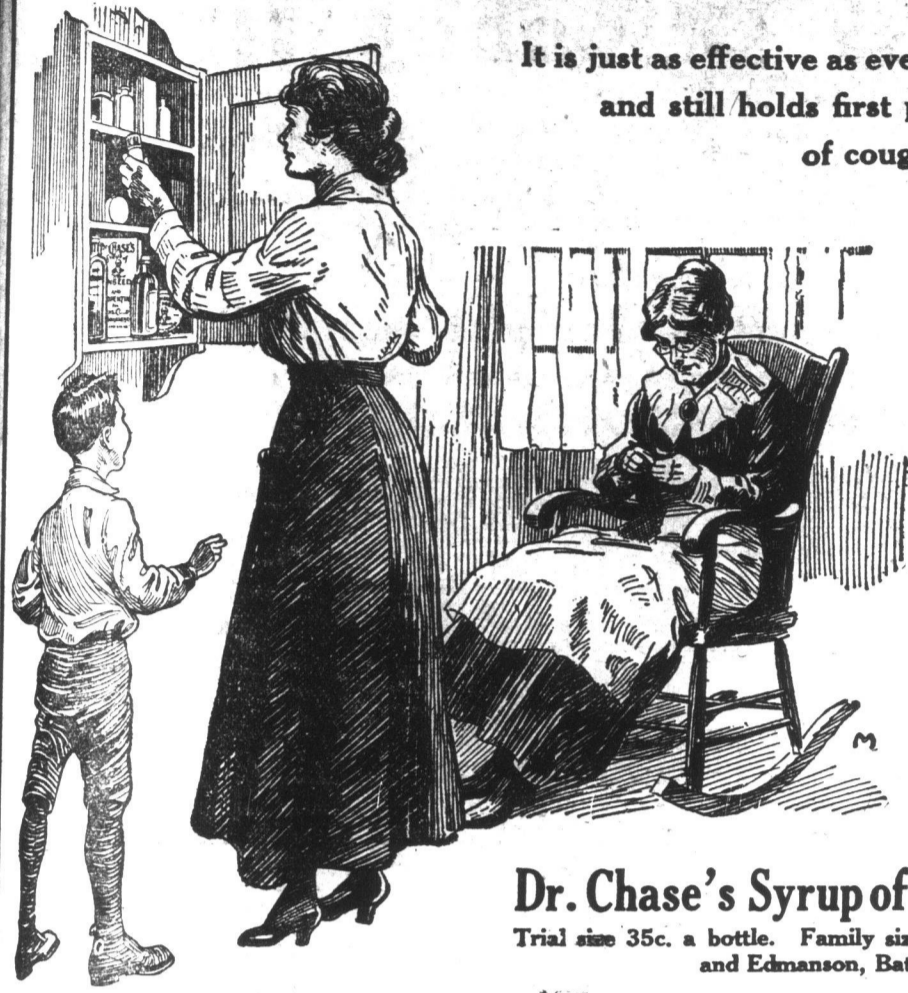

### The Herring Fishery.

SCOTCH PACK WILL BE LESS THAN HALF OF LAST SEASON.

(Western Star.)  
At Bay of Islands the herring fishery has been in full operation the past week. The fish have been plentiful both in the Middle and North Arms and the packers have been kept busy with all they could handle, and on some occasions fishermen have found it difficult to dispose of their catches. Schooners seeking salt bulk have had no trouble to secure fish and one vessel one day last week took seven hundred barrels. One schooner, the Louise R. Silva was ready to sail on Monday. She had half salt bulk and half barreled herring. The auxiliary schooner Gaspé will be ready to sail on Friday. There are several others now in the Arms, and one or two more are on the way here. There are two vessels here for frozen cargoes, and several others are expected. Three buyers of "Scotch Pack" have arrived. Their report of the market in New York is not very encouraging. None but full fish is required. Packers find that only about fifty per cent. of the herring taken can be packed for the Scotch method market, owing to the large quantity of empty fish. The large and medium empty fish are being split and salted by local method. Every indication points that the pack this season by the Scotch method will be less than half of last season.

The American schooner Hazel R. Hines is due here to load salt bulk herring for Gloucester. The schr. Donald Silver has been chartered by E. Baggis Ltd., to take away a load of salt bulk herring. The schooners Governor Foss and Thos. S. Gorton arrived last week from Gloucester, and will load herring for the Bay of Islands Fisheries Company.

### Sagona Back

From Straits.

After a voyage of continued storms the S.S. Sagona, Capt. Taverner, reached Curling a few minutes before six o'clock on Monday evening from the Straits, says the Western Star of Wednesday, Nov. 22nd. Although the trip occupied 13 days, only two fine days were experienced during that time. The ship, however, made all ports both going and returning. She reports winter conditions on Labrador. The ship handled big freight throughout the trip and upon arriving at Bonne Bay she was filled to the hatches. A portion was landed there and other taken on board so that she was loaded upon her arrival here. The ship brought along a number of passengers. It is not expected she will be ready to go north again until after to-day.

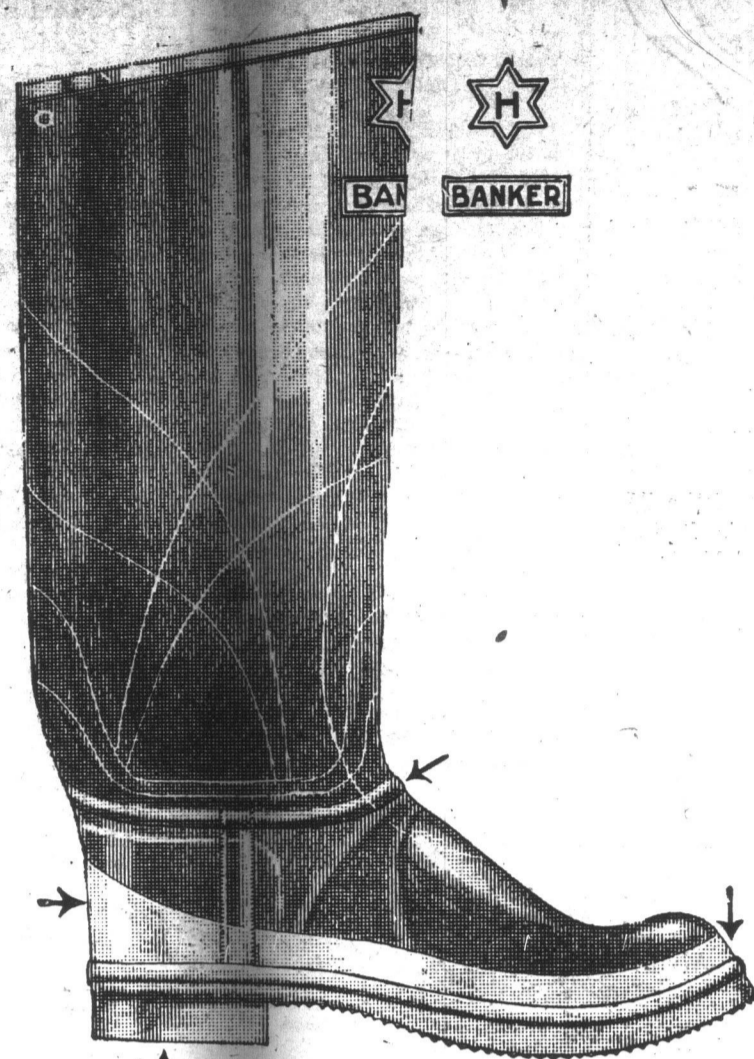
### Wages in States

Continue Upward.

COMPETITION IS TAKEN AS REFLECTING IMPROVED BUSINESS CONDITION.  
Wages continue to show upward swing in the United States, according to the National Industrial Conference Board, New York.

The most numerous increases, the statement says, occurred in the clothing and textile industries, influenced by the restoration of pre-strike wages in important New England mills. Increases took place in the copper mines of Arizona and Montana, due to a shortage of common labor, reflecting the effect of the immigration restrictions, which are widely felt. The metal trades show a large number of increases, mostly to molders, who are working on a sliding scale. Increases to shopmen and other classes of railroad labor above the rates laid down by the Railroad Labor Board have also been granted by individual firms. All these changes are considered to evidence a growing competition for labor in industrial centers in face of rapidly improving business activity.—Financial Post.

## Britain's Unemployed.

The Million Four Hundred Thousand by New Year -- Reprisals May Follow Execution of Childers -- Greek and Bulgarian Statesmen Disagree.

### ISLANDS UNEMPLOYED.

LONDON, Nov. 24. There will be one million four hundred thousand unemployed in England at the end of the year, the chief commiser was told by Thomas Fisher, former Minister of Labour.

### CHILDERS' TRAGEDY.

LONDON, Nov. 24. The tragedy of Erskine Childers ended with the death of Michael. The well-wishers of the Free State expect that his execution will be the beginning of a new chapter in the turbulent history of Ireland. Many quarters fear this chapter will be described by the word reprisals and that these reprisals may be more and more developed into more intense and more bitter warfare than that which has been known before. Many people are shocked because they believe that he bore an honorable name as a British patriot who served his country good service in the Boer War, and when was regarded as a hero in the British world because he wrote "The Riddle of the Sands," which was not only a work of great interest but a work of patriotism. Some of Childers' old friends have spoken to to-day knew just why he had undertaken the mission from an ardent Britisher to an Irish revolutionary. Childers was an Irish woman's family came from a distinguished line and his father gained an "Oriental scholar." Childers' mother was an American woman who had her ancestry back to the United States revolutionary days.

### REPRISALS WILL FOLLOW.

DUBLIN, Nov. 24. Erskine Childers, who was executed yesterday morning, was educated at Cambridge, and during the great war was Lieut-Com-

mander in the R.N. between January and May, 1916, winning the D.S.O. for service against submarines. He is credited with having been the moving force in organizing armed resistance against the Free State authorities. It is believed that reprisals will follow his execution.

### DEFEAT BONE OF CONTENTION.

LAUSANNE, Nov. 24. Elliphros Venizelos, former Premier of Greece, and M. Stamboulyski, Bulgarian Prime Minister, faced each other at to-day's session of the Near Eastern conference, when an effort was made to reach an agreement on Bulgaria's claim to an outlet into the Aegean Sea. Both men showed great emotion. Stamboulyski was holding out for actual possession of the port of Dedeagatch, contending that no other way could Bulgaria be guaranteed free commerce. Venizelos opposed the proposal in an impassioned speech holding for a free port under the control of a mixed mission.

### NIGHT NAVIGATION CLOSES.

MONTREAL, Nov. 24. Night navigation on the St. Lawrence will be officially closed on Nov. 26th, when all gas buoys will be replaced by steel buoys, visible only in the day time.

### GREEK CABINET RESIGNS.

ATHENS, Nov. 23. The Greek cabinet has resigned. The political situation is extremely complicated.

### REBELS CAPTURED.

DUBLIN, Nov. 24. General Killy and seventy men of his irregular forces, have been captured by General McKeown of the Free State Army near Newport. The capture was due to an encircling movement by the National forces which had been in County Mayo the last few days.

### LABRADOR MISSIONARIES AT HALIFAX.

HALIFAX, Nov. 23. Rev. and Mrs. W. Stride arrived today by the Albania from England en route to resume their work on Newfoundland Labrador.

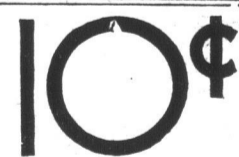


### Scotchedown Frae Scotland.





### Died For His Dog.

**HEROIC SELF-SACRIFICE. TRAPPED IN PIT-SHAFT.**

There is no more eloquent witness to the bond between man and dog than the many instances recorded in which the one has risked his life for the other.

A singularly pathetic case in point was reported from North London recently. A little boy, only eleven years old, plunged into the river Lea after his pet, which had become entangled in some weeds.

He freed the dog, which swam ashore, but, becoming himself enmeshed in the reeds in his turn, the brave boy sank and was drowned in some seventeen feet of water.

In another case a fox terrier had fallen down a disused pit-shaft one hundred feet deep, and could be heard moaning pitifully at the bottom. A brave man, a local boxer, volunteered to try to rescue it, and was lowered by a rope to the depth of thirty feet, at which point he found the shaft impassable owing to the brickwork having become disjointed.

He had to clear away the obstruction while hanging to the rope, a task of considerable difficulty and danger, and was then lowered the remaining seventy feet and recovered the dog, which was badly bruised and shaken.

How a British Tommy risked his life for a dog belonging to a German soldier in the early years of the War was told by a newspaper correspondent, who witnessed the incident while on a visit to the trenches.

The animal had somehow become trapped in a deserted farmhouse situated between ours and the enemy's trenches. Here it remained for three days, thirsty and hungry, terrified by the incessant firing, and howling dully to be let out.

Eventually, one of the Tommies could stand it no longer. Clambering "over the top," he shouted across to the Germans that he was going to release their dog, and started to walk towards the farmhouse.

A few rifles were loosed off at him, but not many, the bulk of the men in the opposite trench evidently divining his intention, even if they did not understand his speech.

He released the dog, which promptly scampered off to the German lines, the rescuer meanwhile strolling back to our lines in perfect safety, not a shot being discharged from the other side until the plucky fellow was once more safe under cover.

### Beauty For The Hands.

It is difficult for the busy woman to keep her nails "fit" in winter; the fingers are apt to get rough, and consequently pick up grime and retain it. The great point to aim at is to keep the skin under and around the nails soft and unbroken.

A little lemon juice is excellent to remove stains from under the nail, and after using it dip the tips of the fingers in glycerine or a cream to soften the skin. If "hang nails" (loose bits of skin at the side of the nails) appear, remove them and apply a cream at once, or a little vaseline. Do not cut the cuticle at the base of the nail, press it back.

Some nails get so brittle in winter. When they have this tendency, a little olive oil or vaseline should be applied at night-time, once or twice a week, after soaking them in hot water for a few minutes.

When engaged on any work likely to soil the nails, wet a piece of fairly soft soap and press the nails into it, so as to fill them up and prevent dirt getting underneath.

### Alebrta's Iron is Not Very Important.

(Financial Post).

A report submitted to the Alberta Government's Council of Scientific Research by Dr. J. A. Allan, professor of geology in the University of Alberta, states that the reputed iron deposits on the north shore of Lake Athabasca are not of commercial importance. These deposits were discovered last year by prospectors who staked claims and have since opened offices in Edmonton and Chicago for the purpose of interesting investors, their belief being that they had located a rich body of iron-bearing ore in quantity and quality sufficient to warrant development.

At the request of the Advisory Scientific Research Council, Dr. Allan went north in July of this year to make a thorough inspection of the deposit, and his report is based upon the observations he then made and the results of analysis of representative ore samples that he brought out with him. These tests have shown that the ore is of a comparatively low grade, while the quantity of ore available is negligible. The deposit therefore, cannot be classed, says the geologist's report, as a commercial one.

It was also found during the investigation of the supposed iron areas that it could not be worked economically, even if the quality of the ore were satisfactory, because of its distance from fuel supply and the fact that it is 200 miles up-stream from any possibility of railway transportation. The deposits are on the north east shore of Lake Athabasca and lie within the province of Saskatchewan.

Now only the word "Fish" was left on the signboard, and even this, the fourth critic suggested, was superfluous.



### Cocoa Magnate.

DEATH OF MR. CADBURY, BUILDER OF A GREAT BUSINESS.

Mr. George Cadbury, head of the famous cocoa firm and a noted Quaker philanthropist, has died, at the age of eighty-three at his residence, Manor House, Northfield, Birmingham.

When he joined the firm of Cadbury Bros. in 1851 it employed about a dozen hands. Largely owing to his energy, he saw the business expand until it gave steady employment to 9,000 workers, housed in the garden city of Bourneville, which he founded. He was twice married, and had eleven children. Beyond an active interest in Birmingham City Council, of which he became a member in 1877, he took little part in public affairs, although twenty years ago he purchased the "Daily News," which he has since transferred to a trust administered by his sons.

### Can You Read Quickly?

You Should Get Through This Article in One Minute.

How many words do you read in a minute, dealing with ordinary, clear printing, such as this?

The answer should be something between 300 and 350, the average taken over a large number of cases being almost exactly 330.

As a rule, those who fall much below the average do so because of the manner in which they read; they form each word with their mouths as they proceed, and in such cases the figure rarely exceeds 200 words a minute.

On the other hand, those whose occupations entail a large amount of reading, such as members of editorial staff, book reviewers, readers to the press, and so on, can often read up to 500 words a minute, or a 30,000 word story in an hour!

And not only can the read at that speed; but every salient fact in the matter being perused is thoroughly absorbed.

Typewritten matter can rarely be read at more than about 250 words a minute, owing to the greater distance the eye has to travel, while with even the clearest handwriting a minute is occupied in reading at the most 200 words.

The art of reading quickly is attained by the practice which enables the eye to recognize a word by its formation more than by the actual

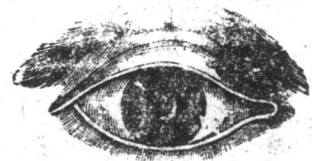
