"I want fifteen shillings and sixpence, please," said Royce, cheerfully. "Will some one take it for me?"

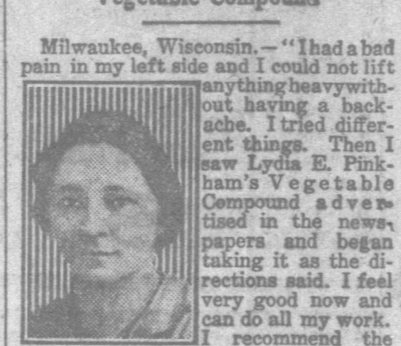
Old Davy went and picked out the required sum from Bill's huge palm, and Royce, with a pleasant "Thank you, Davy," put it in his own pocket.

**What a Horse Can Pull**  
(By Christopher Beck.)

Aprons the tests of the pulling powers of shire horses made on February 26, at the Agricultural Hall, it is interesting to note that, some years ago, the R.S.P.C.A. suggested that as a general rule, a horse should not be required to pull more than three times its own weight.

Tested against an arrangement of springs with a dial showing the exact power exerted, a pair of horses, each weighing 1,600 pounds, together pulled 3,750 pounds, or 550 pounds more than their combined weight.

An elephant weighing 12,000 pounds pulled only 3,750 pounds, or 3,250 pounds less than its weight.

The surface across which the load has to be pulled is, of course, of supreme importance. A horse can draw on metal rails 1 2-3 times as much as on good asphalt pavement, 5 times as much as on cobble stones, and 20 times as much as upon an ordinary rutty farm road or track.

For an ordinary farm horse fifteen hundred-weight is reckoned as a fair load—that is fifteen hundred-weight plus the weight of the cart.

Under saddle or pulling light vehicles good horses are capable of astonishing feats of strength and endurance.

In the year 1912 a cob twelve years old and fourteen and a half hands in height, belonging to a Staffordshire farmer, pulled a governess cart one hundred miles in 13 hours 27 minutes.

The driver used no whip and drove almost all day with a slack rein. The horse finished its big day's work in excellent condition.

American trotting horses have done the mile in four seconds less than two minutes. In the matter of galloping the record presumably belongs to that wonderful filly Mumtaz Mahal, which in winning the Spring Two-year-old Stakes at Newmarket last year covered the course at the rate of just on 39 miles an hour.

**Prince of Wales Meets With His Twelfth Mishap**

**MacLaughlan Again at the Head of the Agitators--Singapore Project Deferred -- Shipbuilding Lockout Threatens in Britain.**

**PRINCE AGAIN INJURED.**  
WORKINGHAM, Eng., Mar. 17. The Prince of Wales had another accident yesterday while riding in the army point to point steeplechase events at Arbor Field Cross. His injuries were found to be not serious and after a time he was sufficiently recovered to return to London by motor car.

**PAPERS COMMENT ON ACCIDENT.**  
LONDON, Mar. 17. The Prince of Wales' twelfth accident, in which he was thrown while participating in a race at Arbor Field, Saturday, is made the text of editorials by the morning newspapers which tell him kindly that the people are very much concerned over the manner in which he continues to risk his life. The writers remind him that he is not a private person but a national asset, especially in view of the hearty and thorough way in which he performs his duties, and it is time he imposed restraint on his plucky spirit.

**SINGAPORE PROJECT DEFERRED.**  
LONDON, Mar. 17. It is understood the British Government with the assent of the dominions has suspended the Singapore naval base project for one year. It is expected that Premier MacDonald will make an announcement to this effect in the House of Commons this week.

**FIUME FORMALLY ANNEXED.**  
FIUME, Mar. 17. Welcomed by cheering thousands, King Victor Emmanuel and suite entered Fiume to-day and formally annexed the city to Italy.

**EGYPT'S FIRST PARLIAMENT OPEN.**  
CAIRO, Egypt, Mar. 17. Egypt's first parliament under the new regime was formally opened by King Fuad. The streets were crowded for the brilliant spectacle of the royal procession from the palace to the House of Parliament. Premier Said Zablouli Pasha rode with the King in the Royal Coach.

**WINSTON'S CHANGES SEEMINGLY NONE TOO GOOD.**

LONDON, Mar. 17. Winston Churchill, the independent candidate in the bye election for the seat in the Abbey Division of Westminster, scarcely makes any concealment of his own belief that victory will rest with him only if he shakes the constituency out of its traditional apathy under which a solid band of Tories goes solemnly to the polls while the remainder of the electorate is hardly aware that an election is in progress. Churchill's bitter enemy never has said that he is not energetic and he has made great efforts to attract the attention of those 15,000 or 20,000 voters who usually take no notice of an election. The market porters of Covent Garden, wily nilly, have become familiarized with his pugnacious physiognomy. One day he appeared among the apple barrels and banana crates in Covent Garden market, gravely carrying a huge cabbage bestowed upon him by a fervent admirer. "Winnie you are a scream, but you are the best of the bunch anyway," thrilled another Covent Garden admirer at Churchill as he went

**LEAGUE'S ACTIVITIES GROWING.**  
GENEVA, March 17. In a statement last night reviewing the work of the Council of the League of Nations, Alberto Gual, of Uruguay its President, says the March session which adjourned Saturday was one of the best in the League history so far as concerns the achievement of practical results. He says the moral and practical influence of the League will be greater and more decisive in the future.

**BRINGING SETTLERS TO CANADA.**

LONDON, March 17. Right Hon. J. H. Thomas, Secretary for the Colonies, acting on behalf of the Empire Settlement Committee, today signed an agreement with representatives of the Canadian National Railways to assist in placing in Canada selected groups of families from Great Britain. The Settlement Committee authorized loans of three hundred pounds to each settler, also guaranteeing any loss up to fifty per cent. of the amount loaned. The first groups emigrating under this agreement will settle at Tiesdale, Sask. It is stated that only married couples with thorough agricultural experiences

will be accepted and they will be expected to possess about two hundred pounds of their own. The farms are limited to 160 acres and each group is restricted to twenty families. The present agreement provides for the acceptance of five hundred families.

**BASIS OF EXPERTS' REPORT**

PARIS, March 17. The report of the first committee of experts, under Brigadier-Gen. Charles G. Dawes, which is practically agreed upon by the experts, through the working out of some details and the drawing up of the text may require another week, is based upon these findings.--The German people must pay as much in taxes as any of the Allied countries. Germany must pay the maximum of her capacity in reparations, and the German economic machine must be free to function under German control, unhindered by any interference from the outside. Minimum sums must be paid at once or in the immediate future on reparations, these to be increased in accordance with the revival of Germany's prosperity and according to her economic condition. The French and Belgians will be left free to maintain guardians on the Ruhr or immediate vicinity, so that while obliged to give up the actual pledges seized in January 1922, they will be able at any time to put their hands on Ruhr industries, if Germany fails to carry out the terms.

**OREGON'S CHARGES.**

MEXICO CITY, March 17. President Oregon has definitely charged a British petroleum company, El Aguila, with having actively aided by Vera Cruz revolt against the Government by giving supplies, money, and ships, while at the same time having attempted to obstruct the Federal Government's efforts to quell the disturbances. The President's charges were made in a statement to the newspapers in which he asserted that he had arranged to turn the matter over to the Attorney General for investigation upon information submitted to him by Federal officers who were present in the occupied areas during the rebel domination. High personages were hidden behind the activities of El Aguila, he declared. He did not think the British Government would attach major importance to the affair.

**CHARGE DENIED.**

MEXICO CITY, March 17. A denial of the charges made by President Oregon was made by R. D. Hutchinson, Vice-President of El Aguila in Mexico City. He said he was seeking an interview with President Oregon and was satisfied he could clear up the charges, which he declared were unfounded. Isolated acts by company employees were being investigated, he said.

**PACIFISTS WANT ARMY REDUCED**

LONDON, March 17. Imperial defence in its various aspects may give the Government some uncomfortable moments this week. The House to-morrow will have before it a demonstration by pacifists for the reduction of the army to one hundred thousand men.

**CANNOT INTERVENE OFFICIALLY.**

LONDON, March 17. The British Government does not feel it can intervene officially with the Russian Soviet Government to obtain the release of Catholic Church dignitaries imprisoned in Russia, but any suitable opportunity that may occur of making a friendly and unofficial representation to the Soviet in this matter will be taken, Premier MacDonald so informed a questioner in the House of Commons to-day.

**SHIPBUILDING LOCKOUT THREAT- ENED.**

LONDON, March 17. A national lockout in the shipbuilding industry is a prospective development of this week should the striking shipbuilders in Southampton persist in their refusal to resume work on the terms the employers have already offered. The employers have declared they cannot wait longer on the Shipbuilding Employers Federation, has summoned its Executive to meet at Carlisle, Thursday, and has invited the Executive of the Federation of Engineering and Shipbuilding Trades to attend the conference and discuss the situation.

**TWO CHILDREN PERISH IN BURNING CABIN.**

Trapped in a log cabin where they had been locked by their mother, who had to go to a grocery store, the nine months old baby and three year old boy, children of Mr. and Mrs. Omer Garland, were burned to death Saturday afternoon at Monet. The fire

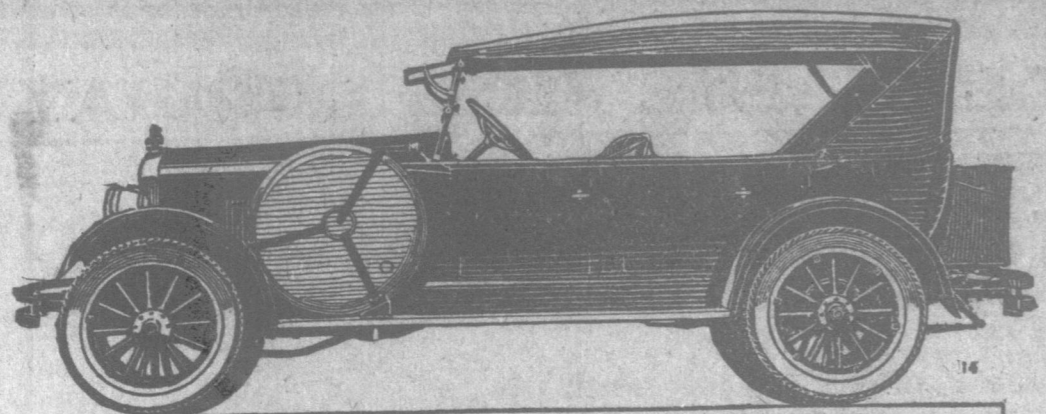

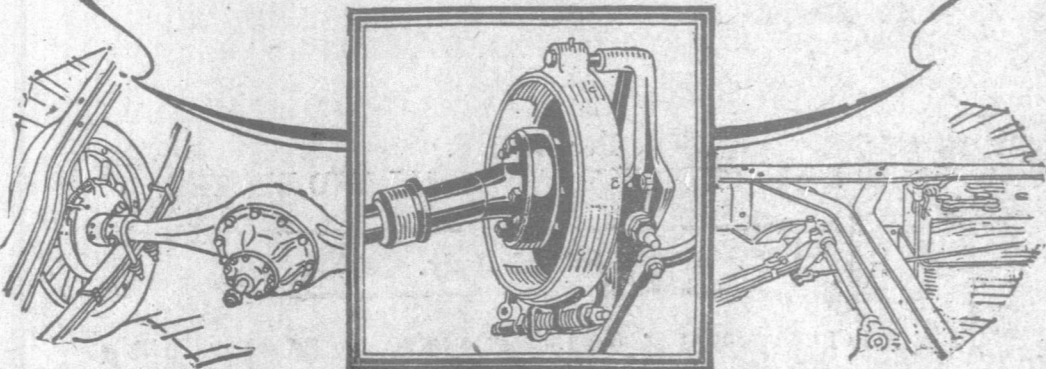

When Dr. Benson, afterwards Archbishop of Canterbury, was Bishop of Truro, in one of his tours of the diocese he came upon a clergyman who for absent-mindedness must have outrivalled the "absent-minded beggar." His affliction had grown upon him till, if there was any interval in the service, such as a hymn, during which he was not actually officiating, he would drift into the vestry, disrobe himself, and set off home. To obviate this, with his full consent, he used to be attached to the altar rails by a dog-chain fastened by a padlock, of which his sister kept the key, so that if he started off for the vestry he received a gentle check, which reminded him where he was. At the end of the service he was set free.

The above is related by Mr. A. C. Benson in "Trefoil" (John Murray), in which he tells many other stories of his father and his father's friends. Another "character" was John Wordsworth, Bishop of Salisbury, who was utterly unaware of what he ate or drank.

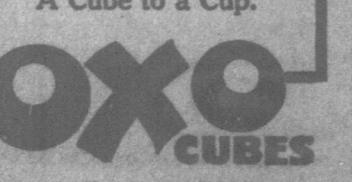

**Kungsholm Rescues Crew of S. S. Obernai**

Swedish Steamer Reached Scene of Wreck at 11 p.m.—Men Had Taken to Lifeboats—Rescue Ship Took Crew on Board at 2 p.m.—And Went to Halifax.

Forced to take to the boats at noon Saturday, when their ice and storm battered craft, with her decks swept by the wintry seas cremed on the verge of sinking, the crew of the Sydney owned steamer Obernai, after spending 14 hours adrift in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, battling with the mountainous seas kicked up by a heavy southeast gale were providentially rescued by the Norwegian steamer Kungsholm at 2.30 o'clock Sunday morning and are now on their way to Halifax. News of the rescue was contained in a wireless message from the Kungsholm received by Mr. Vincent Mullins, local representative of the Marine and Fisheries Department, shortly after the Obernai's crew were picked up. No loss of life is reported and it is safe to assume that the full complement of the unfortunate craft, 17 men in all, are now safe on the Kungsholm.

Details of the rescue are very meagre, but reading between the lines one finds a stirring tale of those in peril on the deep and it requires but little of the imaginative gift to visualize the scene. The Obernai was abandoned about noon Saturday, Captain Dicks evidently recognizing the impossibility of bringing his ship to port. She was then about twenty-five miles from Port aux Basques, Newfoundland, with her decks awash, and steaming at about three knots per hour. It is the general opinion that the stoke hold became flooded sometime Saturday afternoon, drowning the fires and putting her engine and pumps out of commission. Driven helplessly by the wind and sea, and in imminent danger of foundering, Captain Dicks was at last forced to order his crew to abandon ship. Wireless calls for assistance had been sent out during the morning, and the Kyle and Kungsholm were already hastening to the rescue. The Obernai is reported as sunk, but the time is not given.

The crew left the ship in two boats. A strong southeast gale was blowing at the time, which gradually increased in velocity. At 11 o'clock Saturday night, the Kungsholm arrived in the position last reported by the Obernai, and after cruising around, located the two boats. A full gale was blowing at the time, with a heavy sea running, and great difficulty was encountered in effecting the rescue, the work being made more hazardous by the darkness. At about half past two Sunday morning the second boat's crew was safely taken aboard and the rescuer headed for Halifax, where she is expected to arrive this morning.

**Tomb Broken Open.**

(Daily Express Correspondent).

CAIRO, Feb. 22.—Tutankhamen's tomb was broken open this afternoon with chisels, crowbars and hacksaws. Mr. Carter was not present. He has the keys of the tomb, but refused to give them up. Two locks on the massive outer door took ten minutes to remove. Then M. Lacau, the Director of the Egyptian Antiquities Service, and an armed guard descended into the tomb with lighted candles like a band of conspirators. Three more locks had to be smashed before the ante-chamber was reached. There was a sigh of relief when the party beheld the heavy lid of the sarcophagus undamaged, and still suspended in mid-air.

**Canadian Soldier Lays Bare Secret of Wall St. Bomb**

New York—(Canadian Press)—Proceedings for the extradition of Ralph Thurber, a prisoner in Pentonville prison, London, England, who has implicated himself and a number of other persons in the Wall Street explosion of September 16, 1920, which resulted in the death of 30 persons and injuries to scores of others, will be begun only after a thorough investigation of his alleged confession.

Thurber's confession was made public on March 4th by District Attorney Banton. It had previously been forwarded from the American consulate in London to Secretary of State Hughes and Governor Smith.

Served in C.E.F.

London—(Canadian Press, March 1)—Ralph Thurber, prisoner in the Pentonville jail who has confessed to implication in the Wall street bomb explosion of 1920, formerly served in the Canadian army, according to the Daily Sketch.

Thurber recently came to England, in defiance of a deportation order sending him to the United States, says the Daily Sketch.

The paper adds that the only explanation of his motive for returning here is his own statement that he came to recover a debt of 10 pounds. He is said to have travelled by way of Paris and Antwerp, landing in England at Harwich.

Thurber is declared to have left his home in the United States when 14 years of age to join the Canadian army. It was apparently while serving with the Canadian forces that he got into trouble under circumstances causing suspicion that he was acting as a spy and resulting in his deportation.

The United States officials here who have been handling the case are very secretive, as are the Scotland yard authorities.

London first learned of Thurber's confession in despatches from New York last night.

But the woman held her ground. "I'm sure, if you will help me, that I can find some less expensive fixtures that will be entirely appropriate and with which I can live just as happily, without running up a bigger bill than we have planned," she said.

But from then on the salesman lost all interest in the sale. He answered perfunctorily, when she asked prices yawned occasionally, and tapped his order book impatiently with his pencil. Once when she asked the price of a little ivory and gold candle fixture, he said: "I'm sure you wouldn't consider that, it costs 50 cents more than the one you were looking at."

When HIS WIFE Shops! I longer to box his ears! I wondered if he were married and if, when his wife goes shopping he is pleased to have her make the most elaborate and showiest purchases regardless of price.

I fell to chatting with the woman a little later as she sat near me waiting for her husband. "My sister is building a lovely new 15 room house," she said, "and I am going to tell her how unaccommodating these people are and advise her to go to X's." (a rival concern).

So you see, taking care of this plucky little woman's pennies would have brought many dollars to the firm in the wealthy sister's patronage. No, I didn't think the salesman who

plays the snob is the most successful in the long run.

### Spectrum's Green Line

Mystery of "Northern Lights" Reported Solved by Professor.

Professor Vigaro, the Norwegian scientist, has, according to the Affenpost, made an important discovery regarding the phenomenon known as the Aurora Borealis, or Northern Lights. Rejecting the theory that the upper air strata consists of immensely light gases, he maintains that the temperature of the high air strata is so low that nitrogen vapour becomes solidified in crystal form.

These nitrogen crystals, he says, account for the hitherto inexplicable green line in the spectrum of the Northern lights.

### Cancer Must be Treated

NOT NEGLECTED.

NEW YORK, March 8.—That the best course to take when attacked by cancer is to make intelligent use of every help which science and experience show to be of value rather than reply upon secret, proprietary, and sensational cures is the announcement made by the American Society for the Control of Cancer following a conference of experts in this disease held under the auspices of the Society at its annual meeting just concluded in New York City.

In making the above announcement Dr. George A. Soper, Managing Director of the Society said, "The most helpful fact thus far established in the organized fight which is being waged against the cancer menace is that many cases of this disease can be cured and some prevented through intelligent co-operation between qualified physicians and those persons who think they may have cancer."

"The Society recommends," said Dr. Soper, "that all persons who think they have cancer go to a competent physician and receive such treatment as he advises." The form of treatment will necessarily depend, he continued, "upon the kind of cancer; its location; stage of development and other factors." Surgery and radiation by radium or X-rays are valuable methods of dealing with cancer cases but, cautioned Dr. Soper, "radiation should be regarded as a tool which, in the hands of skilful persons may accomplish good results, but when administered by those who are not thoroughly familiar with it, may aggravate the disease."

At a time when the public is becoming alarmed by the reports of the increasing prevalence and mortality from cancer; and when public anxiety with respect to this disease is being capitalized as never before by quacks and charlatans, it is timely to have this latest pronouncement with respect to the cancer problem from this organization of physicians and scientists especially formed to study this disease and to make known to the public the facts as discovered.

### Safety-First Bottle

Device to Prevent Poison Being Drunk by Mistake in the Dark.

A neat little device to prevent the picking up of a bottle containing poison in mistake for any other is the invention of Mr. J. A. Ferguson and Mr. W. J. Richardson of Bromley, Kent, England. It consists of a recessed metal cap on

a spring which fits round the neck of the bottle.

The cork cannot be removed until this cap is pressed down, and it immediately springs up again when the pressure is slackened.

Chemists are enthusiastic over the device, as it will remove any possibility of a fatal result from a patient picking up the wrong bottle at night. It will cost only 6d.

### Wanted: Young Men in Politics

We rely too much on middle-aged experts. In all departments of human endeavour, the younger generation is always knocking at the door; Mr. Baldwin said a wise thing the other day when he exhorted the Conservative Party agents to answer the knock and open the door and make it a welcome, or even to go out and knock for youth, and compel it to come in.

The cause, he maintained, can, at the juncture, be carried even more effectively by young men with brains than by middle-aged men with money bags.

He was right; and it is not to the conservative cause only that his sentiments are applicable.

It is just as important to the Liberal cause and to the Labour cause that youth should be given its opportunity.

And that for a sound reason which is too frequently overlooked. Not because young men are, as a rule, wiser than old men, or because liberalism is a perfect substitute for experience; but because government administration are skilled trades and need to be mastered before they can be properly practised.

Our ancestors recognized that fact and acted on it.

The elder statesmen among them were always to look out for recruits among the brilliant young men of the universities who could be brought early into the House of Commons and prepared by long parliamentary training to step up into the ranks of elder statesmen in their turn.

"Professional Politicians."

It was one of the few advantages of the old "pocket borough" system that this could easily be done; and it is a sad fact that the men who have achieved the highest eminence in political life in England have nearly always been men for whom seats have been found and to whom office has been given in the early morning of their careers.

Walpole, Pitt, Canning, Peel, Macaulay, Gladstone—these are a few of the names which one instinctively thinks of in this connection.

Not one of these men had to wait for admission to Parliament until he had made a fortune and a reputation outside its walls. All of them were "chanced" by seniors who had confidence in their talents, when they were really little more than boys.

They might all, in truth, be described as "professional politicians"; and though that expression is often used derisively, its proper meaning is a perfectly honourable one.

If by a "professional politician" we mean a man who is in politics for what he can make, then the fewer professional politicians we have the better for the country.

But if we mean a man who makes politics the one serious occupation of his life, who serves his apprenticeship before following his trade, and studies the art of government as diligently as the barrister studies law or the doctor medicine, then the election of such men to Parliament is an inestimable advantage—a guarantee of the continuity of our progress and a safeguard against the wild-cat schemes of amateur faddists.

Let us hope, therefore, that Mr. Baldwin's appeal will be heard by those to whom it is addressed.—Daily Mirror.

### British Unemployed AND THE END OF STIKES.

The number of unemployed persons on the registers of the British Government's employment exchanges, who were claiming unemployment benefits in January, was 1,184,246, according to statistics received by the Bankers Trust Company of New York from its English Information Service. Of this number 919,599 were men, 235,027 women, and 32,710 juveniles.

National work has been instituted for the purpose of giving employment and it is estimated that possibly some 300,000 will be employed directly and 100,000 indirectly upon such national works.

On the other hand, the approximate number of working days lost by trade disputes in Great Britain and northern Ireland in 1923, was 10,640,000. The number of working people involved in these disputes was approximately 400,000.

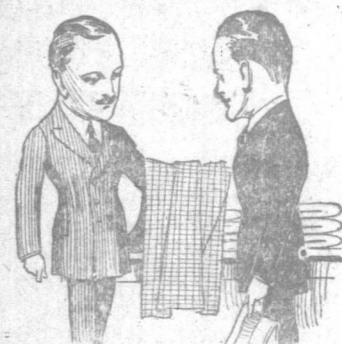

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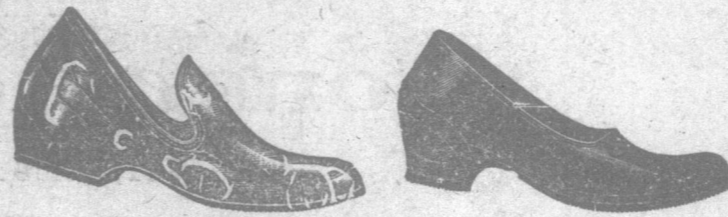
