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8000 REBELS ARRIVE IN RIO

Alleged cruelty of Peixoto's officers to the men-fight between the Niteroy and Angraquians will be a united attack.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—Further details from insurrection sources have been made public regarding the movements of Gen. Saravaya, who, as reported yesterday, was said to have arrived in Rio Janeiro bay with reinforcements of 8000 troops for the insurgents.

The case has already cost the prisoner and his father \$5000, and it is thought they have but little money left to fight the case over again.

The crown officers claim that the circumstances of the attempted murder at Louveira is so strong that a verdict of guilty is sure to be returned.

They also maintained that no jury, after learning that the prisoner had been acquitted on a murder charge, would convict him on the minor one.

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THE C.P.R. LAND SUBSIDY.

AUSTRIANS MAKING REQUIRES FOR CANADIAN GOODS.

Alignment of the Balance of the Land to Which the C.P.R. is Entitled Soon to Be Made—Trial shipment of Canadian Canned Goods to be to the Antipodes.

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 22.—President Van Horne, Solicitor General and Mr. T. of the Canadian Pacific Railway has an interview to-day with the Minister and Deputy Minister of the Interior on matters relating to the land subsidy of the company. It may be mentioned in this connection that since Mr. Daly took charge of the Department of the Interior he has applied himself with great vigor to the allotment of these lands and that out of about 184 millions of acres to which the company remained entitled, after part of its original grant of 25 million acres had been re-purchased by the Government, nearly 14 millions have been allotted and accepted by the company.

The conference to-day was to some extent a continuation of a conference held some weeks ago just prior to his departure for England, by Mr. Hamilton, land commissioner for the company, with officers of the Department of the Interior, and the various conferences are likely to result ere long in the allotment of another quantity of land.

Canadian Canned Goods for Australia.

When the Hon. Mackenzie Bowden visited Australia he took with him a quantity of information relating to Canadian trade, prices current, trade circulars, etc., which were judiciously distributed in the various parts of Australia he visited. The seed thus sown is already beginning to bear fruit in the way of correspondence between Australian dealers and Canadian manufacturers, and some orders for Canadian goods have been placed, while a number of Canadian manufacturers are preparing trial shipments for the Australian market.

Prof. Robertson and Fletcher of the Central Experimental Farm leave for Ingersoll to-day, where they will address the Dairyman's Association of Western Ontario, which commenced its annual session to-day.

BLAKE'S APPEAL FORSABAM.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—Hon. Edward Blake is causing sarcastic comment here. The Graphic says that from the annual balance sheet which the "American" has published, it is deduced that it costs \$2000 yearly to keep the McCarthys in Westminster. The Times says that Mr. Blake's appeal against the Standard is a similar manner to Mr. Blake's appeal.

REBOLUNGA AGAIN IN THE FIELD.

Reorganizing His Forces For a March On Bulawayo.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—A news agency in this city has a despatch from Cape Town stating that the latest advice from Bulawayo is to the effect that King Lobengula is organizing his forces along the Zambezi River. The despatch adds that many of the Matabele, who were scattered in many directions by the British, have returned to their chief, and that it is Lobengula's intention to reopen the conflict. It is said that he is already in the neighborhood of Bulawayo, and that he has determined to march upon Bulawayo, and that he has already occupied the British. The defenses at Bulawayo are not of sufficient strength to allow the British to hold the place against an attack by the Matabele in force.

PREMIER WHOSE FEELS BITTER.

At the manner in which English People have been treated.

CAPE TOWN, Jan. 22.—In addressing the volunteer troops at Bulawayo just before his departure, Premier Cecil Rhodes spoke bitterly of the manner in which the Cape had been violated by a large section of the English people at home.

RETURN OF THE SOFA EXPEDITION.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—A despatch from Freetown, Sierra Leone, states that the British expedition under command of Col. F. B. Eli which was sent against the Soias, returned to Freetown yesterday, the work of the expedition having been accomplished. The interior of the country is now quiet.

HE IS FRED. BACON OF AGINCOURT.

His sweetheart had married Agincourt and He Took His Life.

A Romance Which had its Beginning in Far-Off Norfolk, England, and culminated in the Waters of Lake Ontario—How The World's Enterprise Resulted in the Positive Identification of the Suicide.

The body which Johnnie and Joseph Price discovered on the shore of Lake Ontario, near the Swansboro Works, when en route to Sabbath school Sunday afternoon, was yesterday positively identified as that of Frederick Bacon, aged 23, farm laborer, who disappeared from Agincourt on Dec. 27 last.

The circumstances which came to light yesterday also served to show that the presence of the body where it was discovered was neither the result of accident or murder, but of deliberate suicide, due to unrequited love.

People who are inclined to sneer at disappointed love as a thing that is easily got over and that just requires to be left alone may possibly, after reading the romance in connection with the "hanging" of Fred Bacon, arrive at the conclusion that the distracting influence of love is not a matter to be lightly dismissed.

Where the Romance Had its Genesis.

Six years ago two families named Bacon and Thaxter resided in Norwich, England, and the almost under the shadow of the same roof. They were very intimate and the children attended school together.

MILITARY INSTITUTE. Annual Meeting and Election of Officers Last Evening.

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TORONTO JUNIOR COUNCIL. Want the Police Magistrate to Re-examine the Solicitor's Salary.

A meeting of the Toronto Junior Council was held in the council chamber last night, Mayor Bond in the chair. Present: Councillors Laughton, Harry Bond, Reid, Councillors Laughton, Blandall, Wagner, Hestiman and Boose.

An application was received from John Harrington for position of street commissioner. Referred.

In answer to a question by Councillor Laughton the mayor said it was not necessary to interfere with the pipes in West-end road.

A letter was received from the solicitor the special rate in which he gave the annual payments on present debentures, which is some \$1000 less than the \$2000. He cited the difficulty in consolidating the debenture debt on account of the number of parties who held the debentures. He recommended Messrs. Osler & Hammond as the brokers for the sale of debentures.

The recommendation of the Fire, Light and Police Committee that the salary of the fire chief be reduced to \$1000 was referred back to the committee.

The same committee also recommended that the question of reducing the salary of Mr. Ellis, police magistrate, be laid over to next meeting, which was done.

The salary of Mr. C. G. Giffin, water collector, was reduced from \$1000 to \$750.

The Toronto street water rates, as estimated by the Executive Committee, recommended that the services of Mr. F. Ellis as assistant superintendent of waterworks be dispensed with.

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YORK TOWNSHIP COUNCIL

The Toronto Aqueduct and Power Company Agains.

An adjourned meeting of the York Township Council was held in the township hall, Eglington, on Saturday afternoon, Nov. 16, 1923.

Applications were received from Mr. George C. Moore for the position of assessor, and from W. L. Bond, M.D., for Medical Health Officer.

The communication from the Toronto Aqueduct and Power Company submitting a draft of an agreement and requesting the council to pass a by-law granting the company the privilege to supply the township with heat, light, water, power, etc., was received.

The Irresponsible E. A. Macdonald addressed the council, saying that as the legislature would meet next month, he would like the council to pass a by-law to the effect that the council should refer to the Solicitor and County Engineer for their consideration.

Mr. Ingham, who was present, addressed the council and said that he would like to see the township take action in this matter. He would like to know what the township would do if it were to grant the company the privilege to supply the township with heat, light, water, power, etc.

The wind was taken out of the promoter's sails when Mr. Leonard and Mr. Ingham, seconded, that the petition be laid over for future consideration.

E. A. then withdrew his petition and made himself scarce.

Petitions were received praying for the appointment of John L. Francis as assessor, Mr. Fitzgerald as sanitary inspector, John T. Brown as health inspector, James Moffatt for road commissioner for division No. 7, from the Riverview Park Volunteer Fire Co. asking for a grant of \$1000 for purchasing new appliances, all of which were laid over until next meeting.
