**Resolved.**—That no surveyor or Inspector of Roads, or servant of the Board, shall give or have authority to give any order for supplies, or work of any description, without first obtaining the written order of the Chairman and Secretary.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

THE BOARD OF WORKS hereby give notice that the temporary Light exhibited on Green Island, at the entrance of Catalina Harbor, Trinity Bay, since the 1st March last, was on the 13th instant, removed, and replaced by one of a more brilliant character and extensive range. This is a FIXED WHITE LIGHT, burns at an elevation of 92 feet above high water, exhibited every night from sunset to sunrise, and in favourable weather will be seen from E. N. E. seaward, to W. 12 miles. Vessels bound Northward by keeping this Light open with the North-head of Catalina until Bonavista Light opens with Cape Le Jean, will give the Flowers Rocks an ample berth—or when coming from the Northward and bound for Catalina, by giving the N. Lead a moderate berth, you will clear the Brandy Bay by steering for Green Island Light. Green Island is situated in lat. 48. 30. N. long. 53. 03 West.

# THE CONCEPTION-BAY MAN.

[FROM THE ROYAL GAZETTE.]

## HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

FRIDAY, Feb. 2.

The SPEAKER took the Chair at 3 o'clock.  
Dr WINTER presented a petition from William Christian, of Old Perlican, and the subject of Education; also, from John March; at same place on subject of Roads.  
The petitions were then ordered to lie on the table.  
Committee of the Whole on the Address—Mr. Benning in the Chair.  
Upon motion of Mr. CASEY the address was committed.  
After some time the committee rose and reported the Address with amendments, when it was ordered to be engrossed and read the third time to-morrow.  
Some notices of motions having been given,—  
The House then adjourned to to-morrow, at three o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, February 3.

The Speaker took the Chair at three o'clock.  
Hon. Colonial Secretary said, he had a message from His Excellency the Governor, the members having risen uncovered, the Colonial Secretary, by command of His Excellency, handed in the following documents:  
A Message, transmitting to the House certain despatches from the Secretary of State for the Colonies.  
A copy of a letter from Mr. Labouchere, relative to the admission of Hanseatic goods duty free.  
A despatch from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, relative to the proposed admission of Hanseatic goods duty free.  
A letter from Mr. Labouchere, enclosing remarks made by the Lords of the Committee for Trade upon two Acts of the Newfoundland Legislature for granting to Her Majesty certain duties on goods, &c. &c.  
A message from His Excellency the Governor transmitting to the House a certain despatch from Sir Houston Stewart, vice-admiral and commander-in-chief on the station.  
Mr. Warren asked leave to present a petition from Michael Fennell, of Bonavista, on the subject of his salary.  
Ordered to lie on the table.  
Mr. Warren asked leave to present a petition from Peter Ward, and others, of Bonavista, relative to roads. It was ordered to lie on the table.

## ORDER OF THE DAY.

On motion of Mr. Casey, the Address in reply to His Excellency's Speech, as amended, was then read a third time and passed, and ordered to be engrossed.  
Mr. Hoyle, pursuant to notice, asked leave to bring in a bill to regulate the practice on the probate side of the Supreme Court; also, a bill to regulate the practice on the equity side of the Supreme Court; both bills were read first time, second reading on Tuesday.  
Mr. Hogsett, pursuant to notice, asked leave to bring in a bill for the establishment of a Light House on Cape St. Mary's; read first time, second reading that day fortnight.  
The Hon. Colonial Secretary, in answer to a question of which the Hon. member for St. John's Mr. Parsons, had given notice, in reference to the clearing the Gut of Quidi Vidi, said that provisions would be made for the purpose in the estimates.  
The House then adjourned to to-morrow, Thursday, at 3 o'clock.

THURSDAY, February 4.

The SPEAKER took the chair at 3 o'clock.  
The SPEAKER informed the House that His Excellency the Governor would receive the House with the Address in reply to His Excellency's speech, on to-morrow at half-past 12 o'clock.  
Dr. WINTER gave notice that on to-morrow he would ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary to lay before the House copies of the following Despatches.—  
1.—From the Right Hon. Secretary of State for the Colonies to His Excellency Governor Darling, of Aug. 3rd, 1855, No. 6, with Governor Darling's reply in full.  
2.—From Governor Darling to the Secretary for the Colonies, July 27, and reply thereto in full.  
3.—Copies of Correspondence referred to in Despatch No. 60, 29th Sept., 1855, between Governor Darling and British Minister at Washington.  
4.—From Governor Darling of 2nd April, 1856, to Secretary for the Colonies.  
5.—Also, that he would ask the Receiver General for a detailed statement of balance unnecessary for new account, amounting to £1320 16s. 0d. in the Financial Secretary's statement of 1856.  
Mr. ELLIS gave notice that on to-morrow he would ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary for copies of evidence taken in reference to the mill-premises of C. F. Bennett, Esq. at River Head; also, that on this day week he would ask for leave to bring in a bill to increase the number of Representatives for Twillingate and Fogo.  
The House then adjourned until to-morrow at half-past 12 o'clock.

FRIDAY, February 5.

Mr SPEAKER and the whole House met to-day at half-past twelve o'clock, and proceeded to Government House to present the address to His Excellency the Governor: Upon their return the Speaker read the reply of His Excellency, when the House adjourned to Monday at 3 o'clock.

[FROM THE MORNING POST.]

THE despatch received at our Telegraphic and General News Agency yesterday, states that the Royal Mail Steamer *Isabella* had arrived at New York on the previous evening.  
The English dates received by her are to the 23d January, being one week later than those we were previously in possession of.  
The news from India, though not important, is said to be of a favorable character.  
Lord Elgin had allowed the Chinese ten days to consider his ultimatum.  
The Duke of Devonshire is dead.  
It has been ascertained that one hundred and fifty persons were injured in the attempt to assassinate Napoleon.  
The French Minister has requested the British Government to expel certain suspicious refugees.  
The principal topic with which the English papers are occupied is that of the approaching nuptials of the Princess Royal.

## THE CONCEPTION BAY MAN.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 17, 1858.

WE copy from the Gazette to day a synopsis of proceedings of the Assembly, and shall continue to do so for the information of our distant readers. We also subjoin by way of specimen a speech of each of the leaders on both sides of the House, upon the subject of law reform, only interesting as showing the different conclusions upon the same subject which Lawyers themselves may arrive at.

HON. ATTORNEY GENERAL said he wished to make a few observations as the hon. and learned member for Fortune Bay had arraigned the Administration, and charged them with not having moved before then upon the subject of Law Reform. The Administration had not been indolent in the matter; they had thought in and perished, since their accession to power, several practical and generally beneficial law reforms. Had they not reformed the jury system in a manner which would put an end forever to packed juries, and enable both poor and rich to look with confidence for justice? Was not the change in the Law of Insolvency a reform of some importance? Then was it nothing to have established the fishermen's charter which secured to them the payment of their wages? In the case of a late insolvency, eight fishermen with large families, who had been shamed at the Labrador, and whose fish had gone into the insolvent's stores, had been saved from starvation by the operation of the Bill which he, (the Attorney General) had had the honor of bringing in; these were some of the practical law reforms of the Administration, and in the case to which he (the Attorney General) had referred, the hon. and learned member for Fortune Bay when it had been submitted to him, had acknowledged that the fishermen were entitled to a preference for the value of their labor. Had not the Law of Evidence been reformed so as to allow parties to give evidence in their own causes? These were reforms which had appeared necessary and beneficial in other countries, and they had been introduced here by the Administration for the benefit of the people of this. These were no sham reforms, they were realities, and were enough to refute the imputations of the hon. and learned member for Fortune Bay. The hon. and learned gentleman and hon. and learned member for Trinity had been asked to co-operate upon the commission appointed by the Administration; and he (the Attorney General) therefore thought it did not become the hon. and learned gentleman to reproach the government with intending to make it a sham, while he saw their determination and desire to effect a substantial reform of the law, not only in the procedure but in the organization of the Courts. He, (the Attorney General) hoped that hon. gentlemen at both sides would unite to perfect a useful and sound measure when it should come before the House, and he agreed with the hon. Colonial Secretary that the bill of the hon. and learned member for Fortune Bay might be referred to the committee on the general measure. The combined wisdom of both sides would, he hoped, produce such a measure of law reform as would conduce to an improvement in the administration of justice. He would not oppose the second reading of the bill.

Mr. HOYLES said he was glad to find that the administration were endeavoring to vindicate their conduct, and to show that they had in some degree come up to their professions, but if any benefit had resulted from the Legislation of the House during the present administration, it had been owing to the constant driving of the opposition. Hon. gentlemen of the administra-

tion claimed credit for their industry—yes, the industry of the thimble-rig; the industry to help themselves and promote their own interests; but what he charged them with was a want of industry respecting the interest of the public. The first thing which the administration should do for the public was to give a fair representation to the country in that House. They said they had done something—a miserable boast. The hon. and learned Attorney General had given an enunciation of the law reforms which had been effected by the present administration—first came the Jury Bill, a miserable failure, and as worthless a piece of legislation as had ever been perpetrated; it was contemptible in the eyes of every person acquainted with the administration of justice; it brought a collection of worthless fellows into the jury box, with whom the hon. and learned Attorney General could have his own way. The Jury Bill of the administration, so boasted of, had been the subject of the ridicule and censure of the bench. (Hon. Colonial Secretary said he had not heard of one appeal from their verdicts.) There had been many, one had been set aside that day. The Insolvency Bill was another absurd piece of Legislation; and when it came before the House some sessions ago, he (Mr. Hoyle) took much pains to point out how it might have been amended, and had implored the House not to pass it in its then state; but all he said had been disregarded, his opinions on the matter had not been even reported; not a day now passed that its insufficiency was not felt.

The hon. and learned Attorney General had said that some men had lately been secured the payment of their wages, owing to the prior claim which the act gave them. The hon. and learned Attorney General was entirely mistaken; the Trustees were not influenced by the provisions of the Insolvency Bill, as it had no reference to the case; but the Trustees had determined that all persons having claims for wages or shares of voyage should be paid in full—but that was not in consequence of the Insolvency Act, as if the men had to depend upon that, they would have to go without a farthing. The hon. Colonial Secretary had said that he (Mr. Hoyle) had accepted from the administration the appointment of Delegate to England on the subject of the Convention. He had accepted it from the country, or from the House which represented the country, and he had been unanimously appointed, and was proud of it because it expressed a degree of confidence in him which he hoped he should always merit.

The Rec. General has paraded his Financial statement before the country, and taken, on the part of the Ministry, no little credit for the accumulation of an unprecedented amount of revenue. One misstatement we sincerely regret viz that no additional taxation has been enforced by our Responsible, but that the increase since they obtained power is wholly attributable to the increase of trade. We admit that it is principally owing to the latter cause, but must still aver that if the trifling duty upon American provisions was suffered to remain, instead of the amount being more than realised upon other articles, taxation would not be so severely felt as it is at this time. But waiving this point how much of the 118,000 has been placed against £160,000 Debt of the colony? £2000 only, and the remainder will we suppose be expended as before, with the exception of a small increase for Roads and Education, the same corruption in the House, the same jobbing out of it, the same extravagance, are to be practised, unless the opposition succeeds in forcing the Ministry and its Supporters, to be more considerate honest and faithful.

It would be worth something to know the precise amount of the £36,000 surplus which shall fall to the various outports of the Island, by the time the Colleges and Seminaries in St. John's are provided for small will be the increase for education. Of the Road appropriation alone they may receive something like a reasonable proportion. The sums of money to be voted to the Capital for various purposes are enormous, when we reflect that outport Representatives with the exception of six members, constitute the Assembly, we are astonished that the revenue is permitted to be expended almost solely on objects exclusively beneficial to the Capital. This state of things could never exist, but that a majority of those members are purchased with a price and do not disobey the orders of their directors, three of whom are members for St. John's and consequently are not so much to blame in this particular as those who nominally represent the much wronged and neglected outports.

The Fishermen of St. John's are seeking aid for the erection of an Asylum. It is right they should have this assistance, and no less right that the Inhabitants of these districts should be equally cared for.

Let our Representatives at their peril support another partial vote for the capital, all we ask is a fair equivalent for our poor. Let justice be fairly meted out according to population and the wants of the people, and let the House be purged of its venality by the removal of placenten, and the 'Conception-Bay Man' will avail himself of every opportunity to support the truly Liberal Cause.

(TO THE EDITOR OF THE CONCEPTION BAY MAN.)

Sir, I observe that the Editors of the Express and the Newfoundlander are jointly and severally of opinion that the time has arrived when Steam Communication between St. John's and the various out harbours of this uncivilized Colony, should be established, I further learn that we are residing on the peninsula termed Avalon, are connected with the main part of the Island by a narrow Isthmus only four miles across, and still further that the Island is generally indented by large and deep Bays, which would render it impossible to construct roads for the scattered population.

THE CONCEPTION-BAY MAN.

**RULES OF THE MUTUAL MARINE INSURANCE CLUB OF CONCEPTION BAY**  
 Adopted at a Meeting of Ship-Owners held at the Committee Room, Harbor Grace, February 9th 1858.

MISCELLANY.

I.—This Club shall consist of all such Owners or the Legal Representatives of such Owners of Registered Decked Vessels employed in the Trade and Fisheries residing within the limits of Conception Bay, in the Island of Newfoundland, as shall subscribe and conform to the Rules hereinafter laid down, for the purpose of communicating and receiving reciprocally the benefit of a MUTUAL INSURANCE.

II.—For the management of the business of the Club, the following Officers shall be appointed, viz.—A Committee of seven members of the Club, who shall represent the whole body individually—A Treasurer and Secretary—and seven Surveyors.

III.—The duty of the Committee is to decide by a majority of their body, all losses which may arise in the Scheme of Insurance: they shall govern themselves in their decision by these Rules, each decision shall be final. No Member of the Committee shall vote in the case wherein he is a claimant for a loss. In the event of any of those nominated at this Meeting as Committee-men not attending at the time appointed, having due notice of their meeting, any seven attending, being unanimous in their choice are empowered to elect two members *pro tem*, to complete the number.—The services of the Committee are to be gratuitous.

IV.—The Secretary and Treasurer, under the direction of the Committee, shall transact the general business of the Club, convening and attending meetings, collecting Monies, settling Losses, &c. He shall also furnish each Underwriter and Master of every Vessel admitted, with a printed copy of these Rules, and if required by a member he shall furnish a list showing the Names and Valuation of each and every Vessel admitted into the Club, as well as requisite Stationary for the Committee, and also sell any Wreck belonging to the Club, for which a commission of two and a half per cent. shall be allowed on such Sale; and for the due performance of his duty, and also for all Monies paid into his hands belonging to this Club, he shall give good and sufficient security to the Society in the sum of five Hundred Pounds, as a remuneration he shall receive Twenty Shillings from the Owner or Owners of each Vessel admitted into this Club, and for collecting Losses he shall be paid one per cent. by the claimant.

V.—The duty of the Surveyors is when required to examine any Vessel proposed for admission, and see that she is well and sufficiently found in Anchors, Cables, and Sails, supplied with a spare Rudder, (with lower and transom Pintles affixed thereto) and every other requisite; and particularly to ascertain that the hull is tight, staunch, strong, and in all respects fitted to encounter the dangers and difficulties of the proposed voyage.—It shall always be incumbent on them to see that the Gunpowder in each Vessel is stowed away in a safe and proper place, previous to the Vessel sailing. They shall be satisfied that the master is competent to take charge of the said Vessel, and having in every respect satisfied themselves that no impediment exists against her being received they shall examine her Register, copy the heads thereof into their Record Book, with her valuation, previous to the Secretary's delivery of each Certificate to the Owner or Broker, which Certificate shall state the sum the Vessel is valued in, and shall be as valid as any Policy at Lloyds.—Every Vessel shall be inspected by at least two Surveyors for admission; no person shall survey a Vessel in which he is interested. For the due performance of these duties, the Surveyors are to receive from the Owners Fifteen Shillings for each Surveyed and admitted into this Club. Vessels entered in the Spring must be surveyed before they proceed to the Seal fishery or other Voyage, and again before proceeding on any other Voyage or Voyages within the limits prescribed by these Rules. The Secretary shall furnish each of the Surveyors with a list of all Vessels entered in this Club as soon as the sum is made up, when the duties of such Surveyors commence, and they are hereby required to give immediate attention to the same.

VI.—Should any difference arise between the Owner of any Vessel admitted into this Club and the Surveyors, such difference shall be submitted to the whole body of Surveyors, a majority of whom shall determine the same.

VII.—No Vessels in this Bay at the opening of this Club will be admitted for the Seal fishery, unless the Rules of the Club are signed by the owner or representative of such Vessel on or before the 28th day of February. This Club being formed on a Mutual Principle for the whole season, shall not admit Vessels for the

Summer that have been Insured otherwise on the Sealing Voyage.

VIII.—The owner or legal representative of the vessel shall sign these Rules separately for each admitted into the Club shall be bound to make good to the Treasurer and secretary his or their proportion of any loss that may be admitted.

IX.—Should the owner or legal Representative of any Vessel wish to reserve any proportion of the valuation set upon such vessel by the Surveyors of this Club, he may be at liberty to do so, the amount not exceeding one-third of the sum to be insured on said vessel, provided the amount desired to be so reserved be stated and affixed to the signature at the date of signing the Rules.

X.—Each Member shall underwrite on each particular vessel according to the valuation at which his vessel or vessels are insured in the Club; and bear reciprocally the proportion of any loss that may happen (for which each vessel shall be liable) whether at Sea or in Port, arising from Winds, Seas, Rocks, Shoals, Ice, and all other dangers and accidents of navigation,—as well as from Lightning, Fire, Enemies, Pirates or Thieves, provided the Master has done his duty to prevent the same.

XI.—This Club does not insure against any loss arising from illicit Trade, or from Barratry of the Master or Mariners, nor against average losses, unless the vessel be STRANDED, and the average loss sustained by such stranding amount to Fifteen per cent. on the Fisheries and Coasting Voyage, and Thirty per cent. on all other Voyages within the limits of this Club.

XII.—This Club shall insure all Vessels entered and approved of for the Seal and Codfisheries of this Island, including the Banks and Labrador, also vessels engaged in the Coasting Trade within the limits of this Government and its dependencies. And also when voyaging to or from the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, Portugal, Spain, Sardinia, Italy as far East as Naples, (inclusive), the Windward and British West India Islands, viz. Barbadoes, St. Vincent, Trinidad, Grenada, and the port of Demerara; British North America, and the United States as far south as Baltimore (inclusive) from the First day of March next, until the Fifth day of December following provided always that they are subject to the following restriction, viz:—No vessel shall leave any port or place in Newfoundland or Labrador for any port or place in the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, Portugal, Spain, Sardinia, Italy, the Windward and British West India Islands, viz. Barbadoes, St. Vincent, Trinidad, Grenada, and the Port of Demerara, at the risk of this Club, after the Twentieth day of October, nor for any port in British North America or the United States after the Fifth day of November.

No vessel shall leave any port or place in the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, Portugal, Spain, Sardinia, Italy, the Windward and British West India Islands, viz. Barbadoes, St. Vincent, Trinidad, Grenada, and the Port of Demerara, at the risk of this Club, after the Twentieth day of October, nor the United States after the Tenth day of November, nor British North America after the Fifteenth day of November, and any Vessel acting in violation of these restrictions shall not be insured in this Club, and if lost or under average, shall not be paid for by this association. No Vessel insured in this Club shall be at liberty to trade with Belle Isle or Kelly's Island in this Bay previous to the Twenty-fifth of April, nor after the Tenth of September.

All Vessels entered for the Spring voyage shall be liable for all losses that may arise in the Club, after the First day of March; and Vessels entering for the summer voyage shall be liable for such losses as may arise after the Twenty-fifth day of May. It is understood that in all days named in this Rule the time or Noon is intended.

XIII.—No vessel is at the risk of the Club (whether at Sea or in port,) after noon of the Fifth day of December, at which time this Club ceases.

XIV.—Any vessel may be withdrawn by the 25th May, on notice being given to the Secretary in writing but such vessel shall only be accountable for her proportion of any loss which occurs up to that date, unless for losses on the Seal fishery agreeably to these Rules.

XV.—This Society does not insure any one Vessel at more than Twelve Hundred Pounds currency, and in the event of any Vessel being valued at more than that sum the Owner or Owners shall be at liberty to ensure elsewhere the extra value, who shall be entitled to his or

their proportion of any wreck that may be saved should the vessel be lost.

XVI.—In case of any property being saved from wreck or stranding, the master shall call in two or three special Surveyors, and, if practicable, employ an auctioneer to sell it by public vendue for the benefit of the underwriters, or if it shall appear to be for their interests, he shall freight it to Harcourt Grace, and place it in the same manner as wrecks occurring in this Bay at the disposal of the Committee.

XVII.—When any loss shall be admitted by the Committee, the Secretary shall be allowed Twenty Days to collect the proportions payable on demand, who shall hand the amount to the proper claimant, reserving Fifteen per cent until the Twentieth Day of June, if the loss occurs previous to that date, and if the loss occurs at the Cod fishery, Coasting or Foreign Voyages, Fifteen per cent, until the Twentieth Day of December, to meet any loss which may occur in the respective seasons. Should the Committee refuse to allow the claim of any individual who may in consequence enter an action at law, each member is to bear his respective portion of the cost of defending such suit.

XVIII.—Any vessel sailing before noon of the First day of March although she may have been surveyed, shall be excluded the benefit of this Club.

XIX.—Whereas there are vessels belonging to ports within the limits of the Scheme fitting out the present spring in other places, it shall be, and hereby is lawful for a majority of the Committee to receive the said vessels at a valuation to be fixed by them, and to appoint at every such port two special, Surveyors to inspect and approve of them in accordance with those rules, whose certificate shall be deemed valid. And as some vessels have already proceeded to the northern parts without special surveyors being so appointed the Committee are hereby empowered in those cases, to receive the testimony of two trust-worthy residents, as to the condition of any such vessels when proceeding on the Sealing Voyage.

XX.—When any claim for loss that may be made and held on this association is proved to have arisen from, or be caused by, the wilfully improper conduct of the master of the vessel, or which by exertion on his part might have been prevented or lessened in extent—in all such cases the name of such master shall be recorded on the Books of the association, as that of a person unfit and unworthy, and is hereby declared disqualified, to have charge of any vessel that may hereafter be insured by this association.

XXI.—It shall be understood that all transactions in money matters, shall be in the currency of this Island viz—Dollars at Five shillings and Sovereigns Twenty-four Shillings each.

XXII.—Every underwriter in this Club shall be required on entering a Vessel, to deposit, in the hands of the Secretary good and sufficient security in writing, for such Vessel's proportion of all losses that may occur.

XXIII.—Those persons who at the present date have not paid the amount of their losses for the last year's Insurance shall not be permitted to enter their Vessels in this Scheme before they pay the said amount.

XXIV.—Any persons appearing at any of the Meetings of this Club to represent an Owner or Owners, and who is not his or their accredited Agent, shall produce a Power of Attorney which document when so produced shall be recorded by the Secretary.

XXV.—In the absence, resignation, or neglect of either of the Surveyors, the Committee are empowered to appoint a Surveyor or Surveyors

The Queen has granted the title of Baron Chestam to his Hon. Charles Campton Cavendish.

On Saturday, the 9th instant, the doors of the Ecclesiastical Courts throughout the kingdom closed to open no more, after having existed for nearly 800 years.

An American journal, or, rather, a journal advocating the interests of the United States, is about to be established in London.

It is said that there will be in England a larger number of marriages on the bridal day of the Princess Royal than was ever known to be celebrated in any one day before.

By accounts from the departments it appears that the cold has been very severe all over France.

According to advices of the 2nd instant from Constantinople, the Russians do not now interfere with the navigation on the Circassian coast.

The "Moniteur" publishes the treaty between France and Siam French missionaries may preach and build schools, and Frenchmen may buy land in Siam.

On the 1st of January the Circassians, under Sefer Pacha, carried by storm the fort of Akedou and massacred the garrison—1200 Russians.

It is stated in letters from Berlin that M. Tachmann one of the principal bankers of that city, has just failed with liabilities amounting to 800,000 thalers.

The Princess de Solmes, a daughter of Madame Bonaparte Wyse, is about starting a news paper at the fashionable watering place of Aix les Bains.

The great prize of 100,000 florins in the lottery of the Austrian Steam Navigation Company has been won by a purveyor to the army, who is now in durance vile for having defrauded the state.

The Russian Government have issued an order, permitting the importation, free of duty for metal work intended to be used in the construction of ships by Russian subjects, on their own account, in Russian dockyards.

A contract has been entered into between the Greek Government and a telegraph company to unite Greece by means of the electric cable with the Ionian Islands, and thence with Trieste on the one hand, and, on the other, with Turkey and Vienna by Syra and Constantinople.

A terrible accident occurred on the 8th at the Church of St. Sulpice, in the faubourg St. Germain, Paris. One of the pipes belonging to the warming apparatus burst, and threw hot water with fragments of iron and marble, upon the congregation. Three persons were instantly killed, five seriously injured, and many others slightly hurt.

EXTRAORDINARY CASE OF DOUBLE SUICIDE.—Some short time since Mr. John Walker, cloth manufacturer, of Sunny Bank, Mirfield, in the West Riding, fell into a despairing way in consequence of severe losses which he had experienced in South America and other markets; and on the 30th of last December he terminated his life by hanging himself. This event had such an effect upon the mind of his son, Mr. William Walker, that on Saturday the 9th inst., he followed the lamentable example of his parent.
