THE DAUPHIN DISTRICT.

A Toronto Man Makes a Tour of Inspection—Development of the Lumber Resources.

D. B. Hanna, superintendent of the Lake Manitow Railway and Canal Co., accompanied by Messrs. Wadsworth of Toronto, and McDonald of Eastern Ontario, returned on Wednesday from a trip to Dauphin. From the end of the track at Valley River the gentlemen drove north to Lake Pepigois, through the Mowsey River settlement, and inspected the resources of the district. Mr. McDonald is connected with a large lumbering firm in the east, and was much interested in the resources of the northern country, and in conversation with a Free Press reporter Mr. Wadsworth stated that the lumber trade is being developed in the district, of good quality, which will materially develop the lumbering interests of the country.

PERISHED IN THE FLAMES.

Two Most Disastrous Fires in Hoboken.
Hoboken, N.J., Jan. 31.—This city was visited by two disastrous fires between 11.30 o'clock Saturday night and 7 o'clock this morning. Seven persons were killed and thirty families were made homeless. The Saturday night fire started in the 3-story frame building at 410 Newark-street. Here six persons died and three were injured. Mrs. Nellie Schroeder, 46 years old, and her five children, Henry, aged 11, Maggie T. Kate J. and Edna, aged 2, 3, 4 and 5 respectively, and Willie 3 months old. The father of the family, Charles Schroeder, was in a nearby saloon playing cards while his wife and children were dying.

THE SECOND FIRE.

The second fire started at 3 o'clock this morning in a 6-story double-deck tenement at 157 1/2-159 1/2 in this city. The front rooms, Nos. 157 and 159 were entirely wrecked, and No. 158 was damaged badly. One child was killed and three others injured. Mrs. Mabel Mangie, 8 years old, was the only survivor of the fire.
