

WIDESPREAD WONDERMENT

Has Been Occasioned by the Calling Out of the Militia and Militia Reserves.

London, Oct. 18 .- The calling out of the stories of preparations against continental combinations are reviewed. It is freely rumored that the Government is determined to demonstrate to Europe that the British army is not a negligible quantity.

Probably both the attitude of Europe and that of the natives in South Africa have something to do with this movement; and the lavish display of force is intended, doubtless, not only to check the ill-will apparent on both sides of the Rhine, and beyond the Vistula, but also to guard against the "black peril." According to the statistics published this year, the militia including the permanent staff and the militia reserve, numbers 132,493.

Is Germany Trying to Fix a Price

Africa?

London, Oct. 18.—The Daily News, commenting upon the agitation of the German press and the announcement of The Neuste Nachrichten, that the Colonial Council had adopted a resolution declaring it compatible with German colonial interests to bandon Samoa in return for sufficient indemnification, says: "There can be little doubt that Samoa is just now an important item in the deal which Germany is trying to arrange with England and perhaps with the United States.

"We regard it probable that Germany is still pressing Lord Salisbury for a tripartite division of the island, which would give her the lion's share of the spoils as the price of her neutrality in South Africa. In its present mood the English nation might not like to hear that something had been bartered away merely to induce another nation to be kind; but Germany might be willing to take a reward for her good behavior in some other quarter and to offer Apla as a sort of tangible consideration for concealing the real nature of the transaction."

HOSPITAL SHIP.

The Maine Has Been Lent Without Charge to the British Government by Uncle Sam.

New York, Oct. 18.—The steamship Maine, which has been lent without charge to the British Government by the Atlantic Transport Company, left Philadelphia on Oct. 10. On her arrival in London she will be at once fitted up as a hospital ship. The Maine is a steel, three-masted, single screw vessel, built by William Gray and Comwand and launched in July, 1887. She is 315 feet in length, 40 feet beam and more than 20 feet deep. She has three decks, and her spross register is 2816 tons, the net register being 1813 tons. Below she is divided into six watertight compartments. The Maine has been employed as a carrier of cattle and other freight. She is commanded by Capt. Muzzlewhite, and has a crew of 40 men. When refitted she will accommodate about 300 persons in the hospital quarters.

The immediate effect of the temporary settlement of the Alaskan boundary question will be that a meeting of the High Joint Commission will occur, probably next month. It is not understood that the commission will deal with the Alaskan boundary question, the negotiations for the permanent settlement of this dispute being left to the two Governments.

GEN PIO OFFERS TO SELL OUT

Promises to Play Crooked and Betray Aguinaldo and His Army for a Financial Consideration.

OTIS WILL NOT BUY SURRENDERS.

American General is Suspicious That It May Be Himself That Would Be Sold if He Accepted.

Manila, Oct. 18 .- General Otis has received messages purporting to come from the insurgent general, Pio del Pilar, offer-ing to sell out his army and to deliver Aguinaldo into the hands of the Americans. Although he is not satisfied that this offer is authentic, it is not intrinsically improbable. The policy of General Otis is firmly set against buying any surrenders.
Pio del Pilar offers for the sum of \$50,000 to refrain from attacking Manila with his army; for the sum of \$250,000 he offers to surrender his army after a sham battle, both sides firing into the air, and for the sum of \$500,000 he says he will procure the overthrow of the insurrection and the capture of Aguinaldo, Paterno and the

He Will Bear Watching. In the course of the communication he refers to Aguinaldo in contemptuous terms, indicating that strained relations exist be tween them. Reports are being received from the districts occupied by the enemy

tween them. Reports are being received from the districts occupied by the enemy that the Filipinos believe that Pio del Pilar has an audacious plan to break through the American lines into Manila and to seize General Otis and the Archbishop. Possibly these rumors were started with an idea of helping him to make a deal with the Americans. It is unnecessary to say that the Americans would welcome an attack of that sort. There has been much speculation of late regarding the whereabouts of Pio del Pilar. The recent attack at La Loma is credited to his men. It is believed that he is now in the vicinity of San Mateo Valley, with a force of from 1800 to 3000 men.

A Plot Discovered.

Ten former Spanish soldlers, who were captured by the Filipinos, and for a time acted as officers and members of a Filipino artiliery regiment, located in the vicinity of Santa Rosa, in the Laguna de Bay district, determined to surrender the artillery to the Americans. The pot was discovered by the Filipinos, who killed seven of the conspirators, the other three making their escape to Manila. It appears that when the surrender was determined upon the Spaniards delegated one of their number to proceed to Manila and to propose to General Otis to surrender, after a pre-arranged mock battle, about '12 pieces, including Krupp and Nordenfeldt rapid-fire guns, well supplied with ammunition from the Lipa powder factory, in exchange for certain sums to be paid the Spaniards, who were to be pardoned for carrying arms against the Americans and to be transported to Spain.

The delegate left Santa Rosa, and, accompanied by three Filipinos, entered the American lines at Calamba. The Filipinos did not proceed far, deciding to await his return at a given time. As the delegate was detained in Manila longer than they had expected, they grew suspicious, and returned to Santa Rosa, perceived two men on the beach hurriedly embarking in a cance and pushing out toward them took them on board. They reported that the Filipinos, on discoveri


