BYLAWS FOR THE BICYCLISTS

Transgressors Liable to a Fine of \$50 or Six Months Lord Salisbury had aheady received favorable assurances from Washington. in Jail-Enactment of the City Council.

The following is a copy of the new road bylaws for bicyclists, passed a few weeks ago by the City Council, and a copy of which is to be posted in bicycle clubs, bicycle liveries and on the streets:

1. The provisions shall apply to highways, there is and other public places in Toronto.

2. Bicyclists in overtaking persons or any other vehicles shall give audible warning of their approach before attempting to pass, and shall pass to left.

3. Bicyclists shall slacken up when approaching and crossing street intersections.

They also claim that the Mother Country should enable them to reconstruct the colony's shattered finances by guaranteeing a loan which would enable it to re-fund its present 4 per cent. debt at 2 1-2 per cent., and falling such assistance they ask for a commission to inquire into the mineral and other resources of the island as a means of drawing investors' attention to the same and thus providing for the development. and thus providing for the development of new industries to take the place of

the moribund fisheries. The island has also got into a muddle over its aggressive railway policy. The mileage of railroads now completed is 680 miles, to build which involved an expenditure of about \$11,000,000, which is the heaviest item in aspublic debt of \$18,000,000. The charges on this amount to \$700.000 a year. As long as the work was in progress the money expended for it came back into circulation and produced a fictitious prosperity, which has now disappeared with the completion of the railroad building. But while the latter was in progress the people of the island would hear nothing against railreads, although they are now apparently awakening to the fact that the lines are disadvantage instead of a blessing. In fact, the annual deficit of about \$250,-000 in running the roads was such a serious addition to the expenses and taxation that the expedient was adopted of leasing the colonial railroads, docks and telegraphs to a contractor for a cash-payment of \$1,500,000. The contractor has opened coal mines upon the lines, and is endeavoring to develop industries which it is hoped will make the roads self-supporting and which, if successful, will go far to solving the problem of giving employment to Newfoundland's population.



Liverpool Lower on an Increase in the English Visible—European Crop Reports.

A peculiar condition of affairs has developed in the United States flour trade. The visible supply of wheat in the country shows the smallest total since 1882, and the indications are that this shortage downward movement was due to several causes, among which were an increase of 302,000 bushels in the English visible supply and the consequent weakness of Liverpool prices. A sill more important factor, however, was the added impetus shown in the shipments of new wheat to market. Prices were somewhat steadled on the other hand by the announcement that the American visible has been reduced to a little over nine million bushels, the smallest on record.
