On the forencon of the 13th two strange steamers were reported as being seen in the north-east direction, and the Inflexible was ordered to get up steam, but they soon disappeared. The chase of the Fury continued from 7 to 11 a.m., during two hours of which time she was in great danger. She returned to Kavaraa on the morning of the 14th, having first visited the mouths of the Danube.
