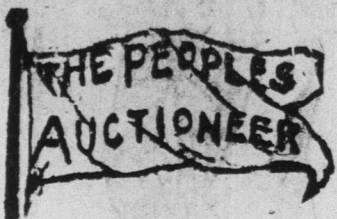

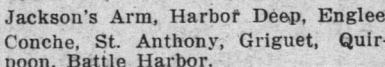

The Psychology of Sex.

The dictionary defines sex as a physical difference between man and woman. But sex is vastly more than that. It is really a wide, psychological difference, as difficult to define as it is easy to feel. The peculiar way in which we classify certain things as feminine and others masculine is an interesting expression of the psychological side of sex. For instance, almost every one speaks of a cat as she and a dog as he, without regard to the actual sex of the animal in question. You know yourself that it is quite impossible to see the clumsy, irresponsible, lovable gambols of a puppy and think of him in anything but terms of masculinity (you notice I wrote "him"; I did that quite unconsciously). On the other hand, the cuddly softness, the domesticity, the grace and quickness, in fact the whole temperament and quality of a cat is quite as distinctly feminine. That we would speak of a cow as she has of course a physical foundation. But why should a horse always be he? And yet almost everyone except a horse fancier or a horse owner naturally refers to a horse in the masculine.

Our bestowal of sex upon vegetable and mineral life and upon inanimate objects is an even more striking proof of the psychological character of sex. Theoretically, all such things should be referred to as "it." Actually we express our sense of their masculinity or femininity by the use of he or she. Take the sun and moon, for instance. The sun is "he" and the moon is "she." Sometimes to be sure we do call either of them "it," but it would be quite impossible to call the sun she and the moon he, would it not? That the ancient peoples felt this too their dedications show. In all mythologies the sun was a god and the moon a goddess. One feels just why this is but it is rather difficult to define. I suppose it is because the sun is larger, fiercer and more masterful, while the moon is his gentler and cooler satellite. Why flowers should always be "she" is obvious. A Fisherman's Manifesto.

It will be observed that many of the planks in the platform of Sir Robert Bond are specially devoted to the interest of the fishermen. Not that the others are not in their interest, but they stand so large in the rest of the country. It is, however, only right and proper that the class which is most numerous and whose industry is the staple one of the country, should have special attention directed to them. In this respect, as these matters loom so large in Sir Robert Bond's appeal to the electorate, the Manifesto might well be called the Fisherman's Manifesto. Amongst these planks are the following:

- (1) The re-organization of the Fishery Department to make it of use to fishermen.
- (2) The appointment of Fishery Agents abroad.
- (3) The enactment of Laws to deal with the cull of fish, its standardization, and the inspection of fishery produce.
- (4) The erection of Bait Depots to meet the needs of the fishermen.
- (5) The amendment of Laws relating to the Sealfishery.
- (6) The erection of Lighthouses and Fog Alarms.
- (7) An Enquiry into the effects of the Whale Fishery and Bait Supply.
- (8) The linking up of fishing centres by means of telephones.
- (9) Harbor Improvements, deepening Waterways, erection of Public Wharves and Landings, and the establishment of a Harbor of Refuge on the Straight Shore.

All of these reforms especially concern fishermen, and are on the line of the policy of progress of the Liberal Party, which has ever manifested keen interest in the fisherman and his calling, as the workers and the industry on which depends the welfare of the country at large. Many a time and often fishery operations are held up for want of good bait. Time is lost and fish is left uncaught, because fishermen either cannot get bait or have to spend an excessive amount of time in seeking it, and when they have found it and

obtained it, after a day or two it becomes stale, and of much less use in catching fish. The linking up of fishing centres by telephones to the larger centres which have telegraphic communication, will provide a cheap and efficient means of communication to find out the whereabouts of bait and fish, as well as serving other purposes, and will incidentally provide a means of cheaper communication at places where the services of a telegraphist is not economical. The erection of more lighthouses and fog alarms will add materially to the safety of fishermen who ply a dangerous calling and insure a safer livelihood to the families of fishermen. The erection of more wharves and landings will help materially the fishermen in their business and do much to relieve them of many of the hardships of their industry. The deepening of waterways and the improvement of harbors will add commercially to the value of their settlements, besides affording protection against many a hard buffeting and nights of anxiety and loss of schooners and gear. Particularly is this true of the establishment of a Harbor of Refuge on the Straight Shore, which will be of inestimable value to those voyaging to and from Conception Bay, Trinity Bay and Bonavista Bay to the French Shore and the Labrador. Its beneficial effects will be appreciated by the fishermen of Green Bay and White Bay who are called upon to go South to St. John's. The re-organization of the fishery department and the appointment of trade agents abroad will afford a means of information as to prices and state of markets that will enable the fishermen through their unions to be on equally advantageous terms with the fish exporter as to the prices which should rule. The standardization of fish and the providing of a cull will revolutionize the fishing industry and save it from the tendency to make an excess of indifferent fish, which is so much deplored by the Board of Trade and those who have the exporting of fish and will the better enable our new trade agents to secure new markets and improve old ones.

Are Model Farms a Success?

Read This From the Herald!
 Hon. E. R. Bowring, in an interview published in the Evening Herald, said, speaking about Australia:—

"In every state, agricultural colleges and training farms are maintained in a high state of efficiency with most excellent results, agriculture being the leading industry; boys put in a two to four years course, getting their general training without charge, though they may have to pay for specialties. The scientists attached to these colleges also do much good in analyzing varieties of soil, recommending suitable crops, fertilizers, etc., and in advising settlers on these and many other points of interest to them.—Evening Herald, Oct. 2, 1912.

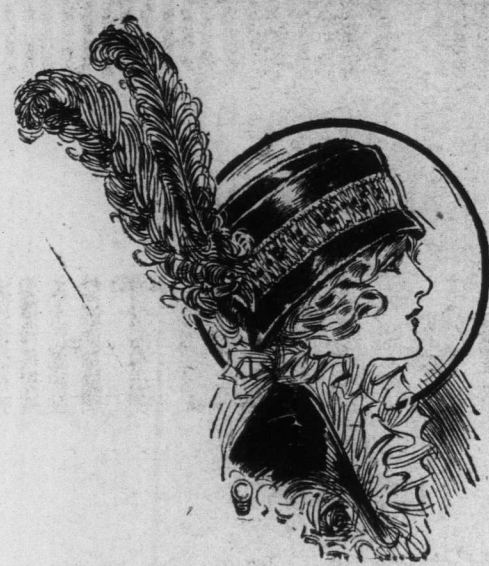

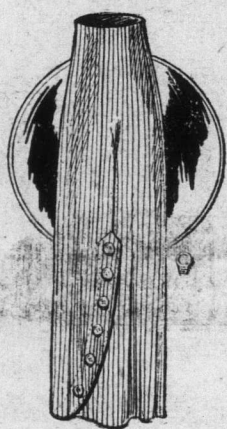

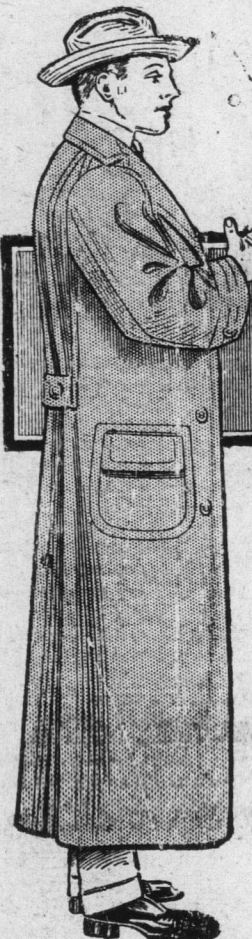

Cable News.

WASHINGTON, To-day. Officials of the Treasury Department are at sea to know what Congress actually meant by the provision in the new tariff law allowing five per cent. reduction of duties on goods imported in American ships with the condition that differential should not be construed to abrogate or impair any existing treaty between the States and foreign nations. Provision should give five per cent. decrease on goods imported in American bottoms and automatically grant the same privilege to ships of many nations whose treaties with the States guarantee no discrimination between their vessels and those of this country. The question undoubtedly will be referred to President Wilson and Attorney General Reynolds, and ultimately will reach the States Supreme Court State and Treasury Departments, who are in consultation over the effect. Countries which will be charged full Underwood duties in any event are Brazil, Chile, China, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, France, German Empire, except several German States, Nicaragua, Panama, Peru, Portugal, Russia, Salvador, Spain, Switzerland, Turkey, Uruguay and Venezuela; also the treaty with Britain does not guarantee any treatment for vessels in her colonies such as Canada and Australia.

OTTAWA, To-day. The new United States tariff has been compared with schedules of reciprocity agreement by a well-known Tariff authority of Ottawa, and results in the complete justification of the stand taken by the conservatives in 1911. The articles free by the final draft of the new United States Tariff are, cattle, swine, sheep and lambs; fresh wheat, corn, fresh milk, fresh cream, eggs, grass seeds, oysters, lobsters, shrimps and other food or packaged, salt, substitute, erude, barbed wire, extract of hemlock, bark, cream separators, type-setting machines, coke, timber, hewn, square or sided, sawed boards, planks, deals and other lumber, pickets and other wooden staves; wheat will be free if Canada removes the duty on wheat, wheat flour and other wheat products, otherwise the duty will be ten per cent, instead of 25 cents per bushel; potatoes will be free if Canada removes the duty, otherwise 10 per cent, instead of 25 cents per bushel will be levied.

OTTAWA, To-day. Cordial greetings have just passed between Borden and the First Minister of Australian Commonwealth, Hon. Joseph Cook, on the completion of the battleship Australia and the cruiser Sydney, the Canadian Premier called as follows:—"The Government on behalf of the people of Canada tender their congratulations on the occasion of official reception of the battleship Australia and cruiser Sydney. Be assured Canada will stand shoulder to shoulder with Australia and other overseas Dominions in the firm resolve to safeguard our common heritage." Premier Cook's reply contained the same strong note of imperial unity and cordial thanks, it ran:—"For kind congratulations heartily reciprocate to-day the completion of an Australian unit of Empire peace, compelling the Navy gladly sharing the obligation for the defense of the whole King's Dominions, this spirit with which we greet our Canadian brothers may cement Empire and set even more firmly as our navies grow."

LONDON, Oct. 6. Because clergy do not include women in their prayers, a party of suffragettes, yesterday, interrupted the morning services at Westminster Abbey by chanting prayer for women now in prison. A party rose as the Litany was being recited, ignored a request to desist singing. At the conclusion the women left the Abbey quietly, addressing a crowd outside one of them said: "This is nothing to what will happen unless women are included in clergy's prayers."

There is abundance of labor in the market to-day as a result of bad or indifferent fishery returns. It is no use to say that a country is prosperous that does not find labor for a few thousand people during the season that intervenes between the cessation of one fishery and the opening of the other, and fishermen who would forsake their natural element, the harvesting of the sea, or who may be forced to drop it for a while by scarcity, would soon learn that the flying dollar caught sometimes at the expense of his health does not pay him for his losses at home in the deterioration of his property.

The Happiest and Freest Man in This Country

is the fisherman who gets enough fish to pay expenses and who can live at home with his family. The voters of this country should try to get it into their heads before it is too late that the Government of this country should be by the fishermen and labourers of this country under a leadership which they can trust—the leadership of Bond. It is not capital that produces labour, but the labour capital. It is in the inverse to the natural or

der of things when capital lords over labour. The labouring man throughout the world understands this and places the product of his brain and muscle beside the product of the mint, and will no longer yield to its mastery. The only asset a man can claim emolument for is extra ability united with integrity. Such men are the true nobles of nature, other nobility is state made and often lacks the essentials of worth. An old Roman poet said that "Virtue is the one and only nobility." Virtue, in its broadest sense stands for the highest manhood. If the manhood of this country had more of the natural and moral virtues we should not have so much rottenness in the State of Denmark and subordinate dependencies. The reform of the proletariat would be a large order, and while the

Demoralizing Influence of State Patronage,

or what I may more aptly call bribery exists, and men are selfish, mean and dishonest enough to accept an office or a price for their votes, the business of the moralist will be hung up. "Most men are true to their own private ends though false to their country, religion and friends." The man, then, who is broadminded and intelligent enough to learn that what is for the good of the whole is for the good of the individual, and that as the Bond Party to-day stands for the good of the country, if he has common honesty as a member of the State and is true, too, to himself, he will vote for the Bond Party; he will vote for legislation that will curtail recklessness in borrowing and expenditure, legislation that will keep monopolists within just bounds, legislation that will level up commercial relationships, lighten up the burden on producers—fisher and workmen especially—and transfer the balance of taxation to the shoulders of those who receive the largest profits. Is the elector so simple, so childish, and so gullible as to swallow all this newspaper twaddle about the wonderful doings of the Morris Party. Were they not elected to do something. Surely no one tries to send a man to Parliament for the sake of reading the speeches he makes. Pensions, school expenditures, roads, arbitrations, etc., etc., are all supported out of the revenue paid out of the

Toil of the Labourer.

The distribution of the country's moneys in this way afford a job for fellows who, as a rule, could not produce as much as a laying hen with any kind of tools. Are we to thank them because we pay them a big salary for a small work? If the Government has lightened our burdens, increased our earning power and helped us by such enlightened, practical legislation as to let us again put them in the broad sense of the term, then they have so far done their duty, but because they tax us forty per cent of our earnings and hands back five to be earned over again, I do not think they have sufficient title to our applause, or even have given sufficient warranty to induce us to again put them in such position that they may continue to fatten upon the product of our toil. All honour and due reward to the men who labour to fulfill their trust, and who, when they again solicit the support of their constituents, can point to something more substantial in their favour than the mere handing around of road monies and

poor relief, or the creation of jobs for disgruntled heeled. There is a big flourish of trumpets in the Government organs about all that has been done by the Morris Party, as an evidence of their zeal for the public welfare and a claim upon the support of the electorate for another term; but the man in the street can analyze all the buncom, and readily reply that you have only expended the money you dragged out of us or borrowed in spite of us—for you have covered more than you told us would be necessary—while you have even nothing to induce capital to develop the country's resources and increase the earning power of the people on a permanent basis. Shallow-brained people may be lulled by this sort of clapnet, or the fellows who want to hold on to a job may try to convince his next door neighbour that the country was never so prosperous as under the Morris regime, but the vast majority are not going

To Swallow That Sort of Hash.

The outgoing Government called itself the People's Party. It was the party of a narrow majority of the people who were fooled last election, being blinded by misrepresentation and a false estimate of the men they elected. But they won't be fooled this time by false promises about education, etc. People know that Governments are to be judged rather by what they did not than by what they did some times; and what the Morris Government should have done but didn't, stands 'out in such condemnatory contrast that history will write across its pages here: A Government true to itself but false to the people, a Government of broken promises and reckless extravagance, I would especially those of the southern part of the island, do a little thinking. Read Kent's reply to the Budget, form your own judgment on the facts and not on your neighbour's view of the situation. Take an intelligent interest in things and throw a little honesty to your doings when you are in the action of honest men. As members of the larger community it is our duty to help conserve its interests and in doing so we will be promoting our own welfare. A man must be very dull who does not recognize that if ever there was need for a change of Government that time is near at hand, and I so far pity him; but if he sees that a change is needed and for private ends casts his vote for the policy of ruin, then I condemn him as a criminal, his conscience will condemn him, and good men will despise him. I hope St. John's West has paid off its indebtedness to Morris, and that a lot of the tailors, and takers and farmers are hanging out of him. Morris knows that a few dollars spent in that way is a good investment—a sprat to catch a salmon. But can they not muster independence and courage enough to cut themselves down and hang some other way? Let them be free for one day, and not be "like dumb cattle driven." The Southern Shore owes

to elect two Bond candidates. The Trepassey end of the next district is for Bond, but I am informed that St. Mary's and Salmonier will hold on to Morris. They are promised a railway and that is their price. But they cannot be so stupid as not to understand that if it is necessary to complete the circuit that the Bond Government can give them a railway's well as Morris, and who is more important still for them to bear in mind is that if they hold out against the Bond-Coaker Union—the true People's Party—they will be out in the cold, and Morris will be able to do nothing for them from the Opposition side of the house. Pleasant Bay, I am glad to see has come to its senses. They know up there what is "saucy for the goose is sauce for the gander"; they want a Government by the people, and for the people. Burin and Fortuna Bay have decided not to be among the assets of a defunct party. My sincere advice to the southern shore of the island would be to drop the Morris Party and be on the winning side. The men of the Southern Shore, embracing the boys, should try to understand their importance. Having its railway and being so close in touch with trans-atlantic traffic and Canadian and American shipping, they should be united with a party that will bring about such international legislation as must tend towards the rapid development of these ports. This is what the Bond Government will do, and it behooves you for your own sake to be on the alert and not allow yourselves to be any longer deceived. I would further advise the

about how you use your vote. Some men, either through stupidity or indifference are drawn to an individual. Independent electors are the greatest humbug that ever bargained a people. They won't join one party, and the other will not take them up, so they start in for election in the hope of forming a third party in themselves. I don't know how any sane man that has regard for a vote or who knows its value can identify himself with a cheat like this. There are other men of a similar brand who will vote for opposite candidates. Do not know that he nullifies his own vote. "Between two stools we come to the ground." There is another type of voter that conceives a dislike to one of the candidates of a party and will plump for the other fellow; a

voter of this element belongs to that class of animal that wears long ears. Can't men of that stamp get it into their heads that it is not the individual they want to return so much as their party, and even though the discounted candidate may not be a glib-tongued lawyer, a stump orator, or a man of letters, yet he may be a man of integrity, a staunch supporter of the party zealous for the country's good, attentive to the needs of his district, kind to those who need sympathetic help without making political game of what he parades as charity or benevolence. Vote for the men of the party. It is enough that they are members of the body you want to elect. There is a lot of stupid voting under those heads, so that I thought it as well to put in a reminder. Again there is the illiterate vote. These men are often humbugged to marking after the wrong name. An illiterate is a sacred thing, and no doubt does blind some men. I think the illiterate voter should be under the guidance of the party he has chosen, and a political job after the next election, nor am I indebted to any party. I write the above in no spirit of vindictiveness against any man, but merely in the hope that I may start some men in the direction to do a little honest thinking. I am not an election fire-brand that wants to set the country ablaze, but my desire is to see the fishermen and all honest voters in united support of a government that I believe will save the country heavy embarrassment and needless legislation as will benefit the labouring classes and lay the groundwork of general prosperity.

CENTRALIA, Oct. 5.
 Thomas Tasheky, miner was rescued from the Continental Mine, at 7.25 a.m. Saturday, after being entombed for 8 days.

RIO JANEIRO, Oct. 5.
 Thirty persons are believed to have been drowned through the sinking of a military tug yesterday, by a big steamer; following the manoeuvres. There were 51 persons aboard including naval officers.

YARMOUTH, Eng., Oct. 5.
 Eighteen seamen of the crew of the British gardenia are believed to have been drowned, when the vessel foundered to-day, after a collision in a fog off this port with the s.s. Cornuro. Four others were picked up alive.

LONDON, Oct. 5.
 The belief prevails that the Irish problem will be solved by consent. It is thought that Ulster will be separated with power to join the Irish government if it so desires. Redmond is silent, but influential Nationalists believe that the financial and other advantages would speedily operate for Union, as they did in the case of P.E.I. and British Columbia.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 5.
 Following a year of preparation the Germans of St. Louis and vicinity on Saturday inaugurated a gigantic festival in celebration of the centennial anniversary of the German War of Liberation. Among the guests is Count von Bernstorff. The festivities will continue for an entire week.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Oct. 5.
 Owners of two fishing schooners which reached port on Friday from the Grand Banks are lamenting that their skippers did not delay a day in bringing home their fares. Had they waited until Saturday, the owners under the new tariff, would have saved the duties which they were obliged to pay on 65,000 pounds of fish.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.
 An enormous quantity of imports have accumulated in the bonded warehouses, awaiting the reduced duties under the Tariff signed on Friday night. In New York \$70,000,000 are stowed. Fifteen new officials were put on, and the office opened an hour earlier on Saturday. At Boston there were \$17,000,000 worth in hand. At San Francisco great quantities of food stuffs await release, including 18,000 lbs. of Australian butter which arrived on Thursday.

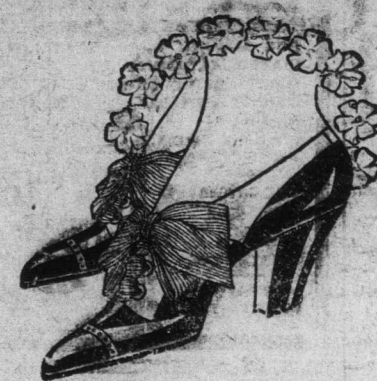
No Explanation Yet.

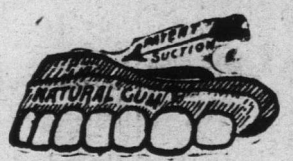

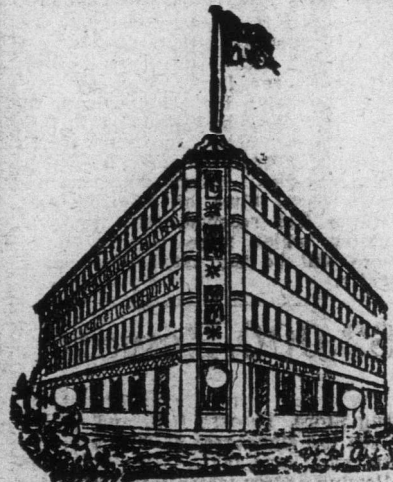

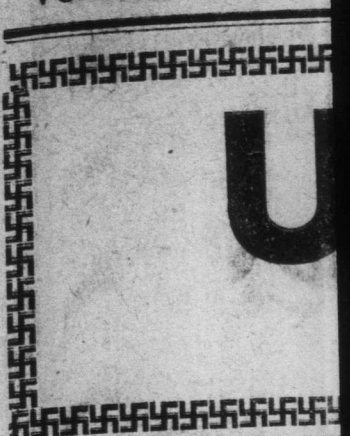
