MIRAM. BASE BALL LEAGUE FORMED

The first meeting of the Miramichi Baseball League was held in the Town Hall, Newcastle, last Wednesday evening. The following gentlemen represented the different ball teams.

Douglstown—Andrew Simpson, and William Jessamin.

Loggieville—Bert McHenry, Vince Flattery, and Leslie Harriman.

Chatham—James Mills, Thos. Martin and Arthur Johnston.

Nelson—Bert Coughlan, Frank Gorman and Robert McCoombs.

Newcastle—Ernest McGrath, A. H. Cole, A. Quartermain, Robert Nirose and Mr. Zinck.

Mr. J. R. Lawlor of Newcastle occupied the chair and Mr. Hugh Holt of Chatham acted as Secretary.

After deliberation it was finally decided to form a Baseball League to be composed of one team from Newcastle, Chatham, Nelson Douglstown and Loggieville.

Mr. J. R. Lawlor of Newcastle was elected President and Mr. Hugh Holt of Chatham Secretary of the league.

Each club is to select their own Manager and each team must finance their own individual expenses.

It was decided that members of one club must remain with the club in which they start playing, throughout the entire season and must not play with any other club during the year.

The several managers of the different teams were authorized to meet and frame up a schedule and bye-laws for the season and were also asked to arrange games for May 24th.

The date for which names of players are to be handed in, was left to the managers to decide and all names will be given to the Secretary.

The manager of each team was also authorized to select three men to act as umpires.

The meeting was an enthusiastic one and it is expected to have the machinery in good working order in the near future and Baseball fans may expect some good ball this year.

There is no doubt that Newcastle has the material to put a team in this league that, with the proper support should be a strong contender for the championship.

To do this a certain amount of capital is required. Uniforms, outfit, ball grounds etc. must be provided, and it is impossible for the team to provide this for themselves, but with the help of the general public, this should not be a serious matter.

It is rumored that a certain public spirited gentleman in Nelson has personally contributed a large sum of money to put their base ball diamond in shape for the season.

Will Newcastle be lacking with the necessary support?

A public meeting will be held in the Town Hall on Wednesday, (tomorrow evening) May 10th to discuss the base ball situation. All are invited to attend.

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VISIT HOSPITAL FRIDAY, MAY 12TH

In grateful recognition of the life of the late Florence Nightingale, the Angel of the Crimea, the Canadian Government, has set apart May 12th as Hospital Day.

Newcastle heartily joins in this commemoration, glad to have a hospital, wherein such commemoration, can be fittingly observed.

Florence Nightingale, manifested a keen interest in suffering humanity even at a very early age. Her philanthropic spirit, led her to visit the military hospitals in Europe, and study the chief nursing systems.

When the Crimea War revealed the defective and primitive conditions of hospital accommodation, Florence Nightingale volunteered her services organized a selected band of nurses at Scutari, and in less than a week was enroute for the East.

She rendered invaluable service to the sick and wounded, opened up the path of hospital reform, and cheered the lonely hearts of Britain's Army by her gift of song.

She gave all she had unreservedly the strain both mental, and physical, injuring her health permanently, and even in later years, when as an invalid she was confined to a sick room she continued her mission of service, in giving her experience through book and pamphlet, for the purpose of developing the art of nursing, and leading others into the service of suffering humanity.

The Miramichi Hospital will be open to the Public on May 12th, during the hours of two to five-thirty in the afternoon. The Miramichi Hospital Aid, with its various auxiliaries will hold public reception, tea will be served in the foyer of the Hospital, to all visiting guests and a "musical" will accompany the features of the day.

Ample provision will be made for receiving all, who wish to visit the hospital, qualified nurses will conduct visitors through hospital, and full inspection of every department can be made. The Institution will be tastefully decorated with Plants and Ferns, the gift of the Board.

It is hoped that our citizens of Northumberland Co. will show their interest in coming out on this important day, and help make it a success.

TENDERS FOR HYDRO LINE TO MONCTON

Work on the construction of a power transmission line from St. John to Moncton soon will be in progress it is expected, as the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission has called for tenders for the clearing of the right-of-way. Tenders also have been called for the clearing of the right-of-way to close on May 9, and those for the construction of the line on May 16.

NEW RATES OF WAGES AT FREDERICTON

A new schedule of wages for all branches of the building trades went into effect at Fredericton on May 1st under an agreement reached by the Building Contractors' Association of Fredericton and district.

Under the contractors agreement the eight hour will remain in effect, but the contractors will not pay more than the regular wages rate per hour up to ten, when it is necessary to work overtime, thus cutting out the time and a half rate of wages for overtime in all the building contractor's new hourly rate of wages scale effective on and after today, as compared with the former rates:

46 AN HOUR WAS GERMAN DEATH TOLL DURING WAR

Forty-six men were killed and 109 wounded on the German side during every hour the World War was raging according to an estimate arrived at by General von Altröck, a statistician. This estimate was made from a study of official records.

Germany's losses totalled in dead 1,808,548 and in wounded 4,246,779. Men to the number of 13,000,000 were under arms during the course of the war, of whom about one in seven was killed in battle.

The officers corps lost 53,000 men killed and 96,000 wounded. German soldier and civilian losses through death, caused directly or indirectly by the war, are estimated by General von Altröck at 12,000,000.

BATHURST TO HAVE NEW THEATRE

Mr. Peter J. Leger, proprietor of the Bathurst Opera House which was burned to the ground recently, has signed a contract with the Geo. Eddy Company for the construction of a thirty thousand dollar theatre and moving picture palace.

The new theatre, which will be constructed of steel and wood, will follow a more modern design than the one recently destroyed. Plans for the building were made locally, and with the Eddy Company in charge of the contract it is guaranteed that both the materials and labor will be supplied locally.

Built on the same site as the old theatre, the new house will prove an even greater architectural attraction than its predecessor. The seat capacity will be nine hundred approximately the same as that of the other building.

Work upon the new building has already commenced, and it is the confident expectation of Mr. Leger that the premiere will be held some time in the early summer.

FREDERICTON CHIEF OF POLICE HAS RESIGNED

The resignation of Chief of Police Finley, as requested by the police commission was received Monday evening and Sergeant Jones was placed in charge of the police department.

NAMES MENTIONED IN THE SENATE VACANCY

Speculation is rife among eastern members as to the likely appointee to the Senate vacancy caused by the death of Senator E. P. Thompson, Fredericton, N. B.

Among the names prominently discussed are those of Hon William Pugsley, Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, and O. Turgeon, Federal member for Gloucester. An interesting possibility, if Mr. Turgeon is elected, is that Peter Venlot, New Brunswick Minister of Public Works and at one time mentioned as a cabinet possibility, may stand for the Commons.

Another name rumored for the vacant senatorship is that of William Todd, St. Stephen.

POLITICAL

The Montreal Gazette does not think that conditions at Ottawa are for the good of the country, as a juncture of Conservatives and Progressives on any question would mean the defeat of the Government. It says another election is not desirable and that no one desires the defeat of the Government before it has fully revealed its policy. Yet it is greatly to be feared, says the Gazette "that Canada faces a period of weak and vacillating administration because of the scant majority of the Government and the constant fear that when a division is taken it may find itself in a minority. The composition of the Canadian Commons makes difficult a strong government, however capable its individual members may be for the reason that there is no surety of its measures being approved. Indeed, in some degree its existence is dependent upon its ability to play off one opposition group against the other, and inevitably its measures will be framed more upon expediency than upon right and principle. In so important a matter as fiscal policy, vital to large interests, the Finance Minister can scarcely fix rates of duty without having regard to whether they will be acceptable to the Progressives. We cannot expect to escape from feeble and sickle government during the duration of the present Parliament. An other election will be necessary to secure a dominant majority for one or other party, and it will be an unquestionable advantage to the country when that state of things occurs."

The Liberal party gained power by making promises recklessly, by professing principles in which its leaders did not believe, and by taking advantage of the feeling of unrest in the country. There is no common bond in the party except the desire to be in power. The Premier does not possess the complete confidence of his colleagues and followers, and neither in Parliament or in the Country is he regarded as the strong man required in the present emergency. There may be good ground for the belief in many quarters that the Government will not live out the present parliamentary term.

EMPRESS THEATRE ON MONDAY

Jean Paige, who has not been seen upon the screen since her memorable appearance as Jessie Gordon in "Black Beauty," based on the famous story by Anna Sewell, is the star of the big special production "The Prodigal Judge," which will be shown at the Empress Theatre on Monday May 15. It was made under the direction of Edward Jose. The picture is based on the story by Vaughan Kester which was the most talked of novel of the year when it was published some years ago, and has since maintained its place as one of the best American novels.

"The Prodigal Judge" is a story of the antebellum days with the locale mostly in Tennessee. While the novel takes its name from the Judge, Colonel Slocum Price Tuberville, a lovable hero, eloquent at every bar and Falstaffian in capacity of appetite and intellect, the interest centers mainly around the loves and fortunes of the pretty heroine, Betty Malroy, and it is this character that Miss Paige portrays. Love and hate and private feud, true friendship and evil ambition, all have their place in this splendid American story. The surroundings are colorful; the characters are of clearcut types and the men and women are of the sort who do rather than talk. It is a strenuous story, of strenuous times, and it is doubtful if another American novel could be found which so perfectly lends itself to adaptation to the screen.

THE D. J. BUCKLEY CASE AGAINST INSURANCE COMPANIES

St. John, May 1—Before Mr Justice McKeown this morning in chambers, application was made for a stay of proceedings in the matter of the estate of D. J. Buckley vs. several fire insurance companies.

This is a North Shore case arising as an issue of a big fire which destroyed huge quantities of lumber some time ago at Newcastle. In all there were twenty-one insurance companies interested.

The value of the lumber was given at one time as more than \$100,000 but through a falling market and various adjustments, the claim of the plaintiff is now about \$81,000.

Writs have been served on nine of the companies carrying insurance upon the stock. It is hoped however, to arrive at a settlement through arbitration, and pending a solution in this connection a stay of proceedings was asked for this morning.

CONCERT UNITES GREAT INVENTIONS OF MUSIC AND AIR

The radio phone, the motion picture machine and the Mills Melody Violins—the three inventions of the recent past, were brought together recently in Chicago, and a sacred concert rendered which was picked up by the radio enthusiasts of twenty states.

While the program of the sacred concert was being given, motion pictures were made by the International News Reel, and upwards of 500,000 motion picture fans will see not alone the operations of the radio broadcasting station on the screen, but will also have the opportunity of witnessing the operation of the latest invention in the musical world.

The program which was arranged under the direction of two musical directors, Morgan L. Eastman of the Westinghouse Radio Station KYW at Chicago, and Banks Cregier, was called the greatest musical program broadcasted so far by radio.

Mills Solo is Feature
The Mills Melody Violins furnished the violin music that accompanied the singers, the harp, the organ and a four-part harmony solo on one of the group violins outshone the other numbers of the program.

Wilson J. Wetherbee, program director of K.W. Radio Station, announced the concert to the radio world, and as the program was about to proceed broadcasted from resembled a concert hall and moving picture studio combined.

In the centre of the broadcasting room, on the upper floor of a skyscraper in Chicago's loop, the various musical instruments were arranged around the huge microphone which receives the music and transports it by air channels to the world. At the left Herman Klum, pianist, sat at a concert grand piano, to his right sat Miss Shelby Jabine at an organ, and

Joseph Stelzl was seated at the Mills Melody Violin console, with five violins of the group control circled in front of the microphone.

The Official Description
When the signals were given for the program to proceed the following announcement was sent out over the radio:

"Tonight among other musical numbers, it will be your pleasure to hear Mills Melody Violins, the latest musical invention, played over the radiophone, the latest device for transmitting sound by wireless.

"Mills Melody Violins are real violins, any number of which may be placed under the control of a single player. The musician sits at the keyboard, resembling that of any piano which is at all times perfectly under his control, so that he can execute the most difficult feats of violin playing with ease.

"On each violin all four strings can be played at once and four-part harmony with string quartet effect can be produced.

"So remarkable is this electrically controlled violin that the United States Government has designated it as one of the eight greatest inventions of the decade.

"All the violin music this evening will be played on the Mills Melody Violins.

"While this program is being rendered a third great invention, the motion picture camera, is making a reel under the direction of Harold Brown of the International News Reel."

Violins Play with Organs
A few seconds later "Andante Religioso," by Thome, rendered by the Mills Melody Violins, Joseph Stelzl, violinist; Miss Shelby Jabine, organist, and Miss Janice O'Hara, was being heard in all its musical grandeur by 200,000 persons listening in their homes, offices, clubs and other places where radio receiving sets were working.

Miss Esther Muenstermann, in her beautiful contralto voice, next broadcasted "Evening and Morning" by Spickett

"The Anthem Hymn," by Shelley, and sung by a quartet composed of Marie Rossi, soprano; Esther Muenstermann, contralto; Magnus Schults basso, and William Mitchell, tenor, sent the music of this beautiful number ringing through the sound waves to the anxious listeners.

Miss Janice O'Hara, concert harpist, next played the "Prayer," by Hasselmann.

Accompany Soloists
The Mills Melody Violins accompanied Alfred MacIsaac, baritone soloist, in his rendition of an evening prayer, "The Day is Ended," by Bartlett.

A violin solo by Joseph Stelzl, accompanied by Herman Klum at the piano, brought the technique of the Mills Melody Violins into play in the broadcasting of the musical number, "To a Violet," by Zamecnik.

A demonstration of how the group violins blend in with the voice was given when it accompanied Marie Rossi in her rendition of "The Song

of the Soul," by Briel.
William Mitchell, tenor, then gave an artistic presentation of "The Lord is My Light," by Speaks.

Theodore DuMoulin presented a cello solo, "Rigoletto" quartet, by Verdi.

Then came the surprise and the most pleasing number of the program. It was "Love's Old Sweet Song," violin solo (four-part harmony), presented by Joseph Stelzl on the Mills Melody Violins, the only violin instruments on which this is possible, accompanied by Herman Klum, pianist.

The program was closed with "Lord God of Abraham," by Mendelssohn, sung by G. Magnus Schultz, basso.

The School of Mills
The history of the violin has shown that as master violin makers created their instruments, modeled them and gave them the tone and finish they were classified as schools, but nowhere in history does the American school appear, and it remained for the School of Mills to take its place among the violin makers of history.

Every violin that is used in the Mills Group Control is made in the School of Mills, perfected by master musicians, toned by expert processes the result of years of experiment, and from wood selected by experts.

A humorous angle of the Mills School of Violins is the story of the wood that goes into the production of the violins. Mr. Mills was buying seasoned violin wood from Germany and paying an exorbitant price for it. He became curious and finally traced the wood he was buying to the American forest, whence it was purchased, transported to Germany, seasoned and shipped back to him to be used as "imported" wood in his violins. It is needless to say that he eliminated all this unnecessary handling of the wood and secured it direct from American forests.

THE RUSSIAN FAMINE RELIEF

Thousands of lives of famishing children have been jeopardized through misleading reports that the famine conditions in Russia were over.

The famine is still on and distress is undoubtedly increasing.

Sir Benjamin Robertson, international authority on famine conditions and Chairman of the All British Relief Organizations has issued a special statement to the Canadian people through the Canadian Committee of the Save the Children Fund. The latter organization requested to be advised concerning the report that conditions had been exaggerated and the following reply was received from Lord Wear dale, Chairman of the British Save the Children Fund.

"I have consulted Sir Benjamin Robertson, Chairman of the All British Appeal of which we are part and under whose direction we are working regarding your cable on famine conditions. Sir Benjamin Robertson says:—

"The present programme of the American Relief Administration is to distribute 317,000 rations to adults in the Saratov area where the British Save the Children Fund Organization is administering relief. The total population of the Saratov district is 2,750,000 and the Save the Children Fund is preparing to feed up to 300,000 children in kitchens, and a further 250,000 adults in addition to the A. R. A. programme. But these numbers by no means represent the full extent of the necessity for relief. At the recent conference at Riga over which I presided Mr. Webster, Chief Administrator of the Save the Children Fund in Saratov stated that an effort should be made to relieve at least fifty per cent of the population, that is a total of say, 1,300,000 against 567,000 now to be fed by the Save the Children Fund and the A. R. A. I would request, therefore, that every effort be made to increase the number to be fed as distress is undoubtedly increasing."

Sir Benjamin Robertson recently returned from an inspection of the famine area undertaken with the approval of the British Government and in transmitting this message from Sir Benjamin, the hope is expressed by Lord Wear dale that the Canadian people will take all possible measures to help the Save the Children Fund to carry out their programme and if possible increase it.

CECIL McCULLUM DROWNED IN THE TABUSINTAC RIVER

Tabusintac, N. B., April 29—A sad drowning accident occurred here on the evening of the 25th inst, when Cecil McCullum, aged 20 years, son of Mr. John McCullum, lost his life. The unfortunate young man in company with Gordon McCullum and three school children, were crossing the river in a small boat, and when about mid-river the boat sank, precipitating them all into the water which was about twenty feet deep at that point. Both young men sank having hold of each other, but Cecil lost his grip on Gordon as they arose. He was unable to swim and although Gordon tried to reach him he was unable to do so. Gordon then turned his attention to saving the three young children, having to dive several times to bring them to the surface. He finally succeeded in holding them up until a young son of Everette England, seeing their plight hurried to their assistance and getting ashore safely.

It appears, however, that Cecil McCullum never came up after going down, and but for the bravery of Gordon McCullum, who performed the almost superhuman task of saving the three others, they also would have met a watery grave.

The sympathy of all was manifested by the large attendance at the funeral of the unfortunate young man who was greatly beloved by all who knew him.

MOLASSES CASKS LOOKED SUSPICIOUS

Truro, N. S. May 3—"A car containing puncheons of molasses," arrived here in bond from the West Indies, attracted the attention of a customs officer who took out a bung and introduced a probing rod, found that the "molasses" was solid. Further investigation showed that a number of puncheons were tightly packed with cans containing West Indian rum. The customs officers are reticent, but it is intimated that they believe they have a clue to an extensive smuggling scheme engineered by some quite prominent people.

LIGHTNING STRUCK MAN AND WIFE

Fort Lawrence, N. S. May 3—A lightning bolt struck Mr. and Mrs. Howard, Thompson of this place, as they were driving home late last evening. Mrs. Thompson, who was the first to regain consciousness, found herself lying under the head of the senseless horse. Struggling free, she saw the carriage upside down and by the side of it her husband lying unconscious. After considerable effort she aroused Mr. Thompson, and then they managed to bring the horse from its stupor.

Today Mr. and Mrs. Thompson are dazed. They remember seeing the lightning strike the horse and travel towards them and after that they remember nothing. The horse is lame and dazed. Mr. Thompson had a narrow black burn right across his forehead.
