38 Miners Killed in North Carolina. Raleigh, N.C., Dec. 19.—There was an explosion of gas in the Cunnock bituminous coal mine in Chatham county, forty miles from here, this morning.

Advices at 6 o'clock this evening state that 43 persons were caught by the explosion, and that all hope of rescue was abandoned, owing to fire damp, which several times nearly overcame those who attempted to rescue the imprisoned men. Once two of the rescuers were in sight of some of the victims, but had to retire in the face of overpowering fire damp. A telegram received here at 7 o'clock says there are 38 dead.
