ITALY TO HARVEST GREAT WHEAT CROP

Yield More Than Twenty-Nine Million Bushels Above Last Year's.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—Italy will harvest 29,396,000 bushels more of wheat this year than in 1914, according to a forecast of crop conditions cabled the department of agriculture today by the International Institute of Agriculture, in Rome. Italy's wheat yield is estimated at 302,098,000 bushels for 1915, as against 172,997,000 bushels in 1914.

SHIPMENTS TO HOLLAND WILL BE RESTRICTED

Britain Takes Measure to Tighten Strangle-Hold on Germany.

NOT ENTIRE EMBARGO

Exports Consigned to Netherlands Overseas Trust Are Alone Permitted.

LONDON, June 22.—An order in council is about to be issued prohibiting the exportation of all goods to Holland except those consigned to the Netherlands Overseas Trust. This is expected to stop the trade now believed to be passing thru Holland into Germany.

Announcement to this effect was made in the house of commons today by Capt. E. G. Prettiman, parliamentary under secretary to the board of trade.
