ONE DAY AT THE CITY HALL.

Rust Wants a Connection Between the Metropolitan Railway and the Canadian Pacific.

WORKS APPROPRIATIONS USED UP.

Assessment Appeals in Ward 4-The Canadian Contingent Send OR-Civic Notes.

The City Engineer, in his fortnightly report to the Board of Works, asks to be allowed to exercise his own judgment in sending out postcards to taxpayers previous to recommending new pavements. His reason for asking is that property-owners frequently wait on his department, requesting that a certain class of roadway or pavement be recommended. In some cases it is found that a roadway is in such a dangerous condition that it is absolutely necessary that a new pavement be constructed; and, owing to local conditions and other circumstances, it is advisable in the public interest that a first-class pavement be constructed, whereas, if postcards were sent out to the property-owners concerned, they might unwisely express a preference for a cheap cinder block pavement, which, under the circumstances, it would not be advisable to recommend.

Coater With the Company.

Referring to the complaint made to him regarding the blocking of York-street by the cars and freight of the Metropolitan Railway Company, he thinks it advisable to send a sub-committee to confer with the company, with a view to arranging upon what terms they can make connection of their system with that of the C.P.R. If such a connection were made, he adds, it would remedy the existing state of affairs.

Is Short of Money.

The following amounts are requested to be provided for by Council, as the appropriations are now exhausted: Roadways, \$4000; sidewalks, \$2000; sewers, \$11,000; street watering, \$5000; street cleaning, \$1300; bridges, \$800.

In His Report on the Cattle Byres Road.

Mr. Rust says he had a consultation with the City Solicitor, who gave as his opinion that nothing could be done until legislation is procured. He adds that a new road is necessary, and it would cost about \$2000.

More New Pavements.

The following pavements are recommended: Asphalt-Lowther-avenue, from Water-road to Spadina-road, estimated cost \$240,000; York-street, from Huron-street to Bernard-avenue, estimated cost \$10,300; city square, O'Brien-avenue, from Huron-street, west side, to Bloor-street, estimated cost \$10,300; Bloor-street, south side, from Huron-street, east side, to Avenue-road to Bedford-road; Huron-street, both sides, from Lowther to Bernard-avenue; St. Nicholas-street, from Breda-bank to St. Joseph.

To Clean the Reservoir.

With reference to the cleaning out of the reservoir, Mr. Rust says that this should be done each year, to keep down the growth of weeds and also to prevent the accumulation of small fish, which are drawn into the pipes, and from there into the service pipes, which they frequently obstruct. The committee will recollect that serious complaints were received last year from the north end of the city of the large number of small fish that frequently blocked the pipes, also that the Medical Officer recommended cleaning the reservoir to keep the water in a state of purity. It is suggested that the City Treasurer be instructed to provide the sum of \$500 for this purpose.

Exhibition Park Water Lots.

The Ontario Government forwarded to the City Solicitor yesterday the lease of the water lots in front of Exhibition Park. The city is now enabled to commence the long-contemplated improvements.

A Request to Council.

The Bell Telephone Company have asked Council to give them permission to erect poles on the following streets: Liberty-street, Fraser-avenue to the roadway and Gladstone-avenue to Van Horne; Cowan-avenue, King to Queen; Dovercourt-road, Queen to College; O'Brien-avenue, Queen to Maple Grove; Spencer-avenue, King to Huxley; Beaconfield-avenue, Crawford-street to Bloor; and Madison-avenue, from Bloor to Dupont; Charles-street, Church to Jarvis; Queen-street, Queen to Cameron-place; Cameron-place, Parliament-street, Wilton-avenue to Oak-street; St. Joseph-street, St. Michael's-lane to Queen's Park; Bellair-street, Bloor to Yorkville-avenue; Heath-street, Yonge to Avenue-road; Summerhill-avenue, Yonge to Reservoir Park. The poles on Cowan, Madison and Summerhill-avenues and Dovercourt-road are to replace old ones.

Deford, Clarence-square, reduced, land \$10 per foot, and building \$200; W. W. Ogden, income reduced from \$1600 to \$1200.
