

### MINUTES

OF THE

# BRITISH COLUMBIA CONFERENCE

HELD IN THE CITY OF VICTORIA, B.C., MAY 11TH TO 17TH, 1887.

THE FIRST SESSION of the BRITISH COLUMBIA CONFERENCE was opened in Wesley Church, Victoria, on Wednesday, May 11th, 1887, at 10 a.m., with devotional exercises.

The Rev. Dr. WILLIAMS, General Superintendent, occupied the chair.

The Rev. J. Hall was elected Secretary pro. tem., after which the roll was called, and 12 ministers responded to their names, and the names of the lay representatives from the several Districts were taken, viz.:—

### REPORT OF THE CONTINGENT FUND COMMITTEE.

### III. Sources of Income.

The sources of income shall be:

1. Collections to be taken up in all the congregations on all Circuits and Missions.

2. The public collections taken up at each Annual Conference.

### IV. COMMITTEE.

A committee shall be elected, to consist of seven ministers and seven laymen, who shall be the Contingent Fund Committee for the Conference. It shall be the duty of this committee to consider all claims properly presented to it, and appropriate all the funds placed at its disposal to their proper objects as directed by the Conference.

Your Committee respectfully submit the following for your consideration :-

1. That as the future of Methodism in this country must largely depend upon the rising generation, efforts should be put forth for the establishment and sustenance of Sabbath-schools at every appointment of our

Connexion throughout the Province.

2. That with a view of assisting and developing weak Sunday-schools in the outlying parts of the country, this Conference make provision for an organization to be called the British Columbia Conference Sabbath School Association, to be arranged by the President of the Conference, with its head-quarters at Victoria, and with branches situated in different parts of the Conference, and co-operating as far as possible with local The objects of the Association shall be the planting of new schools where none are existing, the invigorating of weak schools in outlying neighborhoods, and the improvement of methods of Sabbath-school instruction by the wider circulation of our Sabbath-school literature, the holding of Sabbath-school Institutes, and employment of voluntary lay agency from among our most efficient Sabbath-school workers.

3. Your Committee also recommend that a Convention be held in connection with the Financial District Meeting, in each District, to discuss questions in relation to Sabbath-school work, in accordance with the pro-

isions of the Discipline.

4. That the last Sunday in each year be devoted to a temperance lesson, and that more attention be given to the securing of names of all children in our schools to a Total Abstinence Pledge-pledging themselves as well to abstain from profane language, the use of tobacco, and reading bad books; and that a book for the purpose be kept in every school.

5. Your Committee regret that apparently so little attention is being paid to the study of the Catechism, and would respectfully recommend that every minister and superintendent be requested to observe that the Catechism is taught, and the children examined regarding their knowledge

of the same, at regular intervals.

6. We would further advise that at least once a quarter every minister should address the children and parents on Sabbath schools and their relation thereto; and

7. That all our schools use the helps and periodicals provided by our

own Book Room.

8. With a view to the better observance of the Sabbath Day, we would advise that on the first Sunday of every month for the current Conference year the Fourth Commandment be repeated by the whole school simultaneously, and words of explanation be given by the superintendent or minister.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

1. Your Committee beg to report that we consider the observance of the Christian Sabbath to be binding upon all men by the command of God, as necessary to man's physical, mental and moral well-being, and as conserving the interests of society.

2. The fact that on this subject the people of British Columbia are in sentiment and practice far below the people of all the other Provinces of

the Dominion is to us as painful as it is deplorable.

3. The extent of Sabbath desceration in this Province calls for the prayerful attention of members of this Conference, and such a deliverance on the subject as becomes a body of Christian ministers and laymen charged with the moral and religious interests of the Methodist Church and its adherents.

4. The Sabbath we regard as a sacred heritage which should be guarded with vigilance, that all encroachments upon its sanctity should be reprobated, and that strenuous endeavors should be made to create a public sentiment favorable to the Christian observance of this holy day.

5. That the systematic desceration of the Sabbath by railway and steamboat companies, by which a large number of their employees are deprived of the privileges of rest and worship which this day was intended to secure to them, and the loss of which must entail both physical and moral harm, calls for action on the part of all Christian people to secure for all classes of our fellow-citizens the right of cessation from labor, that the privileges of the Sabbath may be enjoyed by them.

6. We urge upon all our people to oppose all forms of Sabbath excursions, as being in contravention of the law of God and detrimental to the sanctity of the day, as also all parties of pleasure and social visiting. In our judgmentt, he desceration of the Sabbath is ruinous to the Christian character of our country and our homes, dishonors God and depraves man. It is ruinous to our young people, and tends to profligacy and vice.

7. We recommend the Conference to appoint a committee that shall co-operate with similar committees appointed by other Churches, to secure from the Legislature of this Province such legislation as may be necessary to secure the proper observance of the Sabbath in British Columbia.

To the ladies your Committee believe that humanity is justified in looking for a yet larger measure of assistance in removing the blighting curse of intoxicants from our midst.

Your Committee yet further rejoice in noting the fact that the principal journals in this Province are now willing to assist in educating the public mind with respect to the necessity for the total prohibition of the liquor traffic, and they hail this assistance with no small degree of satisfaction.

We are gratified, too, in the great ar' steady advancement made by the various temperance organizations within the past year, and from the present prospect trust that by the united efforts of pulpit, press and platform, the time is not far distant when the people will rise in their majesty and might and declare with one voice that this terrible curse of humanity shall be banished from our midst.

It is with feelings of profound sadness and amazement that we view the multilation of the Municipal Act by the Legislative Assembly—the trampling under foot the rights of the people for the purpose of permitting liquor saloons to be forced upon them against the will of a majority of the electors. We most earnestly hope that the intelligent electors of British Columbia will not long submit to such despotic and degrading action. Your Committee are deeply convinced of the great need there exists for the further education of the public conscience on the temperance question, and would recommend—

1. That all our ministers be instructed to preach, at least once a year, a special sermon on this theme.

2. That the regular weekly prayer-meeting be made a temperance prayer-meeting ut least once a quarter.

3. That a temperance society be formed, if possible, at each appointment on all our Circuits and Missions, and that the children in our Sunday-schools be encouraged to take the pledge of total abstinence.

4. That unfermented wine only be used in all our churches at the

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

5. That our people should be urged to work and pray and vote, till we gain the entire prohibition of the liquor traffic, and our fair young Province be freed from the curse that has so long, and with such deadly effect, rested upon us.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

In reviewing the present state of our work within the bounds of the British Columbia Conference, and tracing it from its small beginnings, your Committee see abundant reason to thank God and take courage.

It was only 28 years ago the 11th of February last that the first missionaries of the Methodist Church landed in British Columbia, and now, behold, we have become four bands or Districts. The progress made has sometimes been slow, trying the faith, patience and courage of those who sowed much and reaped little. But by the good hand of our God upon us better days have dawned and we have been brought into a comparatively large and wealthy place. As the department of statistics is committed to a separate committee, we will not enter into that; but briefly say that we find in every branch of our Church's work progress and expansion. Your Committee learn with gladness that during the past year blessed revivals of religion have been vouchsafed, both among the whites and Indians, and during the same period a number of Chinese have given evidence of conversion to God, while a much larger number have been brought under religious instruction, which it is hoped may soon produce abundant fruit in their salvation. Numerous cases of conversion have occurred in connection with our Sunday-schools, which we regard as being a most hopeful indication.

Your Committee believe that a fresh impetus will be given to the work of Methodism in this Province by its organization as a separate Annual Conference, and its subdivision into a larger number of Districts, as these measures will greatly facilitate a more thorough supervision of the work, and convenient co-operation in aggressive efforts. Your Committee would express the earnest hope that additional laborers may be secured for white, Indian and Chinese departments—laborers wholly devoted to their work, and filled with the Holy Ghost, as the fields in many places are already white unto the harvest.

A Committee shall be appointed by the Conference, consisting of an equal number of ministers and laymen, whose duty it shall be to make the necessary appropriations to ministers and preachers upon an equitable basis, so far as the funds will permit, after the peculiar and special circumstances of each case have been duly considered.

### COMMUNICATION FROM THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE METHODIST CHURCH.

To the Members of the British Columbia Conference, Assembled in Victoria, 1887:

At this your first session as a Conference, the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church comes before you soliciting your advice

and co-operation in the carrying on of its work.

As entrusted with funds for the extension and support of the Gospel, especially among heathen women and children, we are exceedingly anxious to do it in the most efficient and economical way; and realizing that you who are on the ground, and acquainted with its various sections, can best tell what are the most pressing needs and where our organization can best work for the accomplishment of our common aim, we thought it well to appeal to you.

As you are aware, we have since our formation assisted in the support of the Crosby Home, which appeals for still further help. We have been asked to contribute to the Naas River Mission, and lately an urgent call

has come on behalf of the Chinese girls in Victoria.

We hope that a portion of your time will be given to a consideration of these claims, and that we may have the benefit of your counsel.

If we cannot accede to all you may advise it will not be from any want of respect or appreciation. Our income is not unlimited, and other very heavy responsibilities rest upon us. Our aim is to advance the interests of the Kingdom as far as we can, and as each Conference must be especially familiar with the missions under its own care, its advice must be the most valuable.

We think it not out of place to ask that auxiliaries be formed on every Circuit where at all feasible. May we not look for the eo-operation of the ministers in this matter Even during this session of Conference, Victoria might crown herself with this new organization-a Woman's Missionary Society.

# REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LETTER RECEIVED FROM THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

1. That a reply be sent to the President of the Woman's Missionary Society, expressing the views of the Conference in reference to the matters referred to in her letter.

2. That a letter be sent from the Conference to the Ladies of Victoria, requesting them to consider the advisability of organizing an Auxiliary of the Woman's Missionary Society in this city.

3. That a resolution be passed and published in our Minutes, express-

ing the will of the Conference in this matter.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Missions beg to report as follows:— We find that the following institutions are in existence—

### 1. THE CROSBY GIRLS' HOME.

This institution has nineteen girls and one boy—the eldest sixteen years and the youngest nine months.

It is maintained by a grant from the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church of \$400, and income from private subscriptions. The expenditure for the year has been: Matron's salary, \$400; for maintenance of eight girls, in excess of income from private subscriptions, \$300; leaving a deficit for the year now closing of about \$300, which was met by balance in hand from previous year.

This institution, since its commencement nine years ago, has given shelter to about 100 children for a longer or shorter period. A large proportion of the girls thus brought under civilizing and Christianizing influences have given good evidence of conversion to God, several of whom have died triumphant in the faith of Christ and the hope of heaven.

Quite a number have married Christian Indians, and their influence for good upon the other Indian women has been very marked. The present high degree of efficiency of the institution is largely due to the methodical, painstaking and persevering efforts of the present matron, Miss Knight, late of Halifax, Nova Scotia. We recommend this institution most heartily to the confidence and support of the Woman's Missionary Seciety and all Christian people.

### 2. NAAS RIVER ORPHANAGE FOR BOYS.

This institution was established by Rev. A. E. Green, seven years ago. About forty orphan boys have been cared for here for a longer or shorter period since its commencement. The inmates now number seven.

From private benefactions, Sunday-school contributions, and proceeds of a lecture, Bro. Green has received about \$450 towards its maintenance.

The boys are not only taught the ordinary branches of a common school education, and carefully instructed in religion, but εlso trained in industrial pursuits and provided with clothing.

This institution we also commend to the favorable consideration of the Woman's Missionary Society, and the liberal support of all Christian people. (Two of these boys have rendered effective assistance in our work

as interpreters during the past year.)

Resolved,—1. That the condition of the Indians of British Columbia, as it falls under the notice of our missionaries and other members of this Conference, is such that, in our judgment, the Dominion Government should be urged to establish Industrial Schools in this Province, where the children of the various tribes could be collected together and taught such branches of a useful education as would tend to their improvement and elevation.

2. That the representatives from this Conference to the General Board of Missions be requested to urge the importance of such institutions for our Indians upon the Board, and through them upon the Dominion Government, and the importance of taking immediate action in this regard.

3. Considering the length of time during which we have been engaged in mission work among the Indian tribes in British Columbia, the numerous agencies employed, the liberal expenditure by our Missionary Society in their maintenance, and the large number of Indians now under our watch, care, and instruction, many of whom are in pressing need of such an institution, we are of opinion that one or more of these institutions should be placed under the direction of the Methodist Church.

4. In our judgment the most suitable location for the establishment

of an Industrial School is the valley of the Lower Fraser.

5. We recommend that the Conference direct the Conference Special Committee to hold this matter in charge for any action that may be

required in the interim.

6. In the opinion of this Committee the establishment of a Home for Indian Girls of the Flat Head Tribes, under the management of a suitable matron, would supply a missing link in our missionary operations in the southern part of British Columbia, and we consider the mission premises at Chilhwake the most eligible location for such a Home. This matter we would commend most earnestly to the favorable consideration of the Woman's Missionary Society, hoping that they will see their way clear to establish such an institution at an early date.

7. Your Committee consider it highly desirable that the President of the Conference should, during the year, devote a considerable amount of attention to those localities where new missions may be opened, and to assist in bringing forward towards financial independence existing domestic missions; and would, through this Conference, urge upon the Missionary

Committee the advisability of making such provision as may be necessary for supplying his work at Vancouver during his absence.

### GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.

### TREASURER'S INTERIM REPORT.

Requested to be laid before the several Annual Conferences, and published for information in their Minutes.

Although this Fund has been in existence since the time of the formation of a General Conference in 1874, it has never had a written constitution.

The object of the Fund, as gathered from its history, and found in the Journals of the General Conferences and in the Discipline of the Church, is to pay the travelling expenses of delegates to and from the General Conference, and of representatives to other churches and bodies who are appointed by the General Conference; to meet the salaries and expenses of our General Superintendents, and of all General Conference committees that have no funds of their own; as also to pay the expenses of transfers in certain specified cases.

The different departments of the Church, up till the meeting of the last General Conference, paid one-half of the salaries and expenses of the General Superintendents, leaving only the other half to be paid by the Fund.

The income for this moiety was derived from collections taken up from year to year in the several Circuits and Missions in the entire Church, and yet that income has always been insufficient to meet the demands, and hence the Fund has always been in debt.

The present Treasurer was appointed at the last General Conference, and the whole amount necessary to meet all the above claims in full was thrown on the Fund, without aid from any department of the Church. Nearly all the collections for the year 1886 and 1887 had been paid to the former Treasurer, and yet at the close of the General Conference the Fund was in debt about \$5,000. The present indebtedness of the Fund is between \$6,000 and \$7,000, with large quarterly payments and other heavy special claims to be met as they arise.

The Finance Committee of the General Conference, seeing the very great responsibility involved and the large amounts to be raised, took the following action, viz. (Journal, p. 251): The estimated amount required during the quadrennium, less cash on hand, was \$30,000, or an average of \$7,500 per year. This amount was divided by them as follows: Toronto Conference, \$1,430; London, \$1,000; Niagara, \$1,000; Guelph, \$475; Bay of Quinte, \$875; Montreal, \$1,125; Nova Scotia, \$400; New Brunswick, etc., \$400; Newfoundland, \$125; and Manitoba, etc., \$310. These amounts will therefore be required annually, in the estimation of the Finance Committee, to meet the claims on the Fund. The amount paid by the several Annual Conferences last year up till the 1st of September was about \$5,200. Now the Discipline (see p. 50) directs the officers of the General Conference "to disburse only the amount on hand for General Conference expenses," etc. I understand from this clause that the Fund is not to go into debt beyond the quadrennium. As the matter is now carried on, the largest expenditure is incurred in the payment of General involving 1st.

General Conference expenses at the beginning of the quadrennium, thus involving heavy payments for interest. What is to be done? I suggest—

1st. That every Circuit and Mission should take up a large all-day Sabbath collection, and forward it immediately, through its proper officer, to the Treasurer. This will reduce the interest account.

2nd. Should there be any deficiency at the close of any year in the amount expected from any Conference, let prompt and energetic measures be adopted to meet such deficiency. It will be found easier to do this annually than to raise the whole amount at the end of the quadrennial term.

Our brethren throughout sentire Church will see that it will require united, vigorous and prompt action to save the Fund from financial embarrassment, and to enable it to pay in full the amounts needed successfully to earry on our work.

### SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Treasurer for the year ending July 31st, 1886, for publication in the Minutes of the Annual Conferences.

The full Balance Sheet, having been properly audited and accepted by the Board, is published in the Journal of the General Conference.

The Fund is divided into two accounts, the Capital and the Annual. The Capital Account is made up of legacies, domations, and other amounts given for the purpose  $\alpha$  investment, the interest only being used. This account amounted at the above date to \$167,956.23, less certain unproductive assets valued at \$8,355.14, and leaving as productive capital the sum of \$159,601.69, being nearly \$5,000 over the Capital Account of the previous year. This amount is invested in mortgages, debentures, and other reliable securities, and yields nearly 6 per cent. per annum.

The Annual Account amounts to \$70,918.44. The following are the principal sources of income and expenditure at the date above specified:—

A combination of circumstances which the Board could not control left the Fund in debt at the end of the year, as may be seen from the above statement, over \$2,700.

As the financial year does not close till the 31st July, no definite report can be made for the current year. This report will be presented at the next Annual Conferences. The Book Room grant has been increased this

True, genuine loyalty to Methodism and its institutions, and united and persevering effort on the part of our ministers and people, will place the Fund in a position in which it will be a lasting boon and blessing to the Church, and to the aged, the widow, and the fatherless.

Resolved,—That while we have, on this occasion, complied as far as possible with the expressed wishes of the Circuits concerned, we desire to kindly point out to the esteemed brethren composing the Quarterly Official Boards, that in so small a Conference as ours the pursuance of the course above referred to cannot fail to cause serious embarrassment to the Stationing Committee, lessen the efficiency of our Church as a whole, and disturb, to some extent, the present state of good feeling and mutual confidence so happily existing between ministers and people and among the various Circuits and Missions of our Conference. We would remind our people that our churches are not independent congregations, but a Connexion, and that the principle of the itinerancy can be given its highest efficiency only when both people and pastors loyally surrender into the hands of the Stationing Committee, elected by the joint vote of .xity and

# OBITUARY.

### WILLIAM BENJAMIN CUYLER.

The Rev. William Benjamin Cuyler was born in the neighborhood of Whitechurch, Ont., in the year 1859. He must have given his heart to God in early life, for he was yet young when he began to preach the gospel and was received as a probationer in connection with the London Conference of the Methodist Church. He was a painstaking student, and was successful in revival services.

In 1883 Bro. Cuyler met Rev. C. M. Tate at St. Catharines, Ont., and expressed a strong desire to consecrate himself to the Indian mission work, and in the following year the Lord opened the way, and he was sent to the Bella Bella Mission. He soon endeared himself to all the brethren on the District, and to them his memory is precious. His unbounded enthusiasm led him to visit distant tribes of Indians in open cance, exposed to inclement weather, regardless of personal comfort, so that we cannot but record the conviction that his unselfish devotion led to the affliction that compelled him to give up the work he loved so well. He gained the affection of all the Indians, who wept when they heard that they would see his face no more.

He spent the last six months of his life on the Nicola Mission. Though not able to speak above a whisper, he delighted to talk of Divine things, and took part in the class-meeting which was held in his house. His testimony was ever cheerful, clear, hopeful, and full of a simple trust in Jesus as a Saviour to the uttermost. For some weeks before he died he expressed a strong desire to reach his father's home in Ontario, and the day before his call to his Father's home in glory actually travelled in a carriage about twenty miles. His devoted wife was with him during his last hours, and when he complained of dimness of sight, instinctively fearing death, she asked him if he could see Jesus, and if he could trust Jesus for salvation in temporal death and from eternal death. With difficulty (as speech now almost failed him), but with unwavering confidence, he answered, "Yes," and sinking into unconsciousness in a few moments "he was not," for God had taken him. He was buried at Nicola, where a large congregation attended his funeral. A discourse was delivered from Rev. xiv. 13, portraying the lessons of his life, the heroism of his sacrifice, and the glories of his eternal home.

# BRITISH COLUMBIA CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

TO THE SOCIETIES WITHIN ITS BOUNDS.

BELOVED BRETHREN:-

Upon the occasion of our first meeting as a Conference we address to you a few words of affection and counsel, knowing that you are equally with ourselves interested in the work in which we are engaged, and that those "who tarry by the stuff" are entitled to share the spoils with their brethren "who go down to the battle."

To those who have personal recollection of the arrival of the first Methodist missionaries in this land of the setting sun, and indeed to all of us, the organization of the British Columbia Conference is not only an interesting, but also an important event. This organization was effected on the eleventh day of the present month of May, under the direction of the Rev. John A. Williams, D.D., one of the honored General Superintendents of the Methodist Church, to whose wisdom, courtesy and fervent piety is largely due the fact that the session of Conference and the accompanying services have been to us all "seasons of grace and sweet delight." We trust that this day will prove an auspicious one in the history of Methodism in this "glorious Province" of ours. You will learn with pleasure that the laymen elected by the several Districts were present with few exceptions, evincing the deepest interest, and taking their full share of the business of the Church.

Perhaps it may be well in this, our first pastoral, to state that the Canadian branch of the great Methodist family to which we belong numbered last year 1,610 ministers and probationers for the ministry, 2,692 local preachers and exhorters, 6,641 class-leaders, and 197,479 Church members; with 24,646 teachers and 191,185 scholars in the 2,675 Sun-

The statistics of our infant Conference seem very small beside these grand totals, and yet to those of us who can appreciate the difficulties to be surmounted, the progress made during the past twenty-eight years leads us to thank God and take courage. The Great Head of the Church, to whose blessing all real prosperity is due, has vouchsafed to every branch of our work a fair measure of success. We have now four self-supporting Circuits, which are repaying with interest the liberal amounts spent upon them by the Missionary Society in the days of their dependency. Among the fourteen domestic missions or dependent Circuits are several which hope in the near future to reach a similar position. We have nine central missions among the Indians of the Province, with numerous outlying preaching places, supplied by our missionaries and native assistants. In addition to these we are carrying on a very interesting mission among the Chinese, and a second is to be established immediately. On all these fields of Christian

endeavor there have been souls saved, and the future is full of promise.

We are now possessed of the necessary organization for the management of our own affairs, and the effective prosecution of our work as a branch of the Church of the living God in British Columbia. But we hardly need to remind you that no arrangements however wise, or institutions however excellent, whether recent or accient, can of themselves accomplish anything. The success of the work of God upon earth depends upon the fidelity, love and zeal of His people, and consequently upon the measure of the Holy Spirit received by them as the spirit of sanctification and of power. Brethren, have ye received the Holy Ghost since ye believed? In proportion to the completeness of our separation from sin, consecration to God, and sympathy with men, will be our usefulness as a Christian people. Let us not forget that our vocation is "to spread Scriptural holiness throughout the land." To do this we must experience it in our hearts and exemplify it in our lives. Then shall we be "living epistles known and read of all men." Let us then give our first and most earnest attention to the cultivation of pure and undefiled religion in our own souls by the use of such means as are provided therefor, such as the study of the Word, meditation, prayer and keeping ourselves unspotted from the world. We would earnestly impress upon you the importance of family devotion and training. Let your homes be bright and cheerful, but let them also be sacredly pure and well ordered. There are also the various forms of associated worship, select and general, to which we charge von, be loval and true. Let us "not mend our rules but keep them." God has honored these means of grace in the past, and will yet make them wells from which many thirsty souls shall drink the waters of salvati with (

salvation. So far as you are concerned let nothing successfully compete with God's Church for the first claim upon your time and energy.

And while we value, as God's appointed means for the conversion of sinners and the sanctification of believers, the public preaching of the word and gatherings for prayer and praise and the relation of religious experience, we would emphasize the importance of using every possible means for the religious instruction and salvation of the young. The hope of our Church is in the intelligent and faithful training of our children and young people in the doctrines, experience and practice of religion. In home, Sunday-school and select meetings let us lovingly and zealously obey our Lord's command, "Feed my lambs." In the prosecution of this divinely-appointed task as regards yourselves and others you will find invaluable the assistance to be derived from the use of the varied and excellent literature furnished by our own publishing house.

The subject of finance we cannot overlook without neglecting a plain duty. Reports from the domestic missions show that the material support afforded the self-denying and hard-worked missionaries on these fields has, in too many cases, been utterly inadequate to the necessities of the case. Both ministers and laymen in our Conference have been deeply impressed with this painful fact, and a scheme for a Sustentation Fund has been agreed upon, which, if liberally responded to by our people, will considerable relieve the situation. We commend this matter to your practical sympathy, as we do also the various connexional funds of the Church on behalf of which an annual appeal is made to you. Remember, dear brethren, that we are not independent Churches but a Connexion, in which the highest efficiency can be attained only by the strong bearing the burdens of the weak. and so fulfilling the law of love.

Ere this message reaches you the most of you will have taken leave of your present pastors and welcomed their successors. It is well for both pastors and people to seek by God's grace to make such transitions turning points from which a life of more intense devotion to God and aggressive effort shall date its beginning. By the lamented death of one of our compartively young and promising missionaries, Bro. Cuyler, the first Methodist minister to ascend to heaven from British Columbia, we are admonished that "the night cometh when no man can work." Let us "work while it is called to-day."

The views of the Conference upon the great questions of Sabbath observance and temperance, as expressed in the reports of the respective

Committees, will be found to harmonize with the advanced position taken by our beloved Church in all lands upon these subjects.

And now, brethren beloved, we "commend you to God and to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up and to give you an inheritance among them that are sanctified;" and we pray that this the first year of our existence as a separate Conference may be to yourselves and your pastors a year of unexampled success in the given work of saving souls, and that if we shall be spared to meet in the continual assembly we may have to tell of copious outpourings of the Holy Spirit, resulting in powerful and wide-spread revivals of religion, affecting all sections of the country and all classes of our cosmopolitan population.
