



"Whereas the requirements of pre-sent immigration laws are made to apply to all third and second-class passengers coming into Canada from Great Britain and Europe, without regard to former residence, thus class-ing returning Canadian citizens as immigrants, and requiring them to submit to medical examination and educational tests the same as incom-

ing immigrants;
"And whereas these tests are not required of saloon passengers, who, by the payment of a higher rate, are practically exempt from the above-named

Brother of Bob Squeezes Thru Barred Window and Succeeds in Eluding Belated Pursuers.

The city police were notified at once, and guards started immediately to search the surrounding lands.

This was supplemented by continental operations, especially among the low-priced issues, among which Erie and Southern Pacific were the feature, owing partly to the shortage of stock. To-day there were some rather sharp setbacks, accompanied by irregularity from the advance of yesterday on adverse Wall-

Erie was four, and Southern Pacific and Baltimore & Ohio each two points, dearer, but the other securities show little change on the week. In view of the South American and Egyptian gold requirements, and the fact that the Bank of England still falls to get the gold arrivals, the discount market made a vallant attempt to advance discount rates, It succeeded, however, only temporarily, owing to the abundance of money which is being released from diminishing trade.
