The strike in the Carnegie works at Homestead, Pennsylvania, will attract world wide attention, as it is likely to prove one of the most bitter contests of recent years between labor and capital. The managers enraged the workmen by making elaborate preparations to defend the works by armed force and by throwing upon them scalding hot water through hose. An army of 4,600 armed strikers was then organized at Homestead, who have surrounded the town in order to prevent mill operatives from coming in to take the place of the strikers. 200 Pinkerton detectives were gathered at Pittsburg and sent up the Monongahela fiver to Homestead to protect the works. The strikers drove them back by the use of cannon and small arms with considerable loss of life on both sides.

About dusk the officers of the amalgamated association prevailed upon the strikers to allow the detectives to surrender. The detectives hoisted a white flag and the strikers guaranteed safe conduct to the

The detectives observed a white flag and the strikers guaranteed safe couduct to the detectives provided they left their arms and ammunition behind and agreed to leave the place under guard. The detectives accepted their terms. On the boats were found seven dead detectives and twenty or thirty wounded, some fatally. As the prisoners were being conducted through the streets the infuriated strikers beat them with clubs, knocked down and tramped detectives were fatally injured. The captured detectives were fatally injured. The captured detectives were finally lodged in the Opera House where they were kept over night. The strikers looted the barges, then set fire to them. As far as could be ascertained at midnight nine workmen and 18 detectives were killed. Besides the detectives injured in battle at least 100 were seriously injured on the way to jail.
