Liverpool, Dec. 19.—The Liverpool Post says that when Mr. Hartley's letter in regard to Great Britain's position in Venezuela reached Lord Salisbury last August, the Premier saw the gravity of the situation. His first idea was to obtain the withdrawal of the letter by the American Secretary, but he did not make a formal request for its withdrawal, finding that it would be fruitless. "God Forbid That There Should be War." London, Dec. 19.—General Lord Wolsey, Commander-in-Chief of the British forces, in the course of an address to the inmates of the Soldiers' Home at Norwich to-day, mentioned the difference between the United States and Great Britain over the Venezuela question, and exclaimed: "God forbid that there should be war." Crespo said he was pre- paring a personal letter of thanks to President Cleveland. He added: "The attitude of Venezuela and of her ex- ecutive head upon the boundary ques- tion in Guiana will always be one of self-protection. The Republic will up- hold rights that properly may be re- garded as hers at all hazards."
