee was at once held; with one exception, the Governors and your Committee were unanimous in the opinion that so favourable an opportunity for securing the control of the institution in the hands of its friends, and at the same time securing the title to the lands might never again occur, and that it was therefore most desirable to seize the opportunity and secure such important advantages; there being little doubt that an Act to repeal the Grant would pass the Legislature and receive the Royal assent, however strongly opposed; while the effect of such fruitless opposition would only be to exasperate its enemies, and destroy all hope of obtaining those advantages at any future period.

A Bill was therefore introduced by Mr. Wilkins, which embodied the views of the conference, which passed the Legislature, and now only waits the Royal assent to be acted on. A copy of the Act will be submitted to the meeting. That a change of vast importance in the constitution of the College has been thereby effected your Committee do not hesitate to avow, but that a change which transfers the management of the College from its possible, and sometimes open and avowed enemies, to those who are its natural friends and guardians, is one to be dreaded, your Committee cannot allow.

The recognition of the grant of the lands by the Act, and securing a statutable title to them, will appear to those who are familiar with the history of lands granted for public purposes in the Colonies, to be no light advantage.

During the past year the Committee requested the Reverend J. C. Cochran, to proceed on a tour to New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, for the purpose of enlarging the numbers of the Association, and creating a greater interest in the College. A number of new subscribers, nearly 30, were thus enrolled, and some of the outstanding subscriptions collected; the whole period occupied in procuring so large an addition to the members of the Society was little more than a fortnight.

Although quite aware of the important results which might be expected from a mission to England, your Committee had been hitherto deterred from sending an agent by the expense which they were fearful of incurring on an uncertainty. During the last spring, however, your Committee received a letter from the Bishop of the Diocese recommending the appointment of the Reverend G. W. Hill to accompany him on an intended visit to England; and Mr. Hill having offered to bear all the expense of the mission in case of his failure, your Committee availed themselves of his offer, and that gentleman has now accompanied the Bishop to England in prosecution of the task; sufficient time however has not yet elapsed to receive intimation of the degree of success to be expected.

As the College has been thrown so much on its own resources for support, the President of the Association prepared and submitted to your Committee a proposal for raising a sum sufficient for such purpose by subscriptions, with several privileges attached to those of a certain amount. This plan was referred to a Sub-Committee, who have made their report (which will be laid before the meeting) and suggested the details for carrying it out. This plan your Committee would commend to the earnest attention of the Association as of the greatest importance to the future welfare of the College.

The business to be now transacted is the election of a President in place of the Honble. H. H. Cogswell, whose period of office has expired, and three members of the Committee in lieu of S. L. Shannon, Esq., Rev. J. T. Jones, and Major Myers.

## R E P O R T

OF SUB COMMITTEE OF ALUMNI,

*On the Honble. H. H. COGSWELL'S Scheme for raising Funds  
for the benefit of King's College.*

~~~~~

Your Committee, having been deputed to take into consideration the suggestion of the Hon. H. H. Cogswell, relating to the raising of funds for the support of King's College, beg to lay before you the following remarks, based upon that scheme.

The plan of calling upon each County for a contribution of one hundred pounds, or for several sums of like amount, with the privilege attached to each separate contribution, of sending one scholar to College, who should be entitled to receive £30 per annum from the funds of the Alumni for three years, has suggested the idea of entering more largely into some plan for creating a permanent endowment. We have thought that under the present circumstances of the Institution, a very favorable opportunity offers, for making a vigorous and determined effort to place the University upon a sure foundation; and moreover, that if we found a willingness in the Churchmen of the Province, sufficient to induce them to give in any one County a sum of one hundred pounds, it is probable they would be willing to go much farther; and that the same spirit and principle which would lead them to give that sum, would induce them to give much more. It has struck your Committee, that even if each county were to fall in with the proposition submitted to us, the Alumni in the end would only have been the gainers of £150.

Taking, however, the very useful hint which has been kindly thrown out by the President, to be made use of for the great object we have in view, your Committee offer three suggestions:

1. That a definite sum of £10,000 be proposed to the Churchmen of Nova Scotia, as the amount of capital necessary for the support of the establishment in an efficient state.

2. That every individual or company of persons, or county, or township, or parish, or corporate county, contributing the sum of £100, shall be entitled forever, to send one scholar to King's

College, free of the yearly fees, or free from the payment of a sum equal to the fees, with a continuance of that privilege to the heirs, assigns, successors, or representatives of each respectively.

3. That an Agent, well instructed in all the details connected with the College, be employed to visit every township, and every settlement in the Province, calling together all Churchmen within reach, and placing before them the present state of the Institution, and informing them as to what we propose doing.

We feel confident, that if we could obtain the command of a yearly income of £600, we could place the College in such a position as would command the respect and elicit the patronage of all connected with the Church of England, and of a great many not members of her communion. We should then be able to appoint two Professors, who are now greatly needed: one a Professor of Pastoral Theology, who would instruct not only theoretically but practically, the future Ministers of the Church,—the other a Professor of the Sciences, as adapted to the arts, one who could impart useful practical knowledge, upon subjects which are every day becoming more important to be known, in a country just developing itself, and in an age when science is rapidly extending her power.

We are aware of some difficulties which would arise upon the carrying out of this scheme. It might for instance so occur that all the contemplated sum of £10,000 would be raised by contributions of £100 each; and if such contributor, whether an individual or an association, should send a scholar, our receipts would be absorbed, or even more than absorbed. That is, if the Professors would not give up their fees, and we were called upon to pay them for the student so sent. To obviate this difficulty, we propose that the case be first laid before the Professors, and they be requested through the Governors to *forego all their fees*; if they refuse then to offer a compromise, viz: That in no year they should receive fees from more than fifteen students, the average number now in attendance. If all these students were the nominees of contributors, it would cost us £84 per annum, leaving us over £500 per annum to pay our Professors with, and it might so occur that there would be seven or eight students at college paying fees as none. In this case we would only be called upon for £42; the new Professors of course would receive no fees.

Your Committee think that the Governors might be conferred

with upon the subject of the fees, and they would recommend that some action should be immediately taken in the matter.

In conclusion, your Committee in handing in this Report to the Associated Alumni, beg to state that they have obtained a large amount of information from the friends of Acadia College, relative to their mode of raising £12,000, (a proposal made by them only during the last summer,) and since successfully carried out. By this they are encouraged to believe that not only the scheme of the Hon. H. H. Cogswell would be practicable, but that it might be much enlarged and brought to a happy issue.

AN ACT,

TO INCORPORATE

**The Governors of King's College,
WINDSOR,***And to Repeal the Act for Founding, Establishing, and
Maintaining a College in this Province.*

(Passed the 4th day of April, A.D. 1853.)

BE it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, as follows :

1. The Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of his late Majesty King George the Third, entitled, An Act for founding, establishing, and maintaining a College in this Province, is hereby repealed.

2. The Lord Bishop of Nova-Scotia, the Honorable Brenton Halliburton, Reverend George McCawley, D. D., the Honorable James B. Uniacke, and Lewis Morris Wilkins, Esquire, together with eight persons, being members of the Church of England, to be elected at a general or special meeting of the " Alumni of King's College, Windsor," shall be Governors of the College hereby incorporated.

3. The Lord Bishop of Nova-Scotia, for the time being, shall be always ex-officio a Governor, President of the Board and Visitor ; the said Brenton Halliburton, George McCawley, James B. Uniacke, and Lewis Morris Wilkins, shall be Governors, for the term of their respective lives ; and of the eight persons so to be elected by the Alumni of King's College, Windsor, two shall, in each and every year, successively, in the order of their election, go out of office, but such two Governors may be re-elected.

4. All vacancies hereafter occurring, whether by death, resignation, removal from office, or otherwise, amongst the Governors, from time to time, shall be filled up by the Alumni of King's College, Windsor, in manner hereinbefore appointed, but the Governors shall always be elected from among members of the Church of England, and every person hereafter elec-

ted on any such vacancy, shall, as to his tenure of office, be subject to the regulation hereinbefore prescribed touching the eight persons to be elected by the Alumni of King's College, Windsor.

5. For the better management of the College, and for more completely executing the purposes of this Act, the Governors appointed, and to be appointed from time to time by virtue hereof, shall be a body politic and corporate in deed and in name, and have a common seal and succession for ever, by the name of Governors of King's College, Windsor, and by that name shall make bye-laws and ordinances for the regulation and management of the College, and shall also have, hold and enjoy, for the use and benefit of the College, and the purpose of this Act, all the goods and chattels, and all the lands which are now had, held, occupied, or enjoyed by "the Governors of King's College, of Nova-Scotia," or by "the Governors, President, and Fellows of King's College, at Windsor, in the Province of Nova-Scotia," or by any person in trust for them, or in their behalf, in the same manner as if the same had been duly conveyed and transferred to the Governors hereby incorporated, by virtue of a Statute of this Province, authorizing the conveyance and transfer thereof, and also shall have power to purchase, receive, take, hold, and enjoy, for the use and benefit of the said College, and the purposes of this Act, any other goods, chattels or lands, so as the said last mentioned lands shall not exceed in value ten thousand pounds, and also at all times hereafter shall have power to sell, lease, mortgage, or otherwise dispose of the lands belonging to the College, or any part thereof, for the benefit of the said College, as to the Governors, hereby incorporated shall seem proper, any law to the contrary notwithstanding.

6. The Governors hereby incorporated, at any general meeting assembled, shall, from time to time, and as they shall think fit, make and establish such statutes and ordinances for the instruction, care, and government of the students, the management of the property of the College, the appointment of the president, professors, fellows, and scholars, (the president always to be a member of the Church of England); and also touching any matter or thing respecting the College, which to them shall seem meet.

7. The College, hereby incorporated, shall be taken to be an University, with all usual privileges of such an institution,
