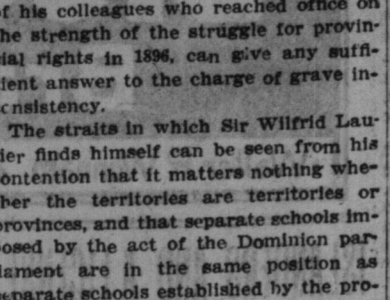

FINANCE GETS A SHOCK

Legislature Will Be Asked to Give the City Power to Issue Debentures.

Hamilton, March 23.—(Special.)—This evening the finance committee agreed to give the following grants:

- Hamilton Art School, \$1000.
Queen Victoria memorial statue, \$1000.
Salvation Army Rescue Home, \$1000.
Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, \$500.

Veteran firemen, \$500.

The 51st Regiment will also likely get \$2500.

that riding were stated when they learned that he was to be appointed to the office of speaker. Mr. Hoyte was certain that he would discharge his duties in a manner worthy of the long line of distinguished gentlemen who had preceded him.

Mr. Hoyte was delighted to have the honor of being the first Conservative to move the address. He has been told that tradition was being violated in that young members of the house are usually selected for this duty. But tradition was not being violated. "We are all young members on this side—we are new to the situation," was Mr. Hoyte's reason for calling himself a new member.

He added that the Conservatives were all in "primal bliss and innocence." He must recognize the great change that had taken place in public opinion. He did not intend to boast, or to indulge in language of exultation, for the victory of the Conservative party was after thirty-three years they had obtained an overwhelming victory. The reasons for this victory had been discussed, and the members of the opposition (Mr. Harcourt) in interview in the press, had made the remark that he had "lost faith in popular forties." Mr. Hoyte was surprised at that. Mr. Harcourt once held the opinion that "populists" was vox dei, but he had lost faith in that vox dei, Mr. Whitney and he lost the majority, too.

Can't Be Hypnotized. It was a question, Mr. Hoyte went on, if any succeeding government would be able to hypnotize the people for so long a time as the late government was in doing. Mr. Hoyte would give his opinion of the reasons for the decided change in popular opinion. The other party wanted no more promises but they wanted that party had not

the slightest intention of keeping them. Another reason was that the people do not want any "fantasizing" legislation. He was glad that the verdict was so emphatic, but he reminded the gentlemen opposite that there was a silver lining to every cloud. It might have been worse. There was a man in a chair, and when Hercules pulled him off three-fourths of his body remained attached to the seat.

Reference was made to the educational interests of the province, and pride expressed regarding the development of the Agricultural College. He compared the wheat yield of several of the states of the union with that of Ontario. For instance, the average yield in New York State was 22 bushels to the acre, as compared with 18.05 in Ontario. The surplus of the college was better than any other in the land.

The departure of Lord and Lady Minto to represent the crown found England glad to prostrate colonial sentiment.

Operate the Road. Referring to the Temiskaming Railway, Mr. Hoyte said the position of the Conservatives when opposing the road to a company. In Australia and other countries, when people were in the management of government railways, they were invariably a success, and he believed that the same would be true in Ontario.

With the extension contemplated, the Temiskaming Railway would be within limits of the province. While the improvements in navigation, he believed the straits would be navigated, giving an outlet for the resources of the west.

Mr. Hoyte said no sterner or more important could be erected than that which would be erected by the political sagacity of the late Hon. A. S. Hardy when he established the Agricultural Experiment Station, and reserves there were no less than 7,061,120 acres of land, and the policy of the government was to continue the policy of the preservation of the forest wealth of the province.

The Liberal administration had boasted that it would be a success, and he believed that the same would be true in Ontario. 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Town in Darkness Owing to the Burning Out of an Armature.
