How the Sawdust is Treated.

The process of manufacturing alco hol from sawdust is simple and economical to a degree. In appearance the plant combines certain features bot! of a pulp factory and a distillery First in the process the sawdust i poured into a "digester," similar operation to the "digesters" of pull plants. Here it is treated under high steam pressure for a short time in the presence of a small quantity of acid A portion of the wood is thus convert ed into glucose.

The glucose is then fermented and distilled into alcohol by distilling apparatus similar to that found in a regular corn-distilling plant. In brief the sawdust goes into the plant on end and comes out at the other in the form of pure alcohol-not wood alco hol, but pure alcohol-purer than that which comes from corn and barley there being in it not a trace of fusel




