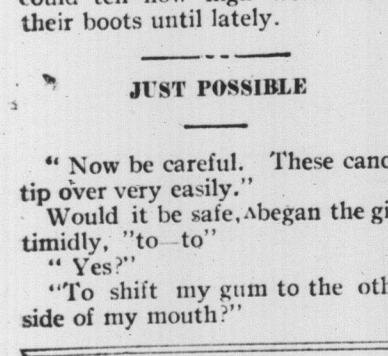
**WOMEN'S HIGH BOOTS**

 And whereas the present Forestry Tax levied upon forest lands of one quarter of one cent per acre is entirely inadequate to defray the cost of an efficient patrol.

And whereas forest lands under 500 acres are now exempt from said Forest Tax.  
 Therefore resolved that the Clerk of the Municipality be instructed to memorialize the Government of Nova Scotia asking that the existing Act be amended making the tax on wild or forest lands one half cent per acre.  
 And that all areas of 200 and upwards be made liable for such tax.  
 Ordered that Dr. Armstrong be County Medical Health Officer for ensuing year with a salary of \$100.

 Ordered that the report of the Committee on Tenders and Public Property be received and adopted.  
 The report of the Committee on Insane was read and on motion received and adopted. The report of the Finance Committee was read and on motion received and adopted.  
 Ordered that the lists of Ward Officers as handed to the Clerk be the Ward Officers for the present year.  
 Ordered that L. V. Shaw be registrar of car marks for the township of Clements in place of W. V. Vroom.  
 Council adjourned sine die.

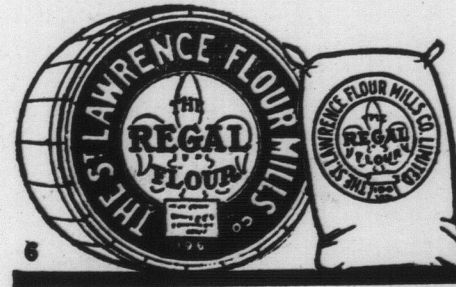

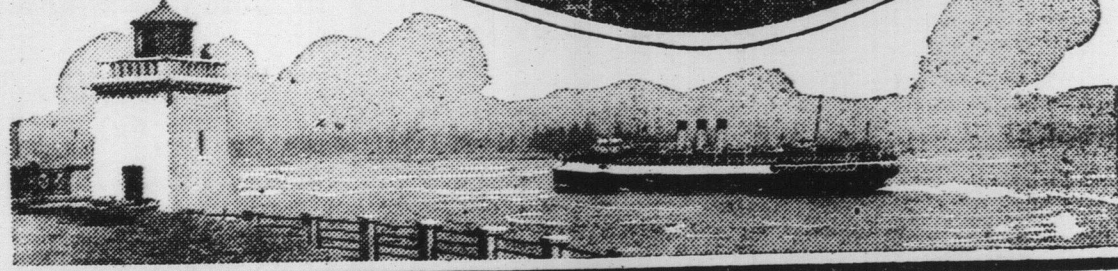

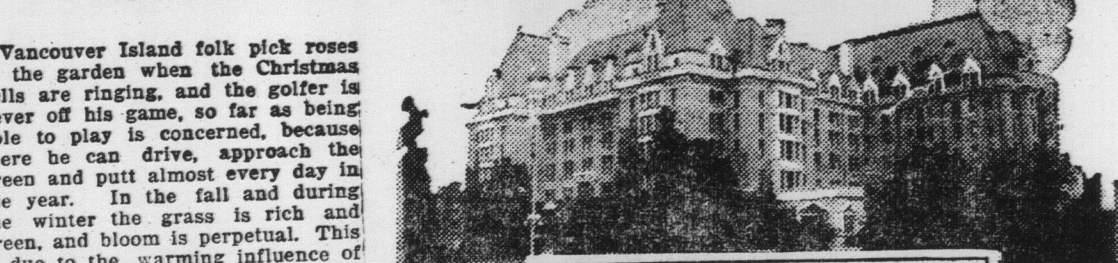

Vancouver Island folk pick roses in the garden when the Christmas bells are ringing, and the golfer is never off his game, so far as being able to play is concerned, because there he can drive, approach the green and putt almost every day in the year. In the fall and during the winter the grass is rich and green, and bloom is perpetual. This is due to the warming influence of the Japan current, which is the Gulf Stream of the Pacific Ocean. Vancouver Island was named after Captain George Vancouver, of the British Navy, who discovered it in 1792, and has an estimated area of 15,000 square miles. Its trees, among them the stately Douglas fir, which towers 300 feet above the roads over which the traveller glides by automobile, or by the Esquimalt & Nanaimo Railway, which runs northward through half the length of the island, are magnificent beyond description, some of them beyond 6 or 7 feet in diameter. Along the road are many comfortable hotels and country chalets, many of them like the Inns one finds on English country roads. Victoria, the capital of British Columbia, is a city of rare charm with its beautiful drives, its golf courses, its Chinese quarter, its turbaned Hindoos, its Empress Hotel and its beautiful Capitol buildings. Every year at least 5,000 American golfers visit one course in Victoria, the Victoria Golf Club course and thousands of automobiles leave Seattle annually for Victoria and Vancouver. There is splendid inland and deep sea fishing in and on the coast of Vancouver Island, and the ambitious fisherman who really wanted to do something sensational has even gone out on the west coast waters of the Pacific and caught a real whale for breakfast. Needless to say, he did not have it served on toast.

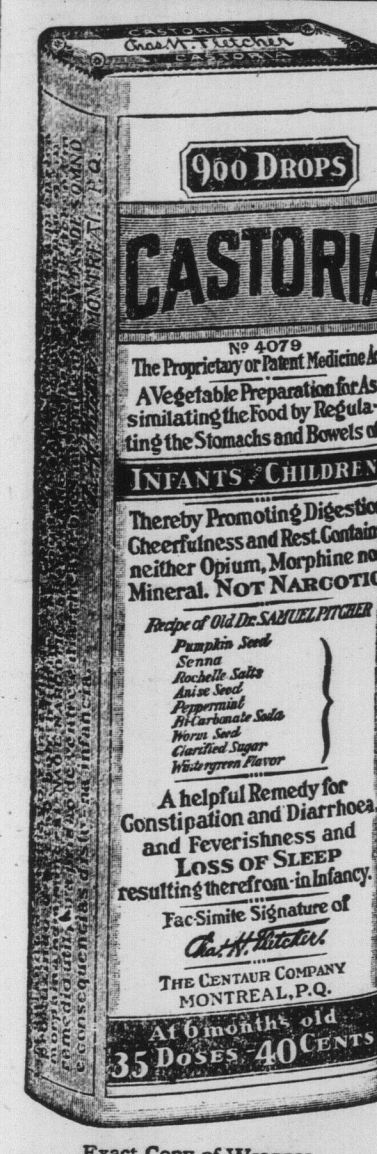

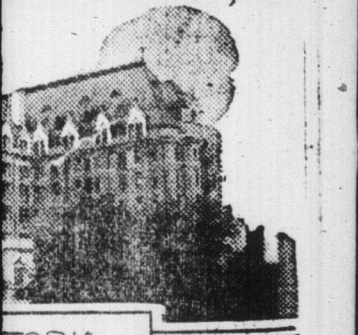

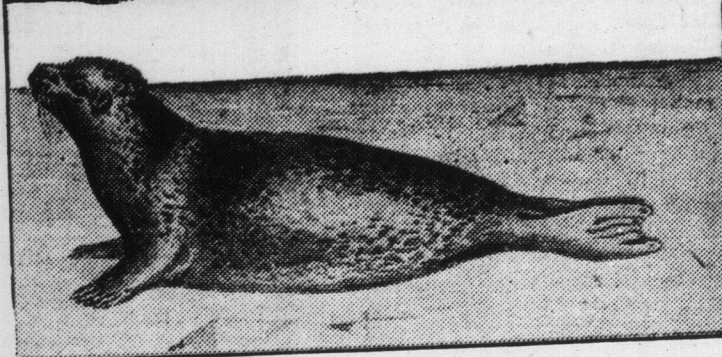

the shores of Labrador. In the year 1919, Newfoundland's share of the seal fishery accounted for \$1,293,000. The industry on the island accounts for the employment of 1,845 men and numerous vessels take part in the often hazardous undertaking.

carries five men besides the pilot and mechanic, descends to the ice where the animals are despatched by bullets from pump guns. The skins are then packed in bundles about the base of poles to which a flag is attached. This kind of hunting continues to the end of the season when the ice breaks up, the hunters proceeding from place to place transported by plane as new berds are seen.

Close upon the announcement of the projected activities of these aviators there arrived in St. John's two "blimps" or war airplanes, a present to Newfoundland from the Imperial Government. These it is intended to use in the seal fisheries in the same manner, the cost of operation, estimated at \$50,000, being borne jointly by the Newfoundland Government and the owners of the sealing vessels assisted in their catch.

The hair seal is valued partly for its hide, which is used in making various kinds of leather, for oil which is extracted from the carcass, and on the Pacific Coast, for use in the manufacture of fertilizer. The hair seal is a particularly valuable animal at the present time, his hide selling for as high as \$175. A recent development in the seal industry is the utilization of the skins of old seals, which considerably enhances the value of the seal catch to any country.

Of late years the seal catch of Newfoundland has fallen off somewhat due to the heavy toll and indiscriminate killing which is now regularized by legislation. The 1908 catch, for instance, numbered 213,843 seals and that of the following year 269,320 animals. A single vessel has been known to bring in to St. John's a catch of 42,000 and a total of nearly

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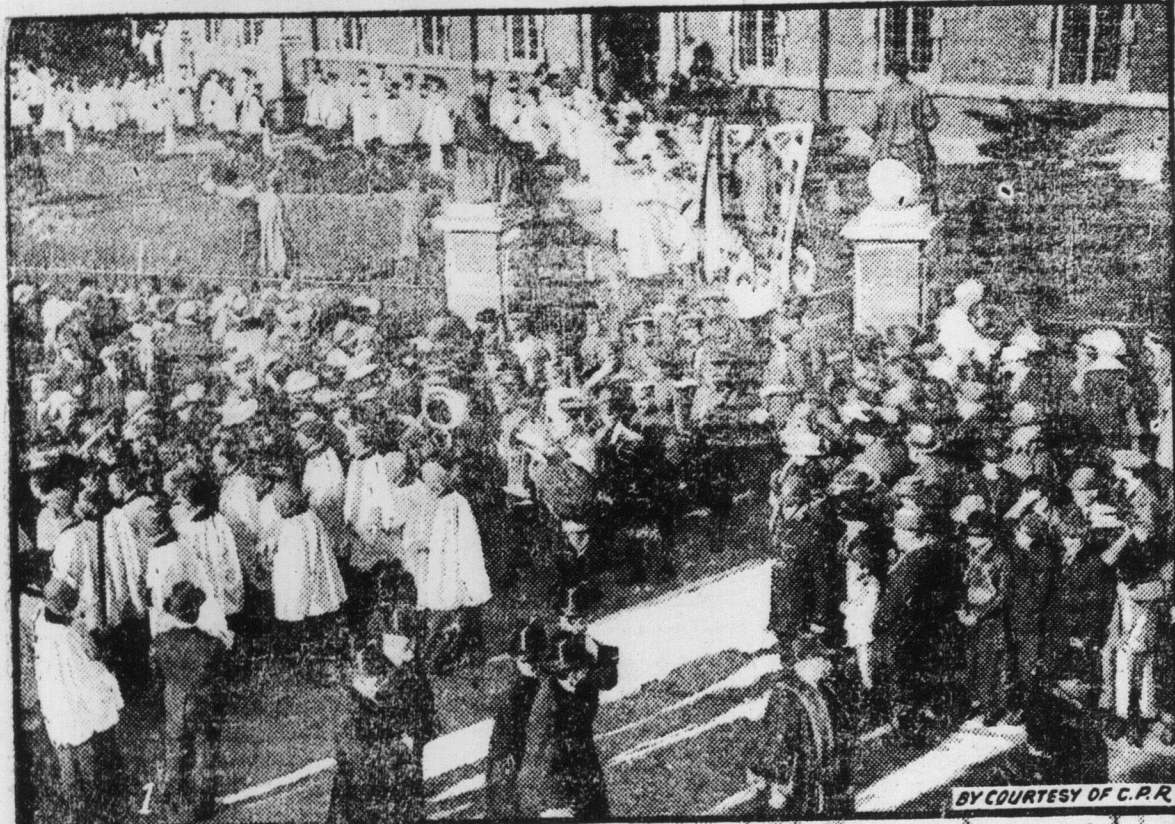
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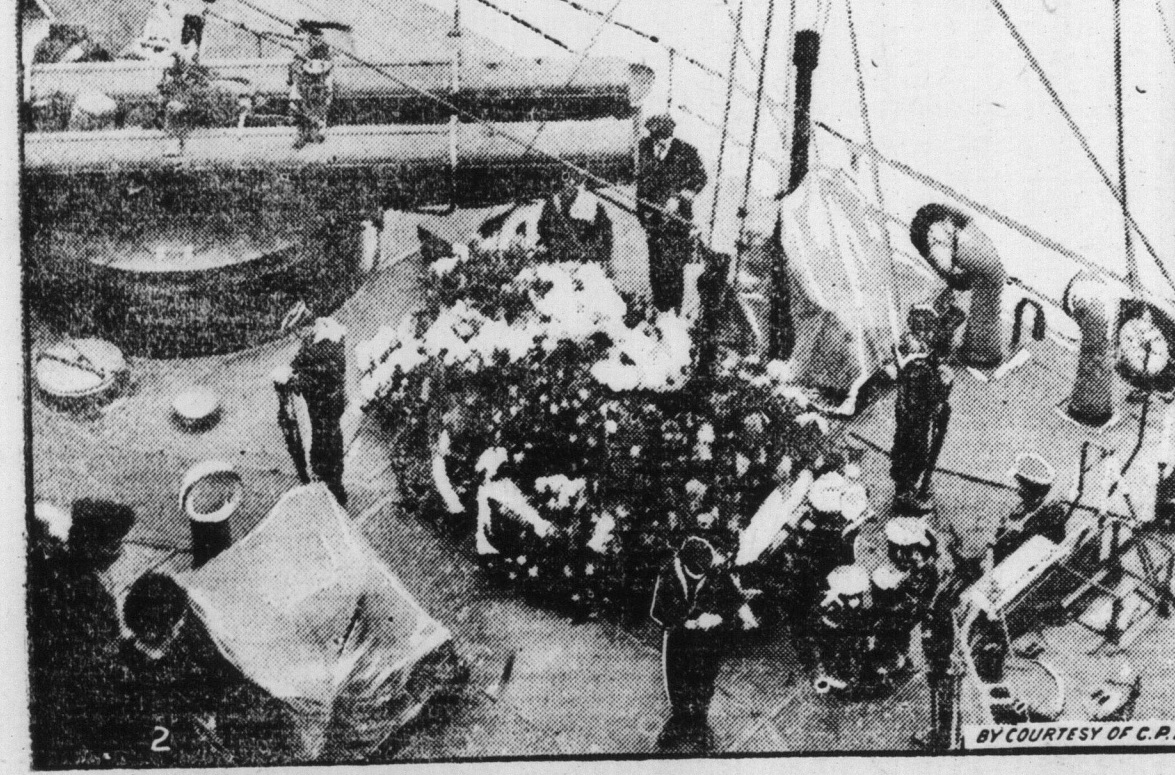
