REPORT

—OF—

The Session of Knox Church, Ottawa,

*Presented at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation,
held January 11th, 1883.*

THE good hand of our God being upon us, we have been preserved through another year; and as we stand upon the threshold of a new year, we look back upon the past with gratitude to God, the giver of all good, and on into the future with confidence in His promises and hope in His mercy and faithfulness.

In some important respects we begin this year in circumstances of greater hopefulness than those which have marked our history as a congregation since entering our present house of worship. By the large-hearted liberality of the members and friends of the congregation, our indebtedness was greatly reduced during the past year; so that with lessened financial responsibilities, with more prosperous times, with the drift of members from the city diminishing, and the number of families identifying themselves with us increasing, we mingle gladness with our thanksgiving for the favorable circumstances in which we begin the year, and for the prospect of brightening hope that is before us.

On looking at the communion roll, though peace and harmony have prevailed, and the general health of the congregation has

been good, yet not a few changes have taken place. Some esteemed by us for their spiritual graces, and endeared to us by years of Christian fellowship, have heard the call of the Master and have gone up to meet Him, and others have moved beyond our bounds

Three were taken from us by the hand of death. These were

Mr. Wm. Gardner, who died February 27th, 1882.

Mrs. Thomas Clarke, " April 9th, "

Mrs. John S. Durie, " May 3rd, "

From other families loved members have been taken, whilst others have passed through seasons of severe sickness and sore trials. But whilst deep shadows have darkened some of our homes, God's grace has been signally displayed in sustaining and cheering the dying, in helping and raising up those who were brought low, and in consoling and comforting the bereaved. So that in the midst of afflictions and under the pressure of sorrow, many have been enabled to discern and understand the loving kindness of the Lord; and while commending all the bereaved and afflicted to the Father of mercies and the God of all comfort, the Session at the same time tender to them all their sincere and heartfelt sympathy.

When this Session submitted their last statement, the number on the communion roll was 231. During the year there have been received 29—13 by certificate and 16 by profession of faith. The removals have been 19—3 by death and 16 chiefly by certificate to other churches or removing from the city. The net gain has been 10, and the number on the Roll, 241.

The number of Baptisms have been 12.

By the report of the Temporal Committee, the financial affairs of the congregation will be fully laid before you.

The attendance upon all the services of the Church on the Sabbath, the Prayer-meeting, the Sabbath-school and Bible-class has been regular and marked by an encouraging increase in numbers.

To the ladies who have distributed *The Monthly Record* and gathered the contributions to the schemes of the Church, the thanks of the congregation are due.

By last statement the balance on hand of the Session Fund for the relief of the poor was \$12.22. During the year \$4.00 have been paid out, leaving a balance of \$8.22.

And now, brethren, let us at the beginning of this new year, renew our consecration to God, and by earnest prayer and faithful persevering effort ; seek by His grace to reach a higher plane of Christian living, and a fuller blessing on all our work. We have great promises, and therefore should have great expectations. Our hope in God should inspire us with confidence and courage, whereby we shall be able to fulfil the duty of every passing moment, and stand ready for all the services and sacrifices that await us in the future, "Wherefore gird up the loins of your mind, be sober and hope to the end for the grace that is to be brought unto you at the revelation of Jesus Christ," and amid all the influences from within and without that tend to draw us away from the "simplicity that is in Christ and the faith of the Gospel, and to paralyze the nerves of Christian activity." "Be ye, steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord."

THIRTY-EIGHTH
ANNUAL REPORT

—OF—

The Temporal Committee of Knox Church.

OTTAWA.

In whatever way done, whether well or ill, faithfully or unfaithfully, resolutely or fitfully, our work as a congregation has for another year ended, and in God's good providence, we are met once more, critically to review the past and hopefully to look forward to the future.

In reviewing financially the work of the past year, the first matter upon which the congregation is to be congratulated is that the Warnock loan of \$6,000, bearing interest at eight per cent., was paid off in January last, and by this reduction of our debt, a substantial annual saving of \$480 has been effected. By the payment of this sum of \$6,000 our debt is now reduced to \$27,000, for which we are paying interest at six per cent., so that the exact amount now demanded for interest is \$1,620 per annum.

In presenting our Report for last year, we expressed the hope that after a most thorough canvass of the congregation, during which an urgent appeal was made, heartily and almost unanimously responded to by our contributors, we could confidently

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rely upon receiving the sum of \$5,000, a sum indispensably necessary, if frequent and often futile attempts to increase our otherwise insufficient revenue, were to be abandoned. After making allowance for necessary annual deductions by removal and arrears, we are glad to be able to report that our hope in the continuously increasing liberality of our people, has not only been fully realized, but considerably exceeded, for from the three common and constant sources of our annual revenue, namely—Weekly Contributions, Ordinary Collections, and Prayer-meeting Collections, we have received the sum of \$4,993.22, and if to this we add—as we fairly may—the Thanksgiving Offering of \$282.25, the handsome sum of \$5,275.47 has been during the past year contributed by our people.

That we may see the full meaning of these figures, we may glance at the amounts received from these sources from 1878 to the present time, and also compare them with the amounts received from the same sources in 1872. In this way we shall be better able to estimate the financial progress made during the decade beginning with 1872 and ending with 1882.

From this comparative statement it will be seen—

First—That in 1882 not only did we raise more from each of these three sources of revenue than was raised in any of the years

compared, but it may be added that with the exception of the years 1876 and 1877, we received more than was ever raised in any former year during the past history of the congregation.

Second—That from Weekly Contributions we raised this year, \$289.42 more than in 1881; \$265.67 more than in 1880; \$713.25 more than in 1879; \$274.40 more than in 1878; and \$2502.24 more than in 1872.

Third—That from Ordinary Collections we received this year \$77.91 more than in 1881; \$118.59 more than in 1880; \$36.85 more than in 1879; \$45.16 more than in 1878; and \$48.77 more than in 1872.

Fourth—That from all three sources combined we received during the present year \$367.62 more than in 1881; \$384.67 more than in 1880; \$756.38 more than in 1879; \$319.74 more than in 1878; and the revenue from these three sources in 1882 exceeds by \$2544.91 that is by a sum \$96.60 greater than double the revenue raised in 1872, by the united congregation, before the separation from us of those contributors who united in the formation of the Daly-street Church. That with all our difficulties, and especially in view of our comparatively small numbers, such a financial statement is possible is surely a matter, both for deep satisfaction and devout thankfulness.

Our actual financial position at the end of the year is also a matter for unmingled satisfaction. By the Treasurer's Financial Statement it will be seen that the total revenue from all sources, amounted to \$11732.60, and the total expenditure for the year was \$11,671.13, leaving a balance in hand of \$61.47.

In regard to the future, our prospect was never brighter since we undertook our present heavy financial obligations. We have proved indubitably that we can, with God's good hand upon us, directly raise, within ourselves, and without special effort, a sum sufficient to meet all our financial obligations, and thus prevent the necessity of any floating debt. All that is now necessary is, that our people, in the same spirit of liberality which characterized them

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amid times sufficiently trying to test their faith and steadfastness, should now maintain undiminished the same readiness of hand and willingness of heart, until after a short respite, and by a united and therefore successful effort, we shall still further reduce the amount of our indebtedness.

Thankful for the mercies and success of the past, and hopeful regarding the labors and issues of the future, let us thank God and take courage, and let us nerve ourselves by faith and prayer, to do all our work as a congregation "heartily as to the Lord and not unto men; not with eye service as men pleasers, but as the servants of Christ doing the will of God from the heart."

IN presenting the annual Sabbath School Report for 1882, it first becomes us with truly grateful hearts to praise the Lord for the many tokens of His goodness, shown both to teachers and scholars throughout the past year.

The money collected by the children during December, 1881, was judiciously spent by a committee appointed by the Teachers in securing a large addition to our formerly inadequate library. In selecting these books the committee were actuated by the desire of securing, as far as possible, works of higher literary and moral worth than many previously purchased could in truth be said to possess: and the new books are being constantly and eagerly read by members of the Bible-class and Sabbath-school. Much remains still to be done in order to make the Library fulfil effectually its proper function in the work of the School, and therefore the Teachers have wisely determined to make during the present year, further substantial additions to the books now in our possession.

The attendance has slightly increased, rising from an average of 96 in 1881 to 98 for the past year. Although the average attendance is not so large as might reasonably be expected, yet it cannot by any means be accounted for by negligence or carelessness on the part of the Teachers whose attendance on the Sabbath, and faithfulness in the discharge of their duties during the year, have been worthy of all commendation.

John Buchanan, George McKinnon and Eva McKinnon were present every Sabbath during the year, while Alex. Macmillan and Jas. Taylor were absent on one Sabbath only. It is worthy of record that in the somewhat long period of seven years, James Taylor has been absent on only two Sabbaths.

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Mr. Cunningham's class wins the prize offered by the Superintendent for good attendance, closely followed, however, by Miss Brown's class, who were successful last year.

By the accompanying financial statement of the Treasurer, it will be seen that there is a substantial balance on hand, amounting to \$84.10.

It is cheering to be able to report that God has been pleased to give us evidencé of His Spirit's power in applying savingly the truth taught to the hearts and consciences of some, for five young persons from the Sabbath-school have been led, during the year, to confess Christ before men by professing faith in Him as their Saviour.

The lessons for the year were taken consecutively from the Gospel by Saint Mark, thus giving splendid opportunities, which have been faithfully embraced by the Teachers of presenting to the children the main facts in the unique life, the wonderful works, the atoning death and the triumphant resurrection of our Lord and Saviour. Let us cherish the hope warranted by God's own infallible word that the seed thus sown may by the Spirit's power grow to full and rich fruition in the lives of not a few, and that more frequently "one shall say—I am the Lord's; and another shall call himself by the name of Jacob, and another shall subscribe with his hand unto the Lord, and surname himself by the name of Israel."

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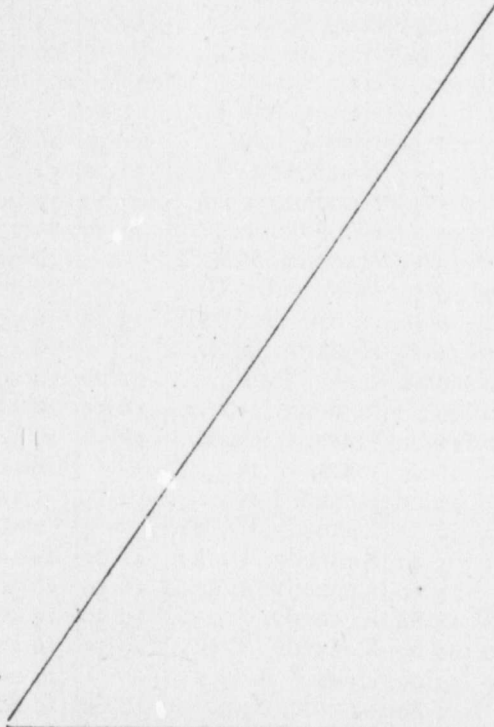
