LONDON, April 24—In the House of Commons last night, Mr W. Hunt, Chancellor of the Exchequer, submitted the annual budget. The revenue for the last fiscal year, which dad been estimated at £70,000,000 sterling, eyielded a total of £98,500,000 stg. The real expansion of the revenue amounted to nearly £900,000 stg. Expenditure of hat year, ex The revenue for the last fiscal year, which is ad been estimated at £70,000,000 sterling, yielded a total of £89,000,000 st. The real expansion of the revenue amounted to nearly £800,000 st. Expenditure of last year, estimated at £71,850,000, fell £50,000 short of that amount. The surplus of receipts over expenditure during the coming fiscal year, is estimated by the Minister at £290,000 st. £50,000,000 of this amount a balance of £3,000,000. Of this amount a balance of £3,000,000 is be met during the ensuing year, as follows:—First, by the addition of 2d. to the rate of the income Tax, which will realize nearly £2,000,000; secondly, by the issue of £xchequer Bills to the amount of £1,000,000; and thirdly, by the application of the estimated surplus of £900,000. Thus the minister estimates that he will have £700,000 or £800,000 more than he needs to meet the expense of the war.

In the House of Lords, the bill for the abolition of the Church Rates, which passed the House of Commons before Laster holidays, came up for consideration. Lord Derby, who was able to be present, spoke against the bill. The Archishops of Canterbury and York and the Bishop of London opposed the bill, but approved of its passage to a second reading. The speakers all concurred in the opinion that the present tendency of politics was toward the disestablishment of the Church. A motion was made to refer the bill to a select committee, but after a long debate the motion was made to refer the bill read a second time.

They are obliged to make affidavit that the requisite number of years has passed over them, that they have no other free grant of land, that they believe that for which they now make application is fit for settlement and cultivation, and not chiefly valuable for mines, minerals or pine timber, that they desire the location for actmal settlement, and not for the use or benefit directly or indirectly of any other person, nor for the purpose of obtaining the pine trees, or of obtaining gold, silver, copper, lead, iron or other minerals, or quarry of stone, marble or gypsum. Having sworn to all that the locatee must perform settlement duties for five years. He must reside upon the place for that time, clear and put under cultivation two acres every year, and fifteen acres during the five years. During that time I e must build a house 20 by 16 feet. The locatee is allowed a month to get on his lot after it is located, and may be absent six months in any year without forfeiting his residence. If he fails in his performance of the settlement duties, all claim to the lot ceases. The pine trees and all the mines ing gold, silver, copper, lead, iron or

ment duties, all claim to the lot ceases. The pine trees and all the mines and minerals upon the lots are reserved to the Government, except that the locatee may cut such trees as may be required for fencing, building, and fuel, and may also cut and sell all pine trees that require to be removed in the process of clearing—though in the latter case the trees shall be subject to the timber dues pay able by lumbermen. After the patent issues all the trees become the property of the patentee.

On the death of the locatee his right and interest shall be vested in his widow if he leave one during he widowhood, though she may elect to have her dower in the land instead. widowhood, though she may elect to have her dower in the land instead. Neither the locatee nor any one claiming under a locatee, can alleniate the land or any interest in it, except by will until the patent is issued. After the issue of the patent, no alienation or mortgage shall be valid for twenty years or within the life-time of the locatee, unless by deed, and unless she be one of the granters and execute the deed in the manner required when married women convey their real estate. No land located under the Free Grant law, is to be liable to debt during twenty years after the data of the location, except the debt is secured by a valid mortgage, but this exemption is not to interfere with the collection of taxes.

The foregoing is a summary of the Free Grant law, and although it may have given unbounded satisfaction to the framers of it, its effect upon the country, which expected something much more generous, was very different. 


