In All Classes, the Exhibit Is Unbeat In America. The live stock at the Industrial this yes surpasses all exhibits of previous years and has probably never been besten in America. The cattle exhibit is of about the sam dimensions as last year and is superior in quality. There are large exhibits of Durhams, Aberdeen Angus, Jerseys and Holsteips and a considerable number of Ayreshires and Devone. The Holsteins are steadily increasing in numbers, and it is expected that they will for a few years yet. Canadian breeders have wrought much imprevement in this breed of cattle. Instead of the former slab-sided beasts, Holsteins are now well formed, handsome animals. Among fat cattle, too, the quality is better than it used to be. Instead of lumpy, clumsy beasts, Canadian fat cattle are now-well-formed, good-looking beasts and are quite as heavy as formerly.

The sheep exhibit is in the opinion of most sheepmen the greatest ever held in America. It is half as large again as it was last year, and the quality is of the very finest. Nearly all the English Royal winners in Canadiare on exhibition. The greatest increase is in Cotswolds.

The pig exhibit is about the same size as last year. The quality is on the whole better. Suffolks are increasing in numbers. There are not nearly so many Tamworths as during the last two years. The unfortunate husband himself is regarded as an unreasonable tax which the unjust custom of society imposes upon her purely commercial transaction. Observe the independent, aggressive, unruly creatures who are incessantly to be met with in society, and I way ou if these are the women whom Goethe referred to when he wrote:

"The woman soul leadeth us Upward and on."

"But the tendency of to-day, more especially amongst would-be fashionable women, is to be assertive, pretentious, and pachy dermatous. They claim equal rights with man, and insist upon retaining besides their former privileges. They accept our civility, not as a tribute, but as a positive duty, and seldom ever dream of acknowledging it with common courtesy. They sweep along the streets, and when you politely step aside to let them pass they utterly ignore your gallantry, and as often as not compel you to seek refuge in the gutter to avoid being trampled down in their triu

A Blast Against Tobacco. All observers agree that in our country many conditions conspire to make us a nervous people, to produce what has even been styled "American nervousness. This "nervousness," in other words, means a weakness, an instability, a vulnerability of the nervous system. Add to this the unquestionably strong quality of the tobacco which the taste of the American public exacts from the manufacturer, and it becomes plain that there exists two cogent reasons that we should be on our guard against the indiscriminate use of the article. French medical observers are of the opinion that one of the factors causing the depopulation of France is the excessive use of tobacco; for the offspring of inveterate tobacco-consumers are notoriously puny and stunted in stature, and lack the normal power of resistance, especially on the power of resistance, especially on the part of the nervous system; again, it is a significant fact that an astounding per centage of the candidates for admission to West Point, and other military schools, are rejected on account of tobacco-heart. Some persons labor under the delusion that tobacco-increases their working-power, that the persons labor under the delusion that tobacco increases their working-power, that the
flow of thought becomes easier, and that
without tobacco they are unable to do any
mental work. Instances are cited by them
of great men, inveterate and excessive
tobacco consumers. They do not consider
the possibility that these men accomplished
what they did in spite, but not in consequence of, or aided by, their habit.
Students of chronic nicotine intoxication
are convinced that the great men among
the tobacco slaves would have been still
greater had they never used the drng. Thus the tobacco slaves would have been still greater had they never used the drng. I have to declare that the heirs of James de Rothschild, when questioned as to the sum total insisted that the figures were exaggerated.

Eight hundred millions was not of course the 1,700,000,000 attributed to the defunct by the papers of the time. In the last 25 years the operations of the banking house of "Rothschild Freres" have probably augmented their capital at least 60 per cent. Nevertheless, the bulk of the money is now divided into five parts. In 30 years from now there must be fifteen wher subdivisions.
