





chan, With the R.N.W.M.P. Lieut.-Col. and Hon. Col. S. B. Steele, C.B., M.V.O., has been selected by His Excellency the Governor-General for the position of Honorary Aide-de-Camp, made vacant by the death of Brigadier-General Buchan. As the title itself implies, the appoint-ment of Honorary Aide-de-Camp is entirely an honorary one, the only duties attaching to it being to attend His Excellency at state functions, such as the opening of Parliament, state dinners, etc. But it is one of the very few honors which the Governor-General has the privilege of personally conferring without consulting anybody, and as such it is very highly regarded in the force, although there have been some absurdly incampships in years gone by. There will certainly be no grumbling over the last appointment, for there is no more popular soldier in Canada today than Col. Steele. Most Canadians consider Col. Steele as a contribution of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police to the Canadian Militia.
