A Night on the Bosphorus

After a pleasant tour in Asia Minor, I found myself, one summer's day, in Constantinople, my cash and leave of absence almost run out.

What was to be done? Not only was my passage money at stake—and I had no means to pay another—but if I lost this steamer I shouldn't reach Malta till long after my leave had expired.

There are few pleasanter things in the world than to be at ease reclining on the cushions of a caique, with the amber mouth-piece of a chibouque, piled with fragrant Persian tobacco, at the lips, and darting over the blue pellicled waters, idly to watch the scene around.

It is the madness to try to cross in a crazy little nut-shell like that, argued my friend "wait till the storm is over. You'll be drowned, to a dead certainty. You're determined to go? Well, I suppose you know best. There are a certain class of people who are exempt from fear of drowning. Good-bye, old fellow, if you will go."

I had such good and weighty reasons to urge me on, that I didn't hesitate for a moment to take the offer of old Selim the Turk to ferry me over the dark and stormy water. He was placid and composed, and seemingly all unconscious of danger; and although I felt in a horrible stew myself, I took care not to show it as I stepped gingerly over the rocking boards and stowed myself carefully at the bottom of the old caique.

A strong current from the Black sea, as everybody knows, runs down the Bosphorus, so that, in crossing from Scutari to Pera, the boatmen take a considerable stretch to the north in the slack of the current along the shore, to make without difficulty the opposite side. As long as the boat was taking this upward course we were in some measure protected from the sea, which was now rising rapidly, by a projecting spit of land; but when old Selim shaped his course to shoot across the strait, we met the full force of the wind, which had strengthened to a regular gale.

With the hope of safety, my heart revived. The boat I might manage to crawl into without assistance. It was no easy matter to do. By resisting a little, and trying again when an approach wave gave me an impulse, I managed, although at the imminent risk of swamping the boat, to crawl into it. Instantly I heard a shrill scream, which seemed to be a woman's, and voices calling, then somebody rushed on deck with a light. Now was the time to shout again; I hailed my loudest, presently a man's head appeared over the taffrail. There was light enough to see by now, for the mist had cleared, and the night was nowise dark; but the lantern the man carried and slung over the side dazzled both his eyes and mine, so that we could hardly make each other out. It reminded me of the old woman who lit her candle to see if the sun was rising. Still he saw that there was somebody in the boat, and he called out to me to some foreign tongue which was Greek to me, as I subsequently found out.

"For the love of heaven," I cried, "hast me up into your ship." He knew a little English, it seemed for he rejoined in the same language garbling his speech with some of our most characteristic oaths, "Go long with you; get out of that, you rascal."

People would soon be astonished at results if they would all work together for the common good. The Household. Cabbage. Knowledge is power, and saves us from infinite mortification. It is amusing to see people hold up hands and eyes at the mere mention of cabbage, and exclaim at the odor it spreads through the house. Properly cooked it ranks nearest to cauliflower in delicacy of flavor and tenderness. As to its healthful qualities let the lovers of it speak. Among the Romans it was highly esteemed as an article of food, being given the credit of firming muscle.—Among the hardy Irish peasantry it is one of the necessities; each cabin has its little cabbage-plot. Think of our Teutonic brethren, their size and vigor, and remember their attachment to Kraut in every form. With some, it loses its merits unless boiled with corned beef, bacon, or salt pork, but cooked as follows it is an agreeable dish with roast meat, particularly lamb. Cut the head in quarters, wash it thoroughly, let it lie in cold water for an hour before cooking. Have the water boiling, put in with the cabbage half a tea-spoon of salt, and a half that quantity of cooking-soda. Let it boil fast, and in half an hour it will be ready to strain, and serve, as it is. The light green color will be preserved, the cabbage will have its delicate flavor, and the odor will be imperceptible beyond the kitchen, and thus not disagreeable.—Baten thus with cold butter or butter with the gravy of the meat, it is not only delicious, but nutritious and agreeable.

Supreme Court.

The October term of the Supreme Court for this county opened on Tuesday, Judge Wilkes presiding. There were present 18 Grand Jurors, but an unusually small number of Petit Jurors.

The only attorney present from outside the county was H. Oldright, Esq. His Honor congratulated the jury upon their being an criminal calendar, and was presented with the emblematical white gloves. The jury afterwards, however, found bills of indictment against James Miller for assaulting a constable in the discharge of his duty, and Nixon Thompson and Wm. Fizzle for taking a net from a fishery warden who was in the discharge of his duty.

There were 43 Summary and Appeal, and 48 Declaration Causes, of which the following were tried. (Of the attorney's names given, the first is for plaintiff, the second for defendant.)

REMARKABLE APPEAL. John Cochran vs. Collingswood Paper. Prosecution for tortious a horse over a bridge. Defence denied. Conviction below confirmed. Townsend and W. A. D. Morse.

The Ottawa Times says Government will vote for a committee to examine evidence taken before the Royal Commission and to take such further evidence from Mr. Huntington or others as may be available.

Adams and Charles Black of London are about to publish the ninth edition of the Encyclopaedia Britannica the most extensive and valuable work of the kind published in modern times. It will require an outlay of a million of dollars.

The Peterburg, Va., Index and Signal has a paragraph announcing the arrival in that city of Mr. Dawson Hayward, secreting of this office, who was there spending a vacation amid the scenes of his early boyhood.

The Cumberland Co. Rifle Association acknowledges the receipt of \$1 from E. Vickery, Esq., M. P. P. Lt. Col. H. G. Pines has also contributed, in addition to his former donations, a handsome French clock.

At the Supreme Court at Annapolis, last week, the Grand Jury, Magistrates, and Bar presented Judge McCully with a highly complimentary address. The learned Judge made an appropriate reply.

A few days ago, Mr. Ernest A. Sharp, of Macoon, shot a large bald eagle which measured 7 feet across the wings. He intends to have it stuffed and presented to the Museum at Halifax.

The bark Snowdon, 316 tons, built at Londonderry, N. S., in 1863, and been sold in London for about £2100, to go under a foreign flag.

The Star has removed from Kentville to Berwick, and a new paper called the Western Chronicle is to be issued at the latter place in about a month, by M. J. A. Cogswell.

The Colonial Farmer, Fredericton is considerably enlarged, and the agricultural department, edited by Mr. Keator, who is said to be highly competent for the work.

It will be seen by adv't that Messrs. Chapman & Eater are opening a custom tailoring department, and have secured head workmen of superior ability.

We are glad to state that the Rev. G. Townsend, who has been suffering from a painful surgical operation in the removal of a tumor from the neck, is again able to be out.

The Cheese Factory started at Mabou, last June, is doing a good business. The establishment turns out about 350 pounds of cheese per week.

Mr. W. F. George, of Sackville, N. B., lately sold a short-horn calf to Mr. Slipp of Jemseg for \$80.

Joseph L. Black, Esq., has during the season shipped eight large cargoes of deals to G. Britain.

The Amherst Warehouse Co., succeeding the firm of B. Douglas & Co., has removed into its new store, although the building is not yet quite finished. The main store room is very spacious, being 50x38 ft. Although making what almost seems a new start in business, the company will probably soon command that extensive trade enjoyed by its predecessors when the fire occurred.

We hope our Spring Hill friends will persist in endeavoring to prevent the sale of intoxicating liquors among them, but advise them by all means to take the legal course. We have an agent, Clerk of License who is ever ready to do his duty, and to him let applicants be made to suppress the sale. The temperance party is the one for law and order.

Mr. Weathered Bent, Leicester, has trapped three bears, within the past three weeks. He seems to have no forbearance with the Bruin family, and the fact that during his life he has wrought destruction to twenty-six of these animals, entitles him, we think, to the championship of the province.

The annual inspection of the Cumberland Battalion will take place on Wednesday afternoon next near Drill Shed, Amherst. The four Companies will assemble at 2 1/2 o'clock, and Col. Lauris and Sawyer will arrive on the ground at about 3 1/2 o'clock.

Digby is to have a new hotel near the landing, of capacity sufficient to accommodate about 200 persons. The estimated cost of the building is \$16,000. It is expected that the building will be completed and ready to enter by the 1st of July.

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CUMBERLAND CROPS FOR 1873.

No. 4 Polling District. (Comprising East and West Branch, Windham Hill, Gray's Road, Mount Pleasant, and River Philip Proper.)

REPORTED BY E. L. BAKER, ESQ., RIVER PHILIP.

HAY AND GRAIN.

The Hay crop is exceedingly good—much above the average—and stored in fine order.

There is very little Wheat sown, as our farmers believe they can buy it cheaper than they can raise it, but what has been sown has been a very good crop.

Barley is not much sown but what has been sown has been a very good crop. There has been a much larger breadth of Oats sown than last year, and they have ripened well with the exception of some few fields that were sown late and beaten down with the terrific storm of the 24th August. They will yield 30 bushels to the acre. I sowed one field of Norway Oats which looks beautiful.

There was a large breadth of Rye wheat sown, but it was almost totally destroyed by the gale.

Very little Rye was sown, but what there was yielded well.

Flax is very little raised. Our young ladies do not care to run the little wheel, as they have since the Woolsey Manufacture has been put in operation, abandoned the spinning wheel.

Potatoes were got in in good time last spring, the weather being very favorable. A large quantity was planted, and a heavy crop is now being dug in fine condition. Our farmers have planted a good many Early Rose, which yield about 25 bushels to one of planting, and are of splendid quality, very early ripened and not requiring of sowing one day's delay.

Turnips which escaped the devastating of the spring are looking well.

Beets, Parsnips, Carrots and all garden roots are above the average crop.

Apples will be very light—no half a crop—owing to the late gale which blew more than half of them off.

The Black Plum is now sown in the same manner, and in some cases trees were torn to pieces.

Wild Berries were not so good as last year, the late spring frost having destroyed the blossoms.

Our gardeners do not attempt to raise Pears, Grapes, or Strawberries, but begin to talk about them. We all give too much attention to lumbering operations for this.

I think, Mr. Editor, that were we to pay some attention to fruit growing, as good fruit could be raised in River Philip as in any part of Nova Scotia.

Indeed, I have seen as good growing here as I have seen in Kings County. If we would all become members of the Eastern Fruit Grower's Association there is no doubt it would be done.

HORSE NOTE.—Mr. J. R. Lamy's mare Jennie which had become such a favorite with our turfites, has also become so great a favorite elsewhere that he has been offered a price which tempted him to dispose of her. She has been charged with Mr. Shea of Boston for the five horse Climax, well known in the United States which has won many races and has the best 2-mile record, known, and which has also won laurels at the late races in Fredericton. Four years ago his owner challenged him against any horse in Great Britain, to run four-mile heats in Saratoga for \$50,000, allowing \$10,000 for expenses, but the challenge was not accepted.

Mr. Shea paid \$3000 for him a few years ago. He is said to be a fine looking animal. He is now owned by Mr. Lamy and Mr. Church of Cornwallis. He is to be kept by the latter during the winter and be brought here as a stock horse next spring.

We learn by the N. B. papers that notwithstanding the loss occasioned by the great storm the crops will be good, in some respects superior to last years. Potatoes are a partial failure.

TRAFFIC EXTRAORDINARY.—On Saturday last, while a large wagon loaded with goods was being discharged at the Amherst Warehouse Co's store, the horses, taking fright, dashed about, jerking the stage-loads like straws from under the staging on which were two of the workmen, Messrs. Robert Cote and Thomas Hayworth. Finding the staging suddenly going from under their feet, the men, with great presence of mind, and muscular power, caught hold of the cornice and were there suspended by the ends of their fingers until ladders were brought to relieve them from their first exhibition in traffic.
